Renew Vehicle Sticker & Dog License

It's time to renew City vehicle stickers and dog licenses.

- Renew online at cityhpil.com;
- Renew at City Hall, 1707 St. Johns Avenue, during regular business hours (M, 7:30 AM - 5 PM and T-F, 8:30 AM - 5 PM);
- Renew by mail

Vehicle stickers are \$55 per passenger vehicle and must be displayed by October 1. Upgrade your sticker to support the 112 Education Foundation with a minimum donation of \$30. For more information on the Foundation, visit www.112foundation.org. Stickers purchased after September 30 are subject to a late fee. Renewal fees for dog licenses are \$7 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$12 for unaltered dogs. A current rabies vaccination certificate is required for renewal.

Year-Round Bulk Item Pick-Up

Lakeshore Recycling System (LRS) offers year-round bulk item pickup service. Single-family residential refuse customers may place one bulk item at the curb each week for free on their regular pickup day. LRS will take one 'bulk' item that can be safely removed and is under 50 pounds (tables, chairs, mattresses etc.). No sticker or container is required. This does not include white goods (such as appliances), electronics, or construction debris (including carpet). LRS recommends calling ahead to let them know that the item is being placed on the curb to ensure the truck is prepared to collect the item. Change Your Clocks & Smoke Detector Batteries

Sunday, November 4 at 2 AM, daylight savings time ends and all clocks must be set back by one hour. With the changing of the clocks, the Fire Department reminds residents to change the batteries in their smoke detectors. This simple act could save many lives. These valuable devices provide early warning of fire. The most commonly cited cause of non-working smoke alarms is worn or missing batteries.

The National Fire Protection Association recommends that there be at least one smoke detector outside of every sleeping area and on each floor of a home. Call the Fire Prevention Division with questions at 847. 926.0808.



Seeking Nominations for 26th Annual Historic Preservation Awards

The Historic Preservation Commission is accepting nominations for the 2018 Highland Park Historic Preservation Awards. These awards recognize and encourage projects to preserve, conserve and protect buildings, objects, landscapes of historic significance in Highland Park. Winners in 2017 included the rehabilitation and addition of the house at 2426 Montgomery, an addition at 186 Hazel, a rehabilitation at 486 Ravine, and an honorable mention for rehabilitation at 330 Cedar.

The 2018 Preservation Awards will recognize five categories: Restoration, Rehabilitation, Adaptive Reuse, Landscape Restoration and New Construction. Nominations are due to City Hall by Monday, October 22. Awards will be presented in December. Nomination forms are available at the Highland Park Public Library or online at cityhpil.com. Imagine a Day Without Water

Turn on the tap, and potable drinking water flows out. Most of us hardly think twice about the infrastructure that brings water to our homes; we should.

On October 10, the City participated in the 4th Annual Imagine a Day without Water, a nationwide day of education and advocacy about the value of water. Many communities have lived, and are living, without water because they don't have access to safe and reliable water systems.

Recently the City upgraded its water plant to an Ultra-Filtration Membrane Plant, installed new water meters along with an automatic meter reading system, and replaced and upsized miles of water mains.

Skunks & Nuisance Animals

During certain times of the year, there is an increase in animal activity, specifically skunks, feral cats and coyotes. The City practices a no-kill policy pertaining to domestic and uninjured wild animals and encourages citizens to respect and co-exist with wildlife. For information about nuisance animals visit the City's website: cityhpil.com/nuisanceanimals.

Residents may contract with private animal control services to trap and remove nuisance animals on their properties. The Police Department will respond to nuisance animal complaints only when a in-progress public safety condition exists. Residents may report deceased animals on public roadways and public properties to the Police Department via the non-emergency number **847.432.7730**.



Homeowners: Driveway Approach Curb and Sidewalk Maintenance

The driveway approach or apron is the area within the public right-of-way, typically from the sidewalk to the street. For driveways that do not have an adjacent sidewalk, the public right-of-way is approximately 30'-33' from the center line of the roadway. The infrastructure associated with the driveway approach within the public right-of-way typically includes the sidewalk along the driveway, the driveway approach (asphalt or concrete or pavers), and the curb over driveway (depressed or mountable).

City Code requires property owners to maintain the infrastructure within the driveway approach. The Code requires the infrastructure to be in good repair, free from obstructions

and openings, clear of snow and ice, and in a safe condition for pedestrian and vehicular travel.
