14. RESOLUTION NO. 56-2022 – Approving Grant Application for Stormwater Management Toolkit for Municipalities.

RESOLUTION NO. 56-2022**

Whereas The Seneca-Keuka Watershed Nine Element Plan (9E) prioritizes reducing the frequency and scale of stormwater runoff from multiple sectors as a means of addressing negative water quality impacts in the watershed; and

Whereas although the 9E provides significant guidance on what best management practices (BMPs) can be done and their benefits, it lacks information to guide individuals or groups on how to successfully implement such projects; and

Whereas such information is of particular importance to municipalities where turnover of officials can be high and institutional familiarity with stormwater BMPs applicable to municipal management can be limited; and

Whereas the Seneca Watershed Intermunicipal Organization's Seneca Watershed Steward and the Keuka Watershed Improvement District's Keuka Lake Manager are willing and able to develop a Municipal Stormwater Management Toolkit for the Seneca-Keuka watershed that provides guidance on how to successfully identify and address stormwater management issues; and

Whereas the cost of preparing the Toolkit, making it available for distribution, and doing outreach with it to municipalities is estimated at \$30,000-\$40,000; and

Whereas the New York State Department of State has funding available for such projects that will pay 80% of the cost; and

Whereas the 20% local match can be covered by staff time and will result in no out-of-pocket expense to the applicant; and

Whereas a municipality needs to be the applicant for such a grant, and the Town of Geneva, through the supervisor and the supervisor's assistant/bookkeeper, has the capacity to administer the grant if awarded; now therefore, it is

RESOLVED the Town of Geneva may be the applicant for grant funding for this project, and the supervisor is authorized to sign the application and all other documents in furtherance of it and, if awarded, grant administration.

16. Supervisor's Report:

The state has flagged Slate Rock Road bridge because they have detected some elevation differences. The town has had to commit \$6500 to having the bridge analyzed. The town's engineering firm, MRB Group, has found the company to do the investigation and is not charging, just passing on the bill.

The Town of Seneca has been in the news because it is polling residents about continuing major landfilling after the current contract and space expires at the end of 2028. I will oppose expanding the county landfill or any landfill at or near the existing site for continuing to import waste from outside the area, but we need to continue to work on solutions to the waste problem, and I believe the next step is to look at a comprehensive Resource Recover Park for the area that will cover recycling, reuse and transfer of waste that cannot be recycled or reused to another facility. The town's property where the town hall is goes west to route 14A and is a potential site with access from 14A. We will be working to come up with a concept we can seek funding for to move to the next level before the county landfill closes. The town may need to provide match or seed funding for this effort. Questions? Issues? Ok to proceed? No town financial or land commitments will be made without town board approval.

The supervisor's computer is 6-7 years old, memory about full, running poorly, so a new one has been ordered. The town's Sonic Wall Security Suite to protect town computers and data is expiring and is being renewed at a cost of \$684.92.

The supervisor and water and sewer superintendent having been meeting with the Cornell "Internet of Things" team to see if there is an application that would assist the town, and they are looking at putting sensors on the electric service at the water plant, the town's largest electricity consumer at about \$60,000 per year, to see if it would be cost effective and useful to receive continuous data on power usage at the plant, the theory being if we see spikes or unusual changes in power usage it would alert us to a problem at the beginning stage and save power and repairs.
