Friendly Spring Reminders from Public Works

Fire Hydrant Flushing Program

During the hydrant flushing process, which begins in spring and is completed before fall, residents may notice discolored or rusty water for a brief period. This is normal and there is no health hazard. Allow a few hours for the discoloration to dissipate and avoid doing laundry at this time. Street signage will be placed in the neighborhood prior to the flushing date. Updates will be included in the City eNews and the Construction Projects Interactive Map at cityhpil.com/construction.

Backflow Prevention Annual Testing Requirement

If you have a lawn irrigation (sprinkler) system, it's time to have a State of Illinois licensed plumber inspect and test your backflow device. A copy of the inspection report is required to be sent to waterplant@cityhpil.com or faxed to 847.926.1193. For more info, please call 847.433.4355 or visit cityhpil.com/backflow.

Driveway Approach, Curb and Sidewalk Maintenance

Code section 93.255 requires property owners to maintain the public sidewalk along the driveway, the driveway approach or apron, and the curb over the driveway. Code requires this infrastructure to be in good condition, free from obstructions and openings, and in safe condition for pedestrian and vehicular travel. Call 847.432.0807 for more information.

Trees on Ravines or Bluffs - Extra Care Needed!

The ravines or bluffs, known as Steep Slope Zone under Highland Park City Code (Chapter 150), are sensitive to disturbance and extra caution is needed to work in this sensitive area. Contact the Department of Public Works Forestry Section for permit requirements. A Building Permit is required for removal of any vegetation, landscaping, or ecological restoration, and any type of construction within Steep Slope Zone. For information related to ravine and bluff maintenance, permit requirements or general inquiries on trees, please contact City Forester Ben Miller, at 847.926.1179 or via bmiller@cityphil.com.

Keeping our Lakes, Rivers and Stormwater Systems Clean

Pollutants that make their way into rivers and lakes have a negative effect on water quality and our health. Stormwater is not treated or cleaned like water that flows into a sanitary (wastewater) system. Residents are reminded to observe the following best practices: 1) Dog waste management - clean up after pets and dispose of waste in trash; 2) Phosphorous-free fertilizers; 3) Proper disposal of household chemical waste; and 4) Swimming pool/hot tub/spa cleanouts - City Ordinance requires that swimming pools be drained directly into a sanitary sewer. Discharging pool water into storm sewers, ravine streams or other natural water bodies is illegal.

Help Ensure Pedestrian Safety

Drivers & bicyclists must come to a complete stop and yield:

- When a pedestrian is in a marked crosswalk
- On school days, when children are in close proximity to a school zone crosswalk

Drivers & bicyclists must yield to pedestrians at any intersection, and:

- When a pedestrian is in an unmarked crosswalk on the driver's side of the roadway and there are no traffic control signals
- When making a lawful turn on a red light after coming to a complete stop at the white painted Stop Bar on the pavement
- After coming to a complete stop

- at a stop sign at the white painted Stop Bar on the pavement, or if none, at the stop sign or for a flashing red signal at an intersection
- When a pedestrian enters a crosswalk before the traffic light changed
- When a pedestrian is walking with a green light, a walking person symbol or a walk signal
- When a pedestrian is leaving or entering a street or highway from an alley, building, private road or driveway

Pedestrians should:

- Use sidewalks and crosswalks when crossing the street.
- Yield the right of way to drivers

- by obeying traffic signals, observing walk lights and using crosswalks
- when crossing the road at any place other than a marked or unmarked crosswalk, including between closely- spaced intersections where traffic signals are in operation
- Walk as close to the outside edge of the road as possible, face oncoming traffic, look and listen for cars if walking in the street is necessary
- Obey railroad gates, and/or warning lights/bells.

Drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians are all responsible for traffic safety. For more information, visit cyberdriveillinois.com.

Lead Information: Learn & Act

In 2021, the US Environmental Protection Agency revised its Lead and Copper Rule and Illinois enacted companion rules intended to eliminate all lead service lines over a period of time. A water service line has two components: the public service line, which is owned and maintained by the City, and the private service line, which is owned and maintained by property owners. To find out if you have a lead, copper, or galvanized steel service on your property, you (or your landlord) can perform a Materials Verification Test on the water service line where it enters your home to determine the material of the water service line on your property.

Public Works has prepared detailed information and FAQs to assist residents with the replacement of private lead service lines, including information on identifying the composition of the private service line and the City's cost-share replacement program. New Agreement with Lakeshore Recycling Systems

New Residential Refuse & Recycling Contract Rates

In March, City Council approved a new five-year agreement with Lakeshore Recycling Systems for residential waste, recycling, and composting services. The new agreement retains the same menu of service options and incorporates changes to the pricing schedule to bring fees in line with the current costs of providing these services. Depending on the type of service selected, customers may see overall cost savings or increases.

A summary of the new pricing schedule is below with monthly costs listed.

Consider Composting!

Highland Park's current curbside composting service allows residents to dispose of compostable materials such as fruit and vegetable peels, eggshells, coffee grounds, paper



napkins, and yard waste in the same curbside bin. Collect kitchen scraps in an inside bin, then dispose of them in the outside bin (or paper yard waste bag) with grass clippings and other organic materials for collection according to your service plan. Compost is one way for individuals to have a big impact on climate change. Composting reduces the amount of food waste that is sent to landfills, lowering methane levels and reducing your carbon footprint while eventually enriching the soil.

Not sure where to start? Visit cityhpil.com/compost for a list of tips from the Solid Waste Agency of Lake County, including:

- Designate a container for collecting food scraps in the kitchen even an empty coffee can will work. It doesn't need to be fancy, but it does need a lid.
- If counter space is limited, consider storing in your fridge/freezer, mount a bin inside cabinet doors or attach inside existing trash and recycling bins.
- Place a sheet of newspaper or a paper towel on the bottom of your container to keep food from sticking. Never use plastic bags.

Additionally, the use of gaspowered leaf blowers is prohibited between May 15 and October 1. Gas-powered leaf blowers may be used for cleaning gutters until June 15. 

Long-Range Facilities Plan Update April 2022

North Shore School District 112 is committed to providing safe and secure learning environments that leverage instructional technology and can adapt to current and future teaching methods. Four years ago, District 112 began implementing a three-part Long Range Facilities Plan to address deferred maintenance and other capital facility needs.

Phase 1, which is now nearly complete, focused on major repairs and renovations to twhe District's two middle schools as well as keeping Oak Terrace Elementary School up to date. Phase 1 required no dedicated tax increase. District 112 now seeks to move on to Phase 2, which is focused on addressing decades of deferred maintenance at five of its elementary schools that range from 61 to 109 years in age. To address these needs, the District is considering placing a bond referendum on the November 2022 ballot. With borrowing costs near historic lows and construction costs rapidly increasing, the Board strongly believes that a bond referendum is the most fiscally prudent approach to address the District's aging facilities.

After Phase 2 is completed, the district will focus on phase 3 which will address necessary improvements to Red Oak School and the early childhood program. Like Phase 1, Phase 3 would not require a dedicated tax increase. District 113 | Spring News

Dear District 113 Community,



Spring has sprung. In high schools that means a non-stop flurry of all kinds of student events and celebrations until June. It's an incredibly busy time and I am so glad that we have reached the point that we are able to focus on these traditional rites of passage that we so look forward to and enjoy. I am happy to report that we will again enjoy graduation ceremonies at Ravinia this year. I will share more on these celebrations in the June issue.

Moving on to other topics of interest to the community. Following a \$1.2 million cut in operations to address the District's structural budget deficit, the District 113 Board of Education has approved staffing for next year. Comparing non-pandemic staffing for the 2021-22 school year to the staffing request for 2022-23 shows an overall reduction of 20.88 FTE, a

1.88 FTE reduction in licensed staff and a 19.0 reduction in non-licensed staff. This reduction allows the District to constrain costs while preserving diverse student programing, comprised of a robust array of electives, including the fine arts.

The Board reviewed a draft of the Master Facilities Plan, the 10-year comprehensive look at facilities needs districtwide. While the draft plan identifies project priorities and the rationale behind those priorities, the Board will soon begin planning a timeline that outlines the ways it can engage the community on this topic, the projects, priorities of the projects, and the funding options, as it continues to refine the MFP in its discussions. As more information becomes available, it will be shared with the community.

District 113 will also seek community input about aligning the schedules of the two schools to best serve all students. The Board has directed administration to apply the lens of "one district, two schools" as part of the evaluation of any operational or instructional changes. Work has already been conducted by a committee of teachers and administrators to collect data on the research, best practices and the schedules of other North Shore high schools as a foundation for these discussions. An external advisory committee made up of administrators, parents, students and Board liaisons, will oversee the gathering of community input that will be part of this analysis that will ultimately become a recommendation to the Board later this year for the 2023-24 school year.

The common theme across all of these topics is community engagement. When you give us your input, you help District 113 continuously improve the educational experiences the community values. It is so important to us that you are involved. I hope you will take the time when opportunities arise to weigh in. We want to be sure we hear from you.

"Who isn't excited to get back to a normal summer," says Julie Nichols, Recreation Program Manager for the Park District of Highland Park. "The wait will soon be over --it may not seem like it now, but summer is coming!"

Fun Under the Sun



Before you know it, Rosewood Beach and Hidden Creek AquaPark will start welcoming

swimmers. And over 1,000 Highland Park summer campers will be geared up and ready for fun times in the great outdoors at the Park District. The harbingers of warm weather -- Sunset Valley Golf Club and the Highland Park Golf Learning Center, and River's Edge Mini Golf Courses are already open for the season!

This summer, the Park District is bringing back summer traditions and new outdoor events that will reconnect residents to our outdoor spaces and introduce them to new



jewels in the Park District's crown. The Preserve of Highland Park officially opens in early June. Located adjacent to the Recreation Center of

Highland Park, The Preserve is a one-of-a-kind natural area for passive recreation that includes green lawns, nature-based play areas, specialized native gardens, restored woodlands, and walking and biking trails that connect neighborhoods, downtown Highland Park, and regional biking trails. Visitors can immerse themselves in the sights, sounds, and experiences of nature and outdoor play.

Preparing for Blast-Off

Also, this summer, Highland Park's iconic Rocketship playground (ages 5 – 12), new nature-themed playground (ages 2-5), and playground seating plaza at Sunset Woods Park will open to the public. The rocket ship play piece was introduced around 1960 and included a rocket ship slide structure. Space theme playgrounds were trendy then as the world was exploring space travel.

In 1971 and again in 1999, the rocket ship was replaced with newer modern versions of their predecessor. Today's modern rocket looks to the future and honors the park's history. The 2022 rocket is the first to feature a launch tower. Kids can pretend to be astronauts launching into space or head to mission control and play recordings of actual NASA space missions. The playground seating plaza was funded by the Parks Foundation of Highland Park and will provide parents with a clear view of both new playgrounds and a relaxing place for a family picnic or to enjoy the park views.

Unique Outdoor Events

On May 21, Heller Nature Center will be transformed into an Enchanted Forest, with activities that will conjure up fairies and gnomes' imaginative and magical world. The event will run from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. and feature pony rides, dancing and entertainment, and a quest to find the fairy and gnome homes in the woods. The gnome and fairy trail will be open through August 5.

According to Nichols, the American tradition of enjoying movies under the stars is back by popular demand. The Park District is offering two "drive-in movie" nights at the Recreation Center with Steven Spielberg's Oscarwinning classic Jurassic Park screening on Thurs., June 16, and the Disney mega-hit High School Musical on Thurs., August 18. Admission is \$30 per car.

HP Traditional 4th of July Returns!

One of the most anticipated events is the Highland Park Fourth of July Celebration. The parade will be back in full force with dignitaries, local businesses and sponsors, marching bands, perennial favorites such as the Jesse White Tumblers, and special guest band, Maggie Speaks. For more information

about how businesses and organizations can register for the parade, visit cityhpil.com. Fourth Fest will also return to Sunset Woods Park from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. with music, food vendors, inflatables, bounce houses, and larger carnival rides, including a Ferris wheel and dizzying Berry Spin. The Independence Day celebration wraps up at Wolters Field for the Bitter Jester Music Festival and the Fireworks Show.

Connecting Through Recreation
On July 9, the Park District will participate in Illinois' fourth annual Unplug Illinois campaign, created by the Illinois Park and Recreation Association to encourage families to step away from their electronic devices and share in creative outdoor activities. Throughout the day, Park District facilities and outdoor recreational spaces will offer a variety of interactive activities, from a simple trail stroll to soap bubble-making.

The Park District is also throwing an old-fashioned family hoedown on July 22 from 5:30 -7:30 p.m. at The Preserve. The hoedown will feature traditional games, a hula hoop contest, and music by the local children's band, Miss Jamie on the Farm. There will be food vendors, but participants are welcome to bring a picnic.

As the summer comes to a close, the Park District will host an Open House at West Ridge Center on August 25. This free event will spotlight the Park District's launch of a cultural and performing arts division and preview upcoming preschool, childhood and youth enrichment programs that will include a new dance program, new art classes, drama, and private music lessons for piano and voice and ukulele, as well as languages, cooking, STEM and one day programs.

"We are all eagerly awaiting warmer days to "get out and get busy," Nichols says. "The Park District has amazing activities planned all summer to help you with your summer fun and create family memories."
