How We Recycle Is Important!

- Every person in the US produces about 5 lbs. of trash per day.
- 22% is food waste so composting is extremely important!
- No plastic bags! Bring to grocery store-bins to recycle, please!
- **Clean** food from jars, cans, plastics. No loose lids or caps.
- Remove & discard all corks, rings, metal wraps.
- Corrugated cardboard should not exceed 2 ft x 2 ft pieces.
- Flatten all containers. No plastic liners or bubble wrap.
- **Non-recyclables, food & liquids can contaminate the whole bin!**

Mixed Paper 	Examples include: Mail and envelopes (windows are ok) Wrapping paper Magazines and catalogs Writing and ledger paper Paperback books Fax paper Greeting cards Paper bags Shredded paper (place in paper bag) Computer paper	Paper towels Facial tissues Napkins Cigarette packs Candy wrappers Waxed or plastic-coated paper Wrapping tissue paper Foil wrapping paper
Newspaper (including ads and inserts)  Thin cardboard 	Examples include: Shoe boxes Toothpaste boxes Cereal boxes Tissue boxes Pasta boxes Paper egg cartons Toilet paper rolls Frozen food boxes Gift boxes Cake mix boxes Soap or laundry detergent boxes Soda or beer packaging	Boxes with silver or foil coatings Anything dirty, greasy or plastic-coated
Corrugated Cardboard 	Examples include: Boxes and other corrugated cardboard should be flattened and folded Pizza boxes (greasy liner removed)	Dirty or greasy cardboard
Aluminum and Tin Cans 	Examples include: Aluminum and tin cans Wire clothes hangers Foil and pie plates Empty steel aerosol cans	Scrap metal (See Attendant) Paint Cans Hypodermic needles
Glass Bottles and Jars 	Examples include: Mayonnaise jars Spaghetti jars Salsa jars Wine bottles Vinegar bottles Applesauce jars Baby food jars Beer bottles	Broken glass, glass windows, crystal, mirrors Cups, dishes, plates, Pyrex, ceramics, light bulbs
Plastic Bottles, Jugs and Containers 	This includes all rigid plastic containers with symbols 1-7 on the bottom. Examples include: Soda and juice bottles Salad dressing bottles Milk jugs Juice bottles Detergent bottles Saline solution bottles Window Cleaner Fabric cleaner or bleach bottles Shampoo bottles	Plastic shopping bags, plastic food wrap Potato chip and sandwich bags Styrofoam Automotive fluid bottles (oil, antifreeze, brake fluid)
Milk cartons, drink boxes 	Examples include: Milk and juice cartons Juice boxes Flavored milk boxes Cream and creamer containers	Ice cream boxes TV dinner containers Margarine boxes Cream cheese boxes
