Free Tax Assistance

Now through April 8, Moraine Township will offer free assistance to low-and-moderate-income taxpayers filing their 2016 income tax returns through the IRS VITA Program (Voluntary Income Tax Assistance). Volunteers are trained and certified by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to prepare basic returns for taxpayers earning less than \$55,000 in 2016. Appointments take place in the Moraine Township Office, 777 Central Avenue, and are available mornings, afternoons, and evenings, Monday through Thursday and Saturdays 9 AM to 12 PM. Salting and Water Quality

During winter months, the City uses road salt (sodium chloride) to clear roads of ice and snow for the safety of motorists. The City, as part of Snow and Ice Control Plan, uses a combination of road salt and brine solution to treat roadways. The combination of road salt and brine helps in minimizing the use of road salt and more importantly, maximize the area of salt dispersion onto roadways, instead of spreading over parkways.

One of the concerns with over usage of road salt is the impact on water quality of natural lakes and rivers. Salt pollution in surface waters is measured in terms of sodium chloride concentration. The impact to Lake Michigan and City's drinking water source is minimal as roadways only east of Green Bay Road, being the ridge line, drain to the lake. In addition, the intake pipe of City's water plant is approximately a mile from the shore thereby causing massive dilution of any potential salt pollutant runoff to the lake.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) recommends reducing sodium concentrations in drinking water to be between 30 mg/l and 60 mg/l. The City's potable water sodium concentration is well below USEPA threshold with the most recent results measuring at 13 mg/l. Let's take a moment to reflect on the past, while embracing the future with determination and confidence.

We are fortunate to live in a strong, passionate, vibrant community. To meet our needs, my Council colleagues and I partner with City staff, sister governments, residents and businesses. At the core of everything we do, are all of you - sharing your input and creating a community that cares deeply about each other and the future we want for ourselves and the next generation.

Working together, we identify opportunities, build coalitions and find solutions as we focus on the City's core priorities: Fiscal Stability, Public Safety, Investment in Infrastructure and Community Vibrancy. We work to advance business development, meet the needs of our most vulnerable members, celebrate the arts, and preserve natural resources. The more than 150 projects we undertake at the beginning of each year demonstrate a broad desire to highlight the many ways in which our city continually and thoughtfully evolves.

Over approximately seven months, we hold neighborhood meetings and public budget workshops. With your input, City staff, my Council colleagues and I work as a team to create your budget - our most important policy statement. We are fiscally responsible with your dollars and plan for the coming year as well as the future with an eye on potential challenges and opportunities. I am proud that for the sixth year in a row, we approved a balanced operating budget with healthy reserves. Our financial house is in order. Our fiscal strength was recently re-affirmed by Moody's with our continued Aaa bond rating, a rating now held by only a handful of Illinois cities.

Through longtime partnerships with our dedicated first responders, our community's public safety is strong both on a day-to-day basis and during the Ravinia Festival summer season, when more than 600,000 people come to town to celebrate the arts.

Continued city-wide infrastructure investment and multi-year planning mean we ensure resident health and safety each day and for years to come. Public Works crews work hand in hand with us, meeting our daily and long-term infrastructure needs. Last summer, the City partnered with all sister governments to ensure that our public drinking fountains are safe. All public drinking fountains and faucets were tested by City staff for the presence of lead. Fixtures indicating lead were closed and repaired, with plans for on-going annual testing.

Implementation of our Bike Walk 2030 Plan continues, creating safer streets, sidewalks and bike routes. This plan connects neighborhoods for our families and provides transportation alternatives.

We are committed to ensuring continued economic vibrancy. With strategic changes to our zoning, we've seen an increase in transit-oriented, market-driven housing development that encourages longtime residents to easily downsize and new neighbors to move here. The result will be more people shopping, dining and visiting our downtown, helping to ease property tax burdens on residents.

We welcomed hundreds of community leaders, real estate professionals, businesses and prospects to the City's Annual Business Summit. This event reviews economic trends, enhances business attraction and retention and facilitates economic growth. This year, we added a real estate roundtable to gain valuable feedback to make investing in Highland Park even more desirable.

Recognizing that students are our future leaders, the City takes an active role in connecting with students of all ages. High school students contribute to local government through membership on city commissions and via a career shadowing program. All third graders visit with me at City Hall to take part in a mock City Council meeting. These programs provide practical learning and hopefully inspire our

students to get involved in their community both now and as adults.

In 2016, our Leadership Alliance continued to convene conversations fostering partnerships among regional leaders. This past year's conversations examined gun violence and substance abuse reduction.

In our own community, we know that collaboration and synergies benefit the public and improve efficiencies. We will continue our regular meetings with our government partners, local clergy, multiple citizen advisory task forces and community groups. These conversations result in joint initiatives that benefit our day-to-day lives and help us better plan for the future. As State resources continue to shrink and are unpredictable, we depend on the power of local partnerships to meet the daily needs of our neighbors. The Moraine Township Food pantry, serving over 700 families, now has the continuous support of the entire community, and provides fresh produce and dairy products in addition to non-perishable foods.

The Highland Park/Highwood Legal Aid Clinic has grown with the support of countless residents, neighbors and nearly 80 volunteer attorneys providing pro bono legal services in the areas of immigration, domestic abuse and housing to nearly 200 clients who live and work in Highland Park or Highwood. The Clinic's student board at Highland Park High School organized the first naturalization ceremony in Highland Park, an event they hope to repeat annually.

Our community is driven by a collective desire to work together to shape our future. Your input makes a difference in what we do and how we evolve. As individuals, governments and organizations, we are all interconnected with the shared goal of making Highland Park the best it can be, both now and for the future. We are a team and thanks to our collective engagement, we will continue to be a strong and vibrant community.

Traffic Safety is Everyone's Responsibility

Concerned citizens frequently contact the Police Department to report illegal and dangerous driving, bicycle riding and pedestrian behavior within the City. Traffic enforcement and traffic education are primary police functions to help reduce crashes and the associated injuries. The cost of a traffic citation can exceed \$350 with fines and court costs. Listed below are some reminders of basic traffic laws:

Speeds in Highland Park

Motorists are required to obey the posted speed limit.

- The maximum speed limit on the highway in Highland Park is 55 m.p.h. (*unless otherwise posted*).
- The maximum speed limit in Highland Park is 25 m.p.h. (*unless otherwise posted*).
- In alleys the maximum speed limit is 15 m.p.h.
- In school zones the maximum speed limit is 20 m.p.h. (school days between 7 AM and 4 PM when children are present and signs are posted).

Regardless of the posted speed limit, weather and traffic conditions may make it necessary to drive slower.

Stop Signs

Every driver (and bicyclist) must come to a complete stop at the stop sign before entering the intersection. The vehicle that stops at an intersection first, has the right-of-way. When two vehicles stop at an intersection at the same time, the vehicle on left must yield the right-of-way to the vehicle on the right.

Drivers and bicyclists are required to yield to pedestrians at intersections and crosswalks. Drivers are also required to stop for disabled pedestrians who may need more time to cross.

Pedestrians

Pedestrians must yield the right-of-way to drivers by obeying traffic signals, observing walk lights and using crosswalks. When crossing at anyplace other than a marked crosswalk, pedestrians must give the right-of-way to drivers. Pedestrians must obey railroad gates, warning signals and bells.

State-Law: Hand-Held Cell Phone Use While Driving

It is against the law to:

- Use a hand-held cell phone while driving
- Use any cell phone in a school or construction zone
- Text and drive
- Use a hand-held cell phone while operating a bicycle



Bicycle Related Laws

On public roadways, bicyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as other roadway users. In Illinois, bicyclists are required to:

- Travel in the same direction as vehicles, riding near the right edge of the roadway
- Ride no more than two-abreast on the roadway, riding near the right edge of the roadway, so as not to impede vehicle traffic
- Stop at all posted stop signs and yield to pedestrians in a cross-walk (even when bicyclists think that there is not a vehicle or pedestrian at the intersection at the same time)
- Yield to pedestrians while riding on sidewalks
- Have a headlight and a rear reflector at night

Bicyclists are encouraged to wear adequate safety helmets. In Highland Park, Bicyclists under sixteen years of age are required to wear an adequate safety helmet. Three out of four bicycling deaths are caused by head injuries.

Vehicles are expected to "share the road" with bicyclists. State Law requires that motorists pass bicyclists with three feet or more of space between them. Motorists are required to yield when making right and left turns in front of bicyclists. Motorists should look for bicyclists in the roadway or on sidewalks when leaving driveways, alleys or side streets.

A Letter to the Community

Dear Neighbors,

For generations we have worked together as a community to ensure Highwood, Fort Sheridan, and Highland Park continue to be known for the kind of educational excellence that parents and non-parents alike can be proud of. In real and lasting ways, and with your support, our schools have been true cornerstones of our shared community.

It is no secret that we are in a period of transition in District 112, with the unsuccessful bond referendum last year and the recent leadership transitions at both the super-intendent and board levels. At the same time, our facility and financial challenges remain. This has led to understandable questions about the path forward.

It is our collective belief that our challenges can and will be met if our path forward is community-driven and we are unified in our deep commitment to working together.

Three proven district leaders are serving as co-superintendents while an interim superintendent is being sought through a Board hiring process. Two new board members have been appointed to fill recent vacancies. In addition, the Reconfiguration 2.0 Community Team, composed of two dozen community members that have been charged with recom-

mending viable reconfiguration options that address the District's needs, was formed and continues to meet.

This citizen-led 2.0 Community Team has a mission of establishing a community- based planning process to help us build upon all the things that are great about our system, while not shying away from the very real facilities and financial challenges we must face.

The District 112 Board, administration, and 2.0 Team stand unified in our commitment to getting this right. We want – we need – to hear your voice, to know what values are important to you, and to use your input to create a process we all can be proud of.

Over the coming weeks and months there will be various community engagement efforts aimed at real and meaningful collaboration. We will do our best to share that information widely and frequently throughout the community. Highland Park High School 2017 Charity Drive



Highland Park High School officially kicked off its annual Charity Drive with an all-school assembly on Friday, February 3. Charity Drive is a month of fundraising activities planned and implemented by HPHS students, staff, and community members. Over the past two decades Charity Drive has raised in excess of \$2.5 million for various charities; last year's Charity Drive brought in \$201,000 for College Bound Opportunities, a foundation formed to serve under-resourced but high-achieving students in the North Shore region.

This year's recipient, chosen by HPHS students and staff, is the Zacharias Sexual Abuse Center. The Zacharias Sexual Abuse Center (Z-Center) is a non-profit center providing a place of safety and healing for survivors of sexual assault and abuse. The Z-Center has provided free counseling and advocacy, in both English and Spanish, to survivors of sexual violence for over 34 years with the mission to mobilize the community towards action to end sexual violence. It offers a 24/7 confidential support line for survivors (847.872.7799) and educates over 30,000 students annually with public and in-school sexual assault and abuse prevention programs.

In addition to raising funds, Highland Park High School hopes to bring awareness to the Zacharias Sexual Abuse Center.

The month-long drive includes events that Highland Park Highwood families and community members can attend. The first event was led by the Highland Park Poms and Jammers. On February 3, students in grades 4th-8th attended a dance clinic in which they learned a routine to perform at halftime of the HPHS vs DHS Girls Basketball Game. Those who enjoy running for a cause particiated in the NorthShore Cupid's Love Dash 5k on February 12.

There are still plenty of ways for the community to support this year's charity drive. On February 24, all are invited to participate in the Cake Walk, followed by a performance by the Harlem Wizards. Other events include workout and yoga classes at local studios and a silent auction. 

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


