Hello Town Residents, Business Owners and Friends,

Happy Summer! I hope you enjoyed the Spring's steady awakening of plant and animal life.

Reuse Center. A group of town and city volunteers is working hard on laying the foundation for a comprehensive reuse system that will serve the Geneva area and beyond. A not-for-profit corporation, Geneva Reuse Systems, Inc., has been formed, and an application to be qualified as charitable under federal law is about to be filed; that status will make the organization eligible for grants and tax-deductible donations. Work groups are looking at possible sites for collecting and sorting donated items and retailing them at bargain prices; developing a business plan and fundraising; and communicating with and educating people about reuse. The system will include training people for rewarding jobs, holding regular fix-it clinics, and salvaging reusable materials from buildings scheduled for demolition or renovation. We are grateful to town staff and the many volunteers who make our events successful, including Senior Citizen Clean-Out Day, Free Stuff Day, Summer Kick-Off, and work on Town's Bike Park, Community Garden Plots and Box Field; we thank Dennis Ferlito of Bejo Seeds for donating veggie seedlings to Town gardeners.

Solar Panels Coming to the Town Hall. The Town has qualified for a \$175,000.00 grant from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority due to its many high impact green energy actions over the past few years. The grant must be used for another green energy initiative, which will be adding solar panels on Town Hall property that will save over \$8,000.00 per year in energy costs. Installation will likely occur in 2025.

The Towns of Phelps and Geneva are submitting an application for a grant to help fund a sewer line from Gambee Road in the Town of Geneva along Route 14 north into the Town of Phelps, which will make business development along this corridor possible.

#### **Town Summer Kick-off!**

On a sizzling summer day, the town parks and recreation committee kicked off summer with a community event behind Town hall. Activities included a thrilling dodgeball game, bike safety checks, delicious hamburgers, and hotdogs from Northside, Westlake Road and White Springs fire departments, and concluded with relaxing yoga session. #### **Building Department**

The building department continues to be busy, and we are happy to share news of continued growth in the town. Most notably, the currently vacant building at 833 Route 5 And 20 is being restored and will be renovated into a medical facility. This building has been vacant for a long time, and we are looking forward to this revitalization. We are also working on a new affordable housing subdivision that will help the ongoing housing shortage in Ontario County.

#### **Highway Department**

The Highway Department has been busy with road work this year. We paved Kashong Road and Old Lake Road and installed new stone shoulders on both. Sometime in July we will be doing the same to all of Snell Road and Armstrong Road from State Route 14 to County Road 6. That being said, I would like to remind everyone to please SLOW DOWN and be aware of the workers in the work zone. That way we can make sure everyone goes home safely at the end of the day.

The Highway Department helped on Senior Clean Up Day, picking up items from residents for disposal at the transfer station. A big thanks to all my crew for this and all that they do every day for the town folks.

#### Free Composting for all Town Residents!

Did you know that much of what goes into the trash is biodegradable and could be composted locally? You could reduce your waste heading to the landfill (and reduce your costs) if you take advantage of one of the three \*free\* composting opportunities available to Town residents. Thanks to a grant from USDA, Town residents can bring their food waste to the Town transfer station to deposit in the Growing Cycle toters at no cost or call the Town Hall to schedule free home pickup of compost if transportation or mobility is a concern or for those residents who want to compost in their backyards, free compost bins are available at the Town Hall for all residents who want to use them.

Just call Town Hall at 315-789-3922 to sign up for a bin or a bucket (for backyard or compost pickup) or to learn more about Transfer station drop off hours.

#### **Water & Sewer Department**

- From Howard Bailey, Water and Sewer Superintendent

During the summer months the town water and sewer department performs maintenance on its water & sewer system and other facilities in the town. The maintenance includes exercising water mainline valves and hydrants to make sure everything works in case of an emergency. A checklist is made of any issues and repairs will be made as soon as possible.

Water and sewer line easements are kept mowed and free of any fallen trees or debris to keep main accessible in case of an emergency. The department also takes care of mowing and the upkeep of the Town Hall, Kashong Conservation Area, Bike Park, Box field, Water & Sewer Pump Stations, and maintenance garages.

The Kashong water plant upgrades have been on hold for the past few months due to some issues with one of the new pumps. The pump is expected to be reinstalled at the end of June, with hopes of finishing the project sometime this summer and the tank on Kashong Switch Road being painted in early fall.

The town's main sewer pump station upgrade project was awarded with hopes of being started at the beginning of 2025 and completed by the fall.

## **Deer Impact Survey**

A number of people have contacted the Geneva Town Board with concerns about the quantity of deer in their neighborhoods. In response to these inquiries, the Town Board has formed a committee to investigate the situation. The committee held a meeting with Dr. Curtis who is a professor of Natural Resources at Cornell University.

Dr. Curtis, in conjunction with the Nature Conservancy, has developed a program called Community Based Deer Management (CBDM). Dr.Curtis has been involved with most if not all of the community deer management programs in New York State, and has developed a CBDM program in over 30 localities. He has agreed to be an advisor to the Town of Geneva as it investigates this situation concerning deer populations. The first step in this process was for the committee to develop a survey that would identify the impacts of the deer population and help determine if there is a problem. This survey is attached on the next page. The survey will also be available on the Town website and will be handed out in neighborhoods. #### **Another Free Stuff Day Success!**

On June 2nd, many Town residents got rid of things they didn't want, or picked up items they could use at the Town's Free Stuff Day (FSD). The Town's Sustainability Committee initiated FSD in 2021, and we've been holding the event every spring and fall since. FSD gets unwanted items out of residents' houses and garages and into the hands of people who can use them, instead of ending up in the landfill eventually. In addition, the Town often runs a Fix-it Clinic and Senior Cleanout in conjunction with FSD. Although it is

difficult to quantify the amount of material FSD diverts from the landfill, the lawn at the Town Transfer Station is typically 2/3 full of donated items. At the end of the event, we've had to put a very small amount of leftover items into recycling or trash. Previously we donated leftover useful items to a local charity, but lately we've simple moved those items to the front of the lawn and they are taken within a day or two. Keep an eye out for the fall FSD date, and meanwhile start cleaning out the garage!

#### Pizza Boxes: Recyclable?

From Ontario County Recycles:

We know there is confusion about whether pizza boxes are recyclable or not. The good news is YES they can be recycled even if there is a bit of grease residue. Here are the details:

Every year in the U.S. about 3 billion pizzas are enjoyed. That's a lot of sauce, cheese, dough, and... cardboard! According to the American Forest & Paper Association, pizza boxes are made of high-quality corrugated paper, which can be recycled at least seven times (AF&PA).



Before putting a pizza box in the recycling bin, remove any wax paper and the little plastic "table," scrape the box of any remaining crust or cheese, and recycle that valuable cardboard. A bit of greasy residue is acceptable. If you are ever unsure if the amount of leftover cheese and grease stuck on the pizza box makes it recyclable or not, the next best thing you can do is split the box in two, and only recycle the top half of the box.

Remember this: Pizza boxes can be recycled, pizza cannot.
