



Virginia Housing Awards \$46 Million to 25 Redevelopment and Housing Authorities in the Commonwealth

Richmond, Va. – Virginia Housing has allocated a percentage of its annual REACH resources to support public housing revitalization. (REACH is a multifaceted resource that Virginia Housing uses to support vital housing initiatives through its Homeownership, Rental and Community Outreach programs). \$46 million will be awarded to 25 housing agencies across the state in the form of a one-time Public Housing Revitalization (PHR) grant with the purpose of facilitating and accelerating 38 projects to transform, rehabilitate, or improve Redevelopment and Housing Authorities' (RHA) existing public housing stock.

The grant will help fill funding gaps in public housing transformation projects that are under development or in the planning stages, ultimately providing much needed financial resources to aid in the financing of new public housing transformation projects and funding of capital improvements that will enhance and extend the useful life of traditional public housing units.

There are currently 25 RHAs in the Commonwealth which have public housing portfolios supported by the U.S Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Capital Fund Program (CFP). While this funding is available annually, a significant gap has existed for decades between the HUD funding for public housing capital needs and the actual needs of these RHAs. Because public housing serves such an important solution

when it comes to housing many residents across the Commonwealth, Virginia Housing developed this new resource to provide a one-time match to the HUD CFP.

"Virginia Housing has long worked side-by-side with the Public Housing Authority network to help these organizations maintain and create housing options for many of Virginia's residents. This new resource will be a catalyst for the continued revitalization and transformation of these vital communities," says Chris Thompson, Director of Strategic Housing at Virginia Housing.

The RHAs who will receive the allocated funds from Virginia Housing and the amounts can be found in the chart below.

FY22 Public Housing Revitalization Grant Award

Chesapeake Redevelopment and Housing Authority (CRHA) was one of twenty-five Public Housing Authorities to receive notice we were awarded the FY22 Public Housing Revitalization Grant for Capital Improvements from the Virginia Housing Development Authority.

The **award of \$1,327,337.00** will provide muchneeded funding to renovate public housing units in the Peaceful Village Apartments community over the next four (4) years.

HUD Awards (30) New Mainstream Non-Competitive Vouchers to CRHA totaling \$ 266,670.03

Mainstream Vouchers are tenant-based vouchers that serve households that include a non-elderly person(s) with disabilities, who is at least 18 years old and not yet 62 years old.

HUD Mainstream Voucher Award



CRHA was awarded **\$675.00** on August 9th by the Virginia Risk Sharing Association (VRSA) to install rubber speed bumps in parking areas and near building entrances. This grant will be used to help reduce the probability of claims and enhance risk management efforts by increasing the safe traffic flow for personnel and the general public.

Aspire360 Jobs Plus Initiative Program





Jobs Plus services are tailored to residents' individual needs and are drawn from a menu of on-site and referral services. For unemployed residents, case managers will help identify short and long-term employment goals and create plans to accomplish them. Employed individuals can work with case managers to take the necessary steps to advance in the labor market. Staff will continue to canvass all public housing communities to encourage enrollment and opportunities.

In July 2022, two (2) Jobs Plus Community Coaches secured full-time employment, leaving two positions open. Our goal is to emulate their success stories across the entire Jobs Plus program platform. It is our hope the former Coaches will return as spokespersons to explain the full benefit of seeking employment while enrolled in the program and encourage others to do the same.

In August, enrollment numbers steadily increased towards the annual program participant goal. Ten (10) participants are awaiting completion of assessments, with a total of 27 enrolled. The Authority is currently seeking qualified candidates to fill vacancies for the Community Coaches. The 2nd Jobs Plus quarterly report was submitted on July 29, 2022.

Throughout the summer months, the Jobs Plus team and community coaches participated in training sessions and supported the Resident Services team in the many summer programs and activities across several communities. For additional information, please call (757) 233-6900.
