WWU students work in community during annual Service Day

More than 700 Walla Walla University students, faculty, and staff participated in the 27th annual WWU Service Day on Oct. 16.



The event was organized by the WWU Center for Humanitarian Engagement to encourage students to connect with the community through a variety of service projects. "It's about more than raking leaves; it's about sharing and discovering Christ through ser-

vice," said David Lopez, executive director of the CHE. "The Center for Humanitarian Engagement is bigger than just a day, in fact, we're committed to coaching and mentoring students into service for the rest of the year and into a lifetime of service beyond that."

Local businesses and organizations connected with WWU to offer service opportunities for the event. Out of the 37 projects completed, 14 were from organizations that had formed new relationships with the CHE during the past year.

Projects included apple picking in Milton-Freewater, baking apple crisp for first responders, helping with cleanup and event planning at the Blue Mountain Humane Society, horse grooming, organizing thrift store inventory at Yeehaw Aloha, and various outdoor landscaping projects. In many cases, WWU academic departments organized

students by major area of study to work together on specific projects.

For one project students received \$100 in cash to spend in ways that would benefit the community, such as buying bus tickets for people or paying for their groceries.

"I thought it was a unique opportunity to do something different instead of gardening or manual labor," said Savion Grazette, junior business administration major.



Susan Willard, a WWU freshman mentor, helped with the Change the Day \$100 project by providing transportation for students to find needs in the community where they could utilize their funds. "I am impressed with how quickly they all got down to business," said Willard.

A Note From The City Administrator

This has been a busy Fall Season. The new 1.67 acre Veterans Park was officially dedicated on Friday, October 25th. It is located within the Homestead Subdivision on the west side of Homestead Avenue, south of Fourth Street. It features play equipment, benches, and general green space. The C Street reconstruction project is ongoing. The first lift of pavement has been applied to the roadway between College and Damson Avenues. Underground utility (water, wastewater, storm, conduit) construction is going on between Damson and Larch Avenues. The goal is to wrap up this project by the end of the year.

During the October 22nd, 2019 Council meeting, our solid waste hauler Basin Disposal provided a State of the Garbage/ Recycling system. Once our provider assures us that the market for recycled material has come back enough where the material is truly being recycled and not deposited into a landfill we will pursue bringing back the optional recycling service.

The end of the year also means development of the Fiscal Year 2020 budget. City of College Place Leaf Pickup Information



- City crews have begun the annual Leaf Pickup Program by sweeping streets.
- As leaves begin to accumulate City crews will incorporate the use of a backhoe and dump truck to the cleanup effort.
- It takes City crews approximately three days to cover the entire city, crews will continue rotating through the City until all leaves are collected.
- No special accommodations for leaf pickup will be made. Crews will get to your leaves as part of the rotation.
- Leaves can be piled loose, bagged, or boxed and placed in the street.
- Leaves bagged or boxed will be picked up by Basin Disposal (unlimited garbage for residential customers) as part of the standard weekly collection route.
- Leaves piled loose in the street should be kept clear from storm drains and the curb/gutter.
- Allow space for City crews to work. Keep piles at least 10 feet away from parked cars.
- Please be patient, we will get to your leaves as soon as possible!
