
In 2019 The City replaced the handi-access swing in memory of Doug Allison.

How it began

November 14, 1988 Mrs. Darlene Broadway and Mrs. Beth Chambers-Nelson came before the Mayor and City Council and expressed the GREAT need for a park for children to play. Both felt like the property at Woodmen of the World on Woodman Hall Road would be the perfect location. In the next few months the two presented plans and costs associated to develop a park.

February 13, 1989 The Mayor and City Council voted to develop the City of Cleveland Park and Recreation Board and also committed \$10,000 to the park development if the Park and Recreation Board could raise the balance of \$20,000. The board applied for and received a \$10,000 grant from the State of Georgia.

The group went into action and held several fundraisers for the new city park.


