# SBA to Increase Lending Limit for COVID-19 Economic Injury Disaster Loans

The <u>U.S. Small Business</u>
<u>Administration</u> is increasing the maximum amount small businesses and non-profit organizations can borrow through its COVID-19 Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program.



Starting the week of April 6, 2021, the SBA is raising the loan limit for the COVID-19 EIDL program from 6-months of economic injury with a maximum loan amount of \$150,000 to up to 24-months of economic injury with a maximum loan amount of \$500,000.

Businesses that receive a loan subject to the current limits do not need to submit a request for an increase at this time. SBA will reach out directly via email and provide more details about how businesses can request an increase closer to the April 6 implementation date. Any new loan applications and any loans in process when the new loan limits are implemented will automatically be considered for loans covering 24 months of economic injury up to a maximum of \$500,000.

This new relief builds on SBA's previous March 12, 2021 announcement that the agency would extend deferment periods for all disaster loans, including COVID-19 EIDLs until 2022 to offer more time for businesses to

build back. In order to shift all EIDL payments to 2022, SBA will extend the first payment due date for disaster loans made in 2020 to 24-months from the date of the note and to 18-months from the date of the note for all loans made in the calendar year 2021.

# Free COVID-19 Conflict Prevention Training Course

The Highland Park Public Library is sponsoring an online COVID-19 conflict prevention course for the Highland Park business community. The 60–75-minute course, created by the Crisis Prevention Institute in partnership with the National Retail Federation, is designed to help identify the stages of a person in distress, provide strategies to prevent a crisis, and teach verbal de-escalation skills and other techniques to keep employees and customers safe,



illustrating these tools through social distancing and mask-wearing scenarios.

Registered participants will receive an individual link to access the online training. The course is self-paced, can be started and stopped as needed, and will be accessible for 12 months from registration. Those without internet or computer access can arrange to view the training at the Library's public computer lab.

# Financial Aid for Retailers and Restaurants Grant Program

The City of Highland Park has a matching grant program to assist restaurants and retailers with operational costs incurred to provide a safe environment for customers and staff in compliance with state and federal public health guidelines for the coronavirus pandemic. The program will accept applications from qualifying restaurants and retailers located and operating within a commercial building in Highland Park



with a net worth of less than \$2 million and generating less than an average of \$200,000 in profit per year for two years after taxes. Qualifying restaurants and retailers may apply for reimbursement of up to 50% of eligible expenses related to COVID-19 public health mitigations, to a maximum of \$10,000 for restaurants and \$5,000 for retailers, for costs incurred between August 15, 2020, and December 31, 2021, or until funds are depleted. *More information is available here*.
