THIN ICE: No skating allowed

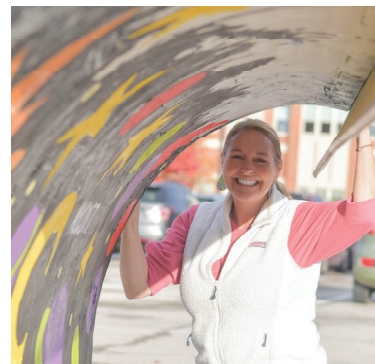
While playing hockey on a frozen pond may sound picturesque, it is prohibited on Township property. The possibility of falling through the ice into the freezing water is too great a risk for the Township to allow.

Each winter, police respond to calls made out of concern for individuals seen on frozen bodies of water.

The Fire Department trains for ice rescue and maintains a specialized floating "sled", in order to reach victims.

Despite its inherent dangers, on-ice recreation is available nearby at Alum Creek State Park, but before venturing out, review the state's guidelines for use and know that ice is never 100% safe.

PAINTED PLOWS: Students Create Public Art



Public art created by Alcott students will be displayed on four of Genoa Township's snow plows this winter.

The project began in September with an outline sketched onto plow blades by Alcott Elementary School's art teacher, Lee Johnson (*pictured*). Using colorful paint, 11 classes in grades 3-5, worked in shifts to fill in the designs.

Students can feel proud seeing their large-scale designs roll down neighborhood streets adding fun and color to otherwise dull winter days.

This year's designs feature outer space, kids playing, polka dots, and snow flakes.

When snow begins to accumulate, plow drivers, also known as "Snow Warriors" work around-the-clock always following the same route along high traffic thoroughfares first. Sometimes these main roads require repeated passes to clear, especially if snow continues to accumulate. Afterward, plows move to secondary streets. This means that neighborhood roads are not cleared together. Rather, trucks will not begin clearing low traffic, residential streets until all thoroughfares and secondary roadways are complete. Contractors driving smaller trucks are sometimes hired to plow cul-de-sacs due to the maneuvering required. Doing so also helps plowing reach completion more quickly for all residents.

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SPECIAL RECYCLING PROGRAMS



Dedicated yard waste dumpsters are placed at the maintenance facility for leaves, grass clippings, tree stumps and branches, paper yard bags, and any other organic material that will break down as compost. Plastic trash bags, plastic pots, metal, or other general trash should NOT be placed in the dumpsters. Misuse of the dumpster may result in the program being discontinued by the Township's composting partner.

Never rake leaves into the roadway where it can contribute to flooding.

Holiday lights will be accepted for recycling at Township Hall during normal business hours from November 15-January 13. In partnership with Keep Delaware County Beautiful, burnt-out or otherwise discarded lights will be recycled properly. When lights are misdirected to Rumpke, they become entangled in their specialized sorting equipment causing damage and delays.

Instead of trashing live trees at the curb after the holidays, residents can drop them off to be chipped into mulch for use in Township parks. Any excess will be composted.

To participate, remove decorations from the tree and bring it to the maintenance facility located beyond the Fire Station (7049 Big Walnut Road) on weekdays from January 3-13, 7a.m.-3p.m. Pile trees in the designated area next to the chipper.

Removing cars from streetside parking areas helps the Snow Warriors more quickly cover the Township's 180 lane miles. Also remember to shovel snow to the left side of your driveway (when viewed from the street). Plows are not agile enough to avoid pushing snow back across the driveway otherwise.

The importance of residents' jobs, appointments, and other obligations is acknowledged. Snow Warriors work around-the-clock in order to get residents out of their driveways as quickly as possible.

Thanks, always, to our Snow Warriors who continue to work until all of our roads are plowed.

ZONING & DEVELOPMENT

There has been an increase in incomplete zoning permit applications filed with the Development and Zoning office. Submittal of an incomplete application often leads to delays in permit issuance or could even result in rejection/denial of the request.

To avoid potential problems, please:

- Research applicable zoning requirements, Delaware County building standards, plat notes, and deed restrictions while developing your proposal
- Obtain applicable approvals from non-Township agencies before applying for a permit (septic impact, easement encroachment, HOA bylaws/covenants)
- Completely fill out the entire application form with as much detail as possible
- Sign and date the application – proof of property owner's authorization via signature or separate documentation is required
- Provide the required application fee at the time of submittal
- Make sure the site plan shows the entire property, is drawn accurately, and is clearly labeled (dimensions, size, setbacks from all lot lines) – screenshots of aerial images are not preferred
- Provide any other required documents listed on the checklist within the application packet

A new aerial ladder truck is on order with Ohio-based Sutphen Corporation. The vehicle will take nearly two years to be completed and will cost nearly \$1,700,000. The current truck is 15 years old is being replaced as scheduled per the department's replacement plan. The new apparatus will ensure firefighters can extend the ladder from where it is parked, across a lawn over a burning structure.

Prefabricated restrooms are expected to be delivered and installed on the prepared sites at Hilmar Park and Worthington Road Park in November. The restrooms will be available for use following installation; however, final concrete work will have to wait until warmer weather in the spring to be completed. 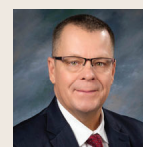
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
