COMMUNICATIONS

MAYOR PRO TEM DEAN: Berkley/Royal Oak high risk response team had a hybrid meeting on Oct. 14th, establishing best practices for combined court, discussed the referral process with respect to each city's public safety departments. The next team meeting is November 25th. Very encouraged by the effort and support the team has been receiving from both cities.

The Michigan Municipal League Convention was held virtually September 29th through October 2nd. The two sessions that stood out were, one was reopening for business the future of main street. Commending Berkley chamber and DDA for doing all the right steps already and being able to pivot and explore other possibilities for the downtown businesses. Had the privilege to moderate best practices for parks and recreation under COVID-19 and Director McGarleton is doing all the right things and following the latest guidelines for safety. It is affirming to hear how forwarded thinking Berkley is and how on top of things we are.

The community center is now open and masks are required to enter the building. Classes are limited, not only the offerings but the size of the classes are being limited. For more information about classes you may visit the parks and recreation website or you can call. Two outdoor Halloween events are being offered. One is the Halloween parade which is sold out which will be October 22nd. Trunk or Treat at Berkley Boo-tacular is on October 30th, and is being held in conjunction with Berkley parks and recreation and the Berkley Junior Women's group. Had great conversations about the wayfinding signs and we will be getting those up later in November and December. Sad update about the Berkley Plaza Project on Coolidge, the bids came in way over than what was expected and the board is going to re-evaluate in the spring and see what project would come within budget.

The historical committee, the museum is now open on Wednesdays from 10am to 1pm. Masks will be requested to be worn. Want to thank DPW with all their help with the old street sign fundraiser, and bringing them to the museum, and the volunteers on the historical committee. The new holiday mug is available at the museum and the City Clerk's Office.

<u>COUNCILMEMBER PRICE</u>: Thank you to the city staff especially those who are working so hard to facilitate a safe and secure election process.

Our library continues to offer curbside pickup and home delivery of items as well as digital resources and virtual events for all ages.

Congratulations to the regular members of the Tuesday afternoon book club who recently celebrated their 25th anniversary of monthly meetings.

The beautification committee will be planting hydrangeas at the newly renamed friends park on Wednesday, social distancing and masks will be required for that activity.

The citizens engagement advisory committee recently updated its mission, values, and duties. More details can be found under boards and commission on the city's website.

AN ORDINANCE

of the Council of the City of Berkley, Michigan Adding Section 138-226 of Chapter 138, Zoning, of the City of Berkley Code of Ordinances to Allow Parking Requirement Modifications During Site Plan Review and Provide Penalties for Violations

THE CITY OF BERKLEY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1: Add new Section 138-226 to Chapter 138 of the Berkley Code of Ordinances, as follows:

Sec. 138-676. – Parking requirement modification during site plan review.

An applicant for site plan approval may request the Planning Commission to modify the minimum numerical parking requirements of this Chapter for off-street parking applicable to the proposed use, based upon the applicant's demonstration that a different parking standard would be more appropriate.

An approved deviation from the ordinance standard will be tied to the specific use and site plan approved and will not apply after the use on the site terminates or changes to another use. The Planning Commission may grant a parking modification up to 10% of the total parking requirement for a particular use, as noted in Section 138-219.

The Planning Commission shall have the authority and discretion to grant or deny the requested modification based on consideration of the following factors:

- (1) Current or anticipated levels of employees and/or patrons;
- (2) Peak period usage versus normal usage;
- (3) Banked or reserved parking for future use;
- (4) Opportunities to provide or accommodate green space, additional landscaping and to minimize impervious areas on the site;
- (5) Provision of valet parking or other means of accommodating parking off-site that will not overburden public parking and is a reasonable alternative to on-site parking. Further, the applicant must demonstrate that such valet parking will be available for the days and times needed and will not conflict with other businesses that share the same parking facility or valet service;
- (6) Neighborhood or other surrounding characteristics justify the requested deviation;
- (7) Strict application of the ordinance would unreasonably hinder development of the site for a permitted use, and an alternate parking requirement would be appropriate;

- (8) Modification will not negatively impact public parking in the city;
- (9) Proximity of the site to local or regional transit, including but not limited to SMART bus stops, bicycle sharing stations, lite rail, etc.

Any planning commission modification under this section shall be contingent on the continuing use of the property as approved. Any change in the use, scope or intensity of the property use will invoke reinstatement and application of the standard parking requirements of this Chapter.

This section shall apply to all site plans on file with the city and awaiting review and approval as of the date of adoption of this ordinance and thereafter.

SECTION 2: Severability Clause

Should any word, phrase, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance be held invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3: Penalty

All violations of this ordinance shall be municipal civil infractions and upon a determination of responsibility therefore shall be punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$500, and/or such other sanctions and remedies as prescribed in Article IX of Chapter 82 of the Code of Ordinances.

SECTION 4: Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days following the date of adoption.

<u>SECTION 5</u>: Publication

The City Council directs the City Clerk to publish a summary of this ordinance in compliance with Public Act 182 of 1991, as amended, and Section 6.5 of the Berkley City Charter.

AN ORDINANCE

of the Council of the City of Berkley, Michigan Amending Division 7 of Article VI of Chapter 138, Zoning, of the City of Berkley Code of Ordinances to Modify Site Plan Review Procedure.

THE CITY OF BERKLEY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1: Division 7 of Article VI of Chapter 138 of the Berkley Code of Ordinances shall be amended, as follows:

DIVISION 7. – SITE PLAN REVIEW

Sec. 138-676. – Purpose.

- (a) The intent of this division is to provide for consultation and cooperation between the applicant and the planning commission, so that both parties might realize maximum utilization of land and minimum adverse effects upon the surrounding area.
- (b) It is hereby recognized that peculiarities of lot contour, existing and potential development of adjacent properties and existing and potential traffic and pedestrian circulation patterns require a flexibility in the location of buildings, open spaces, parking lots and driveways that cannot be achieved by detailed specifications. It is therefore required that all development within the districts listed in section 138-677 be submitted to the planning commission for its review and approval prior to the issuance of building permits. Nothing contained in this section is intended to allow a greater density of population nor less required open space than that which is specified.

Sec. 138-677. – Applicability.

(a) Any development in the following zoning districts shall require site plan review: not located in single family residential districts shall require site plan review.

R-M	Multiple family residential district
R-M-H	High-rise multiple-family residential district
	Greenfield district
	Office district
	Downtown district
	Community centerpiece district
<u>LB</u>	Local business district

	Gateway district
	Coolidge district
	Twelve mile district

- (b) Site plan review is also required for development of all institutional uses permitted in single-family districts such as, but not limited to: churches, schools and public facilities.
- (c) Development requiring site plan review shall include:
 - (1) Construction of a building;
 - (2) Structural alteration of a building that includes adding floor area or height to the building;
 - (3) Additional parking;
 - (4) Facade alterations that include <u>any50% or more</u> change in the exterior surface material or changes in the size or number of windowsof any one façade of a building.

(5) Façade alterations that reduce the size and/or number of windows.

Sec. 138-678. – Administrative review.

Administrative review for site plan review shall be conducted by the building department in cases where:

- (1) The façade alterations do not change the surface material more than 50%; or of any <u>one façade</u>
- (2) The number or size of the windows are increasing in size.
- (3) The structure requiring site plan review is an accessory structure. An accessory structure must conform to site standards according to ch. 138, article III, division 1 of the Berkley Code of Ordinances. Accessory structures located within single residential districts do not require Planning Commission review and approval.

During administrative review, the building official and city planner shall act as the planning commission in determining compliance with the standards for approval. If the building official and city planner do not agree, then the application is denied. If the property owner is not satisfied with the administrative review, the property owner may take the application to the planning commission for site plan review. The Zoning Administrator shall have the discretion to request site plan review and approval by the Planning Commission, based on the size, scope and/or intensity of a proposed project. The applicant shall be responsible for providing all required information for site plan approval.

Sec. 138-679. – Standards.

The site plan shall be reviewed and approved by the planning commission upon finding that:

- (1) The site meets the requirements of this Code.
- (2) The proposed development does not create adverse effects on public utilities, roads, or sidewalks.
- (3) Pedestrian and vehicular areas are designed for safety, convenience, and compliment adjacent site design.
- (4) Site design, architecture, signs, orientation, and materials are consistent with the city's master plan objectives and the design of the neighboring sites and buildings.
- (5) Landscaping, lighting, dumpster enclosures, and other site amenities are provided where appropriate and in a complementary fashion.
- (6) Site engineering has been provided to ensure that existing utilities will not be adversely affected.

Sec. 138-680. – Required information.

The following information shall be included on the site plan for final review, unless waived by the planning commission. The site plan shall be to a reasonable scale and indicate:

- (1) Seal of architect and/or engineer who prepared plans.
- (2) An appropriate descriptive legend, including north arrow, scale, legal description and the names and addresses of the architect or engineer responsible for the preparation of the site plan.
- (3) The existing (and proposed) zoning.
- (4) Location and size of all structures (including location of entrances and loading points).

- (5) All outside dimensions of each structure, its distance from the property lines, its area and its height.
- (6) With multiple-family residential proposals, the number and location of onebedroom units, two-bedroom units, etc., and include typical floor plans with square feet of floor areas.
- (7) Recorded and measured dimensions of all lot lines and location and design of all lots.
- (8) Adjacent property's structures, uses, zoning and other significant features of the community, where appropriate (using a location sketch).
- (9) Location of all existing and proposed drives and parking areas including types of surfacing, parking layout and dimensions.
- (10) Dimensions of road widths and rights-of way.
- (11) All existing easements and vacated easements and rights-of way.
- (12) All required minimum setbacks (from the existing or proposed right-of-way from adjacent properties).
- (13) Locations of lawns and landscaped areas, types and number of species, and how the landscaping is to be accomplished.
- (14) Locations, sizes, and types of existing trees over four inches in diameter (before and after proposed development).
- (15) Location and type of outside lighting, include site and fixture photometrics.
- (16) All proposed screen and freestanding architectural walls, including typical crosssections and the heights above ground on both sides of walls.
- (17) Elevation drawings of all existing and proposed buildings on the site drawn to a scale of one inch equals four feet, or to another scale adequate to determine compliance with this chapter and to provide any other information needed to evaluate the overall site design on the basis of the criteria set forth in this section.
- (18) Color and type of façade materials. <u>Samples representing color and materials shall</u> <u>be presented to the planning commission.</u>
- (19) Stormwater engineering including: existing and proposed grading of the site, location of existing and proposed utilities, stormwater calculations for a 100-year storm, the drainage area on site that will detain the 10-year storm, and a profile of the sanitary sewer.

Sec. 138-681. – Approval process.

- (a) *Sketch plan (optional)*. An item may be submitted to the planning commission for informal discussion. No approval shall be granted. However, the applicant may wish to present and discuss a proposed project and any anticipated problems before applying for site plan approval.
- (b) Site plan approval.
 - (1) An application for site plan approval shall be submitted to the city planning commission on such forms and containing such information that the planning commission shall prescribe.
 - (2) The planning commission is hereby authorized to approve, approve with conditions, or deny all site plans submitted under this chapter.
 - (3) Approval may be issued by the planning commission, subject to the applicant receiving board of appeals variances, as required by the zoning chapter.
 - (4) Each action taken with reference to site plan review and approval shall be duly recorded in the minutes of the planning commission and shall state the grounds for the action taken upon each site plan submitted for its approval.

Sec. 138-682. – **Revisions.**

An applicant for site plan approval may wish to revise a previously approved site plan. A site plan outlining the differences in the original approved site plan and the requested changes shall be submitted to the city. The approval process shall be similar to that outlined above. If the revised site plan is denied, the applicant may develop the site plan as originally approved or appeal the matter as outlined below.

If a change is deemed to be minor in scope or intensity, the revised site plan may be approved administratively. Such minor revisions may include:

- (1) Additions or alterations to the landscape plan or landscape materials.
- (2) Relocation or additional screening of trash enclosure.
- (3) Alterations to the internal parking layout of the off-street parking lot, restriping, etc.

Any major revisions to the site plan, as determined by the Zoning Administrator, shall be subject to review and approval by the Planning Commission.

Sec. 138-683. – Appeals.

An applicant for site plan approval shall have the right of appeal to the zoning board of appeals, and in such cases, the board may reverse, affirm or modify the action of the planning commission by the concurring vote of two-thirds of the members of the board.

Sec. 138-684. – Conformity; extension of approval period.

When an applicant receives final site plan approval, the site shall be developed in complete conformity with the approved site plan, except as provided for under Revisions and Appeals. The site plan approval shall be valid for a period of 12 months. If a building permit is not procured and construction begun within that time, the site plan approval becomes null and void. No time extension to the site plan approval shall be grantedA site plan shall be valid for a period of one year from date of final site plan approval. An applicant may request up to two one-year extensions, to be reviewed and granted by the Planning Commission for reasonable cause. The request for site plan extension must be submitted in writing to the Community Development Department prior to the expiration of the site plan. Upon request, the applicant shall provide a proposed timeline for the proposed project or development.

Sec. 138-685. – Site maintenance.

The city planning commission shall not approve any site plan under this chapter unless and until the applicant signs a site maintenance agreement in a form approved by city council.

SECTION 2: Severability Clause

Should any word, phrase, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance be held invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3: Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days following the date of adoption.

SECTION 4: Publication

The City Council directs the City Clerk to publish a summary of this ordinance in compliance with Public Act 182 of 1991, as amended, and Section 6.5 of the Berkley City Charter.

RESOLUTION TO ADOPT RULES FOR ELECTRONIC MEETINGS

WHEREAS, the Michigan Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.261 et seq. was recently amended by the adoption of Public Act 228 of 2020 to permit the remote attendance by members of a public body using telephonic or video conferencing means; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to continue to meet and conduct the public business of the City in a manner that permits both the general public and members of the City Council and other City boards and commissions subject to the Open Meetings Act to participate by electronic means.

THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED by the Berkley City Council that its Rules and Order of Procedure are hereby amended to add the following provisions:

ELECTRONIC MEETINGS

Section 14:

Rule 1. ELECTRONIC MEETINGS AUTHORIZED

The City Council may meet and conduct its meetings, in whole or in part, by electronic means using telephone conferencing or video conferencing technology without regard to physical place and physical presence requirements, in accordance with Section 3a of the Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.263a, as amended, through December 31, 2020.

Beginning January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021, City Council meetings may be held, in whole or in part, by electronic means using telephone conferencing or video conferencing technology due to circumstances requiring accommodation of any City Councilmember absent because of military duty, a medical condition, or when a declared statewide or local state of emergency or state of disaster exists and the personal health or safety of members of the public or public body would be at risk if the meeting were held in person. As used in these Rules, the term "medical condition" means an illness, injury, disability, or other health-related condition, including the quarantine or isolation of a City Councilmember to minimize the spread of a contagious disease.

Beginning January 1, 2022 members of the City Council may participate by electronic means in City Council meetings only to accommodate their absence due to military duty.

Rule 2. CONDUCT OF ELECTRONIC MEETINGS

An electronic meeting of the City Council will be conducted in a manner that permits twoway communication so that members of the Council can hear and be heard by one another, and so that public participants can hear members of the City Council and be heard by both the Council and other public participants. The City may use technology to facilitate typed public comments submitted by members of the public participating in the electronicallyheld meeting that shall be read to or shared with members of the City Council and other participants.

As permitted by the Open Meetings Act, a physical place is not required for an electronically-held meeting. Members of the City Council and members of the public participating electronically in a meeting that occurs in a physical place are considered present and in attendance at the meeting for all purposes For a meeting at which City Councilmembers are physically absent due to military duty or a medical condition and who are being accommodated by remote participation, all other City Councilmembers must be physically present at the meeting to be able to participate.

In addition to any other notice required by the Open Meetings Act, advance notice of an electronically-held meeting shall be posted on a portion of the City's website that is fully accessible to the public. The public notice must be included on either the home page or a separate webpage dedicated to public notices for non-regularly scheduled or electronically-held public meetings that is accessible through a prominent and conspicuous link on the City's website home page that clearly describes its purpose for public notification of non-regularly scheduled or electronically-held public meetings. Any scheduled meeting of the City Council may be held as an electronic meeting as permitted by the Open Meetings Act if a notice consistent with this Rule is posted at least 18 hours before the meeting begins. Any notice of the meeting of the City Council held electronically must clearly contain all of the following:

- (a) Why the City Council is meeting electronically;
- (b) How members of the public may participate in the meeting electronically (if a telephone number, internet address or both are required to participate, that information must be provided in the notice);
- (c) How members of the public may contact members of the City Council to provide input or ask questions on any business that will come before the Council at the meeting; and
- (d) How persons with disabilities may participate in the meeting.

If an agenda exists for an electronically held meeting of the City Council, the City shall, on a portion of its website that is fully accessible to the public make the agenda of the meeting available to the public at least 2 hours before the meeting begins. This publication of the meeting agenda does not prohibit subsequent amendment of the agenda at the meeting.

A member of the general public is not required to register or otherwise provide his or her name or other information or otherwise fulfill a condition precedent to attend an electronically-held meeting, other than mechanisms established and required by the City necessary to permit the individual to participate in a public comment period of the meeting. Members of the general public otherwise participating in an electronically-held meeting of the City Council are excluded from participation in a closed session of the City Council that is held electronically provided that the closed session is convened and held in compliance with the requirements of the Open Meetings Act applicable to closed sessions.

Rule 3. AGENDA FOR REGULAR BUSINESS MEETINGS; ELECTRONIC MEETINGS

The order of business for all meetings of the City Council conducted electronically and held during through December 31, 2020, and held beginning January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021 for City Council meetings held, in whole or in part, by electronic means using telephone conferencing or video conferencing technology when a declared statewide or local state of emergency or state of disaster exists shall be as follows: Call to Order; Approval of Agenda; Invocation; Pledge of Allegiance; Public Comment – Items On the Agenda; Approval of Minutes; Approval of Warrants; Consent Agenda; Regular Agenda; Public Comment – Items Not On the Agenda; Communications; and Adjournment. The order of business outlined in this paragraph is not applicable when electronic means is used to accommodate the absence of individual City Council members due to military duty or a medical condition.

Rule 4. PUBLIC COMMENTS

During City Council meetings conducted electronically, members of the public attending the meeting, once recognized by the chair, shall identify themselves for the record and indicate the municipality where they reside. Comments by the public will be limited to three minutes for each speaker unless the time is extended by the chair or by vote of the Council. Comments by the public shall be confined to the Public Comment portions of the meeting.

Rule 5. COUNCILMEMBER ATTENDANCE BY PHONE/VIDEO

A member of the City Council who anticipates being absent from a meeting due to the circumstances set forth in the Open Meetings Act and these Rules may request accommodation of their absence to permit their remote participation in and voting on Council business by two-way telephonic or video conferencing communication. A City Councilmember who desires to attend a meeting by telephonic or video conferencing shall inform the City Manager, or the City Manager's designee, at least 24 hours before the meeting to permit any necessary technology to be put in place to accommodate participation of the absent member. City Councilmembers attending a meeting by telephone or video conferencing may fully participate in the meeting, including voting and attendance in any closed session of the City Council. A Councilmember participating by telephonic or video conferencing is not permitted to chair the meeting unless all Council members are participating by telephone or video conferencing is not permitted to chair the meeting unless all Council members are participating by telephone or video conferencing is not permitted to chair the meeting unless all Council members are participating by telephone or video conferencing.

Any member of the City Council attending a meeting remotely must publicly announce at the outset of the meeting (which shall be included in meeting minutes) that the member is attending the meeting remotely. If the member is attending the meeting remotely for a purpose other than for military duty, the member's announcement must identify the member's physical location by stating the city, village, or township and the state from which the member is attending the meeting remotely.

Rule 6. OTHER BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

All other City boards and commissions and the members thereof are governed by and shall conform to the provisions contained in these Rules setting forth the requirements and procedures by which absent members and the public may remotely participate in meetings electronically by telephone or video conferencing. In the event of any conflict between these rules and the bylaws or procedural rules of the other board or commission, this Rule is controlling authority.

Dear Mr. Baumgarten:

After the Michigan Supreme Court's decision earlier this month invalidating the Governor's Covid-related executive orders issued after April 30, uncertainty resulted over whether municipal boards and commissions may continue to hold electronic, remote participation meetings while the pandemic goes on. The State Legislature and Governor solved that – at least temporarily – by enacting and signing into law 2020 PA 228 (copy attached) amending the Open Meetings Act to allow municipal boards and commissions to hold electronic meetings, and establishing conditions, limitations, and procedures for electronic meetings.

The amended OMA does several things: (i) It validates all electronic meetings held since March, (ii) Allows local boards and commissions to continue to hold electronic meetings through the end of this calendar year, (ii) It authorizes remote meetings to be held during 2021 only to accommodate members absent due to military duty, a medical condition, or a statewide or local state of emergency or disaster, and (iii) After 2021, allows remote participation by board and commission members only for military duty.

For the most part, electronic meetings must be conducted similar to the way they were conducted under the prior executive orders of the Governor. But the amended OMA sets forth various additional notice and procedural requirements for electronic meetings. Among the requirements is that absent board and commission members participating remotely must announce the municipality and state where the member is remotely participating from. This disclosure must be made part of the meeting minutes.

Also, a public body with an official internet presence (i.e., a website) must post advance notice of an electronic meeting on its website where it can be accessed by the public at least 18 hours prior to the meeting. Meeting agendas must also be available and accessible to the public on the internet at least 2 hours before the meeting.

The amended OMA requires a public body to establish procedures to govern electronic meetings. Therefore, I offer the attached proposed City Council Resolution to amend the City's

current Rules and Order of Procedure to add rules for electronic meetings. These rules, as drafted, closely track the statutory provisions and procedures of the amended OMA. In addition please note that in the last rule proposed to be added will cover all the City's other boards and commissions by applying these same Electronic Meetings rules to them.

I recommend that the proposed Resolution to adopt the Rules be introduced at the Council's next meeting.

STATE OF MICHIGAN 100TH LEGISLATURE REGULAR SESSION OF 2020

Introduced by Senators Theis, Hollier, LaSata, MacDonald, Lucido, Victory, Daley, Zorn, Wojno, McMorrow, Moss and Schmidt

ENROLLED SENATE BILL No. 1108

AN ACT to amend 1976 PA 267, entitled "An act to require certain meetings of certain public bodies to be open to the public; to require notice and the keeping of minutes of meetings; to provide for enforcement; to provide for invalidation of governmental decisions under certain circumstances; to provide penalties; and to repeal certain acts and parts of acts," by amending section 3 (MCL 15.263), as amended by 2018 PA 485, and by adding section 3a.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

Sec. 3. (1) All meetings of a public body must be open to the public and must be held in a place available to the general public. All persons must be permitted to attend any meeting except as otherwise provided in this act. The right of a person to attend a meeting of a public body includes the right to tape-record, to videotape, to broadcast live on radio, and to telecast live on television the proceedings of a public body at a public meeting. The exercise of this right does not depend on the prior approval of the public body. However, a public body may establish reasonable rules and regulations in order to minimize the possibility of disrupting the meeting.

(2) All decisions of a public body must be made at a meeting open to the public. For purposes of any meeting subject to this section, except a meeting of any state legislative body at which a formal vote is taken, the public body shall, subject to section 3a, establish the following procedures to accommodate the absence of any member of the public body due to military duty, a medical condition, or a statewide or local state of emergency or state of disaster declared pursuant to law or charter by the governor or a local official or local governing body that would risk the personal health or safety of members of the public or the public body if the meeting were held in person:

(a) Procedures by which the absent member may participate in, and vote on, business before the public body, including, but not limited to, procedures that provide for both of the following:

(*i*) Two-way communication.

(*ii*) For each member of the public body attending the meeting remotely, a public announcement at the outset of the meeting by that member, to be included in the meeting minutes, that the member is in fact attending the meeting remotely. If the member is attending the meeting remotely for a purpose other than for military duty, the member's announcement must further identify specifically the member's physical location by stating the county, city, township, or village and state from which he or she is attending the meeting remotely.

(b) Procedures by which the public is provided notice of the absence of the member and information about how to contact that member sufficiently in advance of a meeting of the public body to provide input on any business that will come before the public body.

(3) All deliberations of a public body constituting a quorum of its members must take place at a meeting open to the public except as provided in this section and sections 7 and 8.

(4) A person must not be required as a condition of attendance at a meeting of a public body to register or otherwise provide his or her name or other information or otherwise to fulfill a condition precedent to attendance.

(5) A person must be permitted to address a meeting of a public body under rules established and recorded by the public body. The legislature or a house of the legislature may provide by rule that the right to address may be limited to prescribed times at hearings and committee meetings only.

(6) A person must not be excluded from a meeting otherwise open to the public except for a breach of the peace actually committed at the meeting.

(7) This act does not apply to the following public bodies, but only when deliberating the merits of a case:

(a) The Michigan compensation appellate commission operating as described in either of the following:

(*i*) Section 274 of the worker's disability compensation act of 1969, 1969 PA 317, MCL 418.274.

(ii) Section 34 of the Michigan employment security act, 1936 (Ex Sess) PA 1, 421.34.

(b) The state tenure commission created in section 1 of article VII of 1937 (Ex Sess) PA 4, MCL 38.131, when acting as a board of review from the decision of a controlling board.

(c) The employment relations commission or an arbitrator or arbitration panel created or appointed under 1939 PA 176, MCL 423.1 to 423.30.

(d) The Michigan public service commission created under 1939 PA 3, MCL 460.1 to 460.11.

(8) This act does not apply to an association of insurers created under the insurance code of 1956, 1956 PA 218, MCL 500.100 to 500.8302, or other association or facility formed under that act as a nonprofit organization of insurer members.

(9) This act does not apply to a committee of a public body that adopts a nonpolicymaking resolution of tribute or memorial, if the resolution is not adopted at a meeting.

(10) This act does not apply to a meeting that is a social or chance gathering or conference not designed to avoid this act.

(11) This act does not apply to the Michigan veterans' trust fund board of trustees or a county or district committee created under 1946 (1st Ex Sess) PA 9, MCL 35.602 to 35.610, when the board of trustees or county or district committee is deliberating the merits of an emergent need. A decision of the board of trustees or county or district committee made under this subsection must be reconsidered by the board or committee at its next regular or special meeting consistent with the requirements of this act. "Emergent need" means a situation that the board of trustees, by rules promulgated under the administrative procedures act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL 24.201 to 24.328, determines requires immediate action.

(12) As used in subsection (2):

(a) "Formal vote" means a vote on a bill, amendment, resolution, motion, proposal, recommendation, or any other measure on which a vote by members of a state legislative body is required and by which the state legislative body effectuates or formulates public policy.

(b) "Medical condition" means an illness, injury, disability, or other health-related condition.

Sec. 3a. (1) A meeting of a public body held, in whole or in part, electronically by telephonic or video conferencing in compliance with this section and, except as otherwise required in this section, all of the provisions of this act applicable to a nonelectronic meeting, is permitted by this act in the following circumstances:

(a) Before January 1, 2021 and retroactive to March 18, 2020, any circumstances, including, but not limited to, any of the circumstances requiring accommodation of absent members described in section 3(2).

(b) On and after January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021, only those circumstances requiring accommodation of members absent due to military duty, a medical condition, or a statewide or local state of emergency or state of disaster as described in section 3(2). For the purpose of permitting an electronic meeting due to a local state of emergency or state of disaster, this subdivision applies only as follows:

(i) To permit the electronic attendance of a member of the public body who resides in the affected area.

(ii) To permit the electronic meeting of a public body that usually holds its meetings in the affected area.

(c) After December 31, 2021, only in the circumstances requiring accommodation of members absent due to military duty as described in section 3(2).

(2) A meeting of a public body held electronically under this section must be conducted in a manner that permits 2-way communication so that members of the public body can hear and be heard by other members of the public body, and so that public participants can hear members of the public body and can be heard by members of the public body and other participants during a public comment period. A public body may use technology to facilitate typed public comments during the meeting submitted by members of the public participants to satisfy the meeting that may be read to or shared with members of the public body and other participants to satisfy the requirement under this subsection that members of the public be heard by others during the electronic meeting and the requirement under section 3(5) that members of the public be permitted to address the electronic meeting.

(3) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (8), a physical place is not required for an electronic meeting held under this section, and members of a public body and members of the public participating electronically in a meeting held under this section that occurs in a physical place are to be considered present and in attendance at the meeting for all purposes.

(4) If a public body directly or indirectly maintains an official internet presence that includes monthly or more frequent updates of public meeting agendas or minutes, the public body shall, in addition to any other notices that may be required under this act, post advance notice of a meeting held electronically under this section on a portion of the public body's website that is fully accessible to the public. The public notice on the website must be included on either the homepage or on a separate webpage dedicated to public notices for nonregularly scheduled or electronic public meetings that is accessible through a prominent and conspicuous link on the website's homepage that clearly describes its purpose for public notification of nonregularly scheduled or electronic public meetings. Subject to the requirements of this section, any scheduled meeting of a public body may be held as an electronic meeting under this section if a notice consistent with this section is posted at least 18 hours before the meeting begins. Notice of a meeting of a public body held electronically must clearly explain all of the following:

(a) Why the public body is meeting electronically.

(b) How members of the public may participate in the meeting electronically. If a telephone number, internet address, or both are needed to participate, that information must be provided specifically.

(c) How members of the public may contact members of the public body to provide input or ask questions on any business that will come before the public body at the meeting.

(d) How persons with disabilities may participate in the meeting.

(5) Beginning on the effective date of the amendatory act that added this section, if an agenda exists for an electronic meeting held under this section by a public body that directly or indirectly maintains an official internet presence that includes monthly or more frequent updates of public meeting agendas or minutes, the public body shall, on a portion of the website that is fully accessible to the public, make the agenda available to the public at least 2 hours before the electronic meeting begins. This publication of the agenda does not prohibit subsequent amendment of the agenda at the meeting.

(6) A public body shall not, as a condition of participating in an electronic meeting of the public body held under this section, require a person to register or otherwise provide his or her name or other information or otherwise to fulfill a condition precedent to attendance, other than mechanisms established and required by the public body necessary to permit the person to participate in a public comment period of the meeting.

(7) Members of the general public otherwise participating in a meeting of a public body held electronically under this section are to be excluded from participation in a closed session of the public body held electronically during that meeting if the closed session is convened and held in compliance with the requirements of this act applicable to a closed session.

(8) At a meeting held under this section that accommodates members absent due to military duty or a medical condition, only those members absent due to military duty or a medical condition may participate remotely. Any member who is not on military duty or does not have a medical condition must be physically present at the meeting to participate.

This act is ordered to take immediate effect.

SUBJECT: Ambulance Service Agreement between City of Berkley and Alliance Mobile Health

Alliance Mobile Health (AMH) currently provides ambulance service for the City of Berkley, as well as a number of other local communities. The current agreement expired on October 3, 2020. The Department of Public Safety requests that the attached new agreement be approved by City Council. This is the same contract that recently expired and has not been modified since at least 2012.

The agreement has been reviewed by City Attorney John Staran.

The Department of Public Safety is satisfied with the current agreement and AMH is a great first responder partner. The quick response time of AMH during the height of the COVID pandemic reduced the direct contact of BDPS personnel with COVID patients.

The Department of Public Safety recommends approval for the City Manager to enter into an Ambulance Service Agreement between City of Berkley and Alliance Mobile Health. In consideration of the services to be performed by the Ambulance Service under this Agreement, the City shall pay the Ambulance Service for the term of this Agreement the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) annually. This Agreement shall be effective for a term commencing 7:00 AM December 1, 2020 for a three-year term ending 6:59 AM December 1, 2023.

CITY OF BERKLEY AMBULANCE SERVICE AGREEMENT

This **Ambulance Service Agreement** is made on November 16, 2020, between the **City of Berkley**, a Michigan Municipal Corporation, with offices at 3338 Coolidge Highway, Berkley, Michigan 48072 which will hereafter be referred to as the "**City**", and **Alliance Mobile Health**, a Michigan Non-Profit Corporation, with offices located at 2045 Austin Drive, Troy, MI 48083, which will hereafter be referred to as the "**Ambulance Service**".

RECITALS

- Ambulance Service is a licensed ambulance company in the business of providing advanced life support and ambulance transport services to individuals and municipalities.
- The City desires to have Ambulance Service provide emergency medical, advanced life support, and transport services from locations within the City of Berkley.
- Ambulance Service is willing to perform such services for the City in accordance with the terms set forth in this Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained in this Ambulance Service Agreement, the Ambulance Service and the City agree as follows:

I. Scope of Services

- A. The Berkley Department of Public Safety, a fully consolidated department providing Police, Fire, Non-Transporting EMS and 911 PSAP service, will contact or transfer EMS calls for service to the Ambulance Service when its services are required. The Ambulance Service shall respond to emergency runs, with a transporting ambulance, within six (6) minutes of the time the Department of Public Safety dispatches the ambulance service ninety percent (90%) of the time. For non-emergency runs, the Ambulance Service shall respond without the use of red lights and sirens within fifteen (15) minutes of the time that the City Dispatcher dispatches the ambulance service ninety percent (90%) of the time.
- B. Patient Care Patient care decisions shall be made by the licensed emergency medical services personnel with the most advanced level of certification or licensure under the Emergency Medical Services Act who is available at the scene. In order to obtain the highest patient care possible, the Ambulance Service and its employees, as well as the City and its employees, shall cooperate with respect providing patient care.

- C. Transferring of Patients The Ambulance Service shall be responsible for the loading of all patients into the ambulance. Where necessary, City personnel shall assist. Once a patient is placed into the ambulance, the Ambulance Service is responsible for patient care.
- D. Patients in Custody When a patient is considered in custody the patient shall be supervised by the public safety officer assigned to that detail. The Ambulance Service will not interfere with police or crime scene operations.
- E. In Custody Blood Draws The Ambulance Service shall execute court ordered or voluntary blood draws for person's accused of operating a motor vehicle under the influence or alcohol or drugs at the Berkley Department of Public Safety utilizing in service road crews. If there is any charge for this service, this will be billed to the City under the Cost Recovery program for Court ordered blood draws and to the prisoner for voluntary blood draws.
- F. Transporting of Department Personnel The Ambulance Service shall provide transportation to Public Safety Personnel from the hospital to the Berkley Department of Public Safety or the original response scene when the Public Safety Officers are required to accompany a patient or prisoner to the hospital.
- G. Training The Ambulance Service will collaborate with the department for combined training that will benefit both the Ambulance Service employees and members of the Berkley Department of Public Safety.
- H. Additional Resources & Special Events The Ambulance Service, in cooperation and partnership with the Department of Public Safety will provide additional resources to the City of Berkley for City sponsored special events at no cost to the City. The Ambulance Service shall reserve the right to invoices patient's for care administered under this section as it would under Section IV, sub-section A. In cases where third party events are held within the geographic area of the City of Berkley, the Ambulance service shall reserve the right to negotiate a separate agreement with the third party. Any services provided to this third party shall not effect any service expectations of this agreement for the City of Berkley.

II. Ambulances

- A. The Ambulance Service shall be required to maintain at least three (3) ambulances which are not more than five (5) years old to provide service to persons needing such care.
 - i. One (1) of these three (3) ambulances shall be designated for service to the geographical area of City of Berkley;
 - ii. Two (2) additional ambulances shall be available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

- B. Each ambulance must be capable of carrying:
 - i. Four (4) patients in a sitting position and/or one (1) stretcher patient
 - ii. Meet all applicable laws, rules and regulations relating to their operation
 - iii. Be in good working condition so as to be able to provide safe and comfortable transportation for each patient in a climate-controlled patient compartment.
- C. The ambulances used within the City of Berkley shall be subject to periodic inspection by the City.

III. Ambulance Service Personnel

- A. Each ambulance shall be staffed by two (2) persons (Attendants), who shall meet the following criteria:
 - i. Each Attendant shall comply with all laws, rules, regulations, protocols, standards, guidelines, operational procedures, and licensing requirements, as such may be amended from time to time, of any unit of government, including federal, state, county or municipal governments or governing bodies or any branch thereof, pertaining to the subject matter of this Agreement, and shall at all times maintain an effective Michigan chauffeur's or operator's license;
 - ii. Each Attendant staffing an ambulance providing services pursuant to this Agreement shall be certified, authorized and licensed by the State of Michigan to provide emergency medical services as a paramedic;
 - iii. No Attendant shall operate any vehicle or perform any services to be rendered pursuant to this Agreement while under the influence of or visibly impaired due to the consumption of intoxicating liquor or a controlled substance, or a combination of intoxicating liquor or controlled substance as such terms are defined under the Motor Vehicle Code of the State of Michigan;
 - iv. Each Attendant shall be fit to operate an ambulance, including any requirements, standards or guidelines established by any laws, regulations, standards, or protocols regulating the provision of such services;
 - v. Each Attendant shall be able to speak, read, write and understand English. In addition, each Attendant must present a professional, well-groomed appearance wearing company-identifiable, approved uniform; and

B. The City has the right to unilaterally require the reassignment by the Ambulance Service of any Ambulance Service personnel if the subject employee fails to perform his/her duties in accordance with this Agreement or fails to cooperate with City personnel with respect to providing patient care if it's deemed in the best interest of patient care that such employee be reassigned. The City shall advise the Ambulance Service of dissatisfaction with the employee's performance prior to requesting such action. Any such action shall not violate Paragraph 13, Fair Employment Practices. The Ambulance Service shall indemnify and hold the City harmless against any claims made by any person arising from the exercise of the City's rights under this Section. The purpose of this Section is to maximize harmonious field operations between the Ambulance Service and the City in order to deliver the highest level of patient care.

IV. Compensation and Fees

- A. Fee Schedule In consideration of the services to be performed by the Ambulance Service under this Agreement, the City shall pay the Ambulance Service for the term of this Agreement the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) annually in consideration for the Ambulance Service Contract. The Ambulance Service shall be paid for the services provided by the patients, their insurance companies and health care plans. The collection of such fees shall be the responsibility of the Ambulance Service and not the City. The Ambulance Service shall submit as part of its proposal a suggested User Fee Schedule for review by the City. The Ambulance Service may modify the fee schedule during the term of the Agreement to guarantee optimal service provided it gives the City thirty (30) days advanced written notice of any such modification. No discriminatory fees shall be charged. The fees charged in the City of Berkley shall be no more than those charged elsewhere for comparable services. The Ambulance Service shall accept assignment and in cases of indigent patients, the Ambulance Service shall to the best of its ability set up payment schedules or write off unpaid balances if necessary.
- B. Replenishment of Medical Supplies Used In compliance with the Safe Harbor for ambulance restocking programs allowed for in the Stark Law, the Ambulance Service agrees to replenish for the City on a monthly basis all disposable medical supplies utilized by the City during patient care. The City EMS Coordinator will provide the Ambulance Service, on a monthly basis, an itemized list of the medical supplies utilized for which Ambulance Service shall be responsible for replenishment. The Ambulance Service shall replenish the supplies within ten (10) days after receipt of the list with the supplies specified. The Ambulance Service and City EMS Coordinator will also maintain a rotation for Type D Oxygen Bottles provided by the Ambulance Service for patient care.

C. To the best knowledge of the City and the Ambulance Service, the fees required to be paid by the Ambulance Service to the City under this Agreement comply with applicable laws in effect as of the date of this Agreement. If the fees for services rendered that are required to be reimbursed under this Agreement are determined to exceed the maximum fees permitted by law (the "maximum fee"), then the amount in excess of the maximum fee shall be considered a partial prepayment of fees due the City for subsequent months when this Agreement is in effect, and the fees for services for subsequent months shall be based on the maximum fee permitted by law. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, however, if the fees to be paid are adjusted to comply with the maximum fee permitted by law, and such reimbursement rate is not acceptable to the City for the balance of the term of this Agreement, then the City may, at its option, terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the Ambulance Service. The City and the Ambulance Service agree to do a final reconciliation of reimbursement due within sixty (60) days of the date of termination if the reimbursement schedule is found to exceed the amount permitted by law.

V. Control by the City

A. The parties acknowledge that all patient care decisions made on the scene or during transportation to any medical facility, while accompanied by City personnel, shall be made by the highest qualified provider of emergency medical services in accordance with the Emergency Medical Services Act. In the instances of Crime Scene operations and Fire operations the city's Public Safety Officer's shall be in charge, unless directed otherwise by a physician providing medical direction to the City personnel.

VI. Indemnification

A. The Ambulance Service expressly agrees to indemnify and hold the City of Berkley, its employees, appointed and elected officials, and volunteers and other individuals working on behalf of the City of Berkley, harmless against any losses. costs, expenses, damage, liabilities, or claims whether groundless or not, arising out of bodily injury, sickness or disease, including death resulting at any time there from, which may be sustained or claimed by any person or persons, or destruction of any property, (including the loss of use thereof) based on any act or omission, negligent or otherwise, of the Ambulance Service or anyone else acting on its behalf, relating to this Agreement, except that the Ambulance Service shall not be responsible for indemnification to the City for damages or injuries caused by or resulting from the City's sole negligence; and the Ambulance Service shall at its own cost and expense, defend any such claim and any suit, action or proceeding which may be commenced there under and the Ambulance Service shall pay any and all judgments which may be recovered in any suit, action or proceeding and any and all expenses, including but not limited to costs, attorney fees and settlement expenses as they relate in any way to this contract for demolition.

VII. Insurance

- A. The Ambulance Service shall be required to maintain the following insurance during the term if this contract:
 - i. General Liability Insurance The Ambulance Service shall procure and maintain during the life of this Agreement General Liability Insurance with limits of liability not less than:
 - 1. One Million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) each occurrence
 - 2. One Million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) personnel injury
 - 3. Five Million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) general aggregate
 - Motor Vehicle Liability The Ambulance Service shall procure and maintain during the life of this Agreement Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance, including Michigan No-Fault Coverage, for all owned vehicles, all non-owned vehicles and all hired vehicles with limits of liability of not less than:
 - 1. One Million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) each occurrence
 - 2. One Million dollars (\$1,000.000.00) uninsured motorist
 - iii. Workers' Compensation Insurance The Ambulance Service shall procure and maintain during the life of this Agreement Workers' Compensation Insurance, in accordance with all applicable statutes of the State of Michigan including Employers Liability Coverage with a minimum limit of:
 - 1. One Million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) each occurrence
 - 2. Five Million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) shared aggregate
 - iv. Professional Liability The Ambulance Service shall procure and maintain during the life of this Agreement Professional Liability Insurance, with limits of not less than:
 - 1. One Million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) each occurrence
 - 2. Five Million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) aggregate
 - v. Additional Insured The General Liability and Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance, as described above, shall include an endorsement stating the following shall be "Additional Insured": City of Berkley, including all elected and appointed officials, and all employees or others working on behalf of the City. This coverage shall be primary to the Additional Insured and not contributing with any other insurance or similar protection available to the additional insured parties, whether said other available coverage be primary, contributing or excess.
- B. The Ambulance Service shall not commence work under the proposed Agreement until it has obtained the insurance required by this Section.

VIII. Proof of Insurance Coverage

- A. The Ambulance Service shall provide the City at the time the Agreements have been executed by the City, certificates and policies on the standard City form as listed below:
 - i. Two (2) copies of Certificate of Insurance for General Liability Insurance;
 - ii. Two (2) copies of Certificate of Insurance for Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance;
 - iii. Two (2) copies of Certificate of Insurance for Workers' Compensation Liability Insurance;
 - iv. Two (2) copies of Certificate of Insurance for Professional Liability Insurance.
- B. If any of the above coverage expires during the term of this Agreement, or is required to be modified as a result of changed insurance requirements, the Ambulance Service shall deliver renewal certificates and/or revised policies (as the case may be) to the City at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date (in the case of a renewal) or within thirty (30) days of the date of notification of the change. IX. Contract

A. The City intends to use the Ambulance Service for all ordinary calls for ambulance transportation which are received by the City, except in unusual circumstances, where it is in the best interest of the patient to have those services provided by the City or another qualified provider.

X. Additional Ambulances on Multiple Casualty or Major Emergencies

A. In the case where a multiple casualty or life-threatening disaster or major emergency, the Ambulance Service may be required to provide an additional two (2) ambulances which shall arrive on the scene within fifteen (15) minutes after requested.

XI. Mutual Aid

- A. In the case where a multiple casualty or life-threatening disaster or major emergency occurs and where the Ambulance Service resources are unable to transport all victims in a timely fashion, the Ambulance Service must execute a mutual aid request with another ambulance company in accordance with Oakland County Medical Control Authority protocols. In order for the service during these circumstances to be as flawless as possible:
 - i. The Ambulance Service will be responsible for contacting the secondary provider.
 - ii. The Ambulance Service will contact the Berkley Department of Public Safety with the location the secondary provider is responding from and an Estimated Time of Arrival.

XII. Fire Standby

A. When notified by the City of a fire to which the City's Public Safety Department has responded, Ambulance Service shall arrive, for standby purposes, within (8) minutes, at the scene of the fire with one (1) ambulance in addition to meeting the requirements of Section II.

XIII. Loans of Spare Medical Parts and Equipment

A. Each party to this Agreement shall loan to the other party, upon request, spare medical parts or equipment on an emergency need basis at no cost provided that the borrowing party shall be required to promptly return the same. This provision may be waived if the loaning of such parts or equipment would leave the party making the loan with insufficient equipment or parts to be able to perform services as required by this Agreement or by another agreement to which the loaning party is a party.

XIV. Fair Employment Practices

A. The Ambulance Service agrees as a condition of this contract that it will not discriminate against any person, employer or applicant for employment with respect to his hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment because of his or her religion, race, color, national origin, age, sex, height, weight, sexual orientation, marital status or handicapped which is unrelated to his ability to perform the duties of the job or position.

XV. Assignment

A. There shall be no assignment of this Agreement or any interest in it without the prior written approval of the City. The Ambulance Service agrees that it will not subcontract any of its services without the prior written consent of the City. If control of the entity providing the service changes during the term of the contract, the City may at its option declare a breach of this Agreement unless the City has previously approved the new controlling party.

XVI. Independent Contractor Relationship

A. The relation between the Ambulance Service and the City shall be that of an independent contractor.

XVII. Performance Evaluations

A. The Ambulance Service will provide performance reports as may be required by the City at the discretion and request of the City.

XVIII. Non-Waiver of Breach

A. No failure by the City to insist upon the strict performance of any covenant, term or condition of this Agreement or to exercise any right, term, or remedy consequent upon a breach thereof, shall constitute a waiver of any such Agreement, but each and every covenant, term and condition of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect with respect to any other then existing or subsequent breach thereof.

XIX. Continuation of Service During Dispute

A. In the interest of providing continuance of service to its patients, the Ambulance Service agrees to continue providing service under this Agreement during the time of any dispute unless enjoined by a court of competent jurisdiction or ordered by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

XX. Governing Law; Compliance with Laws, Protocols, Rule And Regulations

A. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Michigan, applicable Oakland County medical protocols and other applicable laws, rules and regulations, as amended from time to time. In the event of a conflict between any of the above, the provision upholding the highest level of patient care shall control.

XXI. Effect of Invalidity

A. If any provision of this Agreement, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance, shall, to any extent, be judicially determined to be invalid or unenforceable, the reminder of this Agreement, or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance other than those as to which it is invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and each provision of this Agreement shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.

XXII. Term

A. The term of this Agreement shall be Three (3) years. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, this Agreement may be terminated at any time upon the mutual written agreement of both parties, or may be terminated by the City pursuant to Section XXIII. Notwithstanding the date of execution, this Agreement shall be effective as of 7:00 AM December 1, 2020 for a three-year term ending 6:59 AM December 1, 2023.

XXIII. Termination by the City

A. The City may terminate this Agreement in the event that Ambulance Service, or any agent or employee of Ambulance Service, violates or fails to comply or maintain compliance with any term of this Agreement, or any applicable law, rule, regulation, protocol, standard, guideline, operational procedure or licensing requirement, as such may be amended from time to time, of any unit of government, including federal, state, county, or municipal governments or governing bodies, or any branch thereof, allowance of any required insurance to lapse, initiates or has initiated against it any proceeding in bankruptcy or an assignment for the benefit of creditors, maintains or circulates or provides false information of any kind, or fails to comply with careful dispatch directions. Such termination under this Section shall be effective upon receipt by Ambulance Service of written notice by the City of a statement of the City's intention to effect such termination and the reason or reasons therefore.

XXIV Title VI Compliance

- A.<u>Compliance with Regulations:</u> The contractor shall comply with the Regulations relative to non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation, title 49, code of Federal Regulations, Part 21as they may be amended from time to time, (hereinafter referred to as the Regulations), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.
- B. <u>Non-discrimination</u>: The contractor, with regard to be performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including the procurements of materials and leases of equipment. The contractor shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by section 21.5 of the Regulation, including employment practices when the contractor covers a program set forth in Appendix B of the Regulations.
- C. <u>Solicitations for Subcontracts, Including Procurements of Materials and</u> <u>Equipment</u>: In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the contractor for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential subcontractor or supplier shall be notified by the contractor of the contractor's obligations under this contract and the Regulations relative to non-discrimination on the grounds of race, color or national origin.

- D. **Information and Reports:** The contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the City of Berkley to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Regulations or directives. Where any information required of a contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, the contractor shall so certify to the State highway department, or the Federal Highway Administration as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- E. <u>Sanctions for Non-compliance</u>: In the event of the contractor's non-compliance with the non-discrimination provisions of this contract, the City of Berkley shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Highway Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
 - (a) Withholding of payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies, and/or
 - (b) Cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.
- F. **Incorporation of Provisions:** The contractor shall include the provisions of paragraphs (A) through (F) in every subcontract, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. The contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the city of Berkley may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for non-compliance; Provided, however, that, in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the contractor may request the City of Berkley to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the City, and in addition, the contractor may request the State highway department to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United states to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

The City and Ambulance Service have executed this Agreement on November 16, 2020.

SUBJECT: REQUEST TO PURCHASE MICHIGAN PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (MPSCS) COMBATABLE PROJECT 25 (P25) RADIOS AND ACCESSORIES

OpenSky, the current radio system that is used by the Berkley Department of Public Safety, and the rest of Oakland County police/fire/public safety departments (with the exception of Southfield Police and Fire) was implemented in 2010. The current system is a standalone Oakland County system with very limited interoperability with the remainder of the State. There are frequent issues with this system and BDPS frequently has issues with coverage and penetration, especially in buildings. This coverage is particularly poor in larger buildings, such as schools. We are also struggling to obtain replacement parts and radios and have been making such purchases on eBay.

After extensive research, Oakland County has decided to migrate to a Michigan Public Safety Communications System (MPSCS) compatible Project 25 (P25) radio system. P25 is a standards development process for the design, manufacture, and evaluation of interoperable digital two-way land mobile radio systems communications products created by and for public safety professionals. This system will be owned and operated by Oakland County, with seamless interoperability with most other departments in the State. Because I am a member of both the Courts and Law Enforcement Management Information System (CLEMIS) Radio Oversight Committee and the Radio Policy Committee, I have been very involved in the project. The projected "live" date for this new system is projected for July, 2022.

Oakland County will be providing BDPS with approximately \$600,000 in radios, remote speaker microphones, consoles, batteries, accessories, installation, programing, and MPSCS "Onboarding" fees. The City of Berkley is responsible for the required additional radios, remote speaker microphones, batteries,

accessories, installation, programing, and MPSCS "Onboarding" fees that are not being provided.

BDPS has budgeted (in Radio Equipment 101-310-984-000) \$10,000 in FY 20/21, \$75,000 in FY 21/22, and \$75,000 in FY 22/23 for this purpose. Due to the need to have the majority of the radios purchased by BDPS well in advance of the implementation date for programing, we have requested to move the FY 21/22 and FY 22/23 funds forward one year.

The Department of Public Safety requests approval to purchase the following radios/equipment:

- 12 Motorola APX6000XE Public Safety Portable Radios
- 12 XE Remote Speaker Microphones
- 12 Single Unit Impress 2 Battery Chargers
- 1 APX6500 "Dual Control Head" Mobile Radio with installation
- 13 Permanent Mount Vehicular Battery Chargers with Installation

The total cost of this initial purchase is \$84,134.85 (see attached quote for specifics).

Unlike our current radios, the APX6000XE portable radios, XE remote speaker microphones, and all batteries are intrinsically safe (for operation in hazardous areas by limiting the energy, electrical and thermal, available for ignition in areas with dangerous concentrations of flammable gases or dust).

The remainder of the radios, speaker microphones, batteries, accessories, installation, programing, and all MPSCS "Onboarding" fees will be purchased in FY 21/22.

This purchase will be made from the State of Michigan's Extended Purchasing Program (MiDEAL) Contract #19000001544. It should be noted that Oakland County has negotiated an additional 10% discount (equaling an additional \$8,413.48 savings) on all orders placed before December 1, 2020 and that all warrantees do not start until Oakland County has accepted the P25 radio system and it is live.

The Department of Public Safety requests approval to purchase the above necessary radios, remote speaker microphones, battery chargers, and installation from ComSource, Inc., 41271 Concept Dr., Plymouth, MI 48170 at a price not to exceed \$84,134.85 from the "Radio Equipment" Account #101-310-984-000.







We have placed on the Council Agenda a motion for Council to approve by your signature and submittal to MERS an application for additional service credit from MERIT System employee Mark Pollock.

I have attached the MERIT System Section 1001.08 which describes how an employee is eligible for this additional service credit purchase. I have met all of the eligibility requirements for this service purchase, and the Application for Additional Service Credit Purchase needs your signature and approval once Council approves the purchase. The City and I have until December 1st to submit the payment and application to complete the purchase of the service credit. This also complies with the MERS Plan Document requirements. We will then send the signed application to MERS along with the Certification of Qualified Fund Rollover to MERS for my portion of the payment and they will confirm the final actual cost and invoice the City for their portion of the final cost.

All employees who meet the qualifications in this MERIT section are entitled to purchase up to 24 months of added service time. The current estimate from MERS is \$41,779, of which the employee will pay \$8,368.00 and the City would pay the balance of \$33,411.00. As with the service time purchase of the previous employees who have elected to purchase service time, this option costs the City less in a one-time lump sum amount than we would pay to MERS in retirement costs over two years of the individual continuing to work. This is because the calculation utilizes a formula that approximates the net present value of the service cost which is lower than the future cost over time.

 - b. The city will pay a portion of the cost for not more than twenty-four (24) months of service to be credited according to Section 1001.05 (b). The employee shall pay to MERS an amount determined as follows:

Employee payment to MERS = ____MERS reportable wages for prior 12 months _____ x .05 x Number of months to be credited

- c. The city shall be responsible for the portion of the total cost not paid by the employee. The employee shall be responsible for the entire cost of any additional service greater than 24 months that the employee may wish, and be eligible, to add to the service credit pursuant to the MERS Plan Document. ^{R-72-99}
- d. The city will be responsible for one required valuation of cost per eligible employee to add additional service credit. The employee shall be responsible for any additional valuations that may be required when less than all eligible prior service is added at any given time. ^{R-72-99}

1002 LONGEVITY AT RETIREMENT

An employee whose application for regular or disability retirement has been approved by the Municipal Employees Retirement System, and who separates from city employment for the purpose of receiving said retirement in the next following month, shall at the time of separation be entitled to receive a prorated longevity payment based upon the number of days from the most recent November 30th to the last day of employment.

1003 HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS FOR RETIREES

Full time employees hired prior to July 1, 20055, who is retired from city employment, who has applied for, and not been denied, or who is receiving, regular retirement or disability payments pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Employees Retirement System, shall be eligible to receive hospitalization insurance coverage while said retirement payments continue to be paid to the employee or the employee's surviving spouse, This insurance coverage shall be:

- a. The same, unless unavailable from the insurance carrier, as that provided at the time to non-retired Merit System employees, excluding benefits under Medicare or similar plan available pursuant to Federal and State legislation;
- b. Paid for by the city on behalf of the former employee and/or spouse who shall be responsible for payment, when required by the city, for any coverage for their eligible dependents.
- c. Terminated if the city is unable to correspond with the employee for lack of a current mailing address, or the employee falls to meet the financial obligation to the city under this program.
- d. Replaced with a PPO form of coverage as described in Section 901.02, when traditional coverage is unavailable due to the age or place of residence of the retiree.

<u>AN ORDINANCE</u> Of the Council of the City of Berkley, Michigan Amending Section 138-222 of Division 1 of Article IV of Chapter 138, Zoning, Of the City of Berkley Code of Ordinance to Permit Permeable Pavement for Parking Areas.

THE CITY OF BERKLEY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1: Section 138-222 of Division 1 of Article IV of Chapter 138 of the Berkley Code of Ordinance shall be amended, as follows:

DIVISION 1. – OFF-STREET PARKING REQUIRMENTS


Sec. 138-222. - Parking lot location, design, and construction.

- (a) Single- and two-family residential uses.
 - (1) *Location.* The off-street parking facilities required for single- and two-family dwellings shall be located on the same lot or plot of ground as the buildings they are intended to serve.
 - (2) Commercial vehicles.
 - a. A commercial vehicle is defined as a truck, pick up truck, sedan or panel van, including tractors, trailers, semi-trailers, and step vans used for the transportation or delivery of goods or merchandise or used in the business occupation of the current resident. No commercial vehicle shall have a height greater than ten feet and a length greater than 24 feet.
 - b. Parking of the following vehicles for more than 48 hours shall be prohibited in any residential district:
 - •Semi-tractor;
 - •Tow truck;
 - •Cement truck;
 - •Flat-bed truck whose bed exceeds 10 feet;
 - •Tank body truck;
 - •Cherry pickers;
 - •Dump truck;
 - •Stake truck whose bed exceeds ten feet; or


•Any type of construction or industrial equipment but not limited to bull dozers and hi-lo's, or vehicles equipped with open racks for transporting glass, lumber or any type of extended materials.

- c. All permitted commercial vehicles shall be currently licensed and operative. Vehicles shall be limited to those used by current residents.
- (3) Residential drive ways.
 - a. Number of driveways.


- 1. For parcels less than 100 feet wide. No more than one driveway and approach per dwelling unit shall be permitted.
- 2. For parcels 100 feet or more in width. A circular driveway with two approaches on the same street is permitted. Circular driveways shall not exceed 10 feet in width and shall not be less than 5 feet from the front building line. The driveway shall not be less than 5 feet from the side lot line as measured along the front lot line. Total pavement within the front yard shall not exceed 35% of the front yard.




3. For parcels 100 feet or more in width and a corner lot. In addition to the circular driveway described above, a separate driveway and approach from the side street is permitted if garage access is required.




- b. *Parking in the side and rear yards.* No parking shall be permitted on any residential lot or combination of residential lots, in the side or rear yards except upon a hard surface material.
- c. *Recreation vehicles.* Recreation vehicles, as defined in chapter 70, mobile homes, trailers, and recreational vehicles of the City Code, shall be stored in a garage or in the rear yard. See section 70-3, Parking outside of licensed park, for further requirements.
- d. *Parking in the front yard.* No parking shall be permitted on any residential lot or combination of residential lots, in any portion of the area extending between the residential structure and the public street, except upon a driveway area, parking strip or garage existing to the side of the residential structure.



- e. *Interior lots.* The width of the driveway area or parking strip shall not exceed 16 feet between the front building line and the front lot line.
- f. *Interior lots with attached garages.* The width of a driveway area or parking strip shall not exceed the width of the garage and shall taper uniformly to a width of 16 feet at the front lot line.



g. *Corner lots.* Garages on corner lots shall be rotated so the driveway accesses the side street. See section 33-115, accessory buildings and structures, for setback requirements. The width of a driveway area or parking strip shall not exceed 20 feet or the width of the garage, whichever is greater. The width of the driveway may be maintained to the side lot line.




- h. Lots fronting on Greenfield. Those residential lots fronting on Greenfield Road between 12 Mile Road and Catalpa shall be permitted a driveway approach not exceeding 20 feet in width in the area between the lot line and the street curb wherein parking in an east-west direction shall be permitted, subject to all other parking regulations.
- i. Lots backing to Coolidge. Those residential lots backing to Coolidge between Twelve Mile Road and Webster that have a driveway and approach onto Coolidge as of June 19, 2008 shall be allowed to maintain and replace said driveway and approach. No additional driveways or approaches onto this portion of Coolidge shall be permitted.

- (b) Multiple-family uses.
 - (1) *Location.* The off-street parking facilities required for single- and two-family dwellings shall be located on the same lot or plot of ground as the buildings they are intended to serve.
 - (2) Commercial vehicles.
 - a. A commercial vehicle is defined as a truck, pick up truck, sedan or panel van, including tractors, trailers, semi-trailers, and step vans used for the transportation or delivery of goods or merchandise or used in the business occupation of the current resident. No commercial vehicle shall have a height greater than ten feet and a length greater than 24 feet.
 - b. Parking of the following vehicles for more than 48 hours shall be prohibited in any residential district:
 - •Semi-tractor;
 - •Tow truck;
 - Cement truck;
 - •Flat-bed truck whose bed exceeds ten feet;
 - •Tank body truck;
 - •Cherry pickers;
 - •Dump truck;
 - •Stake truck whose bed exceeds ten feet; or

•Any type of construction or industrial equipment but not limited to bull dozers and hi-lo's, or vehicles equipped with open racks for transporting glass, lumber or any type of extended materials.

- c. All permitted commercial vehicles shall be currently licensed and operative. Vehicles shall be limited to those used by current residents.
- (3) Design.
 - a. *Parking lot ingress and egress.* Adequate ingress to the parking lot by means of clearly limited and defined drives shall be provided for all vehicles.
 - b. Backing onto public right-of-way. Backing a vehicle onto or from public rights-of-way (public alley excepted) is prohibited in all areas except residential areas. Parking spaces shall be designed and arranged so that it is more convenient for the parking space user to accomplish the necessary backing movements on the private property than it is to work onto or from the public rights-of-way.
 - c. Screenwalls. Where parking and/or off-street loading areas for business, office or industry are abutting a residential district, a six-foot obscuring masonry wall shall be constructed on the property line of such abutting districts. See article III "General Provisions," division 2 "Fences," for further screenwall requirements. Ownership shall be shown of all lots or parcels intended for use as parking by an applicant when an application for a building permit or certificate of occupancy is filed.
 - d. *Attendant shelters.* Not more than one building for shelter of attendants shall be erected upon any given parking area and each such building shall not be more than 50 square feet in area nor more than ten feet in height.

e. *Aisle widths.* Aisle widths shall be required as follows to maintain vehicular and pedestrian safety. The planning commission may alter or revise the aisle width requirements if the commission finds that strict application of said requirements would endanger pedestrians or vehicular traffic.



- (c) Non-residential uses.
 - (1) Location.
 - a. Required off-street for non-residential uses shall be on the same lot or within 500 feet of the building or use it is intended to serve, measured without crossing Twelve Mile Road, Coolidge Highway, Greenfield Road, Woodward Avenue, or Catalpa Drive from the nearest point of the required off-street parking facility.
 - b. If a non-residential use is within 500 feet of a municipal parking lot, without crossing a major thoroughfare, no on-premise parking shall be required.
 - c. No parking lots shall be permitted as a principal use in a zoning district other than the parking district (P-1).
 - (2) Design.
 - a. *Parking lot ingress and egress.* Adequate ingress to the parking lot by means of clearly limited and defined drives shall be provided for all vehicles.
 - b. Backing onto public right-of-way. Backing a vehicle onto or from public rights-of-way (public alley excepted) is prohibited in all areas except residential areas. Parking spaces shall be designed and arranged so that it is more convenient for the parking space user to accomplish the necessary backing movements on the private property than it is to work onto or from the public rights-of-way.
 - c. Screenwalls. Where parking and/or off-street loading areas for business, office or industry are abutting a residential district, a six-foot obscuring masonry wall shall be constructed on the property line of such abutting districts. See article III "General Provisions," division 2 "Fences," for further screenwall requirements. Ownership shall be shown of all lots or parcels intended for use as parking by an applicant when an application for a building permit or certificate of occupancy is filed.
 - d. *Attendant shelters.* Not more than one building for shelter of attendants shall be erected upon any given parking area and each such building shall not be more than 50 square feet in area nor more than ten feet in height.
 - e. *Aisle widths.* Aisle widths shall be required as follows to maintain vehicular and pedestrian safety. The planning commission may alter or revise the aisle width requirements if the commission finds that strict application of said requirements would endanger pedestrians or vehicular traffic.
- (d) Construction. All parking areas and drives shall be provided with paving having an asphaltic or portland cement binder at least 4 inches in depth so as to provide a permanent, durable, and dustless surface. Single family residential driveways may be constructed of masonry pavers. All parking areas shall be graded and drained so as to dispose of all surface water accumulated within the area according to Oakland County requirements prior to the issuance of an occupancy permit. Approaches shall be provided with paving having a portland cement binder at least 6 inches in depth. Approaches shall have a 2 foot flare on each side of the driveway.

Permeable pavement materials may be permitted, upon the review and recommendation by the city engineer. The Planning Commission shall have the authority to approve alternative paving materials in non-residential districts, based on the recommendation of the city engineer.

A zoning certificate shall be required for all driveway replacement and construction.

SECTION 2: Severability Clause

Should any word, phrase, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance be held invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3: Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days following the date of adoption.

SECTION 4: Publication

The City Council directs the City Clerk to publish a summary of this ordinance in compliance with Public Act 182 of 1991, as amended, and Section 6.5 of the Berkley City Charter.

Please accept this letter as a request to establish a Commercial Rehabilitation District (CRD) for the property located at 2219 Coolidge Highway, Berkley, Oakland County, Michigan (the "Property"), further described in Attachment A.

Company and Project Synopsis

2219 Coolidge LLC (the "Developer") is managed by Mr. Fred Blechman and Mr. Steve Friedman. With over 40 years of experience, they have established a proven management track record of successfully acquiring, redeveloping, and managing properies throughout Michigan. Collectively, they have successfully completed over 20 multifamily and mixed-use developments with the Detroit metropolitan region, and currently own and operate 24 residential developments, including Urbane Apartments Complex in the City of Berkley.

The proposed CRD contains portions of five (5) legal parcels totaling approximately 3.24 acres with a street address of 2219 Coolidge Highway, Berkley, Oakland County, Michigan. These parent parcels are in the process of being split and recombined into new child parcels that will be assessed as three (3) new parcels for the 2021 tax year. They are located at 2219 Coolidge Highway on the western side of the Coolidge Highway corridor, bounded by Oxford Avenue to the north, residential to the west, and the Our Lady of La Sallette Church to the south. The property is occupied by a vacant 3-story school building of approximately 40,000 square feet

The proposed redevelopment includes the renovation of the three-story school building to accommodate 54 apartment units, offering studio (7), one-bedroom (40), and two-bedroom (7) layouts. The development also includes the construction of an underground stormwater detention system and parking accommodation for 109 spaces.

Acquisition Timeline

The Property was acquired by 2219 Coolidge LLC in August 2020.

Necessity for Tax Relief

Substantial investment is necessary to rehabilitate the existing building into a viable, long-term development. The rehabilitation project would not be possible without the receipt of a Commercial Rehabilitation Tax Abatement.

In order to secure financing and future tenants for the development, the operating costs of the proposed project must be kept as low as possible (including property taxes).

Job Creation and Investment

On a short-term basis 200 temporary construction jobs will be created during the rehabilitation activities. On a long-term basis the proposed redevelopment associated with the project will create approximately 12 full time equivalent (FTE) jobs directly by the developer. Total hard cost investment is estimated to be \$5,580,000 and total capital investment is estimated to be \$10,650,000

PA 210 Request

This application documents the request for the establishment of a Commercial Rehabilitation District.

The proposed CRD is eligible as defined by Public Act 210, as amended because it is located in a downtown or business area as determined by the legislative body of the qualified local governmental unit.

Economic Advantages of the Rehabilitation

The granting of the District will not result in any fewer taxes to the City in the short-term or long-term. The project will fill a need for additional apartment spaces within the City of Berkley. The proposed redevelopment will attract new Berkley residents to an area that is a short distance from an established downtown area. As a result, it is anticipated that the rehabilitation of this property will increase day and nighttime foot traffic, which will support local merchants, restaurants, and small business.

On a long-term basis, following expiration of the 10-year abatement the building will deliver a significant increase in tax revenue. After the PA 210 tax abatement has expired, the project will have a significant impact on the generation of new property taxes.

All taxes associated with the property are current as of the submission of this request.

The project is also being considered for a Brownfield Plan under Public Act 381 with an estimated value of \$718,623.

General Description

The proposed Commercial Rehabilitation District (CRD) project is located at 2219 Coolidge Highway, on the western side of the Coolidge Highway corridor and is bounded by Oxford Avenue to the north, residential to the west, and the Our Lady of La Sallette Church to the south. The proposed CRD contains of portions of five (5) legal parcels totaling approximately 3.24 acres with a street address of 2219 Coolidge Highway, Berkley, Oakland County, Michigan. These parent parcels are in the process of being split and recombined into new child parcels that will be assessed as three (3) new parcels for the 2021 tax year. The property is occupied by a vacant 3-story school building of approximately 40,000 square feet. A portion of the current school building was originally constructed between 1940 and 1949 and was later expanded between 1952 and 1956. The property was historically occupied by an elementary school until closing in 2013. The building has been vacant since and has started to deteriorate due to the lack of maintenance.

The redesign of the building incorporates essential considerations specific to modern urban living. Particular attention will be given to the preservation of the historic nature of the property when economically feasible by ensuring that any damaged decorative details will be replaced with material consistent with the current profile, finish and color. The project will attract new Berkley residents to an area that is a short distance from an established downtown area. As a result, it is anticipated that the rehabilitation of this property will increase day and nighttime foot traffic, which will support small local merchants, restaurants, and business.



Description of Proposed Use

The proposed redevelopment includes the renovation of a three-story school building to accommodate 54 apartment units, offering studio (7), one-bedroom (40), and two-bedroom (7) layouts. The redesign of the building incorporates essential considerations specific to modern urban living. Particular attention will be given to the preservation of the historic nature of the property when economically feasible by ensuring that any damaged decorative details will be replaced with material consistent with the current profile, finish and color. The development also includes the construction of an underground stormwater detention system and parking accommodation for 109 spaces.

Nature and Extent of the Rehabilitation

2219 Coolidge LLC intends to apply for a 10-year real property tax abatement under the provisions of a Public Act 210 Commercial Rehabilitation tax abatement. Funding for the complete

rehabilitation is sourced from owner equity and permanent financing, with an estimated hard cost estimate of \$5,580,000 and an estimated total project investment of \$10,650,000

Demolition of the outdated interior layout will occur along with electrical, plumbing and mechanical/HVAC upgrades, new energy efficient windows and doors, kitchen and bathroom cabinetry, appliances, and fixtures, and also includes the exterior repair or replacement of the deteriorated and/or damaged plaster, masonry, brick and stone and streetscape improvements.

Descriptive List of the Fixed Building Equipment

Renovations, new fixed building equipment and materials for the project include:

- Masonry; restoration activities associated with the existing building
- Carpentry; including framing, kitchen cabinetry, vanities, trim work
- Thermal and Moisture Protection; roofing system, caulking and sealing, waterproofing
- Doors and Windows; curtain wall and exterior doors, interior doors/frames/hardware
- Mechanical; plumbing and HVAC
- Electrical; electrical work, security system, and communications
- Fire alarm/suppression system
- Finishes; drywall and steel studs/insulation, hard tile, hardwood/LVT flooring, painting
- Specialties; fire extinguishers, toilet accessories, and appliances.

Time Schedule

Renovation activities are anticipated to commence in Fall of 2020 and is anticipated to be completed by winter 2021.

Statement of Economic Advantages

The proposed development will fill a need for additional apartment spaces within the City of Berkley. The proposed redevelopment will attract new Berkley residents to an area that is a short distance from an established downtown area. As a result, it is anticipated that the rehabilitation of this property will increase day and nighttime foot traffic, which will support local merchants, restaurants, and small business.

According to Apartments.com, there are six apartment complexes located within a mile of the project location, with three located in the City of Berkley and three located in the neighboring City of Royal Oak. At present, none of these apartment complexes have availability for new residents. Furthermore, discussions between the development team and Beaumont Hospital of Royal Oak (located approximately one and half miles north of the project location) have indicated a need for additional apartment housing options. Several medical professionals that are in the process of completing their residencies have expressed a desire to relocate to apartments that are closer to the hospital to reduce commute times, as well as being located near a downtown area.

The granting of the tax abatement will not result in any fewer taxes to the City in the short-term or long-term. All City taxes are current as of the date of this submittal. Upon successful redevelopment, the project will generate increased property and income taxes.

On a short-term basis approximately 200 full-time equivalent (FTE) construction jobs will be created. On a long-term basis, the proposed development will create approximately 12 FTE jobs related to janitorial, building and grounds maintenance, and lease management.

Following expiration of the 10-year abatement the building will deliver a significant increase in tax revenue. After the PA 210 tax abatement has expired, the project will have a significant impact on the generation of new property taxes. Over time, the successful redevelopment and cultural growth will have a catalyst effect within this neighborhood.

COMMERCIAL REHABILITATION ACT

Public Act 210 of 2005, as amended, encourages the rehabilitation of commercial property by abating the property taxes generated from new investment for a period up to 10 years. As defined, commercial property is a gualified facility that includes a building or group of contiguous buildings of commercial property that is 15 years or older, of which the primary purpose is the operation of a commercial business enterprise or multifamily residential use. A qualified facility may also include vacant property or other commercial property which, within the immediately preceding 15 years, was commercial property. Types of commercial business enterprises include office, engineering, research and development, warehousing, parts distribution, retail sales, and other commercial activities. Multi-family residential is housing that consists of five or more units. Commercial properties allocated new market tax credits are also considered a qualified facility.

Qualified retail food establishments are considered a qualified facility for purposes of granting the tax abatement. These establishments include a retail supermarket, grocery store, produce market, or delicatessen that offer unprocessed USDA-inspected meat and poultry products or meat products that carry the USDA organic seal, fresh fruits and vegetables, and dairy products for sale to the public. The qualified retail food establishment must be located in a "core community" as defined in the Obsolete Property Rehabilitation Act (PA 146 of 2000) or in an area designated as rural as defined by the United States Census Bureau and is located in an underserved area.

Commercial property does not include property that is to be used as a professional sports stadium or a casino. Land and personal property are not eligible for abatement under this act.

Note: This document is offered as a general guide only and the legislation should be reviewed by local officials.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

"Qualified local government units" mean any city, village or township.

WHAT IS REHABILITATION?

Rehabilitation is defined as changes to qualified facilities that are required to restore or modify the property, together with all appurtenances, to an economically efficient condition. The new investment in the rehabbed property must result in improvements aggregating to more than 10 percent of the true cash value of the property at commencement of the rehabilitation of the qualified facility. Rehabilitation includes the following: improvement of floor loads, correction of deficient or excessive height, new or improved fixed building equipment including heating, ventilation, and lighting, reducing multistory facilities to one or two stories, improved structural support including foundations, improved roof structure and cover, floor replacement, improved wall placement, improved exterior and interior appearance of buildings, and other physical changes required to restore or change the property to an economically efficient condition.

Rehabilitation also includes new construction on vacant property from which a previous structure has been demolished and if the new construction is an economic benefit to the local community as determined by the qualified local governmental unit.

Rehabilitation for a qualified retail food establishment also includes new construction.

WHAT IS THE PROCESS?

Before the Commercial Rehabilitation Exemption Certificate (i.e., property tax abatement) can be granted to the commercial property owner, the city, village or township by resolution of its legislative body, must establish a Commercial Rehabilitation District. The establishment of the district may be initiated by the local government unit or by owners of property comprising 50 percent of all taxable value of the property in the proposed district. The district must be at least three acres in size unless it is located in a downtown or business area or contains a qualified retail food establishment.

The city, village or township must hold a hearing to establish a Commercial Rehabilitation District. Notification of the hearing must be given to the county board of commissioners and all real property owners in the proposed district.

After the hearing is held and the local unit of government determines the district meets the requirements of the act, a copy of the resolution adopting the district shall be provided to the county where the district is established. Within 28 days, the county may accept or reject the establishment of the district. In a county with a county executive, the executive can write a letter rejecting the establishment of the district. In all other counties, the county board of commissioners can pass a resolution rejecting the establishment of the district.

MICHIGAN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Once the district is established, the property owners may file an application with the local clerk for a commercial rehabilitation exemption certificate. Applications are available from the Michigan Department of Treasury. The local clerk shall provide written notification to the assessor of the local unit of government and each taxing jurisdiction that levies ad valorem property taxes of the application hearing. The city, village or township has 60 days after receipt of the application to either approve or disapprove the application. If denied, a reason must be given in the resolution. The assessor and applicant shall be sent a copy of the unapproved resolution by certified mail. If approved, the application and resolution must be sent to the State Tax Commission, which will certify or deny the application within 60 days. A resolution is not effective unless approved by the State Tax Commission.

COMMERCIAL REHABILITATION EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE

Upon approval by the State Tax Commission, a commercial rehabilitation certificate is issued. The property owner must pay a Commercial Rehabilitation Tax rather than the normal property tax. The certificate must be issued for a period of at least one year, but cannot exceed 10 years. Certificates initially issued for less than 10 years may be extended, but shall not exceed 10 years. The criteria for extensions must be included in the resolution approving the abatement.

The Commercial Rehabilitation Tax freezes the taxable value of the building and exempts the new investment from local taxes. The school operating tax and the State Education Tax (SET) are still levied on the new investment. Land and personal property cannot be abated under this act.

DISCUSSION

In addition to the Commercial Rehabilitation Act (PA 210 of 2005), several other property tax abatements are available for the rehabilitation of commercial property in Michigan, including the Commercial Redevelopment Act (PA 255 of 1978) and the Obsolete Property Rehabilitation Act (PA 146 of 2000). Each act has unique eligibility requirements, processes, and lengths and terms of the abatement. Please refer to the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) fact sheet for more information on each program and consult the authorizing statute to determine the best fit for your project needs.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BERKLEY, MICHIGAN TO APPROVE A BROWNFIELD PLAN FOR THE BERKLEY REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT AND TO REQUEST REVIEW BY THE OAKLAND COUNTY BROWNFIELD REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, the City of Berkley has a Brownfield project commonly known as the Berkley Redevelopment Project, proposed by the applicant 2219 Coolidge LLC, that the City would like to have reviewed and processed by the Oakland County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority; and

WHEREAS, the City of Berkley has not created a Brownfield Redevelopment Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Oakland County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority was created by Oakland County pursuant to MCL 125.2651 et seq. to assist jurisdictions like the City of Berkley that do not have their own Brownfield Redevelopment Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Oakland County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority is prepared to assist the City of Berkley by reviewing the proposed Berkley Redevelopment Project, provided that the City of Berkley acknowledges certain rights that the Oakland County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority has, to wit:

- OCBRA intends to collect an administration fee of \$5,000 per year for the length of the Brownfield Plan. The administration fee is determined by the size and complexity of the project; and
- OCBRA intends to capture and collect 100% of the eligible costs for the Brownfield project, and that such funds will be placed in the OCBRA's revolving loan fund for future remediation projects.

WHEREAS, the City of Berkley will have the opportunity to provide public comment on any Brownfield Plan, including the amount of the administration fee to be collected and the amount captured for the revolving loan fund, before it is adopted by the OCBRA.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Berkley City Council requests the OCBRA to undertake review of the Berkley Redevelopment Project.

IT IS FUTHER RESOLVED THAT the City of Berkley acknowledges and understands that OCBRA intends to collect administration fees and capture taxes for its revolving loan fund, specified in the Brownfield Plan.

I. INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

In order to promote the revitalization of environmentally distressed, historic, functionally obsolete and blighted areas within the boundaries of Oakland County ("the County"). The County has established the Oakland County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority (OCBRA) the "Authority" pursuant to the Brownfield Redevelopment Financing Act, Michigan Public Act 381 of 1996, as amended ("Act 381").

The purpose of this Brownfield Plan (the "Plan") is to promote the redevelopment of and investment in the eligible "Brownfield" Property within the County and to facilitate financing of eligible activities at the Brownfield Property. Inclusion of Brownfield Property within any Plan in the County will facilitate financing of eligible activities at eligible properties and will provide tax incentives to eligible taxpayers willing to invest in revitalization of eligible sites, commonly referred to as "Brownfields." By facilitating redevelopment of the Brownfield Property, this Plan is intended to promote economic growth for the benefit of the residents of the City and all taxing units located within and benefited by the Authority.

The identification or designation of a developer or proposed use for the Brownfield Property that is subject to this Plan shall not be integral to the effectiveness or validity of this Plan. This Plan is intended to apply to the eligible property identified in this Plan and, to identify and authorize the eligible activities to be funded. Any change in the proposed developer or proposed use of the eligible property shall not necessitate an amendment to this Plan, affect the application of this Plan to the eligible property, or impair the rights available to the Authority under this Plan.

This Plan is intended to be a living document, which may be modified or amended in accordance with and as necessary to achieve the purposes of Act 381. The applicable sections of Act 381 are noted throughout the Plan for reference purposes.

This Brownfield Plan contains information required by Section 13(2) of Act 381, as amended

II. GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. Description of the Eligible Property (Section 13 (2)(h)) and Project

The Eligible Property consists of portions of five (5) legal parcels totaling approximately 3.24 acres with a street address of 2219 Coolidge Highway, Berkley, Oakland County, Michigan. These parent parcels are in the process of being split and recombined into new child parcels that will be assessed as three (3) new parcels for the 2021 tax year. The parcels and all tangible personal property located thereon will comprise the eligible property and is referred to herein as the "Property."

The Property is located on the west side of the Coolidge Highway corridor, bounded by Oxford Avenue to the north, residential to the west, and the Our Lady of La Sallette Church to the south.

2219 Coolidge LLC, or any affiliate, or such other developer as approved by the Authority, are collectively the project developer ("Developer").

2219 Coolidge LLC strives to create interesting, unique properties to attract tenants that enjoy living in cities that have created vibrant dining and shopping areas in their downtown. The 2219 Coolidge LLC ownership team has an established and proven management track record of successfully acquiring, redeveloping, and managing properties throughout Michigan, successfully completing over 20 multifamily and mixed-use developments with the Detroit metropolitan region. The Developer currently owns and operates 24 residential developments, including Urbane Apartments Complex in the City of Berkley.

Standard and historical sources document that the property was developed in at least 1937 with six dwellings and associated garage structures along the northern and eastern boundaries. The dwellings and garage structures were demolished between the 1940s and 1960s. The southern portion of the current school building was constructed between 1940 and 1949, and the northern portion was constructed between 1952 and 1956. The property was historically occupied by an elementary school until closing in 2013.

The Property's legal description is included in Appendix A. Property location maps are included in Appendix B.

The proposed redevelopment includes the renovation of the three-story school building to accommodate 54 apartment units, offering studio (7), one-bedroom (40), and two-bedroom (7) layouts. The redesign of the building incorporates essential considerations specific to modern urban living. The rehabilitation of the property also includes the exterior repair or replacement of the deteriorated and/or damaged plaster, masonry, brick and stone and streetscape improvements. Particular attention will be given to the preservation of the historic nature of the property when economically feasible by ensuring that any damaged decorative details will be replaced with material consistent with the current profile, finish and color. The development also includes the construction of an underground stormwater detention system and parking accommodation for 109 spaces.

The project will attract new Berkley residents to an area that is a short distance from an established downtown area. As a result, it is anticipated that the rehabilitation of this property will increase day and nighttime foot traffic, which will support local merchants, restaurants, and small

business. In addition, the property was recently acquired by the Developer from a tax-exempt entity. Therefore, the property will no longer be tax-exempt starting in year 2021, which will have a significant impact on the generation of new property taxes after the reimbursement of brownfield eligible activities. New tax revenues from non-capturable millages will be immediate.

Abatement and demolition activities are anticipated to begin in the fall of 2020 with renovations set to be completed by the end of 2021. The Developer will invest an estimated \$10.6 million in the development and create approximately 200 construction jobs and 12 new FTE jobs.

Site plans and renderings for the project are included in Appendix C.

B. Basis of Eligibility (Section 13 (2)(h) and Section 2(o))

The Property is considered "Eligible Property" as defined by Act 381, Section 2 because the parcels comprising the Property have been determined to be "functionally obsolete" by a Michigan Master Assessing Officer (MMAO) (formerly Level IV) as described below.

The Property was determined to be obsolete due to the following conditions:

- Ceiling leakage,
- Peeling paint,
- Foundation cracks,
- Areas of pooling water,
- Window and door replacement or rehabilitation
- Presence of asbestos containing materials requiring abatement and lead-based paint,
- The antiquation of HVAC

The functional obsolescence determination is provided in Appendix D.

In addition, several upgrades to the parking lot area are required as part of the site plan approval process to address stormwater management issues. As such, the parking area has been redesigned to include an underground stormwater detention system that is compliant with Oakland County's recently revised standards.

C. Summary of Eligible Activities and Description of Costs (Sec. 13 (2)(a-b))

Tax Increment Financing revenues will be used to reimburse the costs of "eligible activities" (as defined by Section 2 of Act 381) as permitted under the Brownfield Redevelopment Financing Act that include: Demolition, Asbestos and Lead Activities and preparation of a Brownfield Plan and Act 381 Work Plan. A complete itemization of these activities and associated expenses is included in Table 1.

The following eligible activities and budgeted costs are intended as part of the development of the property and are to be financed solely by the developer. All activities are intended to be "Eligible Activities" under the Brownfield Redevelopment Financing Act. The Authority is not responsible for any cost of eligible activities and will incur no debt.

1. Demolition Activities includes selective building demolition, removal and disposal of parking lots, curbs and gutters, and sidewalks at an estimated of cost of \$418,850.

- 2. Asbestos and Lead Activities includes asbestos containing materials (ACM) and leadbased paint abatement and professional fees pertaining to sampling, air monitoring, reporting and oversight at an estimated cost of \$184,300.
- 3. Preparation of the Brownfield Plan and Act 381 Work Plan (if necessary) and associated activities (e.g. meetings with OCBRA, review by City Attorney etc.) and brownfield plan and Act 381 Work Plan implementation at a cost of approximately \$25,000.
- 4. A 15% contingency of \$90,473 is established to address unanticipated environmental and/or other conditions that may be discovered through the implementation of site activities. This excludes the cost of the preparation of the Brownfield Plan and Act 381 Work Plan.

All activities are intended to be "Eligible Activities" under the Brownfield Redevelopment Financing Act. The total estimated cost of Eligible Activities subject to reimbursement from tax increment revenues is \$628,150 with a potential \$90,473 contingency, resulting in a total cost of \$718,623. Therefore, the total cost for reimbursement to the applicant is a not-to-exceed amount of \$718,623 including contingency), unless the Plan is amended and approved by the Berkley City Council, OCBRA and the Oakland County Board of Commissioners.

"Pre-plan" eligible activity costs pertaining to asbestos abatement and selective interior demolition are necessary to address immediate structural and safety issues and to prevent further damage. It is anticipated these will begin in October 2020, an estimated 90 days prior to this plan's approval by OCBRA. The remainder of the eligible activities are anticipated to resume after this plan's approval, with completion by Winter 2021.

D. Estimate of Captured Taxable Value and Tax Increment Revenues (Sec. 13 (2)(c))

Incremental taxes on real property included in the redevelopment project will be captured under this Plan to reimburse eligible activity expenses. The base taxable value of the Property shall be determined by the use of the 2020 tax year tax values, which is \$0.00 as the property is currently tax exempt. Tax increment revenue capture will begin in 2021 when the tax status of the property is no longer exempt, and a tax increment is generated by redevelopment of the Property. For the year 2021, the redevelopment of the property is expected to be partially complete, therefore the estimated taxable value is estimated to be \$1,629,420. In 2022, the estimated taxable value of the completed development is \$2,377,830. An annual increase in taxable value of 1% has been used for calculation of future tax increments in this Plan. Tables 2 details the estimate of captured tax increment revenues for each year of the Plan from the eligible property.

Prior to reimbursement of tax increment revenue to the Developer, payment of Brownfield Redevelopment Authority Administrative fees will occur first as shown in Table 3.

E. <u>Method of Brownfield Plan Financing and Description of Advances by the</u> <u>Municipality (Sec. 13 (2)(d))</u>

Eligible activities will be financed by 2219 Coolidge LLC. The Developer will be reimbursed for eligible costs as described in Section C and outlined in Table 1. Costs for Eligible Activities funded by 2219 Coolidge LLC will be repaid under the Michigan Brownfield Redevelopment Financing Program (Michigan Public Act 381, as amended) with incremental taxes generated by future development of the property. The estimated amount of tax increment revenue capture that will be used to reimburse the Developer, Brownfield Redevelopment Authority, and State

Brownfield Fund is \$934,524. This includes Brownfield Plan preparation and Brownfield Redevelopment Authority Administrative fees.

No advances will be made by the OCBRA for this project. All reimbursements authorized under this Plan shall be governed by the Reimbursement Agreement.

F. Maximum Amount of Note or Bonded Indebtedness (Sec. 13 (2)(e))

No note or bonded indebtedness will be incurred by any local unit of government for this project.

G. Duration of Brownfield Plan (Sec. 13 (2)(f))

In no event shall the duration of the Plan, exceed 35 years following the date of the resolution approving the Plan, nor shall the duration of the tax capture exceed the lesser of the period authorized under subsection (4) and (5) of Section 13 of Act 381 or 30 years. Further, in no event shall the beginning date of the capture of tax increment revenues be later than five years after the date of the resolution approving the Plan. The Property will become part of this Plan on the date this Plan is approved by the Oakland County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority.

H. <u>Estimated Impact of Tax Increment Financing on Revenues of Taxing</u> Jurisdictions (Sec. 13 (2)(g))

Non-capturable millages; including debt millages, the zoo authority and art institute, will have an immediate increase in tax revenue following redevelopment of approximately \$96,340 throughout the duration of this Plan.

A summary of the impact to taxing jurisdictions for the life of the Plan is summarized below, the amount captured is the sum of developer eligible activity and interest reimbursement, administrative fees and the state brownfield revolving fund.

Assessors Map (2020)





