

Voter Information

Tuesday, April 2, 2019 is the next Consolidated Election. March 5, 2019 is last day to register to vote at City Hall, 1707 St. Johns Avenue.

Grace Period Registration. Residents may still register to vote between March 6 and April 2, 2019 at any Lake County Early Voting Site or at the Lake County Clerk's office, 18 North County Street in Waukegan. Grace period registration is also available on Election Day at the polling place for your current address.

Absentee Ballot. Voters have four options if they choose to apply to request a ballot by mail:

- Apply online until noon on March 8.
- Download a paper application from the Lake County Voter Power website, lakecountyil.gov/351/Voter-Power
- Call 847.377.2406 to have an application mailed
- Email a request to votingbymail@lakecountyil.gov All requests must be received by 12 PM on March 8.

Early Voting in Highland Park. Early Voting is available between Monday, March 18 and Saturday, March 30, 2019 at the Police Department Training Room, 1677 Old Deerfield Road. The hours for early voting are Monday through Friday between 9 AM and 5 PM and Saturday between 9 AM and 2 PM.

Election Signs. Residents may place election signs on their property; however, signs are not permitted on the public right-of-way between the sidewalk and curb. For homes where there is no sidewalk, signs must be placed more than 5 feet from the curb or street.

To report improperly placed election signs, call Code Enforcement in the Building Division at 847.432.0808.

Residents are reminded that it is illegal to trespass on another's property to remove or deface an election sign.

Election Day. All polling places are open from 6 AM until 7 PM on Tuesday, April 2 and are handicap



accessible. Any handicapped or elderly voter who is physically unable to enter the voting site may request voting assistance. To request assistance, notify the Lake County Clerk's office by calling 847.377.2406 at least one day in advance of Election Day.



State of the City

Many R. Rotering

Mayor Nancy R. Rotering Delivered the State of the City at the February 11 City Council Meeting

On behalf of the Mayor's Office and the City Council, I'm pleased to report that we achieved many milestones in 2018. In addition to enhancing our community's overall quality of life, we protected the city's on-going fiscal sustainability, invested in hundreds of infrastructure projects to improve our neighborhoods, and kept our city safe. We worked hard to advance business development, increase communications, and support human services, environmental sustainability initiatives, and cultural arts plans. I am eager for our community to continue our work together, crafting a vision that plans for decades to come. My City Council colleagues and I are proud to work with City staff, government partners, residents, and local businesses focusing on issues that matter to all of us. Together, we strive daily to strengthen our community.

Recognizing that collaboration and synergies benefit the public and improve efficiencies, we continue to meet regularly with government partners, local clergy, and multiple citizen advisory task forces and community groups. Members of the City Council serve as liaisons to each of the school districts as well as the Park District. Conversations result in collaboration on a multitude of initiatives that benefit our daily life, achieve synergies, and provide representative government at its best.

Notably, we finalized the sale of the Highland Park Country Club golf course to the Park District, helping them achieve an objective in their long-range Green Print plan as well as keeping an eye on using part of the land for flood mitigation. We have taken the lead working with both Lake and Cook Counties, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, and the US Army Corp of Engineers on a longterm flood mitigation solution focusing on impacted areas of Highland Park and dozens of other communities throughout the region. With the City's assistance, North Shore School District 112 implemented new traffic plans addressing increased enrollment at its middle schools and successfully completed the addition of a road at Edgewood Middle School to achieve much needed public safety. Additionally, sister governments worked together to promote a culture of inclusivity, and supported human and social services including food security, housing, and mental health care.

Partnerships with our business community continue to support our strong local economy, create new jobs, and reduce property tax burdens on residents. Our development process has been streamlined, bringing new market-driven housing to our downtown, and in-fill development throughout neighborhoods. We are eagerly awaiting the completion of the redevelopment of the former Highland Park Movie Theater site to help revitalize the east end of Central Avenue in downtown Highland Park, an updated Ravinia Festival with the addition of a new Experience Center, and we are looking forward to the groundbreaking of a new apartment building in the Ravinia Business District.

As the New Year begins, we remain deeply committed to meeting the needs of our community now and in the future. In 2019, we head into a year's worth of celebrating Highland Park's 150th Anniversary. We invite you to join with us as we reflect on our rich history and bring the community together to celebrate our future. A number of fun, family-friendly, community-wide events and programs are planned. Thank you for being our partners and our neighbors.

Make a Fire Safety Plan

Fires can happen quickly. Prepare your family ahead of time by creating and practicing a fire safety plan and ensuring you have a working smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector:

- Plan an escape route. Identify two (2) exits from each room. Discuss the routes & options.
- Teach children how to crawl under smoke and make an escape.
- Select a meeting point outside of your home.
- Be prepared practice with your fire alarm ringing.
- Test alarms monthly and replace batteries at least once per year.

Rental Registration Reminder

Reminder - Residential rental property owners are required to register their units with the City by **April 1** each year. Contact information assists the City in its delivery of emergency and code enforcement services. The \$30 annual registration fee is used to conduct outreach and provide educational materials regarding life-safety, property maintenance, and building and zoning codes to all registered property owners and their tenants. For those who registered a property last year, renewal notices are mailed at the end of February. Please use your renewal notice to register again for 2019.

Winter Salt Use and Water Quality Impact

During winter months, the City applies minimal salt (sodium chloride) to clear roads of ice and snow for motorist's safety. Under a Snow and Ice Control Plan, Public Works applies a combination of salt and brine solution. The combination helps minimize salt use.

One concern with any usage of salt is the impact on lake and river water quality. Salt pollution is measured as sodium and chloride concentrations. The impact to Lake Michigan (City's drinking water source) is minimal due to controlled application and dilution. The area draining into the lake is limited to east of Green Bay Road. To the west, snowmelt flows into the Skokie River. Also, the City's Water Treatment Plant intake is far away from shore negating potential intake of salt laden runoff.

Residents and business owners' use of salt on driveways, sidewalks, and parking lots may also contribute to lake and river pollution. Residential and commercial salt use should follow best practice guidelines, limiting to what's absolutely necessary for safety.

The US Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) recommends sodium in drinking water not exceed 30 to 60 mg/L, 20 mg/L for persons on very low sodium diets. The USEPA drinking water standard for chloride is not to exceed 250 mg/L, to avoid salty taste. City drinking water sodium and chloride concentrations are well below the recommendation and standard, measured at 11 and 20 mg/L respectively. 
Italianate Homes: A Founding Style in Highland Park


A familiarity of some of the architectural styles that appear in historic Highland Park neighborhoods can help us appreciate our City's unique architectural history. Italianate homes have been featured prominently in Highland Park since the City's inception. The Highland Park Building Company – which founded and built the suburb as a rail commuter town – built their prototype homes in two styles: Gothic Revival and Italianate. Examples of these homes remain intact in the Linden Park Place historic district. The Italianate style is associated with the late Romantic and Victorian era, and was nationally popular from the late 1830s to the 1880s.

The style is loosely based on Italian country villas, as opposed to Renaissance era townhomes or older classical architecture. Deep, overhanging eves with ornamental brackets are characteristic of the style, as are tall, narrow windows, decorative lintels, and broad front porches. Italianate homes may be built out of wood or brick, and many prominently feature decorative flourishes. Some Italianate homes have a square cupola or tower either adjacent to or at the center of the home.

Kirkwood, MO: This Italianate home is more restrained in

ornamentation, however the boxy shape, low-pitched and brackets der the eaves align with the style. Note the wide porch with practical, thin-columns - contrasting highly with Greek Revival or Neoclassical homes that feature thick Doric columns (Source: architecturestyles.org/ Italianate/).





Windham, CT: Prominently featuring a campanile (or square tower) characteristic of the style, this circa 1850 home has bracketed window details, coupled eaves brackets, and a wide front porch that exemplify the style (Source: architecturestyles.org/ Italianate/).




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Library Robotics Team Takes Home Awards!

Highland Park Composts!

Since late October, three local restaurants have been diverting their food waste through a pilot program called Highland Park Composts! Congratulations to Little Szechwan, Bluegrass, and La Casa de Isaac and Moishe on their efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and enrich local soils through food scrap composting. These three restaurants have collectively diverted roughly 20 cubic yards of food waste from our landfills-that's about 42 95-gallon carts, or 420 full 13-gallon trash bags! These efforts are possible with the dedicated collaboration of the Solid Waste Agency of Lake County, Lakeshore Recycling Systems, Bright Beat Project Management and Sustainability Consulting, and City staff.
