INTRODUCTION

The annual adopted budget document provides the recommended funding for all City programs and services, including those that utilize funds from the City's various enterprise and special revenue accounts, for the next fiscal year. This brochure highlights the major components of the general fund budget.

The City of Burlingame's revenue is expected to grow 2.1% in fiscal year 2017-18, supported by a stable local economy with continuing moderate growth and rising home prices supporting healthy property tax revenues. Despite a slowdown in auto and transportation sales, taxable transactions are still strong. Transient occupancy tax (TOT) revenue from hotels remains solid.


Expenditures for this year reflect support for ongoing operations, key program investments, and a strategic increase of one part-time and two full-time positions Citywide. The increases will be used to improve communication with the public and help connect community groups with City services. Other notable expenditures include additional funds to cover election expenses, information technology needs, and facilities maintenance.

The City is also taking steps to support and fund its employee pension obligations. Changes in CalPERS investment return assumptions driving employer are contribution rates higher, and the increases are expected to be significant over the next 10 to 15 years. To manage the expected rate increases, the City will budget at amounts higher than the actual CalPERS rates, creating a surplus that can be set aside to help fund future contributions. The surplus funds will be held in a trust or reserve fund until they are needed for these higher pension costs.
