Overnight Parking Ban Begins Dec ⁻

The "Snow Ordinance" (72.040) goes into effect each year from December 1 through March 31. Vehicles may not be parked in excess of 15 minutes on any public streets between the hours of 2 AM and 6 AM. This Citywide ban facilitates snow removal operations when necessary and decreases damage to vehicles parked on the streets or in City lots. This ban applies at all times regardless of snow conditions.

Authorized overnight City parking lots require a valid overnight parking permit, which is available for purchase in City Hall, Mondays 7:30 AM to 5 PM and 8:30 AM to 5 PM Tuesday through Friday. For more information, contact Sergeant Chris O'Neill at 847.432.7730 or coneill@cityhpil.com.

Winter Driving Tips

Winter driving can be dangerous especially on slick roads coupled with low visibility. The Police Department offers these additional suggestions for safe travel:

- Keep your gas tank full.
- Buckle seat safety belts...it's the law.

• Drive with headlights on and don't use bright lights during a snowstorm as it increases the glare and reflection from falling snow. State law requires the use of headlights when windshield wipers are activated.

• Keep all windows clear of snow and ice.

• Allow more time for travel. Drive slower and increase the distance between your car and the one in front of you. Speed should be adjusted for conditions to match traffic flow.

• If pavement is snow or ice covered, start slowly and brake gently. Braking abruptly can result in skidding and loss of control. Remember, bridges and lesser-traveled portions of roadways freeze over first.

• Be careful if you are involved in a minor accident. Exiting your vehicle on a road may result in additional accidents or injuries. If possible, relocate the vehicles involved to the nearest location free from other motorists.

• Hand-held cell phone use while driving is illegal in Illinois. Hand-held cell phone use while driving is even more dangerous during winter driving and greatly compromises public safety.

• Maintain a safe distance from State and City snow plow trucks. Do not pass snow plow trucks when they are engaged in snow plowing and salting activities.

- Move over a lane width when possible and slow down when passing stationary emergency and highway maintenance vehicles with their emergency warning lights activated. It's the law.
- If you can, avoid driving during snow storms and severe weather. Consider public transportation.

Help the Police Department reduce crashes and injuries this winter driving season. Be a safe driver and drive responsibly.

🚘 2017 - 2018 Snow Plan

Public Works offers the following FAQs in preparation for the 2017-2018 winter season. Timely response and effective execution against variable weather conditions are essential. Public Works proactively monitors weather reports and works closely with Public Safety officers to ensure efficient operations.

When are specific streets plowed? Under normal conditions all streets are plowed at least once within the first six hours of a three-inch or less snowfall. Initial snow removal operations are staged simultaneously throughout the City and multiple plowing passes along streets are required to move snow to the curb. A winter storm's magnitude may extend response times. Regardless, snow removal operations will continue until all streets are passable and all parking areas have been cleared.

How is the application of salt managed? The initial salting effort concentrates on hills, intersections and inherently hazardous areas.

Why do plows occasionally fill driveway approaches? Plows need to make multiple passes to push snow back to the curbs. Plows initially traverse the center of each street so cars can travel in both directions. Then, the plow trucks return to push the snow back to the curbs. This helps melting snow enter the storm sewers or other drainage systems. The City has approximately 10,000 residential driveways and it is not possible for the plow trucks to avoid filling driveway approaches.

When are sidewalks plowed? The City maintains approximately 130 miles of public sidewalk. For every snow event, the City first plows sidewalk areas that are considered high pedestrian foot traffic areas. These areas include in and around train stations, in the vicinity of schools, Central and Ravinia business districts, parking garage entrances, and public facilities. Upon accumulation of more than four inches of snow, the City will then plow all City sidewalks, including all residential sidewalks. This process of clearing residential sidewalks can take up to 72 hours as the City must first prioritize streets and high pedestrian foot traffic areas.

Areas or other sidewalks that are not plowed by the City are the responsibility of the abutting property owners or merchants. Depositing snow onto sidewalks makes it difficult for pedestrians to walk and for sidewalk plows to clear the walks.

How should drivers navigate the road when encountering a snow plow? The large heavy plow trucks are difficult to maneuver and visibility is reduced in less than optimal driving conditions. Plow trucks also generate slush obscuring visibility so it is important to stay clear at all times.

What assistance can residents provide? Observe street parking restrictions and avoid parking on the street until after the road has been cleared after a significant snowfall event. Ensure snow is not pushed onto a neighbor's property. The City prohibits removing snow or ice from any building, private property, driveway, driveway approach or public sidewalk and depositing it onto public streets. Who should residents call? During regular working hours contact Public Works at 847.432.0807. During off hours or emergencies call the Police dispatch hotline at 847.432.7730.


🔆 Snow Removal Guidelines

It is a violation to remove snow from one parcel of property and deposit it onto another parcel (*including the adjacent public parkway*) without consent of the property owner. Some snow removal companies push snow from one property, across public streets, and onto the parkway on the opposite side of the street. Depositing snow in this manner can damage property, create a nuisance, and hamper sight lines from adjacent properties. The code does provide an exemption to allow plow operators to deposit snow on the City parkway located immediately adjacent to and on the same side of street as the property from which the snow is being removed.

Property owners should inform their private snow removal companies of the Snow Removal Ordinance provisions. Snow plow operators observed improperly depositing snow in violation of the ordinance will be cited; however, residents are ultimately responsible for compliance and may also be cited.

As a reminder, it is responsibility of abutting property owners or merchants to clear the sidewalks after every snow event. Public sidewalk routes will be plowed after accumulations

of 4 inches. This process of clearing r e s i d e n t i a l sidewalks can take up to 72 hours as streets and high pedestrian foot traffic areas take priority.

Our Community

City Communications - Who to Call When

In times of emergency, call volumes to the Communication Center can quickly exceed the capacity to handle every call as it comes in. While the normal call volume is about 50 calls an hour, in emergency situations such as a flash flood or snow storm, the call volumes can increase to over 500 calls an hour!

When faced with an emergency, it can be frustrating if you don't know the proper number to call for assistance. Knowing the proper number to call can save valuable time when reporting an emergency. You may wish to add these numbers to your phone so that you have them, and don't need to look them up.

• If there is an emergency, call 911. In the event of a significant emergency, such as a fire or major traffic accident, call volumes may exceed the capacity of our dispatch center. When that happens, calls may be answered by our 911 backup center. The backup center is located in another community and the dispatcher answering your call may not be familiar with the ongoing emergency. Please be patient and provide them with as much information as you can.

• For all other calls during off hours that may require police, fire department, public works or community development response, please use the non-emergency number, 847.432.7730. This enables the dispatch center to respond to calls in order of importance. If call volumes are extremely high, you may be


redirected through the automated attendant several times before someone is available to answer your call. Please be patient, all calls will be answered.

• During business hours, Public Works can be contacted at 847.432.0807. Problems can also be reported through the City's non-emergency request tracker which allows residents to see if the issue has already been reported and to see the status of the work. For example, a flooded street should be reported here.

• Please be patient. The dispatchers will need to ask you to provide some information that you may feel is irrelevant. This information is needed to quickly and accurately send our public safety personnel to the proper location.

• Don't be offended if the dispatcher asks you what town you are calling from. Highland Park is part of a regional dispatch center that answers calls for over a dozen communities. Many of these communities have the same/similar street names. They need to confirm your location to ensure the call is sent to the proper public safety personnel.

• Remain calm. During an emergency, it's common to get excited and try to provide all your information as quickly as possible. You should first explain the nature of your emergency (flooding, fire, medical, etc.). The dispatcher will begin asking you a series of questions and guide you through the reporting process. Be patient. While you are answering the questions, the dispatcher will be entering your information into the computer aided dispatch system. This information will be forwarded to the responding units and will make sure that accurate and complete information is given to the responding agency.


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Highland Park High School Fall Productions

This year, students participating in the Fall Play are taking a different approach to prepare. David Solotke, theatre and film making teacher at Highland Park High School, wanted students to connect with and understand the context of *The Diary of Anne Frank*. Solotke took the students to



the Illinois Holocaust Museum & Education Center, where the students took an in-depth look at World War II, the Holocaust, and the experience of the Frank family. The students had an opportunity to speak with a Holocaust survivor and hear a first hand account of what it was like to live through such a difficult time in history.

When attendees enter the Studio Theatre Lobby, they will immediately be immersed in World War II Amsterdam. The lobby decor will include artifacts and information to set the stage for the production. Students have prepared a timeline with main events and actions from World War II, as well as a timeline documenting the Frank family's experience, so the audience understands the historical context of the play.

Immediately following the three-day production, Highland Park High School will host a powerful conversation with Elisha Wiesel, son of the late Holocaust survivor and Nobel Peace Prize winner Elie Wiesel, in collaboration with the Illinois Holocaust Museum & Education Center. Elisha will share his lessons for humanity's present and future, and the imperative of helping the world remember, understand, and learn from the lessons of the Holocaust. The lecture will take place in the Highland Park High School Auditorium on Sunday, November 19 from 1:00 - 2:00 pm. Reservations are required. Tickets for the Fall Play and other theater productions will be \$10 each. The musical, which will be presented in February, will be \$15 per ticket.
