
DONALD E. BROWN



Born and raised in Brooklyn, NY until the age of 11, Don and his family moved to Ashland, NH in 1966 where Don began his restaurant "career" at the young age of 14. Don washed dishes at the Common Man (C-Man) in Ashland and quickly moved up to prep cook and eventually cook/chef. As a young man, Don was fortunate to travel throughout the United States, Europe, the Caribbean and Bermuda. In 1977, Don graduated from the University of New Hampshire with a degree in Zoology.

How Don met Jane. During his employment with the C-Man, Don and Jane met and were married in April 1987. Reverend Marshall Davis officiated the wedding and almost the entire town of Sandwich was in attendance. Good thing Don and Jane owned a restaurant! In January 1995 and 1998, Don and Jane adopted two little girls from Russia - Anna was eighteen months, and Julia was eight years old. The town has enjoyed watching the girls grow into beautiful young women!





The Corner House Inn has had an amazing history, and Don and Jane continued that rich history when they purchased the bed and breakfast / restaurant in the spring of 1981. Of course, the inn came with a few guests – several "friendly" ghosts with the most popular named Clarence. For the next 18 years, the B&B and restaurant were widely acclaimed for the dining and lodging. Their recipes and accommodations have been featured in "Country Living", "Bon Appetit", and "Gourmet" magazines. The guest rooms were one

by one converted into intimate dining areas and after the last guests celebrated the Millenium with Don and Jane, the bed and breakfast closed its doors. In the summer of 2000, the Corner House Pub was created on the second floor of the original carriage house. The pub continues to be a very popular place for locals and visitors alike to gather for food, drink and conversation.

An extremely vital part of downtown Sandwich, the Corner House Inn has always been a destination; however, Don, with his innovative ideas and passion for cooking, has hosted a wonderful array of events over the years - St. Baldrick's, storytelling, Robert Burns Night, International **Nights** (Benz Center), cookbook dinners, and live entertainment every Wednesday and Friday evenings. This has been a wonderful venue for local talent. Don continues to bring fresh ideas and menus to the restaurant and pub.



In addition to the Corner House Inn, Don is very active in the local and wider communities. Partnering with Lisa Scott in 2005, they initiated the start of the Sandwich Business Group with Don serving as its first Vice President. Later he was nominated for President and has been President ever since! Don was President of the Annie Forts "Up Fund" for many years. He has also served on the Board of Directors of the Squam Lakes Association and was very active in the organization. Don is also a mentor for the students at Moultonborough Academy. Each year he shows the Senior Class how to make his delicious lobster and mushroom bisque, so they can make and sell it at the Sandwich Fair.

Don's passion for and dream of living in Sandwich continued to grow, so when the "Smith House" on Main Street, adjacent to the Corner House, came up for sale, Don and Jane jumped at the opportunity. After a period of renovations, it soon became home to Willow Pond Antiques and Surroundings Art Gallery as well as a rental property.

Don is one of those very special people who is admired and respected for his unselfish generosity. Extremely generous of his time, advice and talents, Don has never turned down the opportunity to support a cause or an event. His love of Sandwich is evident in all he does and will continue to do. The Town of Sandwich extends its sincerest appreciation and gratitude to Don for his continued dedication and unwavering support for the betterment of our town and community. We extend wishes to Don, Jane and the Corner House Inn for many happy, healthy and prosperous years ahead!

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

2013 featured a year long celebration of the 250th Anniversary of the Town of Sandwich. We are pleased to report that after 250 years, the Town's business, administrative and operational affairs continue to be in good order. We note with appreciation and gratitude the fine services of all Town employees, elected officials and volunteers.

The Selectmen are charged with "managing the prudential affairs of the Town" (NH RSA 41:8). This includes overseeing the day-to-day operations of the Town, preparing and managing the annual budget, holding public hearings and providing a public forum for residents and others with business in the Town. In 2013, a varied selection of new and old business occupied our attention. The following are items of note:

Roads, Bridges and Culverts: We had expected to finish the topcoat of Mountain Road in 2013, but water drainage issues required unanticipated reengineering and mitigation expenses which prevented finalizing the project in 2013.

The culvert replacement project on Great Rock Road was completed in 2013. The culvert replacement on Diamond Ledge Road has not been completed as we need to work out issues with the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES). DES has indicated that they would prefer a bridge to a culvert. The Town would prefer to avoid that expense.

<u>Tea Cup Lake Culvert</u>: We are pleased to report that this culvert was finally replaced, in large part due to the effort and ingenuity of our new Road Agent. The final cost was \$19,984.48, which was \$3,850 under budget. The Chapman Sanctuary/Visny Woods generously helped fund this project.

Notch Bridges: The wooden planks on five (5) bridges in the Sandwich Notch were replaced. This project was generously paid for by the Alfred Quimby Fund.

Road Agent: Jon Peaslee was hired as Road Agent to replace Colin Weeks, who retired in August 2013. Jon immediately began working on an ambitious agenda of projects, maintenance and upgrades for the Highway Department. Jon's initiatives include upgrades for workplace safety, equipment maintenance logs and responsibilities, continuing education and training, information technology and a myriad of other projects. As Road Agent, Jon also oversees the Transfer Station, and we note that there have been positive upgrades there as well. Drainage, waste container efficiency and overall cleanliness to name just a few.

<u>Fire Truck</u>: At the 2013 Town Meeting, the Town voted to purchase a new Fire Truck. The Fire Department took delivery of the truck in December 2013.

<u>Tax Rate</u>: The 2013 tax rate was set at \$11.20. This was a reduction of thirty-one cents (\$0.31) from the 2012 tax rate of \$11.51. The 2013 rate is also lower than the 2011 rate which was \$11.29. We were able to lower the rate primarily due to a decrease in the local and state school tax rates, and the application of \$248,441 from the 2012 surplus.

<u>Police Parking Lot</u>: The parking lot was re-paved with the assistance of a gift from the Alfred Quimby Fund.

Acquisition of Land: After holding two (2) statutorily required public hearings, the Town accepted a gift of 107 acres of land (R1 Lot 35) from Club Motorsports, LLC. The parcel is subject to a Conservation Restriction and will be monitored accordingly by the Sandwich Conservation Commission. The Conservation Restriction allows for forestry and agriculture use and at some point the Selectmen will begin discussions with the appropriate Town committees, and all interested residents, to discuss taking advantage of these uses.

<u>Town Hall Building Project</u>: In 2012, the Town voted to appropriate \$660,000, through the issuance of a bond, for the Town Hall Renovation Project. \$583,003 of those funds were expended in 2012. In 2013, final expenditures were made for electrical upgrades for the Town Hall generator and meeting room furniture. \$49,874 was spent in 2013, and the remaining \$27,123 was returned to the Northway Bank to pay down the bond principal.

<u>Town Buildings</u>: The Selectmen are currently preparing a maintenance and upgrade schedule for all Town Buildings.

<u>Policies and Ordinances</u>: We have been working on revising and updating certain Town Ordinances and Policies, including the Town Beaches, Transfer Station, Intellectual Property and the Employee Handbook. Hearings for these updates will be held in 2014.

<u>Welfare</u>: Welfare applications increased dramatically in 2013, and the Town spent \$40K assisting residents in need. The 2013 expenditure was \$20,000 higher than 2012, a 100% increase. While providing assistance to our residents is both a moral and statutory obligation, this is an issue of some concern and has caused the Selectmen to begin a review of the Town Welfare guidelines and mitigation options.

<u>Litigation</u>: 2013 saw the conclusion of certain litigation cases the Town had been involved with over the past few years. At the end of 2013, the only ongoing litigation cases are tax abatement cases, including those with the utility companies over pole assessments. The Town of Sandwich is a co-party to these lawsuits with several other Towns. The Selectmen expect that these matters may not be resolved until 2015.

<u>Skating Rink</u>: The Town Skating Rink was relocated to Remick Park in North Sandwich. It is enjoying a banner winter season. Electrical and lighting upgrades are planned for 2014, which will enhance and expand for year-round use.

Finally, we would like to note and express our appreciation for the outstanding effort that the 250th Anniversary Committee put forth over the past two (2) years in preparing and conducting the Town's 250th Celebration activities. All events were well-attended and were informative and entertaining. We're looking forward to the 300th Celebration!

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

Trustees of Trust Funds (Trustees) are elected by the voters of Sandwich and are charged as fiduciaries to manage the Trust Funds, Capital Reserve Funds, and Expendable Trusts of the Town of Sandwich. Each year one Trustee is elected for a three-year term. The Trustees manage three distinct types of funds. Trust Funds are those given to the Town, usually through bequests or donation, with the income dedicated to specific purposes by the donor. Payments are requested by the Selectmen or by application by private parties at the Selectmen's Office. Payments are made once the Trustees confirm that the request conforms to the terms of the Trust. Capital Reserve Funds are those Town Funds appropriated by warrant approval. Expendable Trusts are Town Funds used for expenses as needed and approved by the Selectmen.

The Trustees have an Investment Policy for privately funded Trust Funds for an asset allocation of up to 70% in equities, with a goal of maximizing income while at the same time growing the principal. For Capital Reserve Funds and Expendable Trusts, which are usually shorter-term, low risk investments such as CD's, with the goal of providing preservation of capital with growth in income and a high degree of liquidity.

In 2013 our funds were managed by Cambridge Trust of New Hampshire, who have also taken on the accounting of our MS-9 reports as sent to the State of NH and shown in this report.

As of December 31, 2013, the Trustees were responsible for managing \$2,809,042. The Trustees meet at least four times each year with the manager to review investments and oversee investment performance. Investment performance and associated fees for past six years are shown below.

TOWN CLERK/TAX COLLECTOR

In 2013 we settled into our newly renovated, warm, efficient, and user-friendly office space with lots of positive feedback from the public. Town Election was held in the second floor auditorium at Town Hall, which is now accessible by the newly installed lift. A scant thirty percent of the registered voters, however, turned out to cast votes for the Town's elected positions in March and just 160 attended Town Meeting. Going forward, all elections are scheduled to be held on the second floor at Town Hall.

New Services offered in 2013: The Town Clerk's Office has been approved as a <u>Boat Agent for the State of NH</u> as well as <u>Agents for NH Fish & Game</u>. We attended training in April and began issuing both boat registrations and hunting and fishing licenses in May. Previously, boats were registered directly with the State or with local retail and sports shops with a portion of the fees going to the State and a portion to the city or town in which the boat agent was located. All boat registrations run for the calendar year, but may be issued at any time during the year. Please register your boats with us, so that the Town of Sandwich will retain a portion of those fees. In early December, New Hampshire Fish & Game converted to a new electronic licensing system and, after completing the training course in December, we are now certified to issue the new electronic hunting and fishing licenses.

Taxes: The Warrant to collect 2013 property taxes was \$4,868,503.00 and 93% was collected by year end. We encourage anyone unable to pay the full amount of taxes by the due date to consider making partial payments, which will help lower interest due. Prepayments and partial payments are accepted in any amount at any time throughout the year. Please notify us of address changes, so that you will receive tax bills and notices in a timely manner. A tax kiosk is available on the Town's website: sandwichnh.org, on the Tax Collector link. The kiosk provides recent invoices, due dates, bill amounts, and outstanding due amounts. Interest dates can be changed to determine proper payment amount for future payments. Transactional information such as payments, abatements, or penalties is also available. All information may be printed and the best part is that it is available for our taxpayers 24/7.

Dog Licensing: 2014 dog tags are available as of January 1, although 2013 dog licenses do not expire until April 30. Please advise our office if you lose your pet during the year thereby avoiding the need for us to follow up with you when your dog is not licensed. NH laws mandate dog licensing and require valid rabies certificates be on file at all times. Licensing can be done via the mail or in person at our office. Remember, age has its advantages and senior citizens 65 and older may license one dog for a companion fee of \$2.00! Please contact the Town Clerk's Office with any questions you may have. Sandwich will hold its first "Top Dog Contest" in 2014. To enter your dog, must be licensed by April 30. Prizes will be awarded, including the coveted #1 Dog Tag for 2014. Details are available at our office and on the Town's website.

Motor Vehicles: Vehicle registrations remain our busiest activity on a daily basis. This year the Town collected \$257,416 in Motor Vehicle revenue. In addition, \$103,148 was collected for the State of New Hampshire DMV. As we receive updates on a weekly basis, we continue to keep residents informed regarding the ever-evolving rules and regulations governing vehicle titling and registration.

Vital Records: Legislation was enacted this year to allot a larger portion of vital records fees to the Town. For every certified birth, death or marriage certificate issued, the town will now receive \$7 instead of \$4 of the total fee - \$15; and \$5 instead of \$3 of the total subsequent copy fee - \$10. Note: the Vital Records reported at the back of the Town Report --we had a banner year for babies! Although births came close, they did not outnumber deaths. It has been 23 years since the number of births outnumbered deaths. Sandwich reported 9 births and only 6 deaths in 1990.

Continuing Education: Because of the ever-changing legislation, election statutes, motor vehicle laws, vital records rules, etc. we are diligent about our attendance at various Town Clerk and Tax Collector workshops, conferences, and training seminars in order to assist our public in the most effective and efficient manner possible. In addition, Deputy Jennifer Martel attended her first year of the 4-year Town Clerk/Tax Collector Certification program in Concord.

TOWN WARRANT NARRATIVE

In this section we provide an overview of the proposed Town Budget followed by brief explanations of each Article listed in the Warrant.

OVERVIEW: We have an extensive Town Warrant this year featuring 50 Warrant Articles. These include several appropriations for Highway Department equipment and projects. Our Road Agent has set a robust agenda for maintenance and upgrades in several areas which are overdue, as well as our usual infrastructure projects. The Warrant Articles also include Parks and Recreation upgrade projects, most of which are generously funded by the Alfred Quimby Fund. We have two other significant appropriations for Safety Compliance (Article 3) and Sewer Engineering Studies (Article 11), the details of each are set forth below. Finally, there are more petitioned articles this year to consider.

Overall, the proposed 2014 budget expenditure is 2.39% higher than the 2013 budget. One of the goals of the Budget Committee was to keep the budget "flat" with no increase from the year before; however, the Town's safety compliance requirements (see Article 3) brought an unanticipated need late in the budget process, and those projected expenses are included.

ARTICLES 1 & 2: These first two Articles in the Town Warrant will be decided by ballot on Tuesday, March 11 at Town Hall. Voting hours are 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. All other Articles contained in the Warrant will be considered at the Deliberative Session (Town Meeting) on Wednesday, March 12, at the Sandwich Central School at 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 3: The General Government portion of the budget is up by \$142,113 due to several factors including: a 1.5% COLA wage increase to employees; an increase to the Election and Registration line due to the fact that there will be four separate elections in 2014 (there was one in 2013); an increase to the Legal budget due to the ongoing abatement appeals of the utility companies as well as other landowner abatements; and an increase in our Property Appraisal line due to the five year Town-wide Revaluation, which is required in 2014.

Mapping and Engineering – this is a new line and includes: (1) Mapping expenses for training and data input which will allow the Town to take advantage of comprehensive (and free) LRPC and UNH/DRA mapping programs rather than purchasing a costly GIS system; and (2) Engineering costs for the myriad of projects around Town that should have an engineering plan before we commence work.

Safety – in December 2013 we were notified by the Department of Labor that all Town facilities and equipment will be audited in March 2014 for compliance with state and federal safety regulations. This will be the first time the Town of Sandwich has been

subject to a full safety audit, and it is expected to be comprehensive. A preliminary review of the Highway Shed, Fire Station, Police Station and Transfer Station by the Selectmen and Department Heads has determined that we are out-of-date and out-of-compliance with many safety rules. By far our biggest exposure is at the Highway Shed, and the majority of our safety costs will most likely go there. We have projected a need to spend approximately \$75,000 to bring Town facilities into proper compliance. Fortunately, the Town Hall looks to be in good shape thanks to the recent renovation.

Welfare - the Welfare budget has been increased from \$15,000 in 2013 to \$40,000 for 2014. This is due to the fact that actual Welfare expenditures for 2013 were \$37,351, and we expect that applications for assistance will at least stay at this level. The Town's obligation to provide welfare assistance is not discretionary. The Town has a legal duty pursuant to RSA 165 which is a 200 year-old statute and pre-dates the New Hampshire state constitution.

Debt Service – The Town has two debt sources: (1) a Tax Anticipation Note each year to facilitate cash flow until taxes are paid in December. Interest is generally under \$10,000 a year, and (2) Long term debt due to both the NH CDFA loan for the Central Fire Station solar installation and the Town Hall renovation bond in 2012. Principal and interest in 2014 will be \$63,346.

ARTICLE 4: The Police Department budget is up by 3.6% from last year all due to personnel costs: the 1.5% COLA wage increase and associated NH Retirement increases, an increase in the Special Officer's line to provide more coverage, and an increase to the Beach Enforcement Officer's wages, which have not been raised in three years.

ARTICLE 5: The cost of this appropriation is based on a contractual agreement with Stewart's Ambulance Service for mutual aid along with Center Harbor, Meredith, and Moultonborough.

ARTICLE 6: The 2008 Ford Expedition police vehicle was originally scheduled for replacement on the CIP Table in 2013; however, the Budget Committee last year voted to extend ownership for another year. The vehicle has 130,500 miles and upon review, the Budget Committee recommends the purchase of a 2014 Ford Expedition Police Cruiser. Recommended funding is through the use of \$30,000 from the Police Equipment Capital Reserve.

ARTICLE 7: For the past few budget cycles, the Police Department has requested that the Town upgrade its IMC software to provide multi-user and imaging capabilities to greatly improve the department's efficiency. The purchase amount is \$5,690. The Budget Committee recommends using the Police Equipment Capital Reserve to fully fund this purchase.

ARTICLE 8: The Fire Department's operating budget is essentially the same as 2013's. A 2014 budget accounting change for Special Detail reporting increases the overall bottom-line.

ARTICLE 9: The Central Fire Station and the Whiteface Station have some serious maintenance needs. This year we will start by replacing the doors and windows to improve the overall efficiency of the buildings. This appropriation will be fully funded by the Life Safety Building Capital Reserve.

ARTICLE 10: In 2012, the Town updated its Hazard Mitigation Plan as required by FEMA. This year the Emergency Management Directors and department heads will update the Town's required Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). This effort will be fully funded through a grant from the NH Homeland Security and Emergency Management.

ARTICLE 11: Sewer Engineering. As we all know, Town discussion regarding the Sewer System has been ongoing for many years. In 2012, the Town appropriated \$5,000 for a Sewer Expansion Study, which has been partially expended on an initial study by Tighe & Bond. The Selectmen and the Sewer Commissioners agree that it is time to address two primary issues facing the Sewer System: (1) the need to upgrade the existing tanks at the Squam Lake Road pumping station to allow the system to operate properly at full capacity: and (2) to find a new location and to design a satellite leachfield to allow expansion or modification of current usage and the addition of new users.

ARTICLE 12: The Highway Department's operating budget reflects a minimal decrease from last year's. After assessing the needs of the Town's roads and equipment, the new Road Agent is requesting an increase to the gravel, vehicle maintenance and vehicle repair lines within his budget. These improvements to both our infrastructure and equipment will extend their life and performance.

ARTICLE 13: After a major rain event last spring, it was clear the improvements made to Mountain Road near the Moultonborough town line did not adequately address some of the drainage issues. Larger culverts must be installed under the road and better ditching should take care of these issues. This project will use the carryover amount of \$20,823 from the 2013 Budget, plus this \$10,000 appropriation to solve the drainage problem. This portion of Mountain Road is scheduled to receive a topcoat in 2015 which will complete this road project.

ARTICLE 14: Mt. Israel Road is next on the list of paved roads to get rebuilt. Due to the length of the road, this road will be done in a few years or in phases. Phase I will address approximately 1.3 miles starting near the Booty Farm and heading down toward the village. 2000 feet of asphalt will be reclaimed, base gravel will get replaced and the section will be repaved. The other sections, which are not in as bad of shape, will get a new shim and topcoat. Half of this project will be funded by the Highways, Streets and Bridges Capital Reserve.

ARTICLE 15: The Town started leasing a trailer in September to haul the backhoe rather than drive it on the roads. Backhoes are not built to drive long distances. The trailer has greatly reduced the wear and tear the backhoe was previously incurred. This appropriation reflects the purchase price after the application of the lease payments to date. The balance due will be fully-funded by the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve.

ARTICLE 16: The Quimby Trustees have generously offered to fund over 70% toward the purchase of a tracked excavator for the Highway Department. This machine will greatly increase the productivity and flexibility of the Town Highway Department, which is faced with a myriad of projects long neglected to include the Transfer Station and Town roads. In addition, it will increase the life of the Highway Department's backhoe by reducing the amount of hours it will be used.

ARTICLE 17: This fully-funded John Deere tractor will help with the maintenance of Town sidewalks and fields by providing the equipment necessary to do this work; reduce the cost of hiring subcontractors; and allow the Selectmen to review and implement the best possible usage of Town employees to accomplish these tasks.

ARTICLE 18: Highway Shed upgrades. In addition to required safety upgrades, the building also needs a coat of paint, electrical, plumbing, heating, lighting, insulation upgrades and roof repairs.

ARTICLE 19: The Transfer Station operating budget reflects a 9.3% increase from 2013. This is due to an increase in our trash removal expenses as experienced in 2013. The Road Agent has also added projected expenses to both facility and equipment (compactor) maintenance, both of which are long overdue.

ARTICLE 20: Portions of the Transfer Station road are in need of a shim and topcoat. The sidewalk between the drop-off area and the compactors also needs resurfacing in order to reduce trip hazards.

ARTICLE 21: This article is by petition from the Sewer Commissioners and covers their operating expenses and deposits to the Capital Reserve, which will be used for the reconstruction of the leachfield and other system components.

ARTICLE 22: This is our annual article allows a few Albany residents living in Wonalancet to use our Transfer Station because of its proximity. Albany is billed each year for their use.

ARTICLE 23: Culture and recreation are important aspects of our Town's identity and expenditures include the Parks and Recreation Department, Old Home Week, 4th of July and Memorial Day celebrations. As always, the Town is grateful to the Alfred Quimby Fund and the Quimby Trustees for their continued support of the Town's Parks and

Recreation program. The Budget Committee and Director have worked hard on reducing some of the operating expenses while still providing great programs and events.

ARTICLE 24: There are three components to this groundskeeping article which keeps our downtown area and building grounds maintained: general groundskeeping, winter sidewalk maintenance, and roadside snow removal to provide downtown parking along Main and Maple Streets. These three components are provided by subcontractors hired by the town. The purchase of the John Deere tractor proposed in Article 17 will, if approved, eliminate much of the expense. The Selectmen ask for approval of this article to maintain service while the transition takes place. All unexpended funds will be returned to the Town's General Fund.

ARTICLE 25: The decision to move the skating rink to Remick Park in North Sandwich has met with popular approval. The turnout at this year's Winter Carnival was particularly busy and fun. The Quimby Trustees have lights available for the skating rink, but we need an electrical upgrade in order to run them.

ARTICLE 26: The Alfred Quimby Fund is once again funding the ongoing repair and maintenance of Quimby Field.

ARTICLE 27: The number 2 and 3 tennis courts at Quimby Field need to be resealed. The Alfred Quimby Fund will fund this repair.

ARTICLE 28: The Alfred Quimby Fund will fund the purchase of a DR Mower and Brush Cutter. The mower will be maintained and stored at the Highway Shed and will be used at Town parks, fire ponds and as needed on Town property.

ARTICLE 29: All private donations towards Parks and Recreation are first placed in the General Fund and reported as part of the Unexpended Fund Balance (or surplus). Now considered 'public' monies, these funds can be transferred to the Parks and Recreation Expendable Trust per RSA 31:19-a for use in new programs.

ARTICLE 30: The town's conservation expenses are typically used to support the administration of the Conservation Commission, assist with the funding of the Five Days of Sandwich (a very successful three-week program during the summer for children ages 7-14), and a contribution to the Green Mountain Conservation Group (GMCG) toward their annual river testing. The Coolidge Conservation Trust assists the Town in funding these endeavors.

ARTICLE 31: Recommended contributions to capital reserves and expendable trusts are down this year in order to help fund the safety audit and the sewer engineering studies. Of course, it is important to plan for the future and recommended deposits are suggested here to the most active funds.

ARTICLE 32: This is a state procedural requirement to direct the dissolution of the Town Hall Capital Reserve and apply it to the outstanding Town Hall bond principal.

ARTICLE 33: The Marjorie Thompson Trust may be used to assist children of Sandwich with the costs of their education. This is an annual article.

ARTICLES 34 - 50: These are petitioned articles requiring the signatures of at least twenty-one registered voters in Sandwich in order to be placed on the Warrant. Brief descriptions are as follows:

Samuel H. Wentworth Library: The Library Trustees once again submitted a petition for their 2013 budget of \$90,760.

Starting Point: A non-profit organization serving victims of domestic and sexual assault in Carroll County. Services include a 24-hour hotline, emergency shelter, court and hospital advocacy, support groups and education. All services are at no charge.

Tri-County Community Action: Community contact program which provides necessary services to Sandwich residents if they are financially unable to do so. They provide fuel and electric bill assistance, emergency shelter, and support several food pantries.

Community Food Bank - St. Andrews: Furnishes food to Sandwich and other neighboring communities as needed every other week. They also provide needy families with both Thanksgiving and Christmas food baskets.

Northern Human Services: This organization provides services to Sandwich residents who are unable to pay the full cost of their mental health care. They also provide a 24-hour emergency service as a public safety function to the community.

Moultonborough/Sandwich Senior Meals: This Sandwich Senior Meals program (Meals on Wheels) is run under Ossipee Concerned Citizens and provides homedelivered meals to area residents as well as hot meals served at the Benz Center and Moultonboro Lions Club.

Winnipesaukee Wellness Center: A health and fitness center providing necessary monitoring, testing, and training for improved health.

Doris L. Benz Community Center: Our local community center that provides a gathering place for private parties, meetings of clubs, social groups, Town government, charitable organizations, exercise, and musical groups, and more.

VNA Hospice of Southern Carroll County and Vicinity, Inc.: Visiting Nurse and Hospice organization which provides home health care to those who are in need.

InterLakes Community Caregivers: Sandwich Caregivers merged with this outreach program, which services residents in Center Harbor, Meredith, Moultonboro, and Sandwich.

Carroll County Transit: This community-based program provides demand response transportation services to residents in Carroll County.

Loon Preservation Committee: A non-profit whose goal is to protect and nurture the loon population.

Friends of Mead Base Conservation Center: A community organization created to preserve the historic and tranquil nature of Mead Base through passive use, stewardship and education.

Sandwich Historical Society: The mission of this non-profit is to collect and preserve the material culture and historical record of the Town of Sandwich, and to provide educational experiences and outreach to the community.

Sandwich Children Center: Since 1985, Sandwich Children's Center has provided a high-quality, affordable early-learning experience for the children of Sandwich and surrounding communities.

Constitutional Amendment: This is a petition asking the Town to support the repeal of Citizens United Supreme Court case through an Amendment to the US Constitution limiting the ability of corporations to make campaign contributions.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,700 for the Sandwich Children's Center which provides early childcare and education services. This article by petition. The Selectmen's vote on recommending passage of this Article is 2 yes and 1 no.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will urge that the New Hampshire State Legislature join nearly 500 municipalities and 16 other states, including all other New England states, in calling upon Congress to move forward a constitutional amendment that guarantees the right of our elected representatives, and of the American people, to safeguard fair elections through authority to regulate federal spending, and clarifies that constitutional rights were established for people, not corporations.

That the New Hampshire Congressional delegation support such a constitutional amendment.

That the New Hampshire State Legislature support such an amendment, once it is approved by Congress and sent to the State for ratification.

The record of the vote approving this article shall be transmitted by written notice to Sandwich's congressional delegation, and to Sandwich's state legislators, and to the President of the United States, informing them of the instructions from their constituents by the Selectmen within 30 days of the vote. This article by petition.

ARTICLE 50. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

2013 TOWN OF SANDWICH MEETING MINUTES

The first session of the 250th Sandwich Town Meeting was held March 12, 2013 in the second floor auditorium at the Sandwich Town Hall. Moderator Lee Quimby called the meeting to order at 10:00 A.M. and announced that there would be no smoking, loitering or politicking in the building. Members of the Town Hall Building Committee came forward to lead the Pledge of Allegiance and Alyssa Floyd, an eleven year old sixth-grader of Sandwich Central School, sang America the Beautiful. The Reverend Dr. Marshall Davis gave the invocation. Mr. Quimby introduced the following: Selectmen, Town Clerk/Tax Collector and Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Supervisors of the Checklist, Ballot Inspectors, Assistant Moderator, Administrative Assistant, Selectmen's Assistant, PA system engineer, and the microphone runners. Mr. Quimby announced general information regarding use of the building and read the Rules of Conduct for the Meeting. FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-603-271-1370 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

The past fire season started in late March with the first reported fire on March 26, 2013. April, which is the traditional start to our spring fire season, started very dry with little measurable precipitation until the middle of the month. Approximately 70% of our reportable fires occurred during the months of April and May. The largest fire was 51 acres on April 29. 81% of our fires occurred on class 3 or 4 fire danger days. By mid-May, extensive rains began which provided us with a very wet summer overall. We had a longer fall fire season due to drier than normal conditions following leaf fall. Fortunately, most of these fires were small and quickly extinguished. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on Class III or higher fire danger days. Our fire towers spotting was supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2013 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. PARKS AND RECREATION

The 2013 Annual Report was prepared to provide a public overview of our department's accomplishments and achievements. We are very proud of our strong participant numbers in adult and youth sport offerings as well as special events and usage of open public spaces, which are well maintained, robustly used, and friendly to residents and guests.

Special thanks to:

- Steve Olafsen for trail grooming, trail building and training our Nordic athletes
- Ash Nydegger for coaching youth soccer and basketball
- Nate Fletcher for tireless work turning a rambling briar-filled property into an excellent disc golf course
- Jon Peaslee and the Highway Department for assisting with the skating rink installation and flooding
- Sandwich Fair Association for making their property available for lots of different events

At the center of Sandwich Parks and Recreation is a strong commitment to youth sports. Tennis, soccer, baseball, basketball, Nordic and alpine skiing, volleyball, skating, and disc golf are all offered with collegiate-level instruction to Sandwich youth and adults. Facilitating activities and events are another important aspect of the department with Winter Carnival, Old Home Week, Halloween, Club Sandwich, Movies in the Park, and several other events are presented for the town to enjoy.

Youth sports grew again this year with the addition of a summer soccer camp as well as a tremendous increase in tennis lesson participation. Head tennis instructor Ryan Chappuis along with volunteers Sophie Coolidge, Rebecca Woodaman, and director Leo Greene were very busy with beginners, teens, and adults of all levels as a concerted effort was made to grow this traditional summer program.

Youth soccer enjoyed a banner year with exceptional performances from both of the competitive teams at the 3/4 and 5/6 level, and a burst of numbers at the introductory level. Coaches Ash Nydegger, Kate Brewer, Major LaRowe, and Leo Greene worked hard to bring a program that we are very proud of with enthusiastic student athletes and raucous crowds lining the field. Sandwich concluded their season by winning the Carroll County Youth Soccer Tournament outscoring opponents 18-1 over five games. The future of this program looks very strong with the current group of youth and a very supportive community.

Adult sports and other public events are a great way to engage the community, and they have been well-attended over the last several years. 2013 included the return, after 30 years, of the Club Sandwich Dinner Theatre Show; Winter Carnival with a new Nordic



POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 2013 was a year of celebration in Sandwich. First, we would like to wish our town a Happy 250th Anniversary! The year was full of fun-filled events, keepsake souvenirs and a lot of community participation and pride. It was a birthday celebration second to none. Second, it was your Police Department's 45th birthday as a full-time Police Department. The Town voted to hire a full-time chief in 1968. Third, the Police Department saw a decrease in almost all crime categories, calls for service and arrests. This last item is not unique to Sandwich as most area departments saw the same decrease.

One of the crime categories that I would like to talk about is burglary. This particular crime has had a heavy burden on the residents of Sandwich over the past several years. Between the years 2010 and 2012, there were 50 burglaries committed in Sandwich. In those years the Police Department was able to successfully prosecute five individuals that had a known connection in 19 of the 50 burglaries committed. In 2012, there were 23 burglaries investigated. In the wake of these burglaries, I announced that we had a group of dedicated volunteers to help us with our House Watch Program. These volunteers did an excellent job this past year. In 2013, the number of burglaries fell from 23 to 5 (an 80% decrease) the lowest we have seen in five years. Other areas that saw decreases were: 22% reduction in crimes against persons; a 38% reduction in theft; a 54% reduction in vandalism; and an 11% decrease overall.

In May, the Police Department changed dispatch centers from the NH State Police to the Carroll County Sheriff's Office. The department had been dispatched by the NH State Police since 1978. The change was not driven by services provided, as the State Police continues to do a wonderful job, but by logistics. NH State Police dispatches on a daily basis from three separate locations - Troop E in Tamworth; Troop F in Twin Mountain; and at State Police Headquarters in Concord. By changing dispatch centers, this provides more consistency of service to our residents. The cost for the switch over was nominal, and the department was actually able to discontinue a phone line. The switch over occurred on May 1 with no interruption in services.

The Police Department also saw a change in personnel within the department. Long-time officer Joe Canfield resigned from the department in August to take a position with the NH Fish and Game Department. Officer Canfield started with the department as a part-time officer in 1998 and has the distinction of being the third officer to attend the full-time police academy for Sandwich. Officer Canfield had a short hiatus from the department from 2001 to 2004 and re-joined the department in 2004 as a part-time officer. We wish him well in his new job and thank him for all of his years of dedicated service to the Town of Sandwich.

In September, the department hired Stephen Rowe as a part-time officer. Steve is a full-time deputy sheriff with the Carroll County Sheriff's Office. Officer Rowe has 17 years of law enforcement experience and is a graduate of the 105th Session of the NH Police Academy.

In maintaining professional standards, Sgt. Varney and I attended training courses in the following areas: DWI Prosecution, NH Highway Safety Conference, Anti-Police Groups and Protests, Leading By Legacy (Management), and Critical Incident Management.


The Police Department once again received additional funding with patrol and enforcement grants through the NH Highway Safety Agency and the US Forest Service. Together these two grants added almost \$7,000.00 in additional funding that allowed for extra patrols during the year. The Police Department will apply for this funding again in 2014.

In addition to our law enforcement duties, we continue to serve the needs of the residents of Sandwich by delivering several community programs: Project Good Morning, Driver Education, DARE, Annual Toy Drive, Bicycle Safety and the Ice Cream Ticket Program, and the House Watch Program.

In closing, I would like to thank the other members of the Town of Sandwich Team: Selectmen's Office, Town Clerk's Office, Fire Department, Highway Department, Parks and Recreation, Library and Transfer Station. We would like to thank our law enforcement partners: Carroll County Sheriff's Office, NH State Police, and the Moultonborough Police Department for the assistance they have provided to us over the past year. Finally, and most importantly, thank you to all the residents and property owners for your continued support.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Highway Department had a busy year and a year of transition as I adjusted to my new position in August. I was initiated over Labor Day weekend when we had a major rainstorm causing multiple washouts throughout Town. Mountain Road was greatly effected and required repair to culverts and further ditching. The crew focused on problem areas during the fall by ditching many of the roads; this will help to ensure adequate drainage in the future and save on material for the roads. Ledge pack has been applied to problem areas such as Dale Road, Mt. Israel Road, Wing Road and other hills. Summer and fall projects included changing culverts and taking inventory on the status of culverts throughout town. We also applied gravel and graded the roads. Our crew assisted the State crew in replacing bridge decking in the Sandwich Notch.

Some changes that have occurred with the department included a new heating system, which greatly improved the efficiency and safety at the highway garage. The Selectmen and I evaluated the heating options available, and propane was the most cost effective. In an effort to avoid excessive travel with the equipment from one side of town to the other, the department has been leasing a trailer to move the equipment.

The Teacup Lake Project, in which the lake was drained to repair the box culvert, was completed in the fall. I would like to thank Bob Rowan and the Chapman Sanctuary/Visny Woods for their support of man-hours to assist with the completion of the project. The Highway Crew worked with the Fire Department to drain and clean fire ponds at Papen's and Teacup Lake and new hydrants were installed. We also assisted the Recreation Department with assembling the skating rink in North Sandwich, and we saw the first skaters enjoy the rink in early December.

In addition, I would like to thank Bob Goddard for his service, and we wish him the best. Thank you to the Board of Selectmen, Town Hall staff, and all other departments for their support. I would also like to thank the staff at the Transfer Station: Marilyn Read, Mike Welch, and John Noble.

TRANSFER STATION

Another year has come and gone. Where did it go in such a short time? This past year we said good-bye to Mr. Colin Weeks, our Road Agent, and hello to Mr. Jon Peaslee, our new Road Agent. Under Mr. Peaslee's direction, we have made a lot of improvements at the Transfer Station. Everything looks so good...almost like coming to work at a park! Mike, John and I are so thankful to Jon for all of his direction and support.

Recycling News: although recycling prices are down, we are still ahead of the game. Through your continued efforts, we are recycling more. We had another great recycling year. One hundred and fifty seven (157) tons were recycled through our Single Stream Recycling Program, and through the town's association with the Northeast Resource Recycling Association (NRRA), we recycled over 17 tons of scrap metal and over 8.8 tons of batteries, electronics, and tires. We also recycled 380 gallons of oil. Through our association with Planet Aid, over 2.9 tons of clothing, shoes and books were recycled. The success of our recycling program depends on you, and I really appreciate everyone doing their part to help. It makes a big difference.

Provided below is a three-year comparison of tonnages and the cost of trash removal for 2013, which includes the per ton cost, transportation/hauling fee and rental fee (two (2) containers). We did not receive any revenue from our recyclables in 2013.

Each year, certified operators must take refresher training to maintain their certification. Mike and John completed an online program for their Level Four and Level One, respectively, certification. I attended a two-day conference sponsored by the NRRA for my refresher training for my Level Four certification. I also attended "Slips, Trips and Falls" and "Behind Snowplows" training provided by Primex, the Town's insurer.

With the assistance of the Highway Crew, we have been hard at work organizing and streamlining our operation. A drain was installed in front of the storage area as there tends to be an accumulation of water and mud in this area. This has improved drainage quite a bit. The compactor had a significant breakdown, which requiring a rebuilt electric motor and hydraulics. With improved operation of the compactor, it is now possible to fill the box to capacity thereby decreasing the

frequency it needs be emptied by Waste Management – a cost savings to the town! Once in a while we will experience a power outage, which means we have to stock pile the trash. Never a dull moment at the Transfer Station!

We have been trying to improve the traffic flow with the use of white lines to designate vehicle and foot traffic areas. Please pay close attention to this as it will help to keep our residents safe! We have also created an area for the Woodshare Program, so it is more accessible.

All are welcome to visit the Swap Shop and to leave or take items; however, please keep in mind that if you leave an item that requires a disposal charge, you will still incur a charge. The Swap Shop is not intended for free disposal. Thank you!

I would like extend my appreciation to my crew - Mike Welch and John Noble, the Highway Department, the Board of Selectmen and the Selectmen's Office Staff for all of their help and support this year. A big thank you to all of our patrons, and your commitment to keeping Sandwich beautiful!

CEMETERY TRUSTEES

The Town of Sandwich has three cemeteries for residents and property owners to purchase burial lots: Elm Hill Cemetery, Grove Cemetery and North Sandwich Cemetery. Activity in these cemeteries are managed by the Sandwich Cemetery Trustees elected by the voters of Sandwich. The Rural Cemetery, Vittum Hill Cemetery and Little Pond Cemetery are private burial grounds and are managed by individual Boards of Trustees. Whiteface and Mason cemeteries have space issues, and Taylor Cemetery is managed by the families within: Hall, Smith and Vittum.

Sandwich has approximately 65 old family burial grounds, which are not available for burials. In fact, interference within the walls of these burial grounds are a violation of state law. A landowner who has one of these old burial grounds on his property does not "own" an old cemetery. By law, only a direct lineal descendant can make decisions for activity within the walls of an old family burial ground. When an individual presents themselves to the town as a direct lineal descendant of people buried in an old burial ground, a process allows for the land owner to grant access through their property so the descendant can visit their ancestors. State law allows burials on private property with certain rules mandated. Please inquire with a cemetery trustee. Every burial must be reported to the Town Clerk, who maintains a record of all burials in town.

Volunteers are always appreciated. Clean-up of an old cemetery is appreciated; however, the trustees must know who is doing what. A report of the work done for our records is always appreciated as well. Please inquire with a cemetery trustee if interested. There are certain individuals who have "adopted" a cemetery in their neighborhood. Ours is a long-time trusted relationship and very much appreciated, and we would like to recognize and thank: Kip Downs, Don Casey and Peter Van Winkle.

Once again the legacy of Art George lives on by the considerate work of protégé Carl Nydegger. This year Carl has repaired many gravestones in several of the cemeteries in a proper manner. Carl is a big asset to the cemetery trustees and his work and support is much appreciated. We are also grateful to Jeffrey Brown for the maintenance of Mason Cemetery; Jere Burrows for maintenance of the Town's cemeteries, and Tom Canfield for helping in the George Cemetery.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Fifty years ago the NH Legislature passed the enabling legislation for conservation commissions, RSA-36:A. Nine years later Sandwich established its conservation commission at the 1972 Town Meeting..."for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources..." Today the Sandwich Conservation Commission advises the Board of Selectmen on conservation issues, provides stewardship of Town-held conservation lands, reviews wetland concerns, oversees and maintains the Bearcamp River Trail and Red Hill Pond Trail, and supports the Five Days of Sandwich summer camp.

In the 1970's, the early Sandwich Conservation Commission coordinated town efforts to "Save the Notch" that included purchase of nearly 180 acres along the Notch Road. This past year the commission recommended that the Selectmen accept a gift to the town of a 107-acre parcel (R1-35) of conservation land in East Sandwich, abutting Route 25, from Club Motorsports, Inc. (CMI). This recommendation followed extensive study, consultation with NH Department of Environmental Services (DES), and public input. To compensate for CMI impacts on wetlands in Tamworth, the DES required that CMI either pay a fine or find an organization or town to accept this CMI-owned parcel as conservation land. The Selectmen accepted the gift of land to the Town, with CMI paying all transaction costs. The Conservation Commission will work with the Selectmen and other town committees in the coming year on a plan to manage this newly acquired conservation land.

In September, the commission sponsored a morning workshop on conservation easements and their monitoring at Mead Eighteen people, including two Base. attended Selectmen, this workshop presented by two experts in conservation land stewardship: David Mallard, Land and Stewardship Director of the Lakes Region Conservation Trust and Joan Turley, Land Stewardship Coordinator of the Squam Lakes Conservation Society.

In late fall, commission members, with other volunteers, carried out the annual stewardship monitoring of Town-held conservation easements that include over



2,000 acres and involves 19 separate landowners. Monitoring of each easement includes contacting the landowner, walking the land, checking boundaries, and evaluating compliance with the conservation easement deeds as well as noting any unusual flora or fauna.

As an additional responsibility, the Conservation Commission reviews all applications for DES dredge and fill permits for work in Sandwich wetlands, including visits to the

proposed work site. Thanks to the care that Sandwich residents give to their land, the commission seldom needs to exercise its duty to inform DES of potential adverse impacts of a project on wetland resources. This past year, however, the commission, after careful study and consultation with wetlands experts, did send comments to DES with recommendations to withhold one permit until its concerns were addressed.

Commission member Helen Gingras, with the help of volunteers Gerry Gingras and Mark Longley, maintained and cleared blow downs on the portions of the Bearcamp Trail open to the public. She led two hikes along portions of the trail during Old Home Week.

Dan Reidy once again directed the popular summer day camp, Five Days of Sandwich, for Sandwich children. Angela Morton quickly stepped in to assist Dan throughout the summer after long-time assistant director Louisa Bryant was injured on the first day of the program. Two week-long sessions, each including a dozen 7-10 year olds, were held to introduce them to the natural wonders of Sandwich and conservation stewardship; a third session was held for 10-14 year olds. An AMC "Leave No Trace" workshop was included in the session for older campers. Camper fees (\$40 per child) covered a portion of the cost of this conservation program with monies from the Coolidge Trust funding the remainder.


HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

2013 was a quiet year for the Historic District Commission (HDC). We had very few applications, so we did not have many meetings. Applications included the following issues: (1) reconstruction of a sign and (1) construction of a carriage shed. Additionally, the HDC conducted several pre-application consultations during which recognized applicants generally discussed various proposals prior to filing formal applications.

The Sandwich Historic District Commission meets the third Tuesday of the month to review applications of property owners for changes to the exterior of their house or changes in their landscape. Applications for approval and the Historic District guidelines are found at Town Hall and on the town's website.

A common misconception of the Historic District is that the guidelines "tell people what they can do" with their property. Text from *A Guide to National Register Historic Districts in the Lakes Region*, Lakes Region Planning Commission, 1988: "The National Register of Historic Places" is a program which is administered by the National Park Service in conjunction with state historic preservation agencies, including the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources. It is part of a national policy to coordinate and support public and private efforts to identify, evaluate and protect our cultural resources. The National Register is the official list of buildings, structures, sites, districts and objects that are significant in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering and culture which are worthy of preservation."

"Center Sandwich is a remarkably cohesive village of mostly wooden, clapboarded structures in the vernacular, Federal and Greek Revival styles, enlivened by a few good examples of late 19th and 20th early century architecture. Only a few other early villages in the Lakes Region are comparable quality and integrity. And all of these



rivals are smaller villages with fewer significant buildings. As one architectural historian has recently written, 'Center Sandwich has long been regarded as one of the most aesthetically pleasant, historically noteworthy and architecturally significant rural villages in northern New England.'" I frequently meet smiling visitors in the village who excitedly declare, "You don't see this anywhere else!" I hope we can keep it!

NOTICE

If you own real estate lots that were involuntarily merged by municipal action, you may be able to have those lots restored to their pre-merger status.

Your property may qualify if two or more lots were merged for zoning, assessing, or taxation purposes and the merger occurred:

- During your ownership, without your consent; or
- Prior to your ownership, if no previous owner consented to the merger.

To restore your property to pre-merger status, you must:

- Make a request to the local governing body
- No later than December 31, 2016.

Once restored:

• Your properties will once again become separate lots; however, they must still conform to applicable land use ordinances. Restoration does not cure non-conformity.

This notice must be:

- Posted continuously in a public place from January 1, 2012 until December 31, 2016, and
- Published in the 2011 through 2015 Annual Report.

Read the full statute at RSA 674:39-aa Restoration of Involuntarily Merged Lots.

PLANNING BOARD

2013 was another relatively quiet year for the Board. We considered applications for one (1) Subdivision, three (3) Scenic Road tree-cutting proposals, three (3) Site Plan Reviews, two (2) Home Occupations permits, and one (1) Excavation permit. Considerable deliberation was given to the Performance Surety requirements for the 17-lot Berkowitz subdivision.

As in the previous year, we were able to engage in some actual "planning" work. We continued to focus on the concept of creating a "village district" within our Zoning Ordinance. I will "recycle" a portion of our 2012 report because it continues to reflect the Board's intent on this topic.

"The purpose of such a district would be to allow for properties within the village to have zoning restrictions that could differ from properties in the Rural/Residential district. At present the Zoning Ordinance does not differentiate between property in the village and property elsewhere in town. It is a bit of a "one size fits all" approach, and it has been noted that most of the properties in the village do not conform to one or more requirements of the Zoning Ordinance. We could not, at present, construct a village in Sandwich that would in any way resemble the existing Center! This seems a bit odd, given that much of what many of us love about Sandwich is found in our village. There is a feeling among many that the Center lacks vitality and that its viability as a social and economic locus is slowly diminishing. This has been reflected in the recent reports of both the Master Plan Committee and the Smart Growth study. Both documents recommended that the Town create such a village district as a means to encourage activity in the Center that will enable it to remain as the true and effective "center" of our Sandwich. The Planning Board has chosen this issue as the first priority for our planning efforts. The Board is aware that this idea was previously considered and rejected; nonetheless, we feel that circumstances and 'the times" have changed, and it is an idea that is worthy of careful study."

Through our focus on the Village, we have identified a high-priority need to create a comprehensive plan to address public parking in the "downtown" area. This is an issue that the Select Board is also addressing. We have solicited the cooperation and assistance of the Alfred Quimby Fund Trustees, the Sandwich Fair Association, and the Federated Church of Sandwich to work with the Town to identify additional public parking areas and to create a plan to guide their development. We believe this effort could allow for enhanced social and economic activity in the Village while minimizing additional traffic "woes". Much can be done to improve our "parkability" without unduly compromising public safety and convenience. Our intent with these deliberations concerning the Center is to do our "planning" homework to identify and understand the issues both in the broad perspective, and in a "nuts & bolts" view. We will also solicit input from

all interested persons and facilitate a broad community discussion as the process moves forward.

The Capital Improvement Program (CIP) subcommittee again undertook the work of projecting long-term capital expenditures for the town. Toby Eaton led this effort, assisted by Mike Babcock, Kent Mitchell, Elaine Peaslee, and Bryan Peaslee. The result of the annual process is a report that is useful for the Select Board, Budget Committee, and citizenry in tracking the items and projects that will have large budget impacts out as far as 25+ years. It is an aid in efforts to manage the budget in an orderly and predictable manner and helps in the effort to keep tax rates consistent. We appreciate the work of the CIP subcommittee. Considerable effort was invested in 2013 to make the report more comprehensive and consistent. It should be noted that the team is not limited to Planning Board members. Anyone with an interest in the long view of town infrastructure should contact the Selectmen's Office. You will be welcomed to the effort.

On the ballot this year you will find four proposed Zoning Ordinance amendments for your consideration. Numbers one, three and four involve mostly "housekeeping" to clarify confusing parts of the ordinance and/or to achieve consistency with New Hampshire State statutes. Number two creates a distinction between Home Occupations and Home-based Businesses, and clarifies the criteria for approval of each. Full explanations of each are available at Town Hall. The Board would appreciate your vote for approval as we spend good effort to ensure this document is an accurate reflection of the Town's Master Plan. The Board also considered and approved several changes to the Town's Subdivision and Site Plan Review Regulations. Most of them are reflective of the prospective changes to the Zoning Ordinance.

I continue to believe that the citizen's of Sandwich should be humbled by the lengthy and diligent efforts of those who step up to serve on town boards and committees. Citizen government would be just a "pie in the sky" dream were it not for their work. When I witness the dysfunction in DC, I am reminded of our great fortune to live in this beautiful place, where anyone can receive an honest hearing and careful consideration from their peers on any board or committee. Your views matter and you can make a real difference - especially if you will give of your time to take part in this self-government experiment. If you have not tried it yet, you will be especially welcomed.

To all members who have served in the Planning Board's efforts this last year – thank you. To Wendy Huff who has brought competence and hard work to the position of Planning Board Secretary – and who keeps us on the rails – thank you. To Cathy and Jennifer – thank you again for your work and support.



SAMUEL H. WENTWORTH LIBRARY

During 2013, the Library supported an increase in both circulation and program activity in response to community demand. We expanded the collections in a wide range of media and continued to provide six days a week of open hours. Circulation increased with 24,576 separate materials checked out. This is 1718 items more than the previous year. Thank you patrons!

Collections: The total collection is approximately 18,000 items, a number we maintain for display and space reasons. The staff regularly reviews and edits the collection to ensure our items are relevant to the community's needs and interests and to make room for new purchases, often requested by patrons. In addition to the books (classics, fiction and non-fiction, young adult and children), we maintain an extensive collection of over 2,937 DVDs. This was our first year to include Blu-Ray technology. Our library has been identified as having the region's best collection of BBC DVDs. We are also part of the Carroll County Library Coop, which provides an additional 1,128 rotating items. Audiobooks are available on CD, MP3 and "playaway" formats, and we offer complete audio packages including ear buds and micro players for patrons to borrow. We have continued our membership with the New Hampshire Downloadable Book Consortium, whose collection has increased to more than 23,528 eBook and audiobook titles available for checkout to a patron's own computer or other device. Our patrons have checked out 854 items. Patrons are encouraged to access this service online: http://nh.lib.overdrive.com.

<u>Human Resources</u>: The operating staff for 2013 was led by Glynis Miner (Director) with support from Anne Papen and Katie Wonders (Library Assistants); Lois Brady (Youth Services Librarian) and Frederick Bickford; and Pages, Rowan Heard, Maddi Brackett, Skylar Allen, and Zoe Frentress. Former Page Tess Vierus helped fill in during the busy summer. Further support came from Frank Rowell (Maintenance), and Kathy Catalano (Housekeeping). The talent and energy of this group bring the Library to life.

The Library is also fortunate to have had a cadre of committed volunteers offering over 350 hours in various capacities this past year, including: Connie Cunningham, Mary Cullen, Robyn Tolles, Angie Morton, Cecelia Cox, Robin Dustin, and Nancy Stearns. Many of these volunteers have given their valuable unpaid time to the Library for years, and all of them deserve the Town's thanks.

The Town-elected trustees include: John Enright (Chair), Jeanne Ryer (Vice Chair), Wendy Huff (Treasurer), Nancy Stearns (Recording Secretary) and Carla Muskat; alternate trustees are Betty Alcock, Linda Marshall, and Carol Clark. The Board of Trustees, the governing body of the library, meets monthly and provides strategic guidance, financial oversight of operations, and planning for capital improvements, as well as ensuring compliance with State laws and regulations related to library operations.

<u>Building</u>: Long recognizing the need for improved lighting and staff workspace as well as patron convenience, the Library trustees retained architect Peter Wobber to design a new circulation desk area. Peter met frequently with staff and trustees, presenting a sequence of drawings, inviting discussion, and reaching agreement on the final plan. After approval by the Board, the library invited Request for Proposals from nine local contractors of whom three submitted applications. Trustees reviewed these applications carefully and unanimously selected BEAM Construction Associates, Inc. to conduct the work. BEAM, after further review and discussion,

made practical suggestions that resulted in additional cost-savings. Lighting designer, Derek Marshall from Sandwich, offered to create and construct the lighting fixtures to hang over the new circulation desk at no cost to the library. The Trustees approved the design of the fixtures and chose the color. The Trustee extend their enormous gratitude to Derek for his generosity and talent.

<u>Finances</u>: The basic library operations are funded through three major sources of income: town taxes, the Wentworth Trust and six common funds, and private donations. Outside sources of income are sought for projects and purchases above and beyond normal operating expenses so as not to further impact town taxes. The library fund balance has been drawn down over the last three years to help offset expenses, leaving a balance equal to one month of operating expenses for emergency use. Overall operational expenses remain relatively stable with minor annual increases for salaries, benefits, and utilities.

SESTERCENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

What an incredible year it was! The 250th Anniversary Committee began its work in the fall of 2011 and many hours were dedicated to the planning of this year-long commemoration honoring our wonderful town and its rich history. With the help of many organizations, groups and individuals, our anniversary was nothing short of fantastic!

Partnering with the Sandwich Historical Society, we kicked off the celebration on January 1, 2013 in the newly renovated Town Hall. Emcess Lee Quimby and Geoff Burrows led a wonderful program filled with shared memories and experiences of Sandwich's past, poetry reading, costume contest, unveiling of the Bicentennial Time Capsule, photo displays, home movies, and refreshments. It was standing room only and was the perfect way to begin the anniversary! The evening concluded with a stunning fireworks display and the ringing of church bells.

The kick-off celebration was followed with the return of "Club Sandwich" (sponsored by the Sandwich Players); a Bean Supper (sponsored by the Sandwich Historical Society); May Baskets; Memorial Day Remembrance Program and Veteran's Breakfast; a variety of theater productions, Sandwich Fire/Rescue BBQ (sponsored by the Sandwich/Fire Rescue and Sandwich Sirens); Native American Pow-wow - a five day event; Antique Tractor Pull; Cruise Night; 250 Years of Sandwich Musical Festival; Antique Appraisals Day; Sandwich Photo Exhibit - a four day event; Old-Fashioned Ball Game; Old Home Week events: Penny Sale, Scavenger Hunt, Community BBQ and Birthday Celebration, Rural Cemetery Walk and Talk, and a Forgotten Arts Day; "Sandwich - The Beginning" - an Historical Charter Vignette and a Period Lunch, which included a wonderful selection of period foods created by Don Brown and The Corner House Inn. Don provided a very informative explanation of his food research and selections; and our grand finale - "A Sandwich Time Capsule of Memories". Our grand finale included skits, contents of the 2063 (Tricentennial Celebration) time capsule, oral history program, jazz music, refreshments and concluded with a spectacular fireworks display and church bells. The perfect ending to a wonderful anniversary.

To help defray the cost, the committee held several fundraising events as well as designed and sold commemorative memorabilia to raise money for all of the planned events. We kicked off our first fundraising event in August 2012 with our "Breakfast on the Fairgrounds". Our commemorative items included: commemorative calendar, commemorative license plate, decal of the 250th logo, commemorative coin (limited-edition), commemorative book, commemorative postal cancellation stamp, and adults and kids t-shirts (long and short sleeve). The fine print...

- 1. The historical marker, which will honor Daniel Beede and the Wentworth Family, will be dedicated in 2014.
- 2. Tricentennial (2063) Time Capsule (vessel) will be completed in 2014. Van Adriance, Gale Christensen, and Robin Dustin have been hard at work putting on the finishing details. It will be on display at the Samuel H. Wentworth Library and at Town Meeting before it is "buried" in the Town's vault for the next 50 years!

SEWER COMMISSION

There were no new users added to the system in 2013. In 2013, residential use was 62% of the total usage; restaurant use was 16%; school use was 8%; government use was 3%, and other non-residential use was 10%. Measured wastewater discharge was 2,109,431 gallons in 2013 and was up 8% relative to 2012. Infiltration in 2013 was 15% less than 2102. Overall, the system operated at 55% of the permitted capacity in 2013. The proposed 2014 operating budget is \$25,000, an increase of \$1,000 from 2013.

The infiltration/inflow trend has continued downward since 2008 when infiltration peaked and an infiltration/inflow assessment was initiated. The 2013 infiltration/inflow rate was down 15% from 2012 at 3229 gpd. Repairs made to the Bean Road Pumping Station dosing tank in August of 2011 appear to have mitigated a significant source of infiltration.

The Board of Sewer Commissioners currently operate the system under a New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) Permit by Rule. Under this permit, the Commission is required to manage the total flow into the system at less than 500,000 gallons per month (16,438 gallons per day). Total flow includes both wastewater flow and infiltration flow. Infiltration is an unavoidable component of the flow in sanitary sewer systems, and the current long-term average infiltration is consistent with the Facility Plan specifications. Reducing infiltration does not provide for an increase in capacity above the system design. No reserve capacity was designed into the system.

The Sewer Commission recommended at the 2013 Town Meeting that if the Town is concerned about the sewer capacity, then the Town is responsible for conducting a study that evaluates expansion possibilities beyond the current system. The Commission also clearly stated that any costs to expand the capacity of the sewer system beyond its existing design capacity will be the responsibility of the taxpayers of the Town and not the current system users. The Sewer Commission continues to work with the Board of Selectmen and Tighe & Bond, an engineering firm contracted by the Town, to assess the needs and plans for expansion.

The Sewer Commission has the following policy: "The capacity for a given lot that was assigned by the NHDES in 1984 to determine the overall sewer system capacity, and is the maximum available capacity for that lot today." This is to make sure there is reasonable future capacity for all of the properties, no matter how they are currently being used.

All users are reminded that sump pump hook-ups to the system are illegal. If your sump pump is connected to the sewer, then it must be properly redirected immediately, permanently. We will continue to work with the sewer users in 2014 to get usage meters and recorders working properly. Properly operating meters are the responsibility of the

users. Non-working meters need to be replaced in a timely fashion. Replacement of meters/recorders and all repair costs are the responsibility of the user.

The system is over twenty-five years old, and all users need to be careful about what ends up in the system. We are continuing to see substantial fats, oils and greases. Residential users must be careful as to what they put down the drain. If you have a grease trap, please check frequently, and have your traps cleaned before they are ineffective. Remember, businesses with grease traps are required to provide documentation to the Commission when the traps are cleaned.

Please be careful about what you discharge to the sewer system, and as always, be cautious and choose soaps and cleaning products, which are have no or are low in phosphates. In addition, no petroleum or hazardous substances are to be discharged to the sewer system. Please check your labels and dispose of these substances responsibly.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Sandwich Zoning Board of Adjustment meets on an as-needed basis the second Thursday of the month at 7:00 P.M. in the Town Hall.

The purpose of the Zoning Board is as follows:

- To hear appeals for relief from the provisions of the Town's Zoning Ordinance through the Variance process;
- To hear Appeals of Administrative Decisions from actions taken by Town Administrative Officials in interpreting the Zoning Ordinance;
- To hear applications for Special Exceptions;
- To hear requests for Equitable Appeals of Dimensional Requirements;
- and in the course of business, as necessary, to hear requests for rehearing.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment is a volunteer board appointed by the Board of Selectmen and is composed of five (5) regular members as well as three (3) alternates. Discussions are always deliberate, well thought out and often quite lively. The Zoning Board Appeal process often involves parties who are of differing opinions and in adversarial positions to each other and/or the Town, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank our volunteer Board members for taking their job seriously, treating applicants and abutters respectfully, and coming to meetings well-prepared. Townspeople are always welcome to attend meetings, and those interested in serving on this or other Boards should inquire with the Selectmen.

The Zoning Board met seven (7) times in 2013 and heard four (4) applications. Four (4) Variances were granted: one for relief from principal structure sideline setback requirements [Sandwich Zoning Ordinance Section 150-13C(2)], two for relief from accessory structure sideline setback requirements [Section 150-13(D2)], and one for relief from wetland setbacks for construction of a septic system [Section 150-13A(1)]. Two (2) requests for rehearing were considered; one was granted and subsequently conducted, the other denied.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment extends its thanks and appreciation to the Town's staff: Cathy Graham and Jennifer Wright for assisting Sandwich residents through the application process and attending to the administrative requirements of our Board and to Wendy Huff for taking our often long-winded discussions and transforming them into a coherent written record.

General guidelines for applying to the Quimby Trust for financial support are as follows:

- 1. All proposals for financial assistance must show consideration "for the well-being of the Town of Sandwich, its inhabitants and institutions." A request must include the IRS 501 C (3) number or employer ID #. All requests must be in writing and accompanied by the most recent balance sheet and profit and loss statement.
- 2. The deadline for filing a request is prior to the last day of the quarter, that is to say the last day of September, December, March, June.

- 3. Requests will be processed during the first two weeks of the following month. A request for further information, a denial or an award letter will be issued prior to the 15th of the month.
- 4. The schedule of disbursement of funds will be at the discretion of the Trustees.
- 5. A written report showing the completion of the project goals and the expenditure of funds is requested within 60 days of the conclusion of the project.
- 6. Proposals remain the property of the Trustees.

SANDWICH HISTORICAL SOCIETY

"Busy" is a word which falls short of any term that can be applied to 2013. We knew we wanted to "go big" this year, and with the 250th and a range of events coordinated through the Town's 250th Anniversary Committee, it was important that our programming for the year be both supportive and complementary to the work of that group, helping this celebratory year be the best it could be. However, the spectrum of what we have achieved as a community institution has exceeded my greatest expectations and hopes!



As the year unfolded, we hosted a series of Living History Workshops to kick things off in the spring, with a bean supper, photographic digitization workshop, and Opening Day activities which encouraged townsfolk to contribute their stories, family histories, and smiling faces to our seasonal exhibit, "People, Places, and Spaces: 250 Years of Sandwich." As a centerpiece of this exhibit, we were able to produce the ongoing project "Sandwich

Works" by Susan Lirakis and Becky Sinkler, a photographic and biographical study of "Sandwichites" who have managed the task of both living and working in town. Coupled with both of these elements, we were also able to display the fantastic work of Justin Chapman's 4th and 5th grade class from Sandwich Central School, who partnered with us in the biennial Joanne Cook Burt Challenge to research local historical figures and their crafts and trades.

As the summer progressed, we once again restarted the Junior Historians program with the inspiration of Marek Bennett, an Arts Alliance of Northern New Hampshire Artist in Residence. With Marek's guidance, our small group of budding cartoonists and storytellers delved into the Weed family letters to recreate, in visual stories, the letters of Larkin Weed, Phebe Weed, and Caroline McGaffey. They then also researched their own interests, among them Niobe and Native Americans, and produced a comic book which was distributed at our Annual Excursion Picnic. With less than two weeks to spare after this fun week, we held our Annual Excursion Picnic to a crowd of more than 100, with a prelude the day before featuring the "Forgotten Arts", an enjoyable field day that featured demonstrations of spinning, weaving, sewing, antique tool use and identification, post and beam work, and granite splitting as part of the 250th Anniversary celebration.

In addition to this spread of events, we also supported or co-hosted a number of 250th Anniversary events with informational research, logistical support, and in some cases direct participation. These included: Time Capsule Opening, Antiques Appraisal Day, Joan Cook's Photographic Journey, Town Charter Vignette ("Sandwich – The Beginning"), and the final event, a "Sandwich Time Capsule of Memories". The enthusiasm of the year was mirrored in attendance, which at Society-hosted events and at our museums, was the highest in the past decade--approximately 2,000--and this does not include tallies from the supported or co-hosted 250th events just listed!

Thanks to everyone who has contributed to this great institution and its work over the past year, be they staff, trustees, volunteers, or participants! The year's barely over, and we're already pulling together some great ideas for the new one. We hope you'll continue to be a part of them!


