Letter from the Mayor

We achieved many milestones in 2018. In addition to enhancing our community's overall quality of life, we protected the city's on-going fiscal sustainability, invested in hundreds of infrastructure projects to improve our neighborhoods, and kept our city safe. We worked hard to advance business development, increase communications, and support human services, environmental sustainability initiatives, and cultural arts plans. My City Council colleagues and I are proud to work with City staff, government partners, residents, and local businesses focusing on issues that matter to all of us.

Recognizing that collaboration and synergies benefit the public and improve efficiencies, we continue to meet regularly with government partners, local clergy, and multiple citizen advisory task forces and community groups. Conversations result in collaboration on a multitude of initiatives that benefit our daily life, achieve synergies, and provide representative government at its best.

Notably, we finalized the sale of the Highland Park Country Club golf course to the Park District, helping them achieve an objective in their long-range plan as well as keeping an eye on using part of the land for flood mitigation. We have taken the lead working with government partners including the US Army Corp of Engineers on a long-term flood mitigation solution. With the City's assistance, North Shore School District 112 implemented new traffic plans addressing increased enrollment at its middle schools and successfully completed the addition of a road at Edgewood Middle School. Additionally, sister governments worked together to promote a culture of inclusivity, and supported human and social services.

Partnerships with our business community support our local economy, create new jobs, and reduce property tax burdens on residents. Our development process has been streamlined, bringing new market-driven housing to our downtown, and in-fill development throughout neighborhoods. We are eagerly awaiting the completion of the redevelopment of the former Highland Park Movie Theater site to help revitalize the east end of Downtown Highland Park, the addition of a new Experience Center at Ravinia Festival, and we are looking forward to a new apartment building in the Ravinia Business District.

As the New Year begins, we remain deeply committed to meeting the needs of our community now and in the future. In 2019, we head into a year's worth of celebrating Highland Park's 150th Anniversary. We invite you to join with us as we reflect on our rich history and bring the community together to celebrate our future. A number of fun, family-friendly, community-wide events and programs are planned. Thank you for being our partners and our neighbors.

Core Priorities

Four major priorities and organizational objectives guide the City of Highland Park's policy and direction - Fiscal Stability, Public Safety, Infrastructure Investment and Community Vibrancy. In 2017, the City completed more than 150 major projects and initiatives outside of the City's day-to-day operations that are based on the foundation of the four priorities.

Fiscal Stability

Fiscal stability is a critical component of effective city management. The City reviews its operations, seizes opportunities to improve its financial health, and encourages development and cost-sharing opportunities to better serve the community.

Public Safety

The City's nationally-accredited Fire, Police and Public Works Departments are known for expedited response times and high-quality service. All three departments work together to strengthen community relations, provide on-going education, and improve the daily lives of residents.

Community Vibrancy

The City continued to support human services, cultural arts, and sustainability efforts within the community. Business development efforts continue to foster a thriving business community relative to the economy by providing business retention, support, and attraction efforts.

Infrastructure Investment

Infrastructure investment is a key component in ensuring a community's economic growth and vitality. In 2017, the City addressed aging infrastructure by doubling our investment in our streets. The \$12 million investment in infrastructure addressed sidewalks, water mains, sewers, and bridges. Environmentally-sustainable strategies are actively considered in all projects. 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Continued Regional Stormwater Management Efforts

The City has been working with a number of government agencies including the US Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) on a long-term flood mitigation solution for the residents who live along the Skokie and Middle Fork Rivers. City Council approved an agreement with ACOE for a preliminary study related to regional flood mitigation solutions. The preliminary study is currently being initiated by ACOE.

Tree City USA Growth Award and Arbor Day Event

The City received the 2018 Growth Award from the Arbor Day Foundation in recognition of the City's innovative programs and projects. The City hosted an expanded community Arbor Day event to celebrate the achievement. The City's Forestry Section is responsible for the maintenance of about 30,000 public trees.

2018 Asphalt Rehabilitation Program

The Asphalt Street Rehabilitation Program is an annual program designed to extend the life of existing pavements and also provide a new, smooth riding surface for motorists. Streets are prioritized as part of the annual 5-year Capital Improvement Plan budget, based on life safety, age of infrastructure, economies of scale, functional deficiencies and with regard to the reduction of longterm expensive repairs. Sidewalk Repairs and Replacements

The annual sidewalk repair program addresses tripping hazards and replacement of deteriorated sidewalk panels. The City maintains 120 miles of public sidewalk including walkways within Business Districts, public parking lots, and other specified areas. The City received Railroad Safety Funds through the IDOT for the construction of a new sidewalk along the north side of Clavey Road. The new sidewalk begins at Barberry Road at the west end, and continues east to the Skokie Valley Bike Path.





Highland Park Country Club

Four agreements were approved between the City and Park District finalizing the long-term future of the Highland Park Country Club (HPCC). The City will retain ownership of the HPCC building and Route 41 properties. Banquet operations and meeting room rentals at the HPCC will continue. In addition to banquet events, the City plans to move the Senior Center from its current location on Laurel Avenue to the HPCC within the next few years.

Ravinia Business District Street scape Improvement

The City gathered input through a robust pubic input process that included focus groups, a public workshop, neighborhood meetings, and close coordination with the Ravinia Business District Association to establish final designs for the Ravinia Business District Streetscape Improvement project. Lighting and banner poles will be installed in the spring, 2019.

Designated Bike Friendly Community

The City has been awarded a Bicycle Friendly Community designation by the League of American Bicyclists. The League reserves this award for select communities with impressive commitments to bicycling. The City's BikeWalk HP 2030 Plan set forth actions and strategies for improving access and safety for walkers and bicyclists of all ages and abilities.


"I'll Be There For You"

City Financial Overview

The Government Finance Officers' Association awarded the City the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award and the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the 24th year and the 34th year, respectively. These are the highest recognitions in government accounting, financial reporting, and budgeting, and their attainment represent significant accomplishments by a government and its management. The City's Aaa bond rating was also confirmed, reflecting sound fiscal management.




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Revenues

Diversified revenue is important in ensuring a stable budget. In 2018, the City's total revenues were budgeted at \$86 million. In 2018, the City budgeted 15% of its total revenue from property taxes.
