Once the low air activates, firefighters move to a rest area where they remain until their bottle is completely empty. The purpose of this training to give members a realistic look into how much time they actually have to work in a hazardous environment.

The Governor's Traffic Safety Advisory Commission (GTSAC) is presenting the Big Rapids Department of Public Safety with a 2018 Outstanding Traffic Safety Achievement Award for traffic changes made at Brookside and Riverview Elementary schools.

Big Rapids DPS Director, Jim Eddinger, said "The award will be presented during a special program on March 20".

Representing various state departments and offices, local and state law enforcement and county road commissions, GTSAC honors individuals and groups each year for their special involvement and dedication to traffic safety, according to the letter Eddinger received from the commission.

Nominated for the award, by Ferris State University Department of Public Safety, Director Bruce Borkovich, Eddinger said, "The traffic changes implemented at the two schools prior to the start of academic year helped reduce the risk of children and adults being hurt by traffic in front of the buildings".

The Public Works Department has multiple projects scheduled for 2019, including:

- a \$2 million grant funded project for Ives Avenue and South Street, which will include watermain replacement and street reconstruction;
- beginning the \$1 million Stormwater, Asset Management and Wastewater (SAW) grant;
- installation of the National Fitness Campaign-Fitness Court near River Street Park, which was obtained after Rotary, Spectrum Health and the City were successful in fundraising \$90,000;
- the annual sidewalk program, which has doubled funding this year, will involve new sidewalks added throughout the City, focusing first near schools and the hospital, then adding connectors where there are sidewalk gaps;
- planting trees in the right-of-way throughout the City will be a focus in the fall;
- Dial-A-Ride will receive a \$250,000 upgrade at their garage and three additional buses are expected to be replaced with State/ Federal funding;
- the Waste Water plant will begin the process to upgrade the Screw Pumps, starting with modification to the Wet Well;
- removing lead goosenecks and identify types of services for reporting purposes required by the DEQ; plus much more.

While all these projects are in the final planning stages, Public Works will continue to prioritize maintaining our City and will always be available to assist our residents and business owners.

We have a new Strategic Plan!!!

The City Commission recently completed a strategic planning process, adopting the plan on February 18th. The document can be accessed on the City's website, www.cityofbr.org. This document will guide the City over the next 5 years and provides specific action items for the next 12 months. The City is working on a project that will replace the watermain and road on Ives Avenue and South Street from Magnolia Ave to Northland Drive. The project is estimated to cost nearly \$2 million dollars and take 3 months to complete. The original schedule had work occurring from mid-May to early September 2019. The Michigan Economic Development Corporation has committed approximately \$1.8 million to the project and with those resources come approval requirements that have delayed the start date.

Starting later would impinge on FSU's fall semester, so a revised schedule is being developed. The revision will likely involve work being completed in 2 phases, split between Summer 2019 and Summer 2020. The first phase would be from Magnolia to Stadium Drive. Another option is to complete all the work in 2020. Contact Mark Gifford with questions, 231-592-4058.

Hello, my name is Dave Cushway and I am Superintendent of the Wastewater Treatment Plant. I am currently in my 16th year of City employment and hope to continue



until retirement. I grew up here, attended Big Rapids Public Schools and am a graduate of the HVAC Program at Ferris State University. From 1985-2003, I worked in the engineering department of an HVAC systems manufacturer in Grand Rapids. After 18 years of valuable experience and frequent travel throughout the United States, it was time for a change.

In 2003, I began my employment with the City as a Plant Operator and began learning the wastewater treatment process through continuing education and on-the-job training. After acquiring 10 years of experience and Michigan D, C, and B Wastewater Licenses, the position of Plant Superintendent was offered to me in 2013. Since that time, many capital improvements and process upgrades have been completed, such as: headworks screening system, north plant stairway, entrance gate, automated aeration basins, final clarifier repairs, ferric handling and digester piping. New laboratory equipment includes a water machine, BOD incubators, spectrophotometer and a glassware washer. Current projects include a North State lift station, screw pump wet-well, water system upgrades, sludge storage tank repairs, and a new Waterloo lift station design.

Permit requirements have been numerous, as well: Completion of a DEQ-mandated 2-year Ammonia Study, 5-year Headworks Loading Study, User-Charge and Sewer-Use Ordinance updates, and a multi-year WWTP Asset-Management Plan. After a DEQ 2-year application and review process, we were just issued a new 5-Year NPDES Plant Operating Permit last month.

Safety Training and Continuing Education is an ongoing priority to maintain Staff wastewater licenses and a safe work environment. New safety shower and hazardous gas detection equipment has been purchased and installed for employee and community safety. It is personally rewarding to know that the Wastewater Treatment Staff and Plant play a key role in keeping our community and the Muskegon River clean, healthy, and safe.

A variety of conditions have changed in the world of recycling that are impacting the recycling service that we enjoy in Big Rapids. Manufacturers' are utilizing more lightweight materials and those lightweight materials are not as valuable in the recycling markets. Foreign countries were once the primary destination for recycled materials from the United States and now those same counties are changing how they are handling incoming recycling material. These and other issues are greatly increasing the cost of recycling.

Republic Services provides recycling in the City and they operate under a contract authorized by the City Commission. In November 2018, the Commission granted Republics' request to raise the recycling fee that all property owners pay.

Republic is now asking the City Commission to move away from weekly recycle pick up and have the pickups occur on the second and fourth Mondays of every month. This change will be implemented during the summer of 2019. This cost saving measure would be done to prevent another increase in the rates.





Changes in how recycling is handled and the level of service for Big Rapids property owners will likely be a topic of conversation for the foreseeable future.

As Clerk, I am also the Freedom of Information Coordinator (FOIA). All FOIA's are routed through the Clerk's office and documented. The Clerk's office in Big Rapids deals with approximately 400 FOIA's each year. The Clerk's Office also takes minutes for various charter and non-charter boards including City Commission, Compensation Commission, Election Commission, and the City Manager's Meeting with the Big Rapids Property Owner's Association.

The Clerk's office handles all business licenses and sidewalk permits. All businesses that want to sell door to door must receive a permit from the Clerk's office before soliciting.

The City offers a free Notary Public service to all citizens. The City Clerk and the City Treasurer are both Notary Publics.

I moved to Big Rapids in 1982 and was fortunate enough to be on the Senior Enrichment Committee and a member and treasurer for the Mecosta County CARES for ten years. From the Manager's Desk Summer 2019 Construction Plans

The City Commission has placed an emphasis on infrastructure as part of their strategic planning process and staff is preparing for considerable work for the upcoming summer.

- The Ives Avenue road and watermain replacement will begin in June. The \$1.8 million project will begin on Ives near Magnolia.
- Final paving of 300 and 400 blocks of Warren Avenue is planned for the week of May 20th, weather dependent.
- Winter Avenue road and watermain replacement (Cypress to Chestnut) will begin in late summer or early fall.
- Gravel street paving of the last block of Olaf and two blocks of Jefferson will begin in June or July.
- Paving of North Michigan Ave, Bellevue, North Warren (Middle School) will be in July or August before school starts.
- New sidewalk near Riverview School will be installed after school is out in June or July.
- The North/South runway at the airport will be replaced in June or July.
- A portion of the Riverwalk that is in disrepair will be replaced this summer as well.

Investments in infrastructure pay long term dividends to the entire community.

Spring is here and grass is growing.

The City Code of Ordinances states that grass and weeds create a nuisance harmful to the health and well-being of residents. If your grass exceeds 6 inches in height, the City can have it cut and charge you for the cost. Please maintain your lawn and yard.

Currently, I am a part of the team putting together the Infrastructure Capacity Enhancement (ICE) grant project. The ICE grant project includes replacing nearly a mile of watermain and full street reconstruction on Ives Avenue, beginning at Magnolia Street and running all the way to State Street, and a block of Clark Street from Morrison Avenue to Fuller Avenue. This requires removing the asphalt and undercutting two feet of the clay from the base of the road, backfilling with sand and gravel, and installing an underdrain. The existing watermain was installed in the early fifties and is cast iron, which is prone to breakage in heavy ground. As this project surrounds FSU, there will be time limits and staging for various sections to keep traffic moving and have as little impact on FSU operations as possible. With a project like this, which covers such a large area, there is a lot of planning to do, but I believe that the finished product will be a great asset to the City.

For many years the City has envisioned a new home for the Farmers Market that would double as an Ice Rink in the winter months. This permanent facility would shelter the vendors and market patrons and provide a refrigerated ice surface free from the unpredictability of Mother Nature. It was previously thought that this plan might happen 5 or 10 years from now, but a call from the State Economic Development Office has greatly expedited the City's plans.

The facility will be located directly across the street from City Hall, immediately north of Bernie's Place. The approximately 90' X 140' pavilion will have public restrooms, food prep area, outdoor fireplace, Zamboni garage, and picnic area. It will accommodate an approximately 70' X 125' ice surface. Along with the Farmers Market and Ice Rink the space will host Downtown events like the Chili Cook Off and could be reserved for private events such as birthday parties and open houses. There are still some approvals pending, but all signs point toward construction starting in the spring of 2020. serve not only the City but also the residents of the Big Rapids community.

Property Tax Administration can be a very complex issue; however, it is my personal philosophy that part of my responsibilities is to help educate individuals if they have questions or concerns about how their property is being valued or what exemptions they may or may not qualify for.

The Michigan General Property Tax Act (Act 206 of the Public Act of 1893) established a basic framework of schedules and procedures for the assessment and collection of property tax. It states: "all property, real and personal, within the jurisdiction of this state, not expressly exempted, shall be subject to taxation". Because statutes, court decisions, opinions of the Attorney General, and rules of administrative agencies all have a bearing on the assessment procedures, assessors must also be familiar with the Michigan Compiled Laws, which include all of the Michigan statutes, as well as those dealing specifically with the taxation of real and personal property.

It is within these statutes where assessors find the rules and guidance to make the multitude of decisions that are necessary for the administration of property tax law. Assessments are to be accurate, uniform and fair. Assessors must follow statute when setting about this task. Taxpayers are encouraged to come into the assessing office or go online to look at their property record card. We are happy to go over the information with taxpayers. Having correct information helps to ensure accurate, uniform, and fair assessments.

Taxpayers also have the right to challenge the value opinion of the assessor. Values are determined each year, taxpayers are given the opportunity to review, and if necessary, challenge those values. Taxpayers can appeal at the local level at the March Board of Review. If they are not satisfied with the decision, they may appeal further to the Michigan Tax Tribunal. Taxpayers have a voice and a right to be heard. Knowing your rights and following the procedures to exercise those rights are fundamental in the assessment process.

I have a passion for my profession, and I feel very fortunate to be able to work in a community as fine as Big Rapids as well as with others at City Hall who care deeply for the community they serve.

All too often we hear of a tragic event at a school or workplace where an active assailant acted out a nefarious plot to harm innocent people. We considered if we were doing enough to prepare city employees for the possibility of this type of event. While such an event is unlikely, it is not impossible. Therefore, City Manager Gifford tasked members of my department with completing a vulnerability assessment of City Hall. Officers Lorne Juday and Andre Torres, and Service Officer Andrew Hartung, completed the assessment to identify opportunities to improve the facility and presented it to the City Commission.

The assessment established several areas to improve City Hall which were well received by the Commission. The City Manager has made this a priority and we have begun to making changes to improve the safety and security of City Hall. Additionally, the Public Safety Department provides training to employees and groups to be better prepared for the unthinkable. Research shows that training will help you to react appropriately in stressful situations and could even save lives. - Jim Eddinger, 231-527-0021

Summer Construction Season

The following is an update on projects that are going on through out the City this summer:

- Paving on Olaf St and Speer Ave will be complete by July 26 and Jefferson Street will be paved by the end of August. Both are a part of the initiative by the City Commission to pave all the remaining gravel streets in the City.
- The Ives Ave/South Street project has moved into Phase II and final completion of the project will be accomplished by August 20.
- The new sidewalk program will begin mid-August.
 This program will add approximately 2,000 feet of new sidewalk throughout the City.

gaining a deep understanding of city income taxes, which was rather new to me at that time.

I was officially hired by the City of Big Rapids in January of 2016 where I worked under the guidance of Gail Dolbee, the City Assessor, and Paul Cole, then the Income Tax Administrator. The amount of knowledge I was able to gain from both Gail and Paul during my time working for them has led me to where I am today.

As the Income Tax Administrator, it is my responsibility to administer all aspects of the City's local income tax. This includes educating and assisting taxpayers; interpreting and enforcing the income tax ordinance; processing and auditing individual, corporate, and partnership returns; and maintaining accurate records as required by the State of Michigan. Other responsibilities I have include collection of personal property taxes and staying up to date and in contact with State/Federal employees regarding tax law changes and current legislation that pertains to Public Act 284 of 1964 (The Uniform City Income Tax Ordinance).

One project that takes up a large part of my time is working with the State of Michigan to identify and contact taxpayers who may not be following the City's local income tax ordinance. By identifying these taxpayers we can contact them and give them the opportunity to get in compliance so any penalties and interest they may owe are minimized. While not everyone leaves my office with a smile, I've made it a top priority to make sure that any taxpayer who comes in my office with questions leaves with a comprehensive understanding of what the local income tax ordinance requires for them to be in compliance.

I purchased my first house here in the City of Big Rapids in 2017 and I am happy to call Big Rapids my home! As someone who loves the outdoors, living in Big Rapids is perfect because of the many outdoor activities available in and around the City. Some of my favorite outdoor activities include mountain biking, kayaking, fishing, and snowboarding.

Winter Parking

City Ordinance states that no vehicles may be parked on City streets between the hours of 2:00AM and 6:00AM from November 15 to and including March 15. This is to allow for the removal of snow and ice from streets during winter months. Please follow this rule, as vehicles parked in violation may be ticketed and/or impounded by the Police.

House Numbers

The City Code Enforcement Office has started a project to ensure that all houses in the City have property address numbers that comply with the City Ordinance. The following regulations for address numbers are being applied:

- Size: at least 3 inches in height;
- Color: in contrast with the building;
- Location: on or near the front door, or over the garage door and at least 3 feet from the ground;
- Numbers must be easily visible from the road.

It is vital to safety and accessibility to Public Safety that houses can be easily identified. If your property is not in compliance, you will be notified by the Code Enforcement Officer.

Properties on alleys are encouraged to also put numbers up on the alleyside of the house.

Our current key projects are updating policies, materials and services and the Language Artists program in conjunction with Ferris, ArtWorks, and Big Rapids Public Schools 3rd grade classes. Language Artists is a program developed by the Grand Rapids Art Museum that encourages children in 3rd grade to explore art and writing through the lens of viewing and discussing art, creating their own hybrid animal artwork and developing a story around their creation. The Library participated by providing space for the children to gather and do research on animals and habitats for their projects using library books, computers, and electronic resources.

Another ongoing project has been fundraising for the Literacy Playground in Anna Howard Shaw Memorial Park. The park space is currently home to our Community Garden where folks can "check out" a garden plot for a low fee each spring and use our free Seed Library to plant and grow flowers and vegetables. Our hope is to install literacy-themed playground equipment and a permanent StoryWalk in the park, with seasonally rotating stories. The literacy rates in Michigan and all over the country are very low. The park will emphasize the Early Literacy skills: Read, Talk, Sing, Write, Play and incorporate the Talking is Teaching curriculum to improve literacy in Big Rapids by attracting young families to the library. That is also why we have chosen to make children's library cards under the age of 12 overdue fine-free and to offer library cards to all students in the City of Big Rapids, regardless of their residency status. We hope that this encourages people to come in and use the library and increases literacy rates!

I love the sense of community in Big Rapids. I have met so many generous people both at the library and at City Hall that contribute their time, energy, and support to making Big Rapids a special place to live and work. In preparation for the 2020-2021 City Budget, a process is used to identify large-scale projects and equipment purchases that need to be included in the Budget. City staff and the Planning Commission work on the process, with the final Program being adopted by the City Commission. These Capital Improvements are included in the City's Capital Improvement Program, a six-year planning document which is updated every year. City Staff are currently evaluating the needs of the Community and will be working on this process for the next two months. In 2016, I transferred to the Wastewater Treatment plant and currently hold the position of Assistant Industrial Pretreatment Program (IPP) Coordinator. At the City Commission


On Monday, December 16, the City Commission heard an update on City investment accounts as well as an update on the Community Library. They also acted on several points of business including:
