More Survey Responses Needed for Age Friendly City Plan!

People of all ages benefit from the adoption of policies and programs that make neighborhoods walkable, feature transportation options, enable access to key services, provide opportunities to participate in community activities, and support affordable and adaptable housing. Well-designed, age-friendly communities foster economic growth and make for happier, healthier residents of all ages. The most livable communities are those that enable residents to thrive at every age and every life stage — in other words, they are age-friendly. The availability and quality of certain community features, commonly referred to as the "8 Domains of Livability" 1. Outdoor Spaces and Buildings; 2. Transportation; 3. Housing; 4. Social Participation; 5. Respect and Social Inclusion; 6. Work and Civic Engagement; 7. Communication and Information; and 8. Community and Health Services, have a particular impact on the well-being of older adults. This framework is used to organize and prioritize the community's work to become more livable for older residents, as well as people of all ages. Friendly Solar Competition

Cities and businesses around the Bay Area are partnering with <u>Sunshares</u> to offer discounts to their community members. Sunshares is a bulk solar discount program that provides a discount of up to 15% on solar and battery storage. Over 1,000 people in the Bay Area, including 15 in Burlingame, have signed up.



Let's try to double our number and reach 30 Burlingame homes!

In order to reach the goal, residents will need to sign up for a free energy audit, to see if solar and battery storage are right for their homes. The program is purely informational, with no commitment unless you choose to move forward.

Sign-up closes on November 15!

Burlingame City Manager Lisa Goldman, who installed solar on her home through <u>Sunshares</u>, stated, "I didn't realize how simple it could be, and now I love seeing my home's energy generation in the app."

SM 101 EXPRESS LANES PROJECT



Announcing a Phased Opening of the SM 101 Express Lanes for HOV 3+ Now and Full Operations in Early 2023

Construction of the Express Lanes from Whipple Avenue in Redwood City to I-380 in South San Francisco is nearly complete, and **testing of the tolling equipment began this week**.



The toll equipment testing period will ensure that the toll equipment is working properly and will help drivers on the corridor become familiar with the new Express Lanes, and avoid confusion.

During this period, the Express Lanes will be open to **HOV 3+** (vehicles with 3 or more passengers) and motorcycles only, from **5:00 a.m.** – **8:00 p.m.**, **Monday through Friday**. The new Express Lanes will be open to all vehicles during all other times. <u>FasTrak</u> is required.

Burlingame Public Library Foundation Speaker Series


Sunday, November 6, Doors open at 5:15 p.m. - Event starts at 5:30 p.m. at the **Burlingame Main Library**

Building Electrification in San Mateo County





2022 Indicators Report Focuses on Ways to Accelerate Building Electrification

Register by November 7

Sustainable San Mateo County's (SSMC) <u>26th Annual Indicators Report</u> will be unveiled from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, November 10, at a free in-person event hosted at Genentech in South San Francisco. The Indicators Report launch will feature experts discussing the importance of electrifying the new and existing building stock in San Mateo County. Reducing carbon emissions in buildings is one of the most impactful and effective ways to address climate change.

Admission is free, but registration is required by November 7. Please register at: https://bit.ly/SSMC2022IndicatorsReportLaunch.

The speakers will also address what is needed to ensure that this unprecedented electrification transition happens in an equitable way. They will present case studies of cities and local jurisdictions' best-in-class policy approaches and discuss what is needed to make electrification occur during this decade, our last window of opportunity to keep global warming at or below 2 degrees Celsius (3.6 degrees Fahrenheit).

The Indicators Report launch will feature Sarah Cassenego, SSMC's Indicators Report Program Manager, who will present key findings and highlights from the report. The launch will also feature experts who are working on a just and equitable electrification transition for everyone: Jeannie Linam, Climate Action and Resilience Manager, Genentech; Panama Bartholomy, Director, Building Decarbonization Coalition; Susan Wright, County of San Mateo Office of Sustainability; Jonathan Hartman, Principal, Group 4; and Roopak Kandasamy, leader of BlocPower's partnership with Menlo Park, which will electrify 10,000 homes during the next decade with a "one-stop shop" that prioritizes low-income neighborhoods.

CCFD County-Wide Search and Rescue Drill

On October 25, CERT volunteers from Burlingame, Hillsborough, and Millbrae observed a countywide Urban Search and Rescue drill located in a building scheduled for demolition, on Burlingame's Bayfront. During the exercise, firefighters from the Central County Fire Department (CCFD), as well as San Bruno, South San Francisco, Menlo Park, Woodside, and the San Mateo Consolidated Fire Department, rescued two injured "victims" by punching a hole in an outside wall, then jackhammering an opening in a concrete floor. CCFD Chief Bruce Barron, Deputy Chief Ken Giacotto, and Community Risk and Resiliency Specialist Dena Gunning explained the process. While the drill was in progress, everyone's phones lit up with an alert that a 5.1 magnitude earthquake occurred near San Jose.














Get Your Booster Today!

Books Against the Wall: An Exhibition of Art Inspired by Original Books

November 12 - February 5, 2022 at the Peninsula Museum of Art Space 204, Tanforan Shopping Center, San Bruno

The Peninsula Museum of Art presents *Books Against the Wall*, an exhibition of Bay Area book artists who translate their works to mixed media and multimedia projects. These artists use the book format to make original works of art and then explore how to share what they have made with a larger audience. The results challenge the viewer to consider the books as sculptures, animations, video games, and more. Some pieces share the processes used in creating the images, while others expand an original concept by presenting it in a new format. The show broadens and enhances our notions of what a book can be.

Books Against the Wall includes work by five artists:

Zach Clark creates work regarding location memory and his own changing relationship with nature. Working in various approaches to publishing, Zach translates analog photography and writing displayed on risograph, screenprinting, and letterpress into broadsides, postcards, booklets, and hand bound books. *Brilliant Silence* serves as the culminating work of his last six years of his practice, while *Deciduous* and *Tourist Photographs* exist as the prologue and epilogue to the series. Various other forms of ephemera fill the rest of his work, including *However Strange The Landscape*, an accordion booklet. This was published by Buffalo, NY printmaker Rachel Shelton, using Zach's images, which reflects his own collaborative publishing practice.

Sarah Klein puts paper to motion by presenting books, prints, and animations. Informed by a decade of working with stop-motion animation, she uses repetition and variation to activate her subject material. Her work employs or suggests movement. The image sequences are arranged for the viewer to set them into motion, through a GIF app on a smart device or the mind's eye.

Mary V. Marsh makes prints and artists' books that explore the changing technologies of communication through a lens of personal experience and anxiety. Presented here are *TABLOID!*, a linoleum-cut tabloid newspaper sourcing recent headlines; *Vertical Scroll: Unorientable*, a large newspaper-like möbius strip, referencing the endless scrolling of digital reading; and *Here & Now*, which includes hanging book pages featuring linoleum-cuts and rubbings, which evokes a sense of being in two realities at the same time, when immersed in reading a book.

Andy Rottner is an artist, bookbinder, and fine-art publisher. His two books presented here; *Smoke Pourin' Out of a Boxcar Door & Talkin' Hard Work* translate folk music into drawing and book forms.

Lorna Stevens is a mixed media artist whose work centers on integrating material and technique to represent subject matter. She presents *Paradise Drive*, an entirely handmade book of sonnets and paintings translated to videos, electronic games, exhibitions, prints, and e-books.
