I know this next topic can be controversial, but it is important that I not just acknowledge concerns, but also that I write about it. The City will be having our Freedom Festival event on Sunday, July 3rd (see the announcement in this newsletter for location and times). Food, fun, and fireworks are on the agenda. Our hope is that neighbors will forego buying and lighting their own fireworks (boy, are those expensive and with inflation being what it is, you likely have better things to spend your hard-earned money on) and instead come together as a community and enjoy one fantastic show together. College Place's ordinance on fireworks is that they can be used only on July 3rd and 4th from 11am to 11pm. No mortar type bombing fireworks are allowed. If you insist on doing your own fireworks, please keep a firehose ready and clean up afterwards. Please be sure to bring your pets indoors and make sure they are secured on July 3rd and 4th. Keep your doors and windows closed, I've heard tales of dogs running out of them when frightened by the loud noises. It is also a good idea to reach out to your veterinarian for advice on how to keep them calm and safe.

Have you visited our Farmers and Artisans Market at Lions Park yet? If not, you are missing out! Stop by and support our small businesses while getting some really great buys. A Note From The City Administrator

I hope everyone's Summer is going well. A lot is going on at the City. We are in the heart of community event season. The weekly Farmers Market is held every Thursday from 4 to 7 PM at Lions Park (801 SE Larch). For more information, please visit our website. The City is also once again holding the Freedom Festival on Sunday, July 3rd from 6 PM to 10 PM at College Place High School. It will consist of vendors, kids fair, concert by Shanks Pony, and a firework show. For more information, please visit this website: www.cpwa.us/residents/events/freedom_festival.php

In other news, College Avenue will be closed from Cedar Bend to Lamperti throughout July as contractor Apollo is fixing some settlement issues within the project area. Nelson Corp continues to work on building the well-house and associated mechanical equipment at the replacement drinking water well located at the southwest corner of Whitman Drive and Maple. It should be operational by early Fall.

Starting in July the City will start to charge for the Ambulance Utility at 1/3 of the adopted rate. This item has been evaluated by the City Council over a period of four years. This utility was created as basic life support ambulance services has seen 20% call volume increases over the last two years. This is an issue since the majority of the Fire Department staffing is volunteer. The existing staffing of the Fire Department has one full time firefighter per shift with volunteers. We have had several cases where dual calls have occurred at the same time which the city had difficulty responding to with the existing manpower. The ambulance utility will allow the City to hire four firefighter/EMT's which will permit the Fire Department to respond to dual calls in an expedient fashion. Also, many have read the press release issued by College Place Public Schools regarding the pause on the School Resource Officer program. This has been caused due to current staffing levels at the College Place Police Department. The Department is aggressively recruiting for Police Officers. Once we have new officers hired, gone through the state mandated Basic Law Enforcement Training, and field training where they can be on their own, this program will resume.
