### Report Potholes

With freeze-thaw cycles occurring this time of year, potholes become a burden for all of us. Help Public Works maintain City streets by reporting potholes via the City's 24-hour Pothole Hotline at **847.926.1178**. Just leave a message with your name, address, phone number and specific pothole location. Pothole repairs may also be reported on the City's website at **cityhpil. com/service** by clicking on "Customer Service Request" on the main page.

Repairs are typically addressed within 24 - 48 hours upon notification. In winter, Public Works crews fill potholes with cold patch, a quick, temporary solution to make roads drivable until permanent repairs can be made when asphalt plants open in the spring.

#### State of the City 2021

Mayor Nancy R. Rotering delivered the State of the City address at the January 25, 2021 City Council meeting.

I am delivering this update in a time where we've just witnessed the historic inauguration of our 46th President of the United States and the peaceful transfer of power, recognized and honored the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, continue to reflect upon the recent events in the nation's Capitol, and experience the ongoing devastation of the COVID-19 pandemic on the nation and around the world.

Things have not been easy. The sacrifices made by each and every one of us have been enormous. Most importantly, I want to send a message of deep gratitude to each of you - for your patience, resiliency, support, and care for each other. You are the heart of Highland Park.

I'd like to recognize my City Council members – Tony Blumberg, Michelle Holleman, Dan Kaufman, Alyssa Knobel, Adam Stolberg, and Kim Stone. We are a team. As elected officials, there is no absolute right or wrong – just, at times, very hard choices and difficult decisions. The burden of responsibility is always heavy, and even moreso during a pandemic.

Thank you to our dedicated staff. City Manager Ghida Neukirch and the senior staff – we are grateful for your leadership. While we have been staying safe in our homes, our dedicated employees have kept our city operating. Our first responders put their health and their families' health at risk to keep us safe. We thank them for their continued bravery and compassion.

There is no denying that the pandemic created a perfect storm. It has affected each and every one of us. It has upended

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our daily routines, social interactions, work habits, and even our sense of time and place. Many of us have experienced severe personal economic challenges and grief due to the loss of loved ones. We lost the ability to visit our favorite restaurants and businesses and in turn, they have taken a beating, forcing many to close or adapt to a new way of doing business.

While it is easy to get discouraged, we should instead be inspired as we reflect on the heroism of our essential workers, the spirit of togetherness that we are experiencing in the face of adversity, and our strength as we continue to persevere.

While the pandemic may have started as a public healthcare crisis, it has also become a governance and financial crisis. Strong, accessible, and responsible local governance has been paramount. While no one expected the major events that we experienced in 2020, we were able to rely on our carefully crafted core priorities to guide us. As a City, with your input, we have been strategic in developing those priorities - public safety, fiscal stability, infrastructure investment and community vibrancy. These have been our pillars for the past ten years and while every single one has been challenged by this pandemic, we have been nimble, resilient and effective in meeting our challenges because of them.

Every level of government continues to experience severe economic impacts related to the pandemic and the City has not been immune. Costs of pandemicrelated City operations rose quickly and City revenues have been stretched beyond anything anyone could have anticipated, causing a potential shortfall of millions of dollars. To address challenges in the short-term, many infrastructure and other projects were put on hold, events

and programming were cancelled, portions of our staff were furloughed, and our work-force was diminished by 10% through attrition and staff reductions. While careful prior planning provided strong reserves upon which we could draw this year, we continue to face fiscal challenges throughout the pandemic and possibly beyond. I am proud to say that despite these external forces, we recently approved our tenth balanced operating budget in a row, our financial house remains in order, and City operations continue almost seamlessly.

We know that we cannot wait for the pandemic to end to start re-setting, re-imagining, and re-building. As we continue to work closely with the Lake County Health Department and the Illinois Department of Public Health to increase the vaccine's roll out, we recognize that the length and intensity of the pandemic has taken a toll on our local economy. With this in mind, the City swiftly created numerous initiatives focused on supporting our restaurants and small businesses as they faced and continue to experience pandemic-related challenges. We reduced or eliminated fees, created grants for mitigating pandemicrelated costs, rolled back restrictions and permitting requirements, and joined in marketing efforts to showcase our valued businesses. We are fluid in our approach and work regularly with our businesses to provide them support. On their behalf, all of us at the City continue to ask, when possible, that you patronize our local businesses. Our community has depended on them throughout the years and they need us now more than ever.

We continue to make strategic changes to our zoning, particularly in and around our downtown, resulting in transit-oriented, market-driven housing

# Snow & Ice Reminders

**Snow Plowing Operations:** Snow removal begins with the clearing of the City's main arterial routes, followed by side streets and cul-desacs. Street plowing operations continue until all streets are passable and all parking areas have been plowed. Learn more: **cityhpil.com**. **Parking Restrictions:** From December 1 - March 31, vehicles can-

not be parked longer than 15 minutes on any public streets between the hours of 2 AM and 6 AM, regardless of weather conditions.

**Sidewalks:** Please be considerate of neigbors and clear your sidewalk of snow and ice. After snowfall of 4" or more, the City's contractor will plow sidewalks once street plowing operations are completed. Find authorized overnight parking lots at **cityhpil.com/parking**.

**Private Snow Removal Services:** If hiring a contractor to plow your driveway, ensure that your snow is not pushed across the street onto a neighbor's property. City ordinance prohibits removing snow or ice from any building, private property, driveway, driveway approach or public sidewalk and depositing it onto public streets.

**Hydrants:** The Fire Department appreciates assistance from residents in clearing snow from the area surrounding fire hydrants.

development that includes affordable units, is sensitive to the environment, and encourages longtime residents to easily downsize, allowing new neighbors to move here. As a result, over time, more people will be able to shop, dine and visit our downtown, helping to ease resident property tax burdens through the generation of increased sales tax revenue. This new housing also enables our seniors to age in place, continuing a Highland Park tradition of multiple generations of families in our hometown.

In the coming year, some priority projects include the continued planning to replace the obsolete Ravinia fire station, rebuilding a crumbling Clavey Road, a vital east-west artery in south Highland Park, revisiting our economic strategic plan, continuing to shine a spotlight on the need for regional flood mitigation efforts, short- and long-term planning to revitalize the Crossroads shopping district, and most of all – we look forward to coming together again as a community in person. Despite fiscal obstacles and unclear timelines, it is necessary that we continue to plan, continue to progress to the extent feasible. As American author Alan Lakein, best known for his quotes about time management and planning once said, "Planning is bringing the future into the present so that you can do something about it now."

We do not do our work alone. Collaboration and synergies benefit the public and improve efficiencies. We continue to work closely with our sister governments, not-for-profit and other community partners, and area clergy. Thank you to all of our partners who work with us throughout the year. These collaborative relationships result in a broad range of initiatives that benefit our community's day-to-day life, help us coordinate during times like these and plan for the future. Our work together exemplifies representative government at its best. This year, we were tested, and I am proud that although we each have separate functions, we came together to promote a culture of inclusivity, and to

support critical human and social services for our neighbors in need.

Your input is the most vital. Your priorities are our priorities. In the coming months, we will virtually hold our annual neighborhood meetings in partnership with our sister governments. We will apply our listening and learning to the development of our annual budget – our most important policy statement. With fiscal prudence as our directive, we will plan for the future with an eye on our community's short- and long-term needs and hopes, challenges and opportunities.

At the end of the day, every person, every family, deserves to be safe and healthy in their home, on their street, in their neighborhood, at their place of work, and they deserve equal access to opportunity. None of us can predict what may come next, but we will continue to build and learn from the past as we work together to create a bright future.

#### Private Diseased or Dead Trees: Monitor & Take Action

As spring approaches, so does the start of another tree growing season! Once the leaves are back on a tree, it's apparent which are dead or diseased. Dead trees in the woods provide wildlife habitats for birds and insects. Diseased or dead trees located on a private property should be assessed by a Certified Arborist. Of particular concern are trees that can destabilize due to root decay and become hazardous. For example, a dead Ash tree needs timely action. Residents are encouraged to proactively work with neighbors and remove any potentially unsafe tree(s) including those on or very close to a property line.

A Tree Removal Permit is required for removal of any tree with a trunk diameter greater than 8 inches as measured from 4.5 feet above the ground. There is no fee charged for a permit to remove a dead, dying, or diseased tree. Visit **cityhpil.com/trees**. # Green Bay Trail Enhancements & Call for Volunteers

Since 2017, the City has been removing invasive plants along the Green Bay Trail (Robert McClory Bike Path) and replacing them with pollinator habitat of native wildflowers, shrubs and trees. European buckthorn, Japanese honeysuckle, and Norway maple are detrimental to habitat gardens. A healthy pollinator area provides habitat for native species and improves trail user experience with fall color and other seasonal interest. In time, new native shrubs and trees will fill in and provide a vegetation screen.

So far, the City has restored nearly 2 acres of the trail between Roger Williams Avenue and Beech Street. In 2018 and 2019, students, volunteers, staff, and contractors planted approximately 12,000 native wildflower, 350 native shrubs, and 50 native trees. In 2020, contractors installed 1,000 plugs and 600 shrubs. In spring 2021, trail enhancements will continue with additional planting by contractors. City plans to collaborate with volunteers and areas school students in 2021 and 2022, within allowed regulations due to COVID-19 safety protocols. # Moraine Township Provides Free Income Tax Preparation for Low-and Moderate-Income Taxpayers

Moraine Township is pleased to offer free income tax return preparation to low-and moderate-income taxpayers. To keep clients and volunteers safe, tax preparation will be virtual this year!

Under the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program, the Township partners with the IRS to train and certify volunteers to prepare basic returns. The program will run from February 2 through April 12, 2021, and is available to taxpayers with adjusted gross income of less than \$57,000.

#### WE ARE BACK

From Tuesday, October 20, 2020, until Friday, January 29, 2021 District 112 was on a pivot to a Remote Learning Model due to local public health guidance regarding the pandemic. The road the pandemic has taken us down has been unpredictable, everchanging, and difficult. Good news, any good news, has been rare, but good news is what I have at the time this column was submitted to *The Highlander*. You read that correctly. Good news. District 113 staff members and six other Lake County school districts, including North Shore School District 112, have COVID-19 vaccinations waiting for them through a partnership with Walgreens.

Districts 112, and 113 along with Bannockburn School District 106 had an opportunity to partner with Walgreens to create our own POD for all our staff members. As superintendents, our first obligation is to our respective students and staff, and securing vaccinations for our respective staff members fulfilled that obligation. There are, however, other ethical considerations in distributing vaccines. We knew that by creating our own POD we were effectively increasing the supply of vaccine for the Lake County Health Department to distribute to all Lake County educators. In our first meeting with Walgreens, we raised the equity issue of including in our POD more Lake County districts in our geographical area, particularly those that do not typically have the same access to resources that we do. Walgreens enthusiastically supported this approach and committed enough vaccine and staff to accomplish it.

Now seven school districts are working together with Walgreens to provide both doses of the vaccine to 3,325 staff members over four days: North Shore School District 112, Bannockburn School District 106, Beach Park School District 3, North Chicago District 187, Zion Elementary School District 6, Zion Benton Township High School District 126, and District 113. Collectively, we serve 14,410 students.

This is a critically important step on the way to getting back to normal school, which is so important to our students' education and their social emotional well-being.

The approximately 15,000 educators in Lake County still have the opportunity to receive vaccinations through the Lake County Health Department's AllVax program. By vaccinating a fifth of that population, educators and others in Phase 1b will move through the system more quickly.

The next issue for the Highlander will be April. Let's hope that spring brings even better news.



# Business Development in the Central Business District

There have been a number of exciting changes to promote new commercial and residential development in Highland Park's downtown business district. These policy changes will attract new businesses and adapt to market trends while maintaining the character of downtown Highland Park.

#### **Zoning Changes**

- The new Central District Residential Overlay Zone allows for residential developments within a specified area at the heart of downtown Highland Park.
- The Pedestrian-Oriented Shopping Overlay policy was eliminated, removing restrictions that required ground-floor tenants within its boundary to be retail or retail-oriented businesses.
- An experiential uses zoning amendment was adopted, designed to permit additional cultural and recreational business uses alongside traditional retail and commercial uses.

#### Albion at Renaissance Place Development Approved
