

A current rabies vaccination certificate is required for renewal if the vaccination listed on the dog license application has passed its expiration date. Turn Off Idling Engines

Idling is when a driver leaves the engine running while the vehicle is parked. Unnecessary idling is bad for the environment, wastes fuel, and increases engine wear and tear. The American Lung Association recommends the following to reduce unnecessary idling.

If you're waiting for more than 10 seconds, turn off the ignition. Did you know that idling for 10 seconds wastes more gas than restarting your engine?

Warm up your car by driving, not by idling. Even in winter, today's engines do not need to warm up. A vehicle's engine warms up twice as quickly when driven.

Protect your engine by idling less. Frequent restarts are no longer hard on car's engine or battery. You'll also save money on wasted fuel and decrease wear by not operating your car longer than necessary.

The City's local regulation states, "No vehicles shall be left unattended while the motor of such vehicle is running; and no vehicle shall be left without a driver on any hill or incline unless the vehicle is secured against moving." (Municipal Code Section 71.245).

Back to School Safety Reminders from the Police Department

The City works closely with both School Districts to improve traffic flow, parking options, drop-off and pick-up locations and procedures and signage at and around many schools. City of Highland Park Police Department presence and enforcement efforts at and near schools should be expected in an effort to encourage traffic compliance to keep our community safe.

Please help increase traffic and pedestrian safety by following the rules below.

- Learn where designated drop-off and pick-up areas are located at your child's school are and utilize them. Do not use City streets for drop-off and pick-up; this greatly increases risk to children and pedestrians.
- Encourage children to use school buses and carpools to reduce the amount of vehicle traffic and pollution.
- Obey existing State and City traffic and parking laws at all times.
- Do not pass stopped school buses which are loading or unloading passengers while its lights are flashing and its stop signal arm is extended.
- Obey State laws and City ordinances pertaining to Electronic Communication Devices and Wireless Telephone use.



The City of Highland Park's top priority is to provide public safety. The City of Highland Park Police Department continues to partner with both North Shore School District 112 and Township High School District 113 to provide the highest levels of school safety. A Police Resource Officer is stationed at Highland Park High School and at District 112. The resource officers proactively work with students and staff to provide education on a variety of safety issues. The Highland Park Police will continue to work diligently to ensure that our community is safe.

Electronics and Foam Recycling Center

Electronic items such as televisions, monitors, computers and printers are some of the most common household items not allowed to be placed in regular trash pick-up. What should you do to dispose them? Stop by City of Highland Park's Recycling Center!

City of Highland Park, partnering with the Solid Waste Agency of Lake County (SWALCO), provides a drop-off recycling site, conveniently located in our City, for Lake County residents.

The Recycling Center, located at 1180 Half Day Road, is open year-round on Tuesdays and the first Saturday of each month, from 7 AM to 1 PM (closed on City-observed holidays). Electronic items to be dropped off should be free of any packaging material. Recycle packaging materials such as cardboard boxes and printed manuals should be disposed with your regular household recycling wastes. In addition to electronics, other items accepted at Recycling Center include #6 foam, unbroken fluorescent light bulbs and rechargeable batteries. Clothing and textile recycling is also available in a self-service collection bin located near the Recycling Center. *Please note Recycling Center accepts electronic items only from residen-*

tial properties, no commercial, institutional or governmental electronics items will be accepted.

In addition to electronics and foam, the Recycling Center also participates in Reuse-A-Shoe program. Not only are old shoes given a second life and kept out of landfills. Pairs of shoes (all types except for rollerblades, ice skates and winter boots) should be dropped off at the Recycling Center. Shoes should be tied together or paired with a rubber band.

As a reminder, City of Highland Park residents' current waste hauler, Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS) allows one large electronic waste item to be placed curbside on the customer's first pickup of each month at no additional charge. However, items over 50 pounds will incur additional fees. To ensure your electronic recycling items are collected, you must call LRS at 773.685.8811 to schedule your pick-up.

Our Community



970 Sheridan Road - George Pick House

The house at 970 Sheridan Road, built in 1915, is for sale in Highland Park and residents are wondering about its history and the threat of losing the house to demolition. The house was designed by Howard Van Doren Shaw and represents one of his most eclectic endeavors. Although it is an atypical example, it has elements of the Italian Renaissance Revival style. The front of the three-story house is highlighted by an arcaded entry with impressive Roman arches. A front-facing twin gable roof is ornamented with curved bargeboard. Unusual features include the carved limestone birds that sit atop columns and are tucked into niches. The house was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1982.

Howard Van Doren Shaw (1869-1926) was a prolific and well-known North Shore architect who had a wide influence on other architectural practitioners in the area. A nationally respected architect, he designed residential, religious, and institutional buildings in the Chicago area, across the Midwest, and around the country. Although he is best known for his large country estates, including houses in Lake Forest, Evanston, and Highland Park, other commissions included the Goodman Theater at the Art Institute, the Lakeside Press Building near Chicago's McCormick Place, and Market Square, the center of Lake Forest's commercial district. The house is named after George Pick, its first owner. He came to Chicago from Milwaukee in 1905 and worked in the insurance business. After success in that field, he opened the George W. Pick investment company with offices on LaSalle Street. He passed away aged 68 while overseas in 1937.

The next owners were the Gidwitz family. Gerald Gidwitz (b. 1906) is best known as the co-founder of the Helene Curtis cosmetics company. He married Jane Blumenthal in 1944 and they settled in Highland Park. They had five children and among them was Ronald, who was an Illinois gubernatorial candidate in the 2006 Republican primary.

If the house is up for demolition, a notification sign will be posted on the property and it will appear on an agenda of the Historic Preservation Commission for a historic review. The Commission has the authority to delay the demolition for up to a year while alternatives to demolition are explored. But the Commission cannot designate the property as a historic landmark without the property owner's permission.



My Medical Information Refrigerator Magnet Program

The Fire Department has identified a way to improve service to the community with the Refrigerator Magnet Program, designed to improve efficiency and accuracy of service when responding to emergency medical calls at residences.

Time-on-scene is crucial when delivering patient care. There are many important functions that the responders must perform simultaneously when a patient is suffering from an injury or medical emergency to expedite proper treatment, delivery to the hospital, and the passing of care to the proper medical personnel.

One of the key functions is the sharing of accurate information about the patient's condition, history, allergies and medications. It is important to have as much accurate information about that patient as possible, even the location of a Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) order or Living Will if the patient has one. The Fire Department provides an information card that is inserted into a plastic sleeve with a magnet on the back, designed to be placed on a resident's refrigerator. Hav-



ing this information in written form, readily available, reduces the on-scene time, and assures that accurate medical history and patient wishes are communicated to healthcare workers, especially in cases where the patient is unresponsive or unable to speak. The medical information card includes a plastic sleeve, magnet and an easy to use medical information card.

Back-To-School 2019-2020

It's back to school time in District 112! Students return to school on August 19 - staff return on August 15 for the Institute Day. This has been an exciting and busy summer across the District. Our largest project is the Northwood Middle School Construction Project. Following the groundbreaking, in June we started construction in July. Summer Staff and Leadership Development

The entire leadership team attended the HUMANeX Ventures 10th annual Impact & Legacy Summit on June 25-26 in Kalamazoo, MI. This professional development was designed to energize leaders and provide an understanding of their impact in creating sustained legacies of excellence in the District. Lessons learned will be applied to our schools for the students and staff.

ALICE Training

On July 29-30, the district hosted a 'train-the-trainer' professional development on an options based safety protocol known as ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate). Building and District leaders, representative staff from the NSSD 112 Safety Committee, and a team of Highland Park and Highwood police officers were trained together over the course of two days to enhance safety preparedness skills. ALICE training provides preparation situational awareness training on how to proactively handle the threat of an aggressive intruder or active shooter event. The district plans to train all staff in the near future and students as well. Additional information will be provided to parents as the district implements this important safety enhancement.

Teaching and Learning

This summer the Teaching and Learning department worked with teachers from across the District to develop curriculum and guides to prepare for the 2019-2020 school year. This included the development of vocabulary to accompany the units of study in middle school language arts; collaboration between Spanish and French teachers for implementation of the new world language resources; work to prioritize Illinois Learning Standards for implementation of the new social studies curriculum resources; Middle School math teachers worked on unit planning and attended the Math Learning Center Leadership Institute; teachers collaborated to develop Music curriculum for grades K-8 curriculum scope and sequence and pacing; and many other areas of professional development and curricular planning.

The Big Three Focus areas for 2019-2020

Portrait of a Graduate - The Modern Learning Committee has been working on a Portrait of a District 112 Graduate - stay tuned for more information as we "begin with the end in mind" as we best prepare our students.

Closing Achievement Gaps - Student Learning for ALL (special report to the Board on October 1). We are so proud of the impact and initial success from the teaching and learning reforms implemented over the past three years across the District.

Facilities Upgrades & Modernization - Continuing the Northwood project and finalizing plans for the Edgewood Middle School modernization as well as ongoing upkeep of all school facilities.




