## 🛕 Illinois Smoke Alarm Update

Effective Jan. 1, 2023, the Illinois Smoke Alarm Law requires residents to replace old smoke alarms with removable batteries with new appliances which use a long-term, 10-year sealed battery. This does not apply to hardwired alarms.

I am pleased to present the 2023 State of the City of Highland Park. I'd like to begin by recognizing my City Council colleagues – Tony Blumberg, Michelle Holleman, Annette Lidawer, Adam Stolberg, Kim Stone, and Andrés Tapia. Our collaborative and respectful partnership has been critical as we have faced the challenges of this past year. The expertise and professionalism of each member of our team has proven to be an enormous asset to our community. Thank you for your dedication and unwavering commitment to the people we represent.

We are all deeply grateful for the leadership and dedication of our staff. We are particularly thankful for the steady leadership of City Manager Neukirch, senior staff, and corporation counsel Steve Elrod. We have been impressed and inspired, but not surprised by the way in which staff have served our community during this difficult time, with many going well above and beyond their usual scope to respond to the tragedy and at the same time, ensuring that day-to-day City business continued with minimal interruption.

The Highland Park shooting was the darkest day in the history of our town. Seven precious lives were taken while dozens of others were injured in under a minute. We keep every one of them and their families in our hearts. Each of us carries the weight of the Highland Park shooting: the unspeakable grief of the families whose loved ones were violently taken from them, the ongoing challenges for all who were injured, the lasting mental and emotional trauma experienced by individuals in attendance, and the consequences this has wrought on us all: residents, business owners and employees,

neighbors, and City staff alike.

As a community, we turned our pain into action. Finally, after persevering for ten years, urging those who could do something to take the next step, we welcomed the State of Illinois banning these combat weapons from our state.

What I have come to understand both in my own journey and in speaking with community members of all ages and experiences, is that while our lives changed irrevocably on that day, who we are as individuals, as a community, as one Highland Park did not change. We are a welcoming city, committed to encouraging engagement from all residents and fostering diversity, equity, inclusion and transparency in our government and our policy initiatives. We build partnerships across sectors to assist our neighbors, and seek out opportunities to help others, even when we ourselves are in need of support. These priorities -and more - have not changed. In fact, our commitment to them has only intensified.

Together, as a team of elected officials and professional staff, our goal is always to provide our community with the highest standard of excellence in City administration, regardless of the challenges that come our way. Our commitment to the City's four core priorities – fiscal stability, public safety, infrastructure investment, and community vibrancy – guide us in making decisions large and small.

Thanks to the careful administration of the City's resources, we begin 2023 with a balanced operating budget for the twelfth consecutive year. The City's budget is our most important policy document, identifying the scope of work for a given year, summarizing our transparent approach to fiscal management, and establishing long-term priorities for a sustainable and resilient future. Built on this foundation, we are proud to maintain our Aaa bond rating, the highest rating available and an indicator of our fiscal strength and prudence.

Investing in Highland Park's business community through a variety of attraction and retention efforts continues to be a priority for the City, and in 2022 we listened to the feedback of businesses and residents and created an exciting new seasonal event space in Downtown Highland Park: The Lot. Planning for the 2023 season began in late 2022.

## Water Service Reminders

Prevent Frozen Pipes Help prevent frozen pipes within your home. Ensure pipes are insulated, especially those located on outside walls, basements, attics, or crawl spaces. Seal drafts and air leaks near water pipes and keep the house heated, even when on vacation. If extreme low temperatures persist, let warm water (*pencil size flow*) run from one of the upper-level faucets. During winter, garden hoses should be disconnected and drained.

**Street Salting & Water Quality** As part of snow and ice removal, the City applies a combination of salt (*sodium chloride*) and brine solution to minimize salt pollution. The impact to Lake Michigan, the City's drinking water source, is minimal due to controlled application of salt usage and the dilution factor within our sewers and ravines prior to outfall. The City's drinking water has sodium and chloride concentrations well below the recommendation and standard, measured at 12 mg/L and 21 mg/L, respectively.

## My Water Use Program

The City's My Water Use program provides a secure, web-based portal with water usage information, leak notices, tailored recommendations and more. Residents can also set water use alerts based on preferences. Sign up using your water account number at mywateruse.cityhpil.com.

Although this software is not used for billing purposes, it does utilize billing data to generate helpful information. In cases in which live meter readings are not available, the system will use assumptions based on previously billed usage. ## Forestry Reminders

#### Monitor & Take Action on Private Diseased or Dead Trees

Diseased or dead trees located on private property should be assessed by a Certified Arborist, especially those with destabilizing root decay that may become hazardous.

A Tree Removal Permit is required for removal of any tree with a trunk diameter greater than 8 inches as measured from 4.5 feet above the ground. There is no fee charged for a permit to remove a dead, dying, or diseased tree. Learn more about Tree Removal Permits at cityhpil.com/trees.

#### **Green Bay Trail Call for Volunteers**

Since 2017, the City has been removing invasive plants along the Green Bay Trail (Robert McClory Bike Path) and replacing them with pollinator habitat of native wildflowers, shrubs and trees. ## Take Action to Prevent Vehicle Burglaries and Thefts

Reports of vehicle burglaries and thefts are on the rise in our area. #### Spring Clean-Up Begins April 22

The City's annual Spring Clean-Up Program will be offered by Lakeshore Recycling Systems on four consecutive Saturdays beginning April 22 and ending May 13, coinciding with residents' primary refuse collection day (the day both garbage and recycling are collected). Items must be placed at the curb no

later than 7 AM on collection day. This program is for single-family residential customers only.

To keep City streets clean, please do not place any material out for collection earlier than one week prior.

#### **Oversized Items**

Lakeshore Recycling Systems will pick up all allowed oversized items that are placed at the curb during Spring Clean-Up. Only 1 cubic yard of construction material will be accepted. To discard waste from a doit-yourself project, please make sure that the material is bundled so that one person can pick it up and place it in the truck. Carpeting must be rolled and should not exceed the weight that one person can carry. Waste material generated by general contractors will not be accepted.




## District 112 Moves Administrative Headquarters



After spending decades headquartered at the Green Bay School site at 1936 Green Bay Road, the District 112 administrative offices began its move on February 3 to 445 Sheridan Road in Highwood (Viti Insurance building) with the move to be officially completed on February 13. The move comes as Green Bay is prepared to be used as a swing site for schools after the passage of the fall 2022 referendum that will fund Phase 2 of the District's Long-Range Facility Plan. Ravinia Elementary School will temporarily move to the Green Bay School site after the school year in June 2023.

District 112 Board of Education meetings will continue to be held in the board room at Green Bay for the time being. The final plans for the administration will be part of Phase 3 of the Long-Range Facilities Plan.

## 📖 District 113 | Yale's Dr. Marc Brackett Presents Parent/Guardian Survey



Dear District 113 Community,

For those of you who follow the news, have you ever thought of the connection between your relationships and your work and how the news makes you feel? If you follow the news, then you know what I am talking about. What is happening in the world around us does not leave us feeling pleasant. Behind what we hear in the news are real people enduring things that are terrible and worse. We know that not only because our community was in the news on and after July 4, but because we know people from that event whose stories have made and continue to make a profound impact in our lives.

According to research psychologist Dr. Marc Brackett, Ph.D., founder and director of the Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence and Professor in the Child Study Center at Yale, emotions impact a person's attention, memory, learning, decision making, relationship quality, physical and mental health, performance, and creativity. This research applies to all of us, but as a school district we are most interested in our students, who in addition to what they see in the world they are about to enter have their own worlds of concern.

That's why District 113 has been working with Dr. Brackett from Yale to ask our students, families and staff how they are feeling and what they need to feel supported. Additionally, to work to provide an education that more fully meets the aspirations we have for our students, we have asked our staff and current D113 parents and guardians, as well as parents and guardians of our incoming ninth graders, what they want for their students five years after high school graduation. These priorities will drive our work in District 113 as we set long-term goals to align with them and metrics to track our progress.

On February 21, Dr. Brackett will be onsite to share a presentation specific to staff. I am pleased that District 113 is able to extend the opportunity for parents and guardians to hear directly from Dr. Brackett as well later that evening. He will be sharing the results of the parent survey and discussing the critical role of social and emotional learning in achieving well-being and success in school and life. All are welcome. The event is free but registration is required.

This is not the first time I have written about the importance of students' social and emotional skills. We know as adults that our personal and professional relationships are stronger and our work is better when we have the skills to cope with the complexity and stress that just comes from living in 2023. In District 113, we committed to developing, as Marc Brackett says, "the principles, tools, and strategies that build self- and social-awareness, healthy emotion regulation, and responsible decision making" so students can be successful in high school and beyond.
