

HON. ANSON BURLINGAME.

Arrival of His Body by the Steamer *Silesia* Yesterday—The Proposed Reception of the Remains by Prominent Citizens—Action of the Chamber of Commerce—The Funeral Escort.

The body of Minister BURLINGAME arrived yesterday on board of the North German *Silesia*. The revenue cutter *Uno*, with Hon. ISAAC LIVERMORE, of Boston, father-in-law of Mr. BURLINGAME, on board, met the steamer coming up the Bay in the morning, and took off Mr. EDWARD LIVERMORE BURLINGAME, the eldest son of the illustrious statesman, who accompanied his father's remains from Hamburg, leaving there on the 6th inst. The flags on the steamer were lowered at half-mast on young Mr. BURLINGAME'S departure from the vessel. The corpse was embalmed at St. Petersburg a short time after Mr. BURLINGAME'S death on the 23d of February. The body remained on board the *Silesia*, at the foot of Third-street, Hoboken, last evening, preparatory to being taken charge of today by delegations from the Chamber of Commerce and Union League. It is the design of the relatives of Mr. BURLINGAME to have the funeral demonstration in this City as quiet as possible, and for the purpose of conforming to their wishes, the gentlemen forming the escort have determined not to have any procession. They will meet at the Custom-house Barge Office, at the Battery, at 1 o'clock this afternoon, and will then proceed to the steamer *Silesia* to receive the remains. Subsequently the coffin will be transferred to the cutter, after which it will be conveyed to the steamer *Providence*. It will be carried to Boston by the latter vessel, and will be under the charge of Gen. CHAMBERLAIN and Major CAFFELLO, of Gov. CLAFLIN'S staff, on the way there.

A special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held yesterday for the purpose of making arrangements for the reception of Mr. BURLINGAME'S remains. The attendance was quite large. President WM. E. DODGE called the Chamber to order, and Mr. MOSES H. GRINNELL, Collector of the Port, briefly stated the object of the meeting. A Committee was subsequently appointed to escort the remains of the late Minister from the steamer *Silesia* to the Boston depot. Messrs. OPDYKE, GRINNELL and COWDIN were appointed to make such arrangements as should be appropriate to the occasion. The following are the names of the gentlemen comprising the escort:
