CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The regular meeting of the Beulah City Council was called to order at 7:00 pm by Mayor Travis Frey with Council Members Kelsey Timmer, Clyde Schulz, David Ripplinger, David Czywczynski, Gary Miller, Eric Hoffer, Kathy Kelsch, and Loren Daede present.

Kelsch moved to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last regular meeting on September 16 and approve as furnished to the Council by email. Miller seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor.

PUBLIC INPUT

Jesse Hermanson

Local permit for a calendar raffle for Knife River Pheasants Forever at Fanatic's Sports Bar and Grill from January 1, 2020 to December 7, 2020 on the first Monday of each month. Schulz moved to approve the permit as presented. Hoffer seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor.

Mike Manstrom

Dougherty & Company presented the resolution for financing for the Storm Sewer Districts #2 and #3. The not to exceed number for the bond is \$750,000 on the resolution, but it should come in around \$720,000. Timmer moved to approve the Resolution authorizing the issuance of \$750,000 Refunding Improvement Bonds, Series 2019. Schulz seconded. The term is a fifteen-year maturity with a five-year call feature, meaning the bonds could be paid off in 2025 if funds are available. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor. Timmer moved to approve the Resolution creating the funds of improvement districts, providing for and appropriating special assessments, and authorizing the issuance of improvement warrants. Daede seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor. These bonds are available for local banks to purchase.

Granville Brinkman

Home Rule Charter update on notices in the paper and the public meetings on October 8 and 21 at 6:00 pm was noted. The election officials and canvassing board for the special election were presented.

Schulz moved to approve the canvassing board and special election officials. Daede seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor.

COUNCIL PORTFOLIOS

Council Member Timmer

The Assessment Committee has one more meeting. Solem Law stated the properties will be assessed next year. A notice will go into the paper with the legal description. The Assessment Board will have a public hearing for those who would like to discuss the amount assessed. An updated list is then filed with the City Auditor and a notice goes in the paper that you can view the list at City Hall. A notice would be published regarding the City Council public hearing and the list would then be approved. Residents will then have ten days to pay off specials without interest accrual. Otherwise, it will show up on tax statements in December of 2020. The projects are dependent on the weather.

Council Member Hoffer

The committee assigned to address the property of 408 West Main Street presented its recommendation. It was discussed that the city notified the past owner and the auctioneering service that sold the property of the property's water issues. The committee decided the city was not responsible for the new buyer having the information. Based on precedence in the interest of fairness and consistency, since there have been similar issues in the past, the recommendation is the city does not pay for the water repair. Hoffer moved to issue a letter to the homeowner stating the property presented should be corrected by the end of the month or the city will take action to get it corrected and bill it to the homeowner. Miller seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor.

Council Member Kelsch

Information and estimates will be gathered on the Civic Center kitchen.

Council Member Czywczynski

Czywczynski moved to accept Change Order #1 for Wagner Construction on STS District #2. Daede seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor. A second upcoming change order was discussed.

There is one gate valve left to be replaced this fall.

Frey opened the regular meeting. Schulz moved to deny the request of PACE and directed the City Attorney to draft a letter in response. Daede seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor.

CITY PERSONNEL

Economic Development Director

The Home Rule Committee had the first public hearing. The Lignite Council was in Beulah interviewing for a documentary to educate politicians and schools on how coal benefits our country. The Liebelt building could possibly be converted into a library/community building. Timmer moved to direct Brinkman to pursue the Liebelt building for a library. Schulz seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor. Small business plans and financing options are being looked into for some businesses in Beulah.

City Coordinator

The Sun Valley storm shelter was approved and a letter will be coming from FEMA. The storm water project is going well. The gate valve project is going well, but they are finding many valves that need to be replaced. MDU is moving a transformer this week. Keller Drive repairs are planned for Thursday if weather permits. The culvert on 9th Avenue that was replaced has been run over by a vehicle. A curb will need to be put in.

Police Chief

Ordinance #402 was put in place due to calls for false alarms on security systems. The ordinance was publicized at the time and that took care of the problem. Midco has contacted the city regarding the permit listed in the ordinance. Now that we have a new company, the permit process should be started. The request is to waive the permit fee listed in the ordinance for the first year. The company is not required to complete the permit; it is the homeowner's responsibility.

City Auditor

Hoffer moved to approve the presented assessments be added to property taxes for unpaid water and mowing invoices. Ripplinger seconded. Roll call vote found Timmer, Schulz, Ripplinger, Czywczynski, Miller, Hoffer, Kelsch and Daede in favor.
