Stormwater Monthly Utility Fee

How is it Calculated?

- 1. Land type, configuration, and use of the parcel
- 2. Amount of impervious surface on the parcel

Who Has to Pay the Fee?

Every developed parcel within City limits is charged a stormwater utility fee.

Undeveloped parcels and parcels with no impervious surfaces will not be charged a fee.

What is an Impervious Surface?

Surface which either prevents or retards the entry of water into the ground as compared to the existing natural conditions prior to development. Including but not limited to: Compacted gravel, streets, pavement, concrete, stone, brick, roofs, decks, patios, and driveways.

Why Am I Paying a Fee?

The Washington State Department of Ecology notified the City of College Place on October 25, 2017 that coverage under the Clean Water Act's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) is required and the City will have to apply for a municipal water quality permit. The stormwater utility fee was created by the City to pay for costs associated with implementing and maintaining the new, required stormwater program. This program will regulate discharges of stormwater runoff to surface and ground waters to protect water quality within City limits.

The idea for the fee is not reliant on keeping 100% of all stormwater contained on lots that originated the runoff; the fee is dedicated to water quality improvement and maintenance of stormwater infrastructure across the whole City. Through this utility, the City and the residents will work together to improve and protect both the public health and the environment in our community.
