From Supervisor Mark Venuti (cont'd)

We welcome Lorie Peck as town clerk. With the resignation of town clerk Lorrie Naegele, the town board appointed Lorie Peck town clerk at its July 9 meeting to serve until the end of the year. Lorie served as a deputy town clerk for fourteen years prior to this appointment and has held various positions with the Town for twenty-three years, including water and sewer clerk and nine years as town assessor.

If you have thoughts about whether the Ontario County landfill should close at the end of 2028 or remain open, let me know.

We have been closing Slate Rock Road to vehicle traffic in the winter months to reduce wear and tear on the bridge for the past three years, and we are considering closing it year-round to vehicle traffic to avoid the expense of a new bridge. If you have an opinion about this, let us know.

The town and Geneva City School District collaborated on converting the old tennis courts behind the high school to eight pickleball courts. The courts are open to the public when school is not in session and they are not being used for district programs.

With the help of the Ontario County Soil & Water Conservation District, two large stormwater retention basins are being installed on property west of Carter Road that should reduce flows to residences in the watershed east of the basins.

Because at this time we could not obtain a quote for fixed rate electricity that was competitive with the NYSEG rate, the town is going to let the current contract under its Community Choice Aggregation program expire at the end of the year. Those in the program will not experience any change in service and will not need to do anything when the change occurs; there should just be notice of the change from NYSEG. If and when fixed rates improve, we may request proposals and offer fixed rate options for renewable supply again.

The NYS Comptroller has again found the town, based on 2023 data, not susceptible to fiscal or environmental stress.

Our heartfelt thanks to town resident Mary Ann Bell for twenty years of service on the town Planning Board, including service as chair of the board.

Building Department

- From Floyd Kofahl, Code Enforcement Officer

You may have noticed the construction work being done on the long vacant building at 833 Route 5 and 20, formerly known as the "Old Alison's" Building. This site will be the home of the new Rochester Regional Health Geneva Destination Center. The current building is being renovated and a number of services will be available, including radiology, infusion, a pharmacy, a PT gym, and more.

Cold weather is on its way and with that comes several concerns that need to be addressed.

- First, for all property owners who have sidewalks in front of their property, remember that you are required to keep these sidewalks clear of any snow and ice. The sidewalks are to be maintained within 24 hours of snow fall. This also includes after plow trucks go by and throw snow on to the sidewalks. This is a safety issue for walkers.
- Second, if you are thinking of doing any construction with a concrete element involved, be aware that during cold temperatures there are specific requirements to protect the concrete applications. This includes the use of thermal blankets, straw covering, and other applications.

Please remember, if you are looking to do any type of construction, or you are unsure if you need a permit, you can call the Building Department and ask questions prior to designing your project or starting construction.

The Finger Lakes Railway Corporation

Ontario County is currently working on a Freight Rail Corridor Development Plan in the Geneva and Phelps area. The purpose of this study is to identify industrial development opportunities, address safety concerns, and support planning efforts along the Finger Lakes Railway system. Presently, 77 vacant or agricultural parcels have been identified as candidates for rail-enabled development along this Geneva/Phelps corridor. The Town of Geneva is represented on the project's steering committee. The history of rail in the Town goes back 175 years. The Auburn and Syracuse Railroad was chartered in 1834 and completed between these two namesake cities in 1839. By 1850 short line service meant residents of Geneva could travel west to Niagara Falls and east to Albany. In 1853 the name of the company changed to the New York Central Railroad to reflect its larger sphere of travel. Shortly afterwards Geneva residents could also connect to a north-south rail line and to The Lehigh



Valley and Pennsylvania Railroad, and travel throughout the Northeast. In 1901 a timetable of the New York Central Railroad in Auburn listed 23 daily passenger trains serving the Finger Lakes. Commercial traffic along the lines surged up to World War II when it peaked. The advent of the interstate highway system coincided with the drop in rail traffic following the end of WW II, and the outlook for the New York Central Railroad became bleak. In 1968 it joined with Penn Central to stave off bankruptcy, but the newly formed joint company failed in 1970. In 1976 the federal government directed the Consolidated Rail Corporation that it created to take control of Penn Central. Rail service in the western New York area dropped precipitously.

In 1995, the Finger Lakes Railway Corporation (FLRC) took over ownership of the old "Auburn Road" line and other short lines from Conrail. The FLRC worked out PILOT (payment in lieu of taxes) agreements with six Finger Lakes counties (including Ontario County) and their industrial development agencies. Business boomed. Today the commodities transported by the FLRC include steel, scrap metals, scrap paper, pulp board, sand, industrial chemicals, salt, grain, fertilizer, corn syrup, plastic, clay, soda ash and lumber. Operations have grown exponentially to include 167 miles of track serving 90 customers that generate over 18,000 carloads annually. Some of the businesses in the Geneva/Phelps area that presently depend on service from the FLRC are Guardian Industries, Superior Plus Energy, Seneca Foods Corp, DeLong Grain, Pactiv Corp, Sheppard Grain, Blowers Agra Service, Maybury Farms, Henkel Corp., and Phelps Supply. Water & Sewer Department

The Town of Geneva's Kashong Water Plant project is about 99 percent complete. The new pumps and scada system are working wonderfully. The town's water storage tank is now being sandblasted and repainted with work scheduled to be completed by the middle or end of October.

The town's water and sewer department employees have been busy exercising the water system's valves and hydrants. This is done to make sure everything works properly when need exists, such as during an emergency water main break or fire. Routine flushing of the water mains is also done to keep a chlorine residual to keep it safe for the public to use and drink.

The water and sewer personnel have also been busy flushing the town's sewer mains as well as maintaining the town's facilities. This includes mowing the town hall, conservation area, water and sewer plants, bike park, and box field, as well as repairs to the facilities.

During the upcoming winter months, the water and sewer department employees also plow snow at those facilities and all the town's fire hydrants to keep them accessible for the fire department in case of an emergency. If there is a fire hydrant in your yard and you are able to keep it clear of snow, it would be greatly appreciated.

Highway Department

With fall approaching, I'd like to report on the busy summer the Highway Department has had with roadwork. In May we paved Kashong Road and Old Lake Road. In July we paved all of Armstrong Road and Snell Road from County Road 6 to State Route 14. On Pre-Emption Street to the north, we replaced two very deteriorated cross culvert pipes with 15 and 20-inch plastic pipes. This was completed before the Town of Waterloo Highway Department, who installed a new waterline on the east side of the road, paved the whole road due to the edge of the road being broken up from the waterline installation.

Overall, I would like to think that the majority of the roads in the Town of Geneva are in pretty good shape. Next year we are looking at some different options for Carter Road. We are looking at options to try to slow traffic down and make it more pedestrian friendly for all the kids traveling back and forth from school, the Boys & Girls Club, and new housing over that way.

Also, just a reminder, with winter not far away it is a good time to check the condition of your mailbox as the town is not responsible for mailbox damage due to snow load of the plow and wing.
