### Fire Hydrant Flushing Program

During the process, which begins in spring and is completed before fall, residents may notice discolored or rusty water for a brief period. This is normal and there is no health hazard. Allow a few hours for the discoloration to dissipate and avoid doing laundry at this time. Street signage will be placed in the neighborhood prior to the flushing date. Updates will be included in the City eNews and the Construction Projects Interactive Map on the website, cityhpil.com/construction.

### **Backflow Prevention Annual Testing Requirement**

If you have a lawn irrigation (sprinkler) system, it's time to have a State of Illinois licensed plumber inspect and test your backflow device. A copy of the inspection report is required to be sent to waterplant@cityhpil.com or faxed to 847.926.1193. For more information, please call 847.433.4355 or visit cityhpil. com/backflow.

### Driveway Approach, Curb and Sidewalk Maintenance

Code section 93.255 requires property owners to maintain the public sidewalk along the driveway, the driveway approach or apron, and the curb over the driveway. Code requires this infrastructure to be in good condition, free from obstructions and openings, and in safe condition for pedestrian and vehicular travel. Call 847.432.0807 for more information.

### City Receives Financial Reporting Award

For the 36th consecutive year, the City has been awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA). The highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, the award recognizes the City's comprehensive annual financial report for the 2019 fiscal year, the most recently audited report. An impartial GFOA panel determined that the report met the program's high standards, which include demonstrating a constructive "spirit of full disclosure" to clearly communicate its financial story and motivate potential users to read the full report.

According to the CDC, adults are fully vaccinated two weeks after receiving the second dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, or two weeks after the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine. ### Help Ensure Pedestrian Safety

## Drivers & Bicyclists must come to a complete stop and yield:

- When a pedestrian is in a marked crosswalk
- On school days, when children are in close proximity to a school zone crosswalk

### Drivers & bicyclists must yield to pedestrians at any intersection, and:

- When a pedestrian is in an unmarked crosswalk on the driver's side of the roadway and there are no traffic control signals
- When making a lawful turn on a red light after coming to a complete stop at the white painted Stop Bar on the pavement
- After coming to a complete stop

at a stop sign at the white painted Stop Bar on the pavement, or if none, at the stop sign or for a flashing red signal at an intersection

- When a pedestrian enters a crosswalk before the traffic light changed
- When a pedestrian is walking with a green light, to a walking person symbol or a walk signal
- When a pedestrian is leaving or entering a street or highway from an alley, building, private road or driveway

#### **Pedestrians should:**

- Use sidewalks and crosswalks when crossing the street.
- Yield the right of way to drivers

by obeying traffic signals, observing walk lights and using crosswalks

- Give the right-of-way to drivers when crossing the road at any place other than a marked or unmarked crosswalk, including between closely- spaced intersections where traffic signals are in operation.
- Walk as close to the outside edge of the road as possible, face oncoming traffic look and listen for cars if walking in the street is necessary
- Obey railroad gates, and/or warning lights/bells.

## Spring Clean-Up Begins April 24

The City's annual Spring Clean-Up Program will be offered by Lakeshore Recycling Systems on four consecutive Saturdays beginning April 24 and ending May 15, coinciding with residents' primary garbage collection day (*the day both garbage and recycling are collected*). Items must be placed at the curb

no later than 7 AM on collection day. *This program is for single-family residential customers only.* 

To keep City streets clean, please do not place any material out for collection earlier than one week prior.

#### **Oversized Items**

Lakeshore Recycling Systems will pick up all allowed oversized items that are placed at the curb during Spring Clean-Up. Only 1 cubic yard of construction material will be accepted. To discard waste from a do-it-yourself project, please make sure that the material is bundled so that one person can pick it up and place it in the truck. Carpeting must be rolled and should not exceed the

weight that one person can carry. Waste material generated by general contractors will not be accepted.

Residents with appliances for collection such as refrigerators/ freezers (doors must be removed), stoves, dishwashers, washers/dryers, furnaces/boilers, hot water heaters, air conditioners, and microwave ovens must call Lakeshore Recycling Systems at 773.685.8811 to arrange for a special pick-up.

#### **Prohibited Items**

The following items will not be accepted: regular garbage; yardwaste; debris generated by landscapers, tree trimmers, or contractors; demolition material from fences, roofs, or exterior building debris; rubber tires; batteries; and oil and household hazardous waste such as paint, pesticides, or pool chemicals.

### Leaf Blower Restrictions

The use of gas-powered leaf blowers is prohibited between May 15 and October 1. Gas-powered leaf blowers may be used for cleaning gutters until June 15. Electric powered leafblowers are permitted. ## All About Composting

The City of Highland Park is participating as a pilot community in the Lake County Community Compost and Food Waste Reduction Grant, awarded to SWALCO by the USDA. The need for this project is rooted in the USDA's goal to divert food scraps and other organics to a higher and better use as final compost as opposed to landfilling.

In 2015, Illinois published a statewide study on the composition of the waste

taken to Illinois landfills. Food scraps, uncoated cardboard, and compostable paper make up approximately 31% of the waste disposed! With the 2019 Lake County Solid Waste Management Update, Lake County has committed to attaining a 60% landfill diversion goal by 2030. Composting food scraps is essential to achieving this goal.

Be on the lookout for the Compostables! These characters are fun reminders to compost food and foodsoiled paper (like coffee filters) with your yard waste.

### Trees on Ravines or Bluffs: Extra Care Needed!

Highland Park's ravines or bluffs, known as Steep Slope Zone under Highland Park City Code (Chapter 150), are sensitive to disturbance and extra caution is needed to preserve these sensitive areas. Before doing any construction or landscaping work in the Steep Slope Zone, it is important to consult with a professional and contact the Department of Public Works Forestry Section regarding permit requirements. A Building Permit is required for removal of any vegetation, landscaping, or ecological restoration, and any construction within the Steep Slope Zone.

The ravines and bluffs provide invaluable ecological, structural, and financial benefits to the residents. Together the City and the Park District of Highland Park have developed a guide to vegetative management in the Steep Slope Zone. Learn more: cityhpil.com/ravineandbluffBMPs. ## 🔞 Home Fire Safe Escape Plan

If a fire starts in your home, you must be able to respond. Create a safe escape plan and practice it at least twice a year.

• Identify two exits from each room, choose a safe meeting place outside of your home and make sure all know where it is.

• When the smoke alarm sounds, immediately head for the exits. Do not stop to investigate or to gather possessions.

• Crawl with your head 12-24 inches above the ground to stay under the smoke. Move quickly.

• Test doors for heat using the back of your hand. If you feel any heat, don't open the door. Use your backup exit.

• If doors are cool, open carefully, checking for smoke and flames.

- Go directly to the safe meeting place outside. Never go back inside! One person should go to a neighbor's house to call 911.
- When the fire department arrives you can provide them with valuable information such as if everyone is out of the house.

### Moraine Township Health Insurance Sign Up, Free Income Tax Preparation and Van Rides

The American Rescue Plan has great news for people who couldn't afford health insurance. The new law offers higher subsidies to make premiums more affordable.

With insurance premiums based on age, older individuals in particular may find that new subsidies in the tax law signed by the President on March 12 bring health insurance within reach.

Moraine Township Certified Application Counselors (CAC) can help people assess how the new subsidies change the cost of health insurance. Call 847.432.3240 and you will be connected with a CAC for free. REMOTE assistance to help residents understand their options, balance their medical needs and budgets, compare coverage and costs, and ensure that enrollees receive the premium subsidies and cost-sharing reductions they may be income-qualified to receive.

2020 Income Tax Filing Deadline Extended to May 17, 2021

Moraine Township offers free tax return preparation REMOTELY to incomequalified taxpayers

Free tax return preparation is available remotely to taxpayers with basic tax returns and less than \$57,000 of income. To get started, leave a message at 847.780.6644. Calls for tax return preparation need to be received no later than May 12, 2021 to ensure processing and timely submittal.

#### Door-to-Door Transportation for Seniors and Disabled Residents

Moraine Township's Door-to-Door van operates weekdays 8:30AM to 4PM and is available to Township residents age 65 or older, or disabled. Van rides are primarily for medical appointments up to 15-miles from Township borders (Evanston, VA, Libertyville), however, personal errands can be scheduled based on availability. Caregivers are required to accompany wheelchair riders (caregivers ride free). Cost is \$4.00 per trip; \$2.00 for income qualified residents. Call 847.432.3000 to schedule a ride.

## The New Northwood Middle School Opens



Spring Break is complete in our communities and it's now time for the final weeks of learning, leading, teaching, and experiencing life! This year has been full of change, transition, opportunity, obstacle, confusion, clarity, fairness, unfairness, resiliency, and creativity! The final days of this school year also mark an epic historic moment with the opening of the newly renovated Northwood Middle School, the 2nd "new" school in the history of North Shore School District 112.

Northwood students and staff have been learning and teaching at Elm Place School since 2019 for the massive modernization project and now, in the midst of this pandemic, and a completed construction project (on time and on budget), the new Northwood Middle School opened to students on March 30 in the Hybrid Learning Model and it will open again on April 12 in a full in-person and full virtual model.

The Northwood modernization was designed to create an educational palace for its students, staff, and community members. Northwood was originally constructed in 1959 with smaller additions in 1961, 1970, 1999 and 2004. In 2018, North Shore School District 112 approved its Long-Range Plan Phase I ushering in a \$38 million investment at Northwood without adding any new taxes to fund the project.

The new learning center has added a series of features designed to maximize academic and social emotional learning opportunities for all students that attend the school. The Northwood construction project removed two major areas of the existing building to allow for new, modern additions. The front entry and entire single-story classroom wing has been removed and replaced with a two-story classroom wing and a secure main entry. This addition created a new curved façade for the building meant to better embrace the neighborhood and provide a welcoming and secure main entry. The rear northwest corner of the building has also been removed and in its place now stands a new music wing for band, orchestra and choir programming. The music addition will also serve as a storm shelter for the school and the surrounding community. In a nod to the environment, the new school is certified LEED Silver, there are solar panels about to be installed on the roof, and the construction project saved a 254 year old heritage Swamp White Oak Tree in partnership with the City of Highland Park. In addition to air conditioning, there is an abundance of fresh air and natural light throughout the new school.

There is so much more to explore and discover in the new Northwood Middle School and the District is looking forward to accommodating a public ceremony and tours of the building sometime this spring and summer. Thank you for your support as we continue to Inspire...Innovate...and Engage! Next up is the planned and approved construction project at Edgewood Middle School. You may have noticed the signage at Elm Place designated it "Edgewood Middle School at Elm Place". Construction will start this summer with a projected end date and opening early in 2023. Our Future is NOW! And nothing can stop us in District 112.

### District 113 | School Year 2020-21 Update - Fourth Quarter



Dear District 113 Community,

By the time you receive this month's issue of The Highlander, District 113 will have transitioned to full-day, in-person learning. We are now able to do that thanks to the Illinois State Board of Education and Illinois Department of Public Health on March 9 relaxing social distance requirements in schools.

While we are excited that we have made this much progress and look ahead to school that is increasingly normal, the only way we can make full-day, in-person learning work is to consistently and correctly follow our multiple layers of mitigations against virus transmission.

As long as we are in a pandemic, we have two goals: providing as many students as possible the opportunity to participate in on-campus learning, sports and activities and reducing the risk of transmission of the COVID-19 virus among our students, staff, their families and our community. It is only by accomplishing the second goal that we can make progress toward the first. Correct and consistent implementation of mitigation best practices, inside and outside of school, is the key to making that happen.

In early March, we saw a spike of 22 infections among our students. What was the effect of that spike? The Lake County Health Department put those 22 students in isolation, which also means a two-week quarantine for those 22 families. It also resulted in the Lake County Health Department putting 117 other students identified as close contacts in quarantine for two weeks. Each positive case can impact our schools well beyond just those infected.

We meet with the Lake County Health Department to discuss this matter. During that meeting, the Health Department officials indicated that they believe the source of these cases was activities outside the school. This is not surprising as we have multiple layers of mitigations in place to reduce the risk of COVID-19 virus transmission in school, including wearing face coverings, observing social distancing, extra cleaning, and as of March 2, mandatory COVID-19 testing for students. In addition, individuals identified through contact tracing as close contacts of persons who tested positive for the virus are subject to at least 10 days of quarantine. This, too, is an important mitigation against the risk of further transmitting the virus to others.

We talk a lot about the need for us to "work together" as a community to beat back the virus so we can keep getting closer to our "normal" daily routines and interactions. The fastest way to get to normal is to consistently and robustly apply outside school the mitigations we practice inside school. Parents and community members play an important role in supervising students' social gatherings outside of school and in regularly reminding them to practice masking and social distancing in these situations.

Please join us in our ongoing commitment to protect the health and well-being of our students, staff, their families, friends and neighbors by continuing to practice the necessary public health mitigation strategies at school, at home and in our community. Let's work together to ensure that students who want to be in school can stay in school.

This year, a lakefront parking decal is required for **all vehicles** at all lakefront parking lots (in lieu of the discontinued City vehicle sticker). Residents are required to purchase a decal.

#### Fees

**Resident:** \$30 (with proof of residency, see below for details)

Provides parking access every day including holidays through December 31, 2021 at the following beach lots: Lower Rosewood, Upper Rosewood, Park Avenue – North Lot, Central Park – Upper Lot, Millard, and Moraine. Valid dawn to dusk every day.

#### Non-resident: \$285

Provides parking access every day, excluding holidays, through December 31, 2021 to the following beach lots: Upper Rosewood, Park Avenue – North Lot, Central Park – Upper Lot, Millard, and Moraine. Valid dawn to dusk every day, excluding holidays.

**Rosewood Daily Parking**: \$40/4 hours or \$15/hour (*Valid for Upper Rosewood Lot only. Pay for parking in upper lot at autoattendant*). Not valid on holidays (July 4, Memorial Day, and Labor Day). Non-resident daily parking is not allowed at Moraine, Central, Millard, Park Avenue North Lot, Rosewood Lower Lot.

#### **Resident Lakefront Parking Decal Proof of Residency Requirements\***

One of the following proof of residency is required to purchase a Resident Lakefront Parking Decal:



# The Library is Now Fine Free!

## Fines are no longer charged on overdue items in order to provide equitable access to the collection.

### Here's How It Works:

Fines are fees charged for overdue library materials. "Fine free" refers to eliminating fees charged for returning library materials after their due date. Eliminating fines removes barriers to the Library's collection.

While you will no longer be charged a fine, after a Highland Park Public Library item is two weeks overdue, your account will be suspended. Once the item is returned, additional items can be checked out. This includes access to the Library's digital collections such as downloads from Libby, hoopla, kanopy, etc and databases. Items still have due dates and need to be returned in good condition. If items are kept 45 days past their due date or are damaged, you will be charged for the replacement cost.

Please note that materials checked out at other libraries are subject to their fine policies.

Automatic renewals will still be in effect. New items will only renew once; older items will renew twice. An item will not renew if someone else is waiting for it.
