July 4th Reminders

Independence Day is Sunday, July 4. City offices will be closed in observance of the holiday on Monday, July 5. For public safety assistance, residents may call Public Safety Dispatch at 847.432.7730.

Garbage will not be collected on Monday, July 5. Refuse and recycling collection will be delayed by one day for the entire week. Contact Lakeshore Recycling Systems at 773.685.8111.

After much consideration, the City of Highland Park and the Park District of Highland Park made the difficult decision to cancel Highland Park's traditional 4th of July community events, including the 4th of July Parade and Fourth-Fest. The Fireworks Display is tentatively planned for Labor Day weekend, and the Bitter Jester Music Festival will host its annual music competition and concert series on a revised schedule in July and August, to conclude at the September Fireworks Display. The City will sponsor a virtual parade. Submit celebratory photos and videos at cityhpil.com/july4.

The Park District is planning a series of small, family-friendly events that will take place over the 4th of July holiday weekend including a virtual Firecracker 5K Fun Run, Walk or Bike event benefitting the Parks Foundation of Highland Park; a free Firecracker Family Boot Camp Competition; Drive-In Movie Night at the Recreation Center; 4th of July family specials for rounds of golf at Sunset Valley Golf Club and the River's Edge Adventure Mini-Golf Course; and an evening event at Hidden Creek AquaPark to float and watch fireworks on a big screen. Voluntary Sanitary Sewer Lateral Cost Sharing Program

The voluntary sanitary sewer lateral cost sharing program provides assistance to residents in alleviating sewage backups occurring in their homes. The cost share program pays up to 20% of the total cost of the sanitary sewer backup improvement, or a maximum of \$1,260, whichever is less. The cost share program is applicable to only single-family homes. Visit cityhpil.com to learn more.

Smart Irrigation Month: Pledge to Conserve Water!

Water use reaches its peak during the summer. Overwatering lawns and landscape areas may increase the average residential water use from 260 gallons per day to 1,000 gallons per day. Reduce your water use by checking to see if irrigation is necessary; water in the cooler hours (early morning or evening); adjust sprinklers to avoid unnecessary spraying. As a reminder, odd/ even sprinkling restrictions are in effect through Sept. 15. Learn more at cityhpil.com/waterconservation.

Y Reminder for Dog Owners

Pursuant to the City Code, every dog housed within the City that is more than six months of age must be registered with and licensed by the City. Be a responsible pet owner: make sure your dog is wearing a tag, use a leash and properly dispose of any dog waste. Let's Bike!

Six Steps to Stay Safe While Biking

- 1. Always wear a helmet.
- 2. Wear bright-colored clothing to increase visibility.
- 3. Ride in a group on the right side of the road no more than two abreast with the flow of traffic.
- 4. Review your route before you ride.
- 5. Remember to stop at stop signs and obey traffic laws.
- 6. It is legal to cycle on sidewalks. When riding on the sidewalks, remember to signal by voice or bell when approaching pedestrians. Note: In Highland Park, biking on the sidewalk within any commercial zoning district of the City is prohibited.

The Rules of the Road apply to bicyclists, too. Brush up at cyberdriveillinois.com.

Safety is everyone's responsibility. Drivers should use caution and remain alert for bicyclists, especially at night.

Bike Trails

Hop on your bike and get exploring this summer! Start your ride at Laurel and St. Johns. Head north through Lake County to the WI border for 25.4 miles of trail along the Robert McClory Bike Path. Surfaces include asphalt, concrete & crushed

stone, including some roadways. Head south along the Green Bay Trail for 9 miles through the North Shore. Surfaces include asphalt, crushed limestone, and some sidewalks and roadway.

The Numbers Add Up!

Since passage in 2012 of Highland Park's first Bike and Pedestrian Plan (updated in 2020 as MoveHP), the City has been counting walkers and cyclists at various intersections almost semi-annually. You may have seen volunteer counters around town in May. The next count will occur in September.

These counts help the City plan for future street and sidewalk improvements. Data from past counts has informed the goals in MoveHP, and has enabled the City to receive grants to improve its non-motorized transportation network.

Some achievements since 2012 include:

- Completion of sidewalk along the west side of Green Bay from Lake Cook to Central, and along portions of Sheridan from Lake Cook to Roger Williams.
- Walk signals at some busy downtown signaled intersections are now automatic and curb bump outs make it easier for pedestians to cross First and Second Streets.
- An 8' wide bike and pedestrian path being built on

Clavey Rd. will soon allow safe passage east and west for walkers and cyclists.

Viennese Cuisine Prior to 1938 Monday, July 12, 7PM

Susanne Belovari of the University of Illinois Archives, a Holocaust restitution historian and an archivist for the Jewish community in Vienna discusses the famous Wiener Küche, which had long been a collective culinary tradition of Jews and non-Jews alike. 2021 Capital Improvement Program Update

The City's 2021 Capital Improvement Program (CIP), part of the City's core mission of Infrastructure Investment, includes improvement projects prioritized annually based on life safety consideration, functional deficiencies, age of infrastructure, and reducing long-term expensive replacements.

Listed below are major construction projects scheduled for 2021:

- Clavey Rd Improvements Project (Phase One Construction-Bridge & Water Main)
- Walker Ave, St Johns Ave, and Lauretta Pl Water Main Replacement Project
- Laurel Avenue East End Bluff Slope Restoration Project

- Asphalt Streets Rehabilitation Program
- Concrete Streets and Sidewalk Repair Program
- Central-South Parking Lot Reconstruction Project
- Sanitary and Storm Sewer Main Lining Program
- Hydrant Painting and Hydrant Flushing Programs
- Tree Removal and Planting Program
- Public Services Roof Replacement
- St Johns Avenue Parking Deck Repairs
- Hidden Ridge Lift Station Improvements

In addition, within Highland Park IDOT is scheduled to work on the following projects:

- Lake Cook Rd Bridge over US 41: Bridge repairs were started in 2020 and this was completed in the spring of 2021.
- Sheridan Rd Resurfacing between Lake Cook Rd and Lambert Tree Rd.

Moraine Township Re-Opens Office & Welcomes New Township Team

The last year has been difficult for most of us; for some of our neighbors, it has been a health and economic crisis. Moraine Township thanks a generous and caring community for helping us provide a safety net for our neighbors during this challenging year.

Our heroic staff provided over 35,000 non-duplicated services to Township residents, including \$140,000 of rent (through mid-May), utility and other emergency assistance. Township staff helped enroll for Medicaid, SNAP (cash food benefits), utility assistance and other resources, and made regular wellness calls to seniors and families. Our Door-to-Door van drivers ensured that residents needing 3x weekly dialysis had transportation to life-saving appointments. Assessor Staff helped taxpayers remotely.

Volunteers devoted hundreds of hours preparing free tax returns for incomequalified taxpayers and helped enroll individuals and families for health insurance when they lost their jobs. A corps of 30+ weekly volunteers pitched in to ensure that hunger was not one of the issues our neighbors struggled with during this crisis.


The Food Pantry converted to drivethrough and provided over 6,200 household food visits, over 1,000 of which were deliveries to clients who were unable to visit the pantry due to sickness, sheltering, or conflicts with work schedules.

The saying "we're all in this together" has never resonated more, and the spirit of our community has never shone brighter than during this crisis. Thank you to an amazing and unique community!

Senior Center Relocation and Open for In-Person Services and Activities

The City of Highland Park Senior Center has relocated to the Highland Park Country Club (1201 Park Avenue West) to better serve its members and allow for the safe reopening of limited in-person services and activities. Senior Center members and guests may enjoy a variety of on-site activities in addition to an ongoing calendar of virtual programs. To ensure the safety of guests and employees, COVID-19 safety protocols have been implemented.

The Senior Center has offered a wide variety of virtual programming for residents and members since the suspension of in-person service in March 2020. Programs that are well-suited to a virtual environment will continue to be offered online, such as the ongoing News & Views (Wednesdays), Speaker Series (Tuesdays), and book discussion group. Other programs, such as fitness classes, Mah Jongg, Bridge and Canasta open play and classes, and Bingo are being held in-person at the Country Club. The Senior Center also intends to resume day excursions, beginning with a trip to Van Gogh: The Immersive Experience in July.

For the time being, the Medical Equipment Loan Closet will continue to operate at 54 Laurel Avenue by appointment only.

The decision to shift Senior Center in-person services and offices to the Highland Park Country Club accelerates an existing plan to transition Senior Center activities from their present location to the Country Club, which provides ample parking and abundant open, accessible spaces for programs and events. The City's 10-year Capital Improvement Plan includes plans for enhancements to the Country Club to better serve the Senior Center members, tentatively slated for 2024.

The Highland Park Country Club continues to be available for corporate and private rentals through Catering By Michaels. For more information about reserving the Country Club for an event, contact Catering by Michaels at 847.213.5015.

Online Membership and Activity Registration

The Senior Center launched a new online portal to facilitate membership management, account maintenance, and activity registration. Through the portal, seniors are able to join the Senior Center, renew their membership, and register and pay for activities. There is also an interactive calendar that is updated in real-time and provides detailed information of scheduled activities.

Connector Bus

The Connector Bus has resumed services and runs on Tuesdays and Fridays, operating from 9 AM to 3:30 PM. The Connector Bus travels along a fixed route throughout Highland Park to: 654 Walnut; 1695 Second St.; 400 Central; Highland Park Public Library; Sunset Foods; Sunset Woods Condos; Jewel-Osco; Sherwood Forest; CVS; Target; Brooke Estates; NorthShore Highland Park Hospital; Walgreens; and the Highland Park Senior Center at the Highland Park Country Club. Riders may request stops at the Highland Park Metra Station, the Highland Park Police Department, and the Highland Park Hospital Medical Building. Face masks are required on the bus for all guests.

Learning and Leading During a Pandemic

With the end of the school year, there is so much to be proud of as a community. My administration would like to thank District 112 staff, students, and parents for persevering during the immense volume of change that has been experienced over the past year plus. As a superintendent, I feel an almost overwhelming sense of pride and support as a result of how all stakeholders have worked together during a global crisis to educate the students of District 112.

At the May 18, 2021, Board of Education meeting we explored student growth and achievement and the impacts that the pandemic has had on learning. Overall, the data shows while the pandemic had learning impacts that significantly slowed growth in some areas, District 112 students continued to learn through the pandemic and all grade levels are performing above their peers across the nation in reading and math. There is so much work to be done to recover from some of the impacts of the pandemic and some the prioritized efforts for next school year include:

- Professional learning on teacher collaboration, the science of teaching reading, student engagement, and the instructional framework
- Adding seven elementary math interventionists and one instructional coach
- Refinements to dual language programming, including progress monitoring and goal setting for Spanish language learning
- Utilizing data from the May 31st social-emotional screener to implement services to support student's emotional well-being

Another huge priority to improve learning for all students is the modernization of our schools. We are so excited to start the concluding chapter of Phase I of our Long Range Plan with the Groundbreaking for the Edgewood Modernization Project on June 4. The project is slated to be completed in 2023 and Edgewood will join Northwood Middle School as being an exemplary educational palace built for the students of District 112.

This summer will also be the start of the formation of Phase II of our Long-Range Plan. This process will kick off a conversation with the community about how best to modernize the remaining schools within the District and if a bond referendum should be sought. We are proud of the fact that the \$75 million Phase I modernization was completed without adding any additional taxes, and we are grateful for the opportunity in Phase II to help determine our educational footprint for the next 50-years and beyond.

District 113 | Class of 2021 and Preparing for School Year 2021-22



Dear District 113 Community,

Well it has been quite the year. It is amazing to reflect on how far we have come.

In the fall of 2020, we began school in remote learning due to the pandemic but offered in-person services to provide as many opportunities as possible to bring students on campus in small, controlled groups. We watched COVID-19 numbers reach their highs in late fall - early winter and as those numbers began to ebb, in February we began hybrid learning, giving the option to be learning in-person to students and their families. In April, we pivoted yet again to full-day, in-person learning, giving the option to students and their families to select whether they were ready

for that experience. And as I write this, we have just finished celebrating the Class of 2021 at in-person graduation ceremonies.

We did a lot to end the year the way we did. In addition to following local and state health departments requiring face coverings, hand hygiene, social distancing, and symptom screening, we improved air quality by increasing fresh air flow and improving filtration, and we contracted with a third-party cleaning crew for additional disinfecting of high-touch surfaces.

We also did things schools do not normally do. We provided 365,000 meals to our school families facing food insecurities. We were the first high school district to implement SHIELD screening testing, which enabled us to catch positive cases as early as two days after infection when the viral load of the infected person is low, reducing the possibility of spread. The 32,000 COVID-19 SHIELD tests we administered gave our staff and students more confidence to come back on campus.

Then there were the vaccination clinics.

District 113 stood up multiple vaccination clinics to vaccinate not only our own students and staff but also the students of 10 districts and the staff of seven districts in the Lake County area, nearly 15,000 shots in all. This was an incredible community feat for sure and I have to thank our partners Walgreens, Passport Health, our District 113 staff, and the volunteers from other districts as well as our own parent volunteers, for turning our schools from their usual functions into highly efficient vaccine deployment sites -- not once but 15 times.

The vaccines continue to bring even more good news as the CDC, state and local health departments have adjusted their guidance in light of increased vaccination rates and dropping COVID-19 infection numbers. Of course, as the guidance changes, we change with it.

Recent developments include moving into the Bridge Phase and perhaps by the time this issue is delivered, we may be in Phase 5 of the Restore Illinois Plan. The Illinois State Board of Education has given every indication that school will be full-time, in-person for the 2021-22 school year. That's the good news. What we do not yet know is what the rules will be for next year but we do expect an update at some point this summer to the joint guidance from the Illinois State Board of Education and the Illinois Department of Public Health. Once we have that guidance, we will adapt our operations accordingly.

Meanwhile, please enjoy the rest of summer while we continue to work to welcome back our students in August--all day and in person.

Pop-up shops might also be a good fit for online merchants or home-based business owners who would like a physical space to sell their merchandise or host a sample sale. Pop-ups are fun and attract new shoppers. These short-term retail environments enable customers to experience new products firsthand. Pop-up shops might be open for just one day, or a few months.

The process to open a pop-up shop in Highland Park is the same as opening a long-term brick and mortar business. Property owners may lease to a pop-up to showcase their space. If a pop-up is successful, business owners may enter into a long-term lease.
