## Neighborhood Watch Letter Police Reports by Geographical Area:

### North Area (north of Lake Street)

Sanchez, Darian D. of Addison was charged with domestic battery/obstructing a peace officer. Sanchez grabbed the victim by the arm and struck the victim in the face with an open hand. Sanchez was transported to the DuPage County Jail.

La Caze, Anthony L. of Addison was charged with domestic battery. La Caze grabbed the victim and dragged her up the steps and into the apartment injuring her leg. He later returned to apartment, pushed his way inside, grabbed victim by her hair and threw her to the floor, then wrapped both of his hands around her neck and choked her. La Caze was transported to the DuPage County Jail

### East Area (east of Addison Road)

Campuzano, Carlos of Addison was arrested for an arrest warrant. Campuzano had an original warrant out of the Addison Police Department for mob action. Campuzano was released on bond.

Lopez, Sergio of Franklin Park was charged with as an armed habitual criminal/felony possession or use weapon or firearm/possession of a firearm by street gang member-on land/aggravated battery-great bodily harm.

Lopez was transported to the DuPage County Jail.

Ramirez, Christopher of Melrose Park was charged with possession of a weapon by a felon/possession of a firearm by a gang member. Ramirez was transported to the DuPage County Jail.

Sadlocha, Rafal of Addison was charged with domestic battery. Sandlocha pushed the victim numerous times, forcefully grabbed the victim by the wrist and kicked the victim in the back. Sadlocha was transported to the DuPage County Jail.

Lopez, Keith A. of North Chicago was charged with aggravated DUI/operating an uninsured motor vehicle/speeding/improper lighting. Lopez was stopped for improper lighting and speeding. Upon further investigation Lopez was charged with DUI and operating an uninsured motor vehicle. Lopez was transported to the DuPage County Jail.

Thurmond, James D. of Naperville was charged with DUI/consumption of alcohol by a person under the age of 21/no valid driver's license/failure to report an accident to a police authority by driver/failure to provide aid and or information/failure to reduce speed to avoid an accident/operating uninsured motor vehicle/operating a motor vehicle while using an electronic communication device/disobeying traffic control signal/transportation of open alcohol by driver/obstructing a peace officer. Thurmond was released on an I-bond.

Ramirez-Avalos, Laura Y. of Villa Park was charged with consumption of alcohol by any person under the age of 21/obstructing a peace officer. Ramirez-Avalos was released on an I-bond.

# Learn How to Avoid Heat-Related Illnesses and Death

The human body is normally able to regulate its temperature through sweating until it is exposed to more heat than it can handle. Heat exhaustion and heat stroke can escalate rapidly, leading to delirium, organ damage and even death.

## Heat Exhaustion

When the body loses excessive water and salt, usually due to sweating, heat exhaustion can occur. According to the free NSC First Aid Quick Reference app, signs and symptoms include:

**Sweating.**

**Pale, ashen or moist skin.**

**Muscle cramps (especially for those working or exercising outdoors in high temperatures).**

**Fatigue, weakness or exhaustion.**

**Headache, dizziness or fainting.**

**Nausea or vomiting.**

**Rapid heart rate.**

**Uncontrolled heat exhaustion can evolve into heat stroke, so make sure to treat victims quickly.**

**Move victims to a shaded or air-conditioned area.**

**Give water or other cool, nonalcoholic beverages.**

**Apply wet towels, or have victims take a cool shower.**

## Heat Stroke

**Seek medical help immediately if someone is suffering from heat stroke. Signs include:**

**Body temperature above 103 degrees.**

**Skin that is flushed, dry and hot to the touch; sweating has usually stopped.**

**Rapid breathing.**

**Headache, dizziness, confusion or other signs of altered mental status.**

**Irrational or belligerent behavior.**

**Convulsions or unresponsiveness.**

**Immediately take action.**

**Call 911.**

**Move the victim to a cool place.**

**Remove unnecessary clothing.**

**Immediately cool the victim, preferably by immersing up to the neck in cold water (with the help of a second rescuer).**

**If immersion in cold water is not possible, place the victim in a cold shower or move to a cool area and cover as much of the body as possible with cold, wet towels.**

**Keep cooling until body temperature drops to 101 degrees.**
