The Mayor, City Council, and staff wish all Highland Park residents and businesses a very happy and safe holiday season. City offices will be closed on Monday, Dec. 26, Monday, January 2 and Monday, Jan. 16, in observance of Christmas Day, New Year's Day and Martin Luther King, Ir.'s birthday, respectively. Residents may call the non-emergency public assistance line at 847.432.7730 if required.

Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS) observes the Christmas and New Year holidays on the Monday after. All refuse and recycling pickups will be delayed one day. The normal weekly schedule resumes Monday, January 9. There is no change to service for Martin Luther King Day or the week of January 16. Permanent Memorial



差 Holiday Tree Disposal/Recycling

LRS will collect non-artificial Christmas trees as organic material on Jan. 2 – Jan. 27 at no cost, free of any tinsel, ornaments or lights. Trees can be left loose (never in bags), curbside or at the end of your driveway. Due to snow and ice, trees may not always be taken on your primary service day, but LRS drivers and trucks will be in the community for the majority of the month making these pickups. Please feel free to contact LRS at 844.633.3577.

The Park District will accept dropped-off trees free of decorations, wires or any other materials for recycling through January 22. Drop-off locations are in posted areas of parking lots at Larry Fink Park, 1377 Deer Creek Parkway, and Danny Cunniff Park, 2700 Trailway. Winter Walking And Cycling - Wear Reflective Gear And Be Safe!

Winter brings snowy conditions, dark nights with low moonlight, overcast skies, and inclement weather which decrease motorists' visibility. Everyone is responsible for taking safety precautions. Pedestrians and bikers should:

- Always wear reflective and light-colored clothing.
- Wear LED arm-bands, flashlights, and reflective material to increase visibility. Lots of reflective material is best!
- Don't assume drivers can see you.
- Pets should have a leash or harness with reflective material or LEDs, especially for walking at night.

- Use sidewalks where available; avoid walking or jogging in the street. If no sidewalk is available, walk or jog against the flow of traffic so you can see vehicles coming towards you.
- Avoid wearing headphones and be attentive.

Drivers should avoid unnecessary travel during snowstorms and severe weather where possible. During snowy conditions, drive slowly with headlights on, but avoid using bright lights, which can increase glare and reflection from falling snow. For information, please contact Sgt. Healthy Tree Care

Every winter, Public Works performs preventative maintenance on approximately 29,000 public trees. Parkway trees are pruned for proper form and structure, clearance over the streets and sidewalks, and removal of dead/dying limbs, resulting in trees that are more resistant to storm damage and longer-lived. This season, Advanced Tree Care will prune parkway trees in portions of region 1 (south of Park Avenue West and north Northland Avenue) and begin work in region 2 (southwest corner of Highland Park). Rew: Passport Digital Parking Permits

The City has entered into a contract with Passport Mobile Parking to provide a digital parking system for the community. Daily Commuter Parking Permits and formerly metered spaces is anticipated to begin in December. The purchase of new digital parking permits for 2023 begins on Dec. 19. For Student Parking Permit holders, the new system will go into effect in the second semester. When the program launches, daily commuter permit parking will be available for purchase only through the Passport website, mobile app, or at one of seven cashless (credit/ debit only) payment kiosks placed throughout the parking system.

Signage indicating the appropriate zone number to use when paying by the mobile app is in place at all Passport parking locations. Passport Parking via the website and the Apple App Store/Android Google Play mobile apps is free to download and use. However, usual parking rates still apply. Visit cityhpil.com/parking to learn more and access the Passport mobile parking website when it is launched.

Daily Commuter Parking Permit Buy-Back Program

As the community transitions to Passport Parking solutions, a "buy-back" program will reimburse those who pre-purchased Daily Commuter Parking Permit hang tags. The City will buy back these unused hang-tag permits through March 31, 2023. Applications for refunds will be accepted at the City Hall Finance Counter during normal business hours (Monday by appointment, Tues.-Fri. 8:30 AM - 5:00 PM). Individuals should bring in all unused Daily Permit hang tags as well and complete an application requiring name, address, phone number, and email address so that a refund may be issued by the City. Refunds will not be given over the counter; they will be processed through the City's accounts payable system and a refund check will be issued. Holiday Fire Safety Tips from the Highland Park Fire Department

If a live tree is used, be sure it is a fresh tree that is not shedding needles and keep it well watered.

Make sure a testing laboratory such as UL labels all holiday lighting. Replace worn out light sets or those with loose connections, and use only approved lighting for outdoor use. Unplug all lights and extinguish all candles before going to bed or leaving home.

Keep lit candles away from curtains or combustible materials and never put them in windows or near exits. Keep matches and candles out of the reach of children.

Do not burn garbage in a fireplace. Before lighting a fire, make sure the flue is open. Burning wrappings can create a flash fire. The fireplace should be protected by a wire screen or glass doors to prevent embers or sparks from shooting out. Never keep flammable material in front of a fireplace.

Assist the Fire Department by making sure your address is visible at all times. Instruct your plowing service not to place snow mounds that will block or cover any fire hydrants.



Snow Removal Guidelines

Removing snow from one parcel of property and depositing it onto another parcel (including the adjacent public parkway) without consent of the property owner is a violation. The code does provide an exemption to allow plow operators to deposit snow on the City parkway immediately adjacent to and on the same side of the street as the property from which the snow is being removed. Please inform private snow removal companies of the Snow Removal Ordinance provisions. Snow plow operators observed improperly

depositing snow in violation of the ordinance will be cited; residents are ultimately responsible for compliance and may also be cited. A violation may subject the snow removal company and/ or originating property owner to a fine of up to \$200. The

abutting property or business owners should clean the public sidewalks for snow events with less than 4" of snow. Public sidewalk routes will be plowed after accumulation of 4 inches. This



process of clearing residential sidewalks can take up to 72 hours as streets and high pedestrian foot traffic areas take priority. For more information, contact Sgt. Galati at 847,432,7730 or agalati@cityhpil.com.



Volunteer Snow Shoveling

Low-income elderly and disabled residents may register in advance to request volunteer snow shoveling assistance when there is a snowfall of 2" or more. Every effort will be made to secure and dispatch a volunteer team to assist within 48 hours. The homeowner must provide shovels, ice-melting materials, etc. Volunteers and recipients will be required to complete City liability waivers. Snow Ordinance

Winter parking restrictions are in effect through Mar. 31, 2023. Vehicles may not be parked for more than 15 minutes on any public streets between 2:00-6:00 AM, regardless of weather conditions.

On November 8, 2022, the community voted 72% in favor of Phase 2 of the Long-Range Facilities Plan, which calls for the upgrade and modernization of Ravinia, Indian Trail, Braeside, Wayne Thomas, and Sherwood Schools over the next several years and funds \$6MM (six million dollars) towards investments in immediate security upgrades at all campuses.

WHAT NOW

The logistical challenges and opportunities now presented come at a scope and magnitude never before seen by the District. However, we have short, medium, and long-term plans in place to effectively manage an unprecedented period of change, transitions, and modernization. Here is a look at the first few steps of this transformation.

January 2023

District administrative staff and administration personnel will move to alternative office space in January 2023. The final plans for the administration will be part of Phase 3 of the Long-Range Facilities Plan.

The District will lease temporary warehouse space in January 2023 for 12-18 months, as the current District operations warehouse (located at Indian Trail) will be vacated & converted into the Central Production Kitchen as part of Phase 2 of the Long-Range Facilities Plan. The permanent plan for the warehouse is slated to be part of Phase 3, and might be completed sooner.

June 2023

The District's Early Childhood Center Pre-Kindergarten program will temporarily move to classrooms at Lincoln School after the school year in June 2023. The final plans for the Early Childhood Center are called for in Phase 3 of the Long-Range Facilities Plan. Indian Trail Elementary School will temporarily move to the Elm Place School site after the school year in June 2023.

Ravinia Elementary School will temporarily move to the Green Bay School site after the school year in June 2023. Construction at Indian Trail and Ravinia Schools, part of Phase 2 of the Long-Range Facilities Plan, is estimated to last until March 2025.

Fall 2023

The construction work to build the Central Production Kitchen will start in 2023. The kitchen will provide a District-wide hot food service program for all students at all K-8 campuses. This equitable approach to nutrition, wellness, lunch, and overall health of the students will be another improvement for our community for the first time in its history. The new food service program will be introduced in the coming years. More information will be shared.

The District 113 community has found resilience and renewed commitment in adapting to a global pandemic and a local horror. This year marks a pivot from finding stronger shared purpose to build and build upon structures and practices to allow us to focus and concentrate our work on long-term goals. These long-term goals will make District 113 even better and support the success of all students, not just as scholars but as whole people. As we experienced the past two years, we are stronger and can achieve more when we work together, and we look forward to working with our dedicated teachers and parents to get this right.

However you celebrate the holidays, I hope they are joyful.
