Get to Know HP CERT

The Highland Park CERT team, established in 2004, is our local chapter of FEMA's nation-wide Community Emergency Response Team program. Our CERT team, overseen by the Police Department, is trained in emergency preparedness, disaster response and everyday support of first responders to make our community safer.

HP CERT members are resident volunteers who want to make a difference in the community with ages ranging from our high school students (who can participate with parental permission) to retirees. The team assists police and fire personnel during major public events like the Fourth of July parade, and provides additional personnel in response to natural and man-made disasters as needed. You might also see them knocking on neighborhood doors as part of the City's well-being check program. The HP CERT team participates in intergovernmental disaster simulation drills including exercises at Ravinia Festival, the Lake County Department of Health and the Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS).

Every CERT member receives training in first aid, fire suppression, disaster response, crowd control, traffic control, radio protocol, and much more. Swimming Pool Owners: Protect Our Waterways and Neighbors

Each spring and fall in our community, thousands of gallons of water are drained from residential swimming pools. This water may contain chemicals, including chlorine, bromine, algaecides, acids and other cleaning solvents, harmful to fish and aquatic life within river and Lake Michigan ecosystem. Discharging pool water into storm sewers or ravines or overland is illegal. City code requires swimming pools be drained directly to a sanitary sewer line to ensure harmful chemicals are removed at a wastewater treatment plant. Discharging into storm sewer lines pollutes ravines, natural streams, rivers and Lake Michigan.

Contractors or swimming pool companies are not authorized to access City sanitary sewer manholes or structures without approval. Please contact the Public Works Department prior to discharging so that a sanitary manhole may be identified and properly accessed. Unauthorized discharging of swimming pools could cause backups of sanitary sewer service on downstream properties. Hunger quietly impacts hundreds of our neighbors and is a year-round challenge, especially for families with school-age children and seniors. Summertime is particularly stressful as school-based meal programs are unavailable and stockpiles from holiday food drives diminish.

Over 27% of our kindergarten - eighth grade students qualify for free or reduced-cost lunches. The Moraine Township Food Pantry serves over 700 visitors each month

and many seniors depend on the pantry for basic food supplies. Our neighbors need us. No one should go hungry.

The City continues to fight hunger and we are pleased that so many have joined us. Local groups and individuals have taken on year-round hunger as a service project and the community garden is ripe for volunteers! This summer, Ravinia Festival is accepting food donations at Saturday concerts beginning June 11. Join the City

Council on Saturday, July 9 to volunteer, adopt a weekend of your own or assist another group with collection and transport back to the pantry.

Every day 91 Americans are killed by gun violence. June 2nd would have been the 19th birthday of Hadiya Pendleton, the teenager who marched in President Obama's second inaugural parade and was killed just weeks later. To honor Hadiya and others, June 2nd is National Gun Violence Awareness Day. By wearing orange on June 2nd, Americans will raise awareness about gun violence and honor the lives and lost human potential stolen by gun violence. Lakefront and Ravine Maintenance

Our winding system of ravines and towering bluffs that abut Lake Michigan make Highland Park unique. These areas, known as the Steep Slope Zone, are very sensitive to change and caution should be taken when working in these areas. Maintenance is allowed but strict regulations ensure that best management practices are followed. Sprinkler restrictions, from May 15 until September 15, prohibit sprinkler use from 12 PM to 6 PM, and limit lawn irrigation to odd/even days corresponding with the property's address (odd numbered properties may use sprinklers on odd numbered days and even numbered properties may use sprinklers on even numbered days). The Mayor's Bicycle Safety Challenge

Bicycle Safety Week begins Monday, May 23.

Mayor Nancy Rotering Challenges All Motorists and Bicyclists to Test Their Knowledge.

How well do you know Illinois laws and safety techniques regarding car and bicycle interactions? In honor of Bicycle Safety Week, Mayor Nancy Rotering is challenging all residents - cyclists and drivers - to learn how to share the road safely by using BikeSafetyQuiz.com, an online resource for adults, children, and motorists.

Bicycling is a fun way for people to be active and healthy. Many people also bike for transportation and commute to work by bicycle. But, most of us

receive little or no training about proper bicycling safety techniques, or learned about sharing the road with bikes in driver education class.

To help fill the education gap, Ride Illinois, a statewide bicycle advocacy organization, developed BikeSafetyQuiz.com. This interactive quiz includes lessons for adults, children, and motorists, and is designed to educate both brand new cyclists and drivers as well as experienced ones hoping to refine their skills. Most users can complete the quizzes in 15-30 minutes.

Take part in Bicycle Safety Week and take the quiz! Mayor Rotering took the quiz and is applying her Rules of the Road knowledge pertaining to motorist

and bicycle interactions. Mayor Rotering encourages all residents to do the same. Please join in improving traffic safety in Highland Park and beyond.



Spring Maintenance of Driveway Approaches

Each spring, following multiple freeze-thaw cycles of our Midwest winters, older driveway approaches tend to disintegrate resulting in an uneven surface. The driveway approach is the area within the public right-of-way, typically from the sidewalk to the street. For driveways that do not have an adjacent sidewalk, the public right-of-way is approximately 30'-33' from the center line of the roadway. The area associated with the driveway approach within the public right-of-way typically includes the sidewalk along the driveway, the driveway approach (asphalt or concrete or pavers), and the curb over driveway.

City code requires property owners to maintain the area within the driveway approach. This area should be kept in good condition, free from obstructions and openings, clear of snow and ice, and in a safe condition for pedestrian and vehicular travel. 

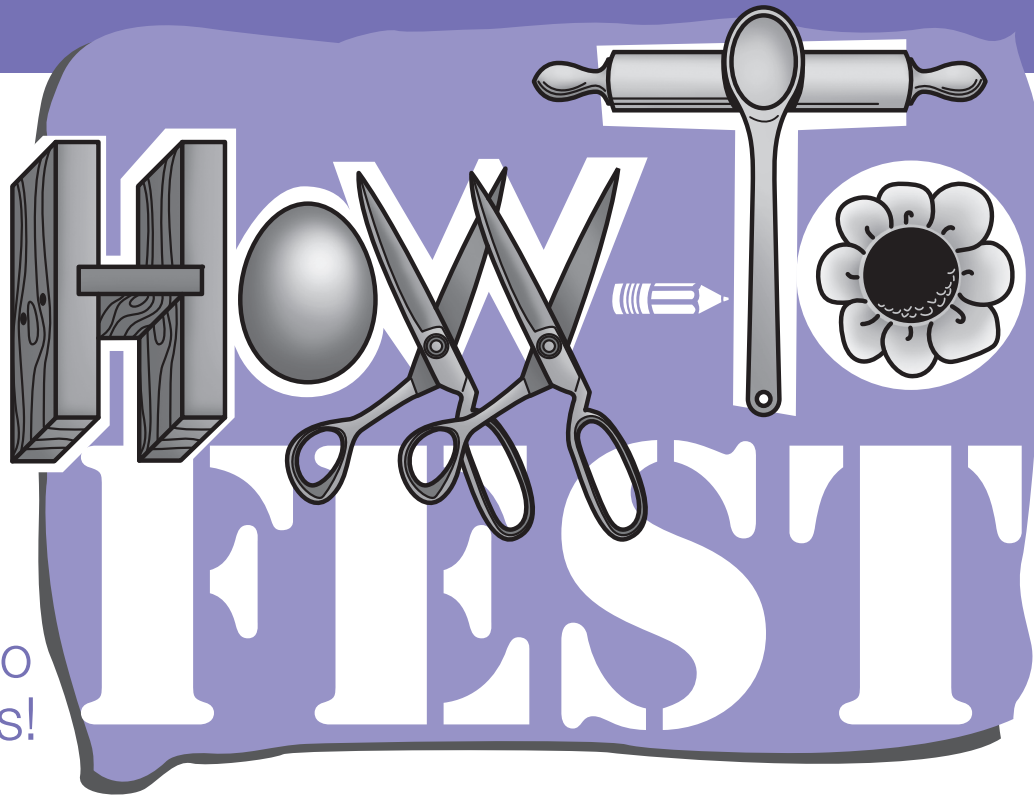

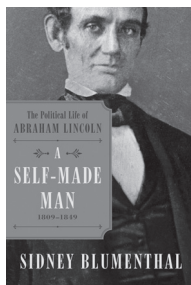
