## Legal Aid Clinic Expands Service

The Highland Park-Highwood Legal Aid Clinic now serves financially eligible individuals who live *or* work in the City of Highland Park and the City of Highwood. The decision to make services accessible to individuals employed in Highland Park and Highwood came from a significant number of requests received during the first year of operation from the local workforce.

Managing Attorney Kathryn Vanden Berk said, “We hope that the employers of Highland Park and Highwood will encourage their employees to seek our legal assistance. Our volunteer attorneys are here to advise, advocate and ensure social justice for these individuals.”

Potential workforce clients may access Clinic legal services by providing proof of income and a recent pay stub as proof of employment. Those living in Highland Park and Highwood need to provide proof of income and residency.

Founded by Mayor Nancy Rotering on May 1, 2015, the Clinic provides access to justice for individuals in the areas of immigration, landlord-tenant matters, and domestic abuse. The Clinic recently became U.S. Bureau of Immigration Affairs accredited for legal work in immigration law. The Clinic is located at the Fire House, 1830 Green Bay Road, Highland Park. ## Hot Weather Tips from Fire Dept.

- Drink more fluids; don't wait until you're thirsty to drink.
- Don't drink liquids that contain alcohol or lots of sugar.
- Stay indoors and in an air-conditioned place. If your home doesn't have a/c, cooling centers are available at the Recreation Center of Highland Park and the Highland Park Police Department.
- Electric fans provide comfort but will not prevent heat-related illness. Cool off with a cool shower or bath.
- Wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing.
- Never leave people or pets in a closed, parked vehicle!
- Anyone at any time can suffer from heat-related illness, and some people are at greater risk than others. Check regularly on: infants and young children, people aged 65 or older, people with mental illness, and the physically ill.
- Limit your outdoor activity to morning and evening hours.
- Protect yourself from the sun with a wide-brimmed hat, sunglasses and sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher.



## 2016 Property Tax Assessments

Moraine Township property owners recently received their 2016 assessment notices (*also known as the "Blue Letter"*). If property owners do not agree with the amount assessed, *they must file an objection no later than September 6, 2016*. Moraine Township Assessor Cynthia Plouché and her staff will help residents understand their assessment, answer exemption questions, provide resources to evaluate their assessment and file an objection. Other assistance includes:

- enrolling for Homestead and Senior Exemptions
- helping income-qualified seniors (*making \$55,000 per year or less*) apply for an assessment freeze
- correcting the Assessor's property record on file if property information is incorrect

## Public Drinking Fountain Water Testing

In light of national events concerning drinking water quality, I recently issued a call to action, asking our government partners to join us in testing all water fountains accessible to the public.

Highland Park water meets or exceeds state and national standards. However, this collaborative effort is a proactive step to protect the health and safety of our residents. Our children spend significant time in our schools, library and at Park District facilities, getting much of their water from fountains

in those buildings. We know that children and seniors are at greater risk for serious health impacts if they are exposed to lead.

City staff began collecting water samples in mid-July. Test results are received approximately two weeks after the sample is taken. Each government entity will post their water results on their respective website. These results should be available in the next few weeks.

Ensuring that our drinking water is safe to drink is one of our fundamental responsibilities.

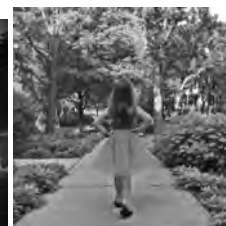

# Our Community



## Back to School Safety Reminders



Beginning the week of August 22, students return to area schools for the 2016-2017 school year. Traffic and pedestrian safety at and around our schools remains a priority for the community and is everyone's responsibility.

The City frequently receives concerns from school officials, parents and residents about the driving behavior of motorists at or near area schools. These concerns generally include complaints that motorists are speeding, disobeying stop signs, failing to yield to pedestrians, failing to obey crossing guards, passing stopped school busses that are loading or unloading, obstructing traffic, texting while driving, using cell phones while driving in a school zone, double parking, and illegal parking in bus loading or no stopping, standing or parking zones.

Historically, the number of parents driving their children to and from school increases with inclement weather. School bus ridership has also declined over the years. Many of the neighborhood schools were constructed years ago and were not designed to handle the traffic volumes, traffic patterns and parking demands of today. These variables greatly increase the risk of an accident and associated injury to children and pedestrians at or near schools. The City has worked with both local school districts to improve traffic flow, parking options, drop-off and pick-up locations and procedures and signage at and around many schools. Police historically increase their presence and enforcement efforts at and near schools and will continue to do so in the future in an effort to encourage traffic and parking regulation compliance.

Please follow these safety measures at or near schools:

- Learn where designated drop-off and pick-up areas are located at your child's respective school and utilize them. Do not use City streets for drop-off and pick-ups, this greatly increases risk to children and pedestrians
- Encourage your children to utilize school busses, carpools and bicycles to reduce the amount of vehicle traffic and pollution at and near schools
- Obey existing State and City traffic and parking laws
- Do not pass a stopped school bus which is loading or unloading passengers while its lights are flashing and its stop signal arm is extended
- Obey State laws and City ordinances pertaining to Electronic Communication Devices and Wireless Telephone use:
  1. A person may not operate a motor vehicle on the road while using an electronic communication device to compose, send or receive electronic messages
  2. A person may not use a hand-held cell phone at anytime while operating a motor vehicle on a City roadway- unless it is utilized in a hands-free mode
  3. Drivers may not utilize a cell phone at anytime while in a school zone or within 500 feet of an emergency scene where police, fire or rescue are present while displaying activated emergency warning lights.

The City appreciates your assistance in keeping our children safe.



## 2016 Capital Improvement Updates

The City's 2016 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is well underway with an aggressive schedule and timeline, which will give way to \$14 million in infrastructure upgrades by the end of the year. Status updates for 2016 Highland Park projects can be found below:

- Asphalt and concrete street repair projects are ongoing. Crack sealing and asphalt patching have been completed.
- Reconstruction of Deerfield Road from the Village of Deerfield to east of US 41 bridge in Highland Park. Storm sewer, traffic signal and sidewalk upgrades are included.
- Bridge reconstruction and repair projects on the Cary Avenue Pedestrian Bridge and the Roger Williams and Linden vehicular bridges are ongoing.

- The Hazel Parking Lot improvement project is out to bid.
- The new LED streetlights in the Village of the Woods subdivision design is finalized and out to bid.
- Storm sewer upgrades on Sumac Road from Old Briar Road to the south end of Sumac Road are ongoing.
- The water meter replacement project is under way and will be near project completion by the end of 2016.
- Crosswalk improvements will begin in late August. Improvements include "bump outs" to shorten pedestrian crosswalk lengths and high visibility continental style pavement markings. 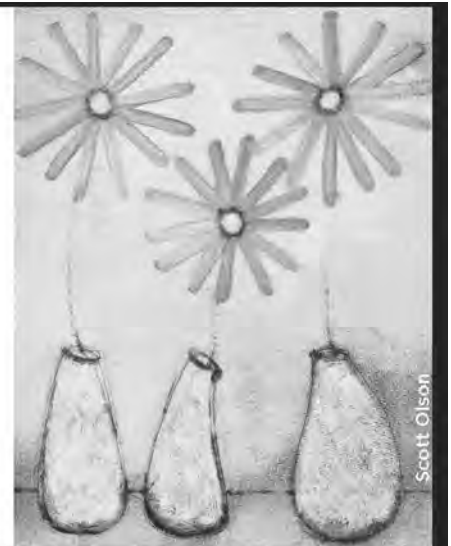

## District 113: Summertime Learning & Referendum Projects Update

### **Summertime Means Learning & Growth for District 113**

In Township High School District 113, summer continues to be a time of learning and growth for students and staff alike.

Again this year, District 113 offered a variety of summer school courses for Highland Park High School and Deerfield High School students including Consumer Economics, World Literature, Creative Writing, Etymology, Introduction to Art, Technology Organization Skills, Summer Dance Workshop, Summer Theatre, Summer Yoga, Spanish, and various math, science and social studies classes.

Our teaching staff is dedicated to

continually honing and improving their craft to better serve students and many have participated in a variety of learning opportunities this summer, including more than a dozen that were sponsored by District 113 and taught by administrators, District 113 staff, and outside facilitators. Workshops were offered in instructional technology, high-quality assessment, supporting students with disabilities, Google tools, STEAM education, supporting student social-emotional wellness and developing student writing skills.

### **Referendum Projects Update**

District 113's referendum construction projects to enhance the learning environments at Highland Park High School and Deerfield High School continue to proceed on time and on

budget. This summer at HPHS, the entire A-Wing (1st floor) was fitted with new windows, lights, and HVAC systems. The B-Wing (all floors) is also being completely gutted and rebuilt from the inside out. The new C-Wing is set to open in August, providing new classrooms; photo, ceramics, and art rooms; and new innovation and collaboration spaces for students. Much of this work is set to be complete when students return to school this month. The pool and athletic facilities—including a new weight room and new yoga and dance studios—are set to be completed by next March.
