



December & January Holiday Reminders

The Mayor, City Council, and staff wish all Highland Park residents and businesses a very happy and safe holiday season. City offices will be closed on Friday, December 25, Friday, January 1 and Monday, January 18, in observance of Christmas Day, New Year's Day and Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, respectively. Call the Public Safety Switchboard at **847.432.7730** for assistance.

Refuse and recycling will not be collected on Fridays, December 25 and January 1. Customers with Friday collection will be serviced on Saturday, one day after their regular collection day. Please contact Lakeshore Recycling Systems with any questions at **773.685.8811** or visit **LRSrecycles.com**. *Please note that there is no change to the refuse and recycling schedule the week of January 18.*



Holiday Tree Disposal/Recycling

Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS) will collect, transport, and dispose of holiday trees left curbside and free of decorations by all customers on their primary collection day, January 2 through January 22. A sticker is not required. Contact LRS at **773. 685.8811** with questions.

Residents may also drop-off trees free of decorations, wires or any other materials for recycling by the Park District through January 24. Drop-off locations are in posted areas of parking lots at Larry Fink Park, 1377 Deer Creek Parkway, and Danny Cuniff Park, 2700 Trailway. Park District crews chip the trees for use as mulch. Volunteer Snow Shoveling for Low-Income Elderly & Disabled

The City offers a volunteer snow shoveling program to serve low-income elderly and disabled residents. Income-qualified individuals requesting assistance from the Volunteer Snow Shoveling Program may register in advance by calling Jennifer Aiello at **847.432.4110**. After a snowfall of 2 inches or more, registered individuals may request assistance with shoveling the home's driveway and walkway; every effort will be made to secure and dispatch a volunteer team to assist within 48 hours. The homeowner is responsible for providing shovels, ice-melting materials, etc. Volunteers and recipients will be required to complete City liability waivers. Warming Centers

Warming centers operate on an ad hoc basis to assist residents during emergencies such as power outages. Face coverings are required for all over the age of two, and individuals should follow all other COVID-19 regulations. Please do not visit a warming center if you have COVID-19 symptoms, have tested positive for COVID-19 even if asymptomatic, or have been exposed to a confirmed case. COVID-19 Holiday Guidance & Vaccine Distribution

Safe Holiday Celebrations Public health officials recommend that holiday gatherings be limited to your immediate household only. Please celebrate virtually as the CDC has determined that in-person gatherings contribute to the exponential rise in COVID-19 cases. However, the CDC and IDPH have issued guidelines for those who do choose to host in-person holiday events, including:

- All gatherings are limited to 10 or fewer guests. Face coverings should be worn at all times, except when eating or drinking.
- Outdoor activities are preferable. If indoors, open windows to allow fresh air to circulate.
- Do not travel if you are sick with fever, cough, or other symptoms of COVID-19. Do not travel if you have recently tested positive for COVID-19, are waiting for the results of a test, or have had close contact in the past 14 days with a person who has tested positive.

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Winter Walking And Cycling - Wear Reflective Gear And Be Safe!

Dark nights and snowy conditions don't deter pet owners or avid joggers, walkers, and bicyclists from enjoying outdoor activities in winter! However, low moonlight, overcast skies, and inclement weather significantly decrease motorists' visibility.

It is everyone's responsibility to take safety precautions when sharing the road. Pedestrians and bikers should follow these safety tips:

- Always wear reflective and light-colored clothing.
- Wear LED arm-bands, flashlights, and reflective material to increase visibility. Lots of reflective material is best!
- Don't assume drivers can see you.
- Pets should have a leash or harness with reflective material or LEDs, especially for walking at night.
- Use sidewalks where available; avoid walking or jogging in the street. If no sidewalk is available, walk or jog against the flow of traffic so you can see vehicles coming towards you.
- Avoid wearing headphones and be attentive.

Drivers should avoid unnecessary travel during snowstorms and severe weather where possible. During snowy conditions, drive slowly with headlights on, but avoid using bright lights, which can increase glare and reflection from falling snow.

2020-2021 Snow & Ice Control Plan

Public Works proactively monitors weather reports and works closely with Public Safety officers to ensure efficiency. Timely response and effective execution against variable weather conditions are essential.

When are specific streets plowed? Under normal conditions, all streets are plowed at least once within the first six hours of a three-inch or less snowfall. Initial snow removal operations are staged simultaneously throughout the City and multiple plowing passes along streets are required to move snow to the curb. Response times can vary depending on the magnitude, duration, and timing of the storm. Snow removal operations will continue until all public streets are passable and all parking areas have been cleared.

Why do plows fill driveway approaches? Plows must make multiple passes to push snow back to the curbs. Plows initially traverse the center of each street so that cars can travel in both directions, then return to push the snow back to the curbs. This allows melting snow to enter the storm sewers or other drainage systems. The City has approximately 10,000 residential driveways and unfortunately, it is not possible for plow trucks to turn the snow blade away at each driveway.

How is salt application managed? Initial salting efforts concentrate on hills, intersections and inherently hazardous areas. Salt and salt-brine help break the bond of snow and ice from the street surface while minimizing the use of salt, expediting snow removal and improving driving conditions.

How should drivers navigate the road when encountering a snow plow? The large, heavy snow plow trucks are difficult to maneuver, especially in less than optimal driving conditions when snowy conditions reduce visibility. Plow trucks

also generate slush which can further obscure visibility, so it is important to always stay clear of snow removal equipment.

What assistance can residents provide? Observe street parking restrictions and avoid parking on the street until after the road has been cleared after a significant snowfall event. City ordinance prohibits parking on City streets and public parking lots between 2 AM and 6 AM from Dec. 1 - Mar. 31.

If a contractor plows your driveway, ensure the snow is not pushed onto a neighbor's property. The City prohibits removing snow or ice from any building, private property, driveway, driveway approach or public sidewalk and depositing it onto public streets where it can create a traffic hazard for motorists, especially on streets that have already been plowed.

What if a snow plow damages my property or mailbox? Snow plowing is performed under challenging weather and traffic conditions and areas adjacent to a street can occasionally be inadvertently damaged. Hardscape or streetscape items within the right-of-way are the homeowner's responsibility. Lawns damaged inadvertently by a City plow truck within the City right of way will be repaired the following spring, upon notification from the homeowner. Report a mailbox damaged by a City plow or equipment to Public Works at **847.432.0807** within 48 hours. The City will place a temporary mailbox and then either repair the damage or reimburse the resident up to \$65 for the purchase and installation of a replacement.



Snow Removal Guidelines

It is a violation to remove snow from one parcel of property and deposit it onto another parcel (including the adjacent public parkway) without consent of the property owner. The code does provide an exemption to allow plow operators to deposit snow on the City parkway located immediately adjacent to and on the same side of the street as the property from which the snow is being removed. Property owners should inform their private snow removal companies of the Snow Removal Ordinance provisions. Snow plow operators observed improperly

depositing snow in violation of the ordinance will be cited; however, residents are ultimately responsible for compliance and may also be cited. A violation may subject the snow removal company and/or originating property owner to a fine of up to \$200. It is the responsibility of the abutting property or business owners to clean the public sidewalks for snow events with less than 4" of snow. Public sidewalk routes will be plowed after accumulation of 4 inches. This process of



clearing residential sidewalks can take up to 72 hours as streets and high pedestrian foot traffic areas take priority. For more information, please contact Police Sgt. Galati at **847.432.7730** or agalati@cityhpil.com.

Community Solar Program

Residents may register now to reserve space on one of the community solar projects participating in a new community solar program developed with neighboring North Shore communities and the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus. Highland Park ComEd customers can support solar development in Illinois and save 20% on electricity bills without installing or maintaining solar equipment on their property. Once the community solar project is complete, residents on the reservation list will be notified to subscribe on a first-come, first-served basis. There is no cost to put your name on the reservation list, and you can remove your name at any time. Once the ComEd customer agrees to subscribe, the subscriber's billing will be a seamless two-stage process. First, the net metering credits for your share of the generation created by the community solar project will be applied to your monthly ComEd electric utility bill. Second, after you have received your net metering credits from ComEd, MC Squared Energy Services, LLC. will bill you for 80% of the net metering credits – leaving you with a discount of 20% of all net metering credits. Tree Pruning for Healthy Tree Care!

The City has been recognized as a Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation for the 40th year. Highland Park is known for its ravines, bluffs, open spaces, and urban forest canopy. We are regionally recognized as a leader in preserving trees during construction, as our tree ordinance balances development and preservation.

The Department of Public Works Forestry Section manages approximately 30,000 public trees, divided into seven regions. Every winter, the urban forestry program performs preventative maintenance by inspecting and pruning trees in one of seven regions. This systematic maintenance program ensures that City trees provide the greatest return on invest-

ment. The annual tree pruning program inspects for the health and safety of parkway trees. Parkway trees are pruned for proper form and structure, for clearance over the street and sidewalk, and for removing dead and dying limbs. This results in street trees that are more resistant to storm damage, such as the Derecho on August 10, 2020, and longer-lived.

Moraine Township Helping Neighbors Through This Crisis



As 2020 closes, Moraine Township would like to thank our community for joining with us to help provide a safety net for residents.

In mid-March -- seems like a lifetime ago -- we closed the Food Pantry from "shopping" to "drive-through" to ensure the safety of our clients, volunteers and staff. Our amazing community stepped up and provided the resources to purchase food in lieu of dropping food off as in days of yore, and that support has grown and continued as Food Pantry visits soared during the fall and winter.

We are purchasing and distributing healthy shelf-stable food, dairy, meat, produce and multi-grain bread weekly from local stores and

vendors, distributing cleaning supplies and personal care products monthly, and grocery gift cards to local stores whenever possible. Our amazing and generous community makes this possible.

With low-income hourly workers in the service industry being laid off in the spring and again this winter, through November Moraine Township distributed over \$60,000 of rent, utility and other assistance to help residents weather this crisis. We also helped households sign up for SNAP, utility assistance, Medicaid and health insurance as needed and eligible.

For many of us, 2020 has been a difficult year, but for some of our neighbors, it has been a health and economic crisis. The saying "we're all in this together" has never resonated more. District 113 | Update On Second Semester Plans



Dear District 113 Community,

As this issue of The Highlander goes to print, we want to share some important updates with you regarding plans for second semester.

At its November 23 meeting, consistent with how it has reviewed data and recommendations in the last several months, the Board voted unanimously to affirm the Superintendent's decisions on the following items:

Due to the current high level of community COVID-19 transmission, transition to Remote Learning Plus Virtual Services effective November 21. This decision will be re-evaluated by the Board at its February meeting based on current public health data.

As soon as pandemic public health metrics safely allow, transition back to Remote Learning Plus In-Person Services. This will include the development of additional academic-based services.

We are grateful to our families, our staff and our community for all they have done to support our students during this incredibly difficult time. In particular, we would like to thank our teachers and other staff who continue to engage our students through the many remote services that are available while we wait for this current surge of the virus to subside.

While this holiday season may not be like the ones we have celebrated in previous years, it is still a time to be grateful and to celebrate all that we hold dear.

Please continue to practice the three Ws - wash your hands, wear a mask, watch your distance, and let's add a fourth W - wish everyone a happy, healthy and, hopefully, a much better 2021.

Park District of Highland Park Board of Commissioners Approves 2021 Flat Tax Levy

In an effort to provide relief to Highland Park property owners, the Park Board of Commissioners approved a Truth in Taxation Resolution for a 0% increase for the Park District's 2021 tax levy. As a result, the Park District plans to levy \$11,743,050 in 2021, keeping the percent increase flat in comparison to 2020. The Park District's portion of residents' property tax is approximately 7%.

"This has been an exceptionally challenging year for our residents," said Barney Ruttenberg, president of the Park Board of Commissioners. "Throughout the pandemic, the Park District has adjusted its operations and programming to provide safe and healthy recreational outlets for our community's physical, emotional, and mental well-being. We feel it is our responsibility to do more for our residents struggling with the financial ramifications of this on-going pandemic. Through careful planning and cost-saving strategies, we can keep our tax levy flat for 2021 to provide much-needed relief for our residents during this unprecedented time."

The 2021 Park District flat tax levy includes a combination of a 2.3% Consumer Price Index (CPI) increase in its "tax capped funds," new growth estimated to be approximately \$25 million, and a reduction in the Special Recreation Fund levy from .04% to .0245%. The Special Recreation Fund is used for the Park District's Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) capital improvements, member fees for the Northern Suburban Special Recreation Association (NSSRA), and program inclusion fees for participants with special needs. Due to COVID-19, there was a reduction in Special Recreation Fund expenses in 2020. As a result, \$682,550.32 will be added to the Special Recreation Fund's balance in 2021, allowing the Park District to lower the 2021 Levy for this Fund.

"Because of the decreased expenditures in 2020, the reduction in the 2021 Special Recreation Fund levy will not reduce our ability to continue with planned ADA capital improvements, complete projects that require ADA accommodations in the coming years, or meet obligations to NSSRA, including support for the renovation of their new administrative building," said Brian Romes, executive director of the Park District of Highland Park.

"It is our goal to continue creating a safe environment for our residents while creating innovative ways to participate in recreational programs and services. Through efficient and fiscally responsible planning, we aspire to ensure the Park District will continue providing essential recreational outlets for our residents in the short and long-term as our community and our country perseveres through this difficult time," said Ruttenberg.



Financial Aid for Restaurants & Retailers Grant Program

The City will reimburse up to 50% of eligible COVID-19 operational expenses for qualifying restaurants and retailers, up to a maximum of \$5,000 for retailers and \$10,000 for restaurants.

2021 Fee Waivers & Deferrals

- Registration fees for businesses occupying 7,000 sq. ft. or less are waived.
- Restaurant license fees are waived.
- 50% of liquor license fees for restaurants and hotels are waived, with payment of the balance deferred until June 30, 2021.
