Ravines and Bluffs: Tree Removal or Maintenance

Two of the most unique and iconic features of City of Highland Park's landscape are its winding system of ravines and bluffs towering over Lake Michigan. These ravine and bluff areas are known as the Steep Slope Zone. The steep slope zones are very sensitive to change and caution must be taken when working or planning to work in these areas. City Code does allow for the management and maintenance of these areas, but there are strict regulations in place to ensure that Best Management Practices are followed. Before working in the Steep Slope Zone, it is important to work with a professional on any improvements and to contact the Public Works Department for permit requirements. Permits are likely required for removal of vegetation, landscaping, or ecological restoration, and any type of construction.

The bluffs and ravines provide invaluable ecological, structural, and financial benefits to the residents of Highland Park. The City, along with the Park District of Highland Park has developed a guide to vegetative management in the Steep Slope Zone. This brochure is available at www.cityhpil.com/ravines. City of Highland Park Forestry

The City's Public Works Department, is responsible for the maintenance of about 30,000 trees in our community. Public Works will remove and replace about 12 crabapple trees in Downtown Highland Park on the northwest corner of First St. and Central Ave., and on Central Ave. on either side of the railroad tracks. The trees have been declining for years and will be replaced with Japanese Tree Lilac to increase diversity of our urban forest. Tree replacement work is scheduled with minimal disturbance to downtown. Planning for the Future Starts Now

We recently kicked off our FY2019 Budget planning. This six to eight month process includes planning for the upcoming year and beyond. The City Council and staff meet with commissioners, sister governments, residents and businesses. We analyze our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats; review major projects; and plan for the future. Like any business, we know that success requires informed short and long-term planning.

Our City has a \$90 million budget, nearly 280 employees, accredited police, fire and public works departments, and a strong commitment to high-quality public

service. We are on track with a balanced operating budget, healthy financial reserves, and appropriate funding to meet our State-required pension obligations. The strength of our financial condition has been re-affirmed by Moody's this year with a Aaa bond rating, the highest rating available and a rating held by only a handful of cities in Illinois. This top rating is the result of repeated balanced budgets, strong financial reserves and excellent fiscal management.

Our decision making continues to be driven by our core priorities of fiscal stability, public safety, infrastructure

investment, and community vibrancy. Over the last few years, non-essential spending has been curtailed and we have instituted long-term plans for infrastructure investments and other major expenditures with an eye towards responsible funding.

Flood Mitigation and How to Prepare Your Home

As we welcome warmer weather, longer days and blooming flowers, we must also prepare for an unwelcome flooding event.

Below are recommendations and options that can be pursued to minimize flooding risks either in a basement or yard. The risk of flooding cannot be completely prevented, especially for those living in floodplain areas, but in certain circumstances, there are options that can be done to a property to help mitigate the flooding and help alleviate some damage.

1. Inspect flood protection devices such as backflow preventers, sump pumps, and battery backups, check valves, standpipes, etc., to make sure they are in good working condition
2. Contact an authorized plumber to have your storm (rainwater) and sanitary (wastewater) lateral service pipes (running from home to street) inspected to make sure they are free of roots and debris.
3. Contact an authorized licensed plumber for inspection and verification that storm lateral service pipes are not connected to sanitary lateral service pipe or vice-versa. These two lateral pipes should remain separate and connected separately to City storm and sanitary main pipes
4. Make sure all exterior drains such as window well drains, outside yard drains, gutters, and street drains are clear of debris, leaves and any other obstructions
5. Install an overhead sanitary stem to alleviate sewer backups

Bicycle Safety

The City recommends following these bicycle safety tips to help everyone stay safe this summer:

- When riding your bicycle on Illinois roadways, you must obey the same traffic laws as vehicles. This is especially important at stop signs and traffic lights!
- Bicyclists must ride in the same direction as other traffic. Riding in the opposite direction of traffic is both dangerous and against the law.
- Wear a properly fitted bicycle helmet. Protect your brain, save your life. Every person under the age of 16 operating a bicycle, skateboard, in-line skates or any other non-motorized user-propelled wheeled device upon any public highway, sidewalk, bike path or any other public right-of-way in the City of Highland Park is required to wear a protective bicycle/safety helmet that meets current safety requirements.
- Check your equipment. Before riding, inflate tires properly and make sure your brakes are working.
- Know and follow the Illinois Bicycle Rules of the Road available at www.cityhpil.com/bike.



- Ride defensively. Never assume a vehicle or other bicyclists can see you or anticipate your next move.
- See and be seen. Whether daytime or nighttime, you need to be seen by others. Always wear neon, fluorescent, or other bright colors when riding day or night. Wear something that reflects light, such as reflective tape or markings, or flashing lights. At night, a bike lamp must be used. Front and rear bicycle lights should be used. Remember, just because you can see a driver doesn't mean the driver can see you.
- Ride single file. While it is legal for two cyclists to ride abreast, riding single file is recommended.

The City hopes these safety tips will help you and your families stay safe while bicycling this summer!



Swimming Pool Owners: Protect Waterways & Neighbors

Each spring and fall in our community, thousands of gallons of water are drained from residential swimming pools. This water may contain chemicals, including chlorine, bromine, algaecides, acids and other cleaning solvents, harmful to fish and aquatic life within river and Lake Michigan ecosystem. Discharging pool water into storm sewers or ravines or overland is illegal.

City code requires swimming pools be drained directly to a sanitary sewer line to ensure harmful chemicals are removed at a wastewater treatment plant. Discharging into storm sewer lines will result in polluting ravines, natural streams, rivers and Lake Michigan.

Contractors or swimming pool companies are not authorized to access City sanitary sewer manholes or structures. Discharging a heavy volume of swimming pool water at a high rate could cause sanitary sewer surcharges in City sanitary sewer lines potentially causing backups on sanitary sewer service laterals on downstream properties. Residents are strongly encouraged to contact Public Works prior to discharging into City sanitary sewer pipes.

Driveway Approach Curb and Driveway Sidewalk Maintenance

Following multiple freeze-thaw cycles of Midwest winters, older driveway approaches or aprons tend to disintegrate resulting in an uneven



surface causing riding discomfort. The driveway approach or apron is the area within the public right-of-way, typically from the sidewalk to the street. For driveways that do not have an adjacent sidewalk, the public right-of-way is approximately 30'-33' from the center line of the roadway. The infrastructure associated with the driveway approach within the public right-of-way typically includes the sidewalk along the driveway, the driveway approach (asphalt or concrete or pavers), and the curb over driveway (depressed or mountable).

City Code Section 93.255 requires property owners to maintain the infrastructure within the driveway approach, as noted above. The Code requires the infrastructure to be in good repair, free from obstructions and openings, clear of snow and ice, and in a safe condition for pedestrian and vehicular travel. Motorcycle Safety

Citizens can expect to see an increase in motorcycles and scooters on area roadways throughout the spring, summer and fall seasons. New and experienced riders are encouraged to enroll in a local motorcycle riders training program, which includes classroom and hands-on training. Classes cover use of the motorcycle and related equipment, review of riding skills and strategies. Attendance in these classes can reduce the likelihood and severity of a crash by teaching risk management and developing essential riding skills. For further information, contact the Motorcycle Safety Foundation at www.msf-usa.org. Participants may receive lower insurance rates by attending these classes.

The most common causes of motorcycle crashes occur when:

- A vehicle turns left in front of a motorcycle that has the right-of-way
- A vehicle rear-ends a slowing or stopping motorcycle
- A vehicle changes lanes and strikes a motorcycle
- A motorcycle exceeds the speed limit or drives too fast for conditions
- A motorcyclist collides with an animal (deer, raccoons, squirrels, birds, and pets)

Motorcycle and motorized scooter riders should wear proper protective clothing, which includes a Department of Transportation (D.O.T.) approved helmet, eye protection, jacket, gloves, pants and boots. To increase visibility, wear contrasting or light colored clothing when riding a motorcycle. Motorcyclists are encouraged to utilize turn signals, avoid traveling in a vehicles blind spot and adhere to traffic laws. Motorists are encouraged to "Start Seeing Motorcycles."

June is National Internet Safety Month - Think Before You Click

One of today's biggest threats to internet security are the users themselves. Hackers are getting better at tricking people into clicking on fraudulent links or opening up malicious attachments in emails. A large portion of today's cyberattacks originate from within an organization's own user base when they click on a link or open an attachment in malicious phishing emails. It can happen at work and at home. It only takes one click or one attachment being opened to put your system and others at risk.

It is important for internet users to be cautious when clicking on links and attachments in emails. Be sure that the email is legitimate before opening or clicking on anything. Some emails look authentic but they can be malicious attempts to coax you into opening up a hyperlink or file.

Things to ask yourself before clicking on a link or opening an attachment:

- Are you expecting an email from the recipient?
- Is the recipients email misspelled or is the link typed correctly? Is it from chase.com?
- Does the email make sense? If the subject says "UPS delivery," ask yourself if you are expecting a package.
- If an email asks you to click on a link to sign in, skip the link and go directly to the site via a web browser.

Remember, think before you click.

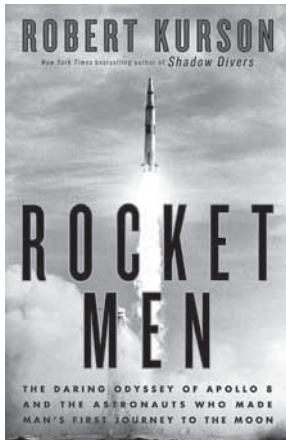
