VILLAGE OF HUNTLEY SPECIAL VILLAGE BOARD January 9, 2020 MEETING MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER:

A meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Huntley was called to order on Thursday, January 9, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. in the Municipal Complex, Village Board Room, 10987 Main St., Huntley, Illinois 60142.

IN ATTENDANCE: Village Manager David Johnson, Assistant Village Manager Lisa Armour, Management Assistant Barbara Read, Director of Development Services Charles Nordman, Chief Robert Porter, Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell, and Village Attorney John Cowlin.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Mayor Sass led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Mr. Paxton Knopsnyder, 12893 Farm Hill Drive, commented on the proposed construction of the Holiday Inn Express at Regency Square and noted that there is increased traffic on Farm Hill Drive and Cold Springs now and asked if a traffic study could be conducted.

Ms. Melissa Solis, 11330 Dean Street, stated that they have owned their home since November, 2019 and stated that it is intolerable to live there with the noise from the trucks at the Dean Foods facility. She stated that the decibels are over 90 at night and on Sundays. She stated that they have already put up sound-proof curtains but it doesn't help as the trucks are parking on the fence line adjacent to their property. She asked the Village for assistance. Mayor Sass stated they have been asked to put the trailers on the east side of the lot and also noted that the Village is in negotiations with them regarding their proposed plans. Village Manager Johnsons stated that there is a meeting with Country Delight on Monday and Staff will discuss the issues at that time.

Ms. Michelle Thimios, District Director for Representative Lauren Underwood, reported on the various items the Representative can help residents and municipalities and also noted recent accomplishments. Ms. Thimios gave information for distribution in the Village Hall reception area.

b) Consideration – Approval of the January 9, 2020 Bill List in the amount of \$282,312.32

Mayor Sass reported that \$237,730.77 of the bill list expenditures is from the FY19 Budget and the remaining \$44,581.44 is from the FY20 Budget.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions; there were none.

c) Consideration – A Resolution Approving a Façade Improvement Assistance Program Grant for DNT Properties LLC, 10501 Route 47

Director of Development Services Charles Nordman reviewed a Power Point presentation and reported that the petitioner, DNT Properties LLC, has submitted a Façade Improvement Assistance Program application requesting \$20,000.00 in assistance for improvements to 10501 Route 47. The scope of work proposes to remove the existing canopy signage and bracing located over the showroom portion of the building and construct a new canopy that will be sided with 'James Hardie' artisan shiplap siding. The work also proposes to paint the existing face brick, limestone sills, and overhead doors on the portion of the building utilized by the used auto dealership. The other portions of the building will

remain as existing and no other site improvements are proposed. The construction cost of the proposed work is estimated at \$45,000 (the petitioner has submitted three quotes for the proposed work which range from \$49,000 to \$59,875).

The petitioner was previously before the Village Board on August 22, 2019, to request an extension for completing exterior improvements that are required as a condition of Ordinance (O)2018-07.26, which approved a special use permit for Sardar Motors Inc. to operate a used automobile dealership. The petitioner was requesting a twelve-month extension; however, the Village Board granted an extension of six months, therefore requiring the exterior improvements to be completed by February 29, 2020 (Ordinance (O) 2019-08.55). Failure to complete the required improvements by February 29, 2020 shall constitute grounds for the revocation of the special use permit for Sardar Motors.

Staff Analysis

The Façade Improvement Assistance Program Guide identifies specific exterior improvements that are eligible for reimbursement. All proposed exterior improvements are identified as eligible improvements under the guidelines of the program.

The Village Board shall evaluate the project based on the value of the aesthetic improvements to the Village of Huntley and the following criteria:

- Condition of the building and need for renovation (see photos with application)
- Extent to which the improvements conform to the Downtown Revitalization Plan and Commercial Design Guidelines
- Extent to which the proposed improvements restore, maintain, or enhance the character of the building and surrounding area

Strategic Plan Priority

The 2016-2020 Strategic Plan identifies "Promote New Business Development, Retention, and Expansion" as a priority, and "clean up or redevelop businesses along Route 47 corridor north of Main Street" as an objective.

Financial Impact

The FY20 budget includes \$50,000 for the Façade Improvement Assistance Program in the Downtown TIF District No. 2 Fund.

The Façade Improvement Assistance Program allows reimbursement of up to fifty percent (50%) of the project cost per property with a maximum reimbursement of \$10,000 per project. As a policy, the maximum aggregate amount of all grants approved for a property within any five (5) year period shall be limited to \$20,000. The estimated cost of the proposed improvements totals \$45,000 which would allow for a maximum reimbursement of \$20,000 if the Village Board finds that the proposed project meets the review criteria.

Legal Analysis

If the requested grant is approved by the Village Board, the petitioner must sign and abide by the terms of the Façade Improvement Assistance Program Agreement in order to be reimbursed for the project.

Director Nordman reported that the property owner, Tommy Kondraros, was in attendance to answer questions.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions.

Trustee Goldman asked if there was going to be any signage on the building. Mr. Kondraros stated that he is waiting to hear from Sardar regarding signage.

Trustee Piwko asked if this project will be completed by February 29th? Mr. Kondraros said that he has the contractors lined up and ready to start.

Mayor Sass asked about the completion of the parking lot as it is nothing but gravel and doesn't work. Mayor Sass also stated that the proposed plans do not look much different than the building does presently.

Trustee Westberg recommended that the old glass block be replaced with a commercial grade window so that the building looks better. Mr. Kondraros stated that the glass block is in the office.

Trustee Kanakaris stated that he is not ready to vote on this item as the building does not look right and that nothing is changed from its current appearance.

Trustee Hoeft stated that he needs to see the proposed signage.

Trustee Goldman stated that he needs to improve on the aesthetics of the building.

Mayor Sass asked if it was the consensus of the Village Board to have the petitioner return with signage and the removal of the glass block window with a store-front window. Trustee Westberg asked Mr. Kondraros how long it would take for him to prepare this information.

Trustee Hoeft asked about the signage and stated that he could not vote until the sign plan was presented. Director Nordman stated that the current sign is a sign box.

Trustee Leopold told Mr. Kondraros that he needs to prepare a new design for the building and return in 30-days. Mr. Kondraros stated that he has already spent over \$7,000 for the design.

Trustee Westberg asked Mr. Kondraros if he could return in 30 or 60 days with an improved design.

It was the consensus of the Village Board for Mr. Kondraros to return in 60 days or sooner with an improved design.

d) Consideration – A Resolution Authorizing Negotiations for a Business Development Agreement with Huntley Hotel, LLC for a Holiday Inn Express on a 5.7 Acre Site at Regency Square

Village Manager David Johnson reviewed a Power Point presentation and reported that the contract purchaser owns several properties in the Village including the new multi-tenant center with Starbucks at Reed's Corner. He has informed staff that he has secured an IHG Franchise for a Holiday Inn Express for the Huntley market. He has indicated that this is a three-year license granting him the franchise rights for Huntley. He also stated he is ready to contract with an architect. The proposed hotel would include approximately 95-100 rooms.

Staff Analysis

The site is zoned Business Park – Planned Development District ("BP-PDD") and a hotel is a special use within Regency Square. The site is subject to the Regency Square Design Guidelines and will require at a minimum the following review and approvals from the Plan Commission and Village Board:

- 1. Special Use Permit
- 2. Site Plan Review, including any necessary relief
- 3. Plat of Subdivision

The contract purchaser has expressed interest in starting construction in Summer 2020, with an opening in the Summer of 2021.

Strategic Plan Priority

The 2016-2020 Strategic Plan identifies "Promote New Business Development, Retention, and Expansion" as a priority, and "secure a commitment for the construction of a hotel" as an objective.

Financial Impact

The contract purchaser is seeking financial assistance. The estimated project cost is \$11.5 million. The purchaser is seeking authorization from the Village Board to enter into negotiations for a Business Development Agreement that would provide for a property tax abatement and rebate of hotel/motel taxes.

Legal Analysis

A Business Development Agreement would require future Village Board approval.

Village Manage Johnson reported that the property owner, Henry Patel, was in attendance to answer questions.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions.

Trustee Leopold stated that the proposed building looks like an apartment house. Mr. Patel stated that Holiday Inn is very strict on their design standards.

Mayor Sass asked Mr. Patel to do whatever possible to make the building look better; Mr. Patel agreed.

Trustee Westberg stated that he anticipates most of the traffic coming from the east on Kreutzer Road from Route 47 and not Farm Hill Drive and doesn't believe that there will be a need for a traffic study. Trustee Leopold agreed.

e) Consideration – A Resolution Approving a Bid Award to Compass Minerals for the Purchase of Water Softening Salt in the Amount of \$104 per ton

Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell reported that the Village operates five water treatment plants that utilize the Ion-Exchange process to treat water to IEPA standards. Each water plant has three softeners. Salt is required to regenerate the softeners after a predetermined amount of water is filtered through. The water treatment plants cannot treat and produce drinking water without salt. Therefore, it is vital to purchase from a qualified, reliable source to ensure availability of product throughout the year.

On Thursday, December 19, 2019 the Village received bids from two contractors for the purchase of Water Softening Salt. The bid results are summarized in the attached bid tabulation.

Staff Analysis

The bids have been reviewed by Staff and the lowest responsive, responsible bidder is Compass Minerals in the Year 1 Unit Price Bid amount of \$104 per ton. Based on an estimated annual quantity of 1,200 tons, the estimated Year 1 annual cost is \$124,800. The Village has been obtaining water softening salt from Compass Minerals for over 20 years. All is in order to award the bid to Compass Minerals.

Financial Impact

The FY20 budget includes \$190,000 in the Water Operating Expense Fund, line item 510-60-65-7225 for water treatment chemicals of which \$160,000 is budgeted for Water Softening Salt.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions; there were none.

A MOTION was made to approve a Resolution Approving a Bid Award to Compass Minerals for the Purchase of Water Softening Salt in the Amount of \$104 per ton.

f) Consideration – A Resolution Waiving the Formal Bidding Process and Approving the Purchase of Chemicals from Hawkins, Inc. in an Amount Not to Exceed \$130,000

Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell reported that water and wastewater plants cannot properly operate without various chemicals. IEPA regulations require the permittee to maintain parameters that only can be met through the use of specific chemicals.

Staff Analysis

The Village has been obtaining water and wastewater treatment chemicals from Hawkins, Inc. for approximately the past 12 years. The quality and consistency of chemicals purchased can have an effect on water and wastewater plant operations and many of the chemicals used by the Village are proprietary in nature. Changing vendors would most likely result in a disruption of plant processes for both the water and wastewater treatment plants. Due to the importance of maintaining compliance with IEPA regulations and the specialized nature of these products, it would be in the Village's best interest to waive the formal bidding process for the purchase of these commodities and allow the continued purchase from this vendor.

Financial Impact

The FY20 budget includes \$100,000 in the Wastewater Operating Fund, 520-60-66-7225 and \$30,000 in the Water Operating Fund, 510-60-65-7225 for this item.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions; there were none.

g) Consideration – A Resolution Authorizing the Waiver of the Formal Bidding Process and Approving the Purchase of Water Meters and Radio Transmitters from Core & Main in an Amount Not to Exceed \$150,000

Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell reported that Village Board approval is requested for the purchase of up to \$150,000 in water meters and radio transmitters from Core & Main. The Village Board's approval of the request will allow for the sale of water meter and radio devices in new residential and commercial properties as well as the on-going replacement and maintenance of aging water meters and non-functioning radio devices. This will help ensure the accurate and efficient gathering of water meter readings and proper billing of water use consumption to the Village's customers. Due to the proprietary nature of the meter radio transmitters and mobile drive-by reading equipment, staff is requesting the Board waive competitive bidding.

Staff Analysis

Accurate reading and billing of water use is vital to ensure adequate funding to support operational and capital needs within the Water and Wastewater Divisions.

The Village uses a drive-by meter radio system to gather meter reads for the Village's bi-monthly billing of utilities. Replacement of the water meter and radio device typically occur every 15 to 20 years, at which time the accuracy of the water meter begins to decrease and the battery life of the radio transmitter has been exhausted. Once the battery stops functioning, the radio ceases to transmit and the drive-by reading equipment can no longer read the water meter. Accounts that have radio transmitting devices that no longer function require the water bill to be estimated until such time that the radio device can be replaced and an actual meter reading can be taken off the face of the water meter.

The meter radio transmitters and mobile drive-by reading equipment are specific to each meter company. The reading equipment from one manufacturer cannot read the meter radios from another manufacturer. For this reason, staff is requesting the Village Board waive competitive bidding and proceed with the purchase of the water meters and radio devices through Core & Main.

Financial Impact

The FY20 budget includes \$150,000 in the Water Capital Improvement and Equipment Fund line items 515-00-00-7110 (\$75,000) and 515-00-00-8123 (\$75,000) for the purchase of new Meters and MXU's. Meter sales revenue is budgeted at \$25,000 in line item 515-00-00-4640.

Because the warranty period for water meters and radio transmitters begins upon purchase and not installation, it is preferred not to keep an extraordinary amount of stock on hand. For that reason, staff is requesting authorization to expend up to the budgeted amount of \$150,000 for the purchase of water meters and radio transmitters with an understanding that these items would not be purchased as part of a single order, but would be purchased on an as-needed basis throughout the fiscal year. If the expenditure is approved, staff would not return to the Board for approval of the subsequent purchases (within the budgeted amount) in this fiscal year.

Legal Analysis

Given the proprietary, single-source nature of meter radio devices, waiver of competitive bidding is requested.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comment or questions; there were none.

Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell reported that on August 8, 2019, the Village Board approved a Resolution Authorizing a Bid Award to Mauro Sewer Construction Inc. in the amount of \$429,955.00 for the 2019 Water Main Replacement Program.

Mauro Sewer Construction, Inc. has submitted the second and final payout request for the 2019 Water Main Replacement Program. Public Works and Engineering staff has reviewed the request and all is in order for approval of Payout Request No. 2 (Final). The project final cost is \$25,082 (5.8%) below the Bid amount.

Staff Analysis

Financial Impact

The FY19 Budget included \$385,000 for the Water Main Replacement Program engineering and construction in the Water Capital Improvement and Equipment Fund 515-00-00-8004. If necessary, a budget amendment will be presented to the Village Board for consideration at a later date.

i) Consideration – A Resolution Authorizing a Professional Services Agreement with Ruekert-Mielke. Inc. for a Water System Capacity Analysis

Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell reported that a Proposal dated November 26, 2019 was received from Ruekert-Mielke, the Village GIS consultant, for a Water System Capacity Analysis.

Staff Analysis

A Water System Capacity Analysis can be used in conjunction with GIS as a tool to identify existing issues within the water distribution system and to evaluate alternatives for correcting deficiencies or areas of concern. The analysis would also provide information on what could be done to address areas in the Village with low pressure and be used to plan for development. Flow and pressures throughout the Village could be analyzed with new pipes, replacement of mains with larger sizes and looped systems.

The cost for the Water System Capacity Analysis is \$59,400.

Financial Impact

The FY20 Budget includes \$59,400 in the Water Capital Improvement and Equipment Fund 515-00-00-6120.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions; there were none.

j) Consideration – A Resolution Authorizing Professional Service Agreements with Ruekert-Mielke for GIS and Asset Management Program Services

Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell reported that proposals were received from Ruekert-Mielke, the Village GIS consultant, for the annual GIS and Asset Management Program services.

Staff Analysis

Each year over the past several years, the Village has budgeted funds to continue building the GIS system on an incremental basis. The GIS inventory and update has provided the Village with additional data including field verified utility locations that was uploaded to the web application for these areas. The cost for continued web-based GIS services is \$29,230 in 2020.

A new addition to the program in 2018 was an asset management solution called VUEWorks, with six modules consisting of Service Requests, Work Orders, Resource Manager, Condition, Request Portal, and MobileVue specific to Public Works initiatives. The Service Request Module tracks calls, complaints and requests from citizens. The cost to implement the Asset Management solution tailored to the existing GIS Program was \$50,000 in FY2018 and \$36,450 in 2019. The Asset Management implementation is now complete and costs are reduced to an annual subscription charge and support services at \$30,000 total.

Financial Impact

The FY20 Budget includes funding shared across six funds for the GIS and Asset Management Program services.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions; there were none.

k) Consideration – A Resolution Waiving the Formal Bidding Process and Approving the Purchase of Bulk Fuel from Blu Petroleum

Director of Public Works and Engineering Timothy Farrell reported that the Village Board approved a fuel delivery contract with Blu Petroleum on March 24, 2016. The terms of the contract required Blu Petroleum to remove the existing aging gasoline and diesel fuel supply equipment located at the Public Works Facility and replace with new equipment including tanks, monitors, pumps, meters, hoses, nozzles, etc. The removal and installation of new equipment was completed in the Spring of 2016 and has been in use since that time. The Blu Petroleum equipment has a value of nearly \$24,000 and is provided to the Village at no cost as long as the Village purchases gasoline and diesel fuel from Blu Petroleum.

Staff Analysis

Blu Petroleum Fuel price is determined as follows:

87 Gasoline = Daily Rack + \$0.20; Diesel = Daily Rack + \$0.23

Daily Rack is usually set once per day and includes the cost of the fuel itself, as well as transportation, overhead, and profit costs. The price can vary from terminal to terminal and depends on the cost of crude oil and related refining costs. Blu Petroleum's service also includes the fuel system accounting.

As of December 16, 2019, total annual usage for all Village departments was 64,138 gallons. In addition, the Huntley Fire Protection District also utilizes the Village fueling system and was billed for an additional 21,528 gallons of fuel for the same period.

Financial Impact

The FY20 budget includes \$160,800 for fuel purchases in all departments.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions.

Trustee Leopold asked if Staff checked prices with Palatine; Director Farrell stated that Blu Petroleum is less expensive, provides the equipment at no additional cost and their customer service is better.

There were no other comments or questions.

 Consideration – A Resolution Authorizing the Purchase of Two 2020 Police Ford Interceptor SUV Vehicles through the Illinois Department of Central Management Services (CMS) Procurement Program in the Amount of \$71,410.00

Chief Robert Porter reported that based on current vehicle use and projected mileage of vehicles, the FY20 Budget provides for the replacement of two police patrol vehicles. These two vehicles will replace vehicles with high mileage and will be used in the police patrol division as fully marked squad cars.

Staff Analysis

The FY20 replacement plan will address the replacement of Squad #20, a 2013 Ford Interceptor SUV with 133,443 miles, and Squad #26, a 2013 Ford Interceptor Sedan with 110,437 miles. Both are used in the patrol division.

Authorization to dispose of these vehicles will be requested at a later date. Both vehicles will be replaced with the 2020 Ford Interceptor SUV.

Financial Impact

The Village will purchase these vehicles through the Illinois Department of Central Management Services (CMS) Procurement Program. Total cost for the two vehicles is \$71,410.00. This is within the approved budget amount of \$50,000 for each vehicle. Additional funds will be utilized to equip the police vehicles with emergency equipment once the vehicles are delivered. Funds for this project will come from the Village's Equipment Replacement Fund line item: 480-50-00-8132.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions.

Trustee Leopold asked if the vehicles will be black and white; Chief Porter stated that the will be black and white.

m) Consideration – A Resolution Authorizing an Intergovernmental Agreement with Kane County for Animal Control Services in the Kane County Portion of the Village

Chief Robert Porter reported that the Village of Huntley is located in both Kane and McHenry Counties and therefore receives animal control services from both counties. Kane County requires a signed agreement with the Village to provide these services. The Village entered into an agreement with Kane

County for Animal Control services for the Kane County portion of the Village in 2018. The agreement expired on December 31, 2019. The agreement provided an option for renewal.

Staff Analysis

The services being renewed include pickup of stray domestic animals and animals that would be considered dangerous or a nuisance. The services also include the removal of wild animals that are sick or injured.

Financial Impact

In order to provide these services to Village residents within Kane County, Kane County Animal Control would charge the Village a fee to cover their costs which could range from \$20.00 to \$175.00 per animal as per the attached fee schedule. Average cost of animal impoundment is approximately \$100.00 per animal. The fees are the same as in the previous contract.

Legal Analysis

The Agreement has been reviewed by the Village Attorney.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions.

Trustee Leopold asked what the cost would be to trap and remove coyotes; Chief Porter stated that to do this would require the need to hire a private trapper and not Kane County. Trustee Leopold asked about removal of raccoons from someone's attic; Chief Porter stated that would be the homeowner's responsibility.

Chief Porter reported that the County would be called to remove a dead or injured animal from the street.

Trustee Leopold asked how many times Kane County's services were needed in 2019; Chief Porter reported that the County was called two times in 2019.

There were no other comments or questions.

n) Consideration – A Resolution Authorizing Expenditure of Funds for the Purchase of Information Technology Support Services

Assistant Village Manager Lisa Armour reported that the Village Board approved a Master Contract and 2020 Task Order with Advanced Business Networks (ABN) on December 19, 2019 for the provision of supplementary information technology services. ABN assistance is provided via two ABN employees

that are on-site for a total of 16 hours per week ("support hours") as well as off-site monitoring and management of the Village's network infrastructure ("project hours").

Staff Analysis

ABN provides a 20% discount by purchasing blocks of pre-paid project hours over 300 hours and a 33% discount by purchasing support hours. As in previous years, Staff is seeking authorization to commit the Village to purchase an initial block of 350 project hours at a cost of \$42,000 and 416 support hours (six months) at a cost of \$41,600 for FY20. Additional support hours will be purchased for the remaining six months of the year at a later date. Project hours and support hours do not have an expiration date and if not used during FY20 could be carried over to FY21.

Strategic Plan Priority

The 2016-2020 Strategic Plan identifies *Promote Innovation through Technology* as a priority and "continually monitor network security system to protect against cyber-attack" as an objective.

Financial Impact

The total cost for these services was budgeted for in the FY20 Budget.

Mayor Sass asked if the Village Board had any comments or questions; there were none.

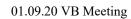

Agenda Item: Consideration - Ordinance Amending Chapter 156 of the Huntley Code

Regarding Zoning Regulations for Medical Cannabis Facilities Operating in Accordance with the Illinois Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis

Program Act, 430 ILCS 130/1 et seq.

Petitioner: Village of Huntley

Department: Development Services Department - Planning and Zoning Division

Introduction

Medical cannabis businesses are regulated under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act (the "Act") and consist of two types of businesses: dispensaries and cultivation centers. As with Adult-Use Cannabis, Medical Cannabis businesses are exclusively licensed by the state, and the statute and state regulatory process largely govern the manner in which the businesses operate. Home rule power is preempted except for authority to enact "reasonable zoning ordinances" that do not conflict with the state Act (410 ILCS 130/140).

Differences between medical and recreational (Adult-Use) Cannabis relevant to the zoning process include:

- No local prohibition option for medical cannabis. A local government "may not unreasonably prohibit the cultivation, dispensing, and use of medical cannabis" as authorized by state law (410 ILCS 130/140). Accordingly, the Village cannot simply prohibit medical cannabis dispensaries or cultivation centers, and it cannot enact zoning regulations that are unreasonably restrictive such that they would effectively prohibit these uses.
- No local cap on the number of businesses. Unlike with Adult-Use Cannabis, the Medical Cannabis Act does not authorize a municipality to cap the number of dispensaries or cultivation centers within their jurisdiction.
- <u>Buffer requirements</u>. The Act specifies buffer requirements for Medical Cannabis cultivation centers (2,500 feet from the property line of a pre-existing public or private preschool or elementary or secondary school or day care center, day care home, group day care home, part-day child care facility, or an area zoned for residential use). When it was originally adopted, the Act also specified buffer requirements for dispensaries, but a recent amendment states that those requirements "shall not apply to any dispensing organizations registered on or after July 1, 2019." Although (unlike the Adult-Use Cannabis statute) the Act does not expressly authorize local governments to impose buffer requirements, it is reasonable to conclude that buffers could be part of a municipality's "reasonable zoning ordinances" in the absence of a state requirement, provided that the buffers do not unreasonably limit the sites available.
- On-Premises Consumption. Unlike the Adult-Use Cannabis statute, the Medical Cannabis Act does not address on-premises consumption of cannabis within a medical dispensary or local authority to regulate such activities. Similar to buffer requirements, a prohibition of on-premises consumption would be justified as a reasonable zoning regulation in the absence of a state law requirement.

The Village's Special Counsel has prepared a memorandum, dated December 5, 2019, providing a further explanation of the Act. Special Counsel will be in attendance at the Village Board meeting to answer questions on the subject.

Staff Analysis

To maintain consistency with the proposed Adult-Use Cannabis dispensary regulations (which will be considered in as a separate agenda item), a Medical Cannabis dispensary is also proposed as a special use in the "C-2" Regional Retail Zoning District. The additional standards for Medical Cannabis dispensaries are also the same terms as proposed for Adult-Use Cannabis dispensaries, except that the numerical limit of one dispensary cannot not apply.

The Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act does not allow a municipality to prohibit a Medical Cannabis cultivation center; thus, a Medical Cannabis cultivation center has been proposed as a special use in the "M" Manufacturing Zoning District. The Act prohibits a medical cultivation center from locating within 2,500 feet (0.47 miles) of pre-existing schools, daycare facilities, and areas zoned for residential use, which significantly limits possible locations in the Village. The only "M" Manufacturing zoned property that meets the 2,500 feet buffer requirement is located south of Interstate 90, west of Route 47.

Proposed Zoning Code Amendments

The following is the proposed Zoning Code amendment in its entirety:

Section 156.011, entitled "Definitions" of Article II, entitled "Interpretations and Definitions," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part to add the following new definitions:

"Medical Cannabis Cultivation Center" means a facility operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Illinois Department of Agriculture to perform necessary activities to provide registered Medical Cannabis dispensing organizations with usable Medical Cannabis.

"Medical Cannabis Dispensary" means a facility operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation to acquire Medical Cannabis from a registered Medical Cannabis cultivation center for the purpose of dispensing cannabis, paraphernalia, or related supplies and educational materials to registered qualifying patients.

SECTION III. Section 156.061, entitled "(C-2) Regional Retail District" of Article VI, entitled "Planned Development District," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

§ 156.061 (C-2) REGIONAL RETAIL DISTRICT

* * *

(B) Uses.

* * *

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the C-2 District:

<u>RETAIL SALES</u> – Furniture sales (used), Outdoor sales & service, Secondhand store, <u>Medical cannabis dispensary</u>.

SECTION IV. Section 156.045, entitled "(M) Manufacturing District" of Article V, entitled "Business and Non-Residential Districts," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

§ 156.045 (M) MANUFACTURING DISTRICT

* * * * * (B) Uses. * * * *

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the M District:

<u>AGRICULTURAL BUSINESS</u> - Kennel/boarding, Poultry hatchery, Veterinary Hospital, Wind Energy Systems (large or small), <u>Medical</u> <u>Cannabis cultivation center.</u>

<u>SECTION V.</u> Section 156.068, entitled "Special Use Permits" of Article VII, entitled "Special Use Permits," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

(F) Special Standards for Specified Special Uses. Where the district regulations authorizing any special use permit in a particular district impose special standards to be met by such use in such district, a permit for such use in such district shall not be recommended or granted unless the applicant shall establish compliance with such special standards.

* * *

(10) Medical Cannabis Cultivation Centers.

a. <u>Location Restrictions</u>

(i) No Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall be established, maintained or operated on any lot that has a property line within 2,500 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private pre-school or elementary or secondary school or day care center, day care home, group day care home, part-day child care facility, or an area zoned for residential use.

(ii) Medical Cannabis cultivation centers shall not be established on multiple-use or multiple-tenant property or on a property that shares parking with other users.

b. Manufacture and Production Standards

- (i) <u>Unless otherwise stated herein or provided by state law, the Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall conform to all Village rules, regulations and ordinances.</u>
- (ii) All Medical Cannabis cultivation centers shall comply with the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 410 ILCS 130/1 et seq., ("Medical Cannabis Act") and all rules and regulations adopted in accordance therewith.
- (iii) Parking areas shall be well lit and monitored by video surveillance equipment in accordance with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations.
- c. Setbacks/Lot Area/Bulk Regulations. A Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall conform to the setback, lot area, and bulk regulations applicable to the zoning district in which the Medical Cannabis cultivation center is located.

d. Signage

- (i) Other than signage expressly required by State law, all signage for a Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall be limited to one flat wall sign not to exceed ten square feet in area, and one identifying sign, which can only include the center's address, not to exceed two square feet in area; such signs shall not be directly illuminated.
- (ii) Electronic changeable copy signs and temporary signs are not permitted in connection with a Medical Cannabis cultivation center.
- e. Age and Access Limitations. Cultivation centers shall not employ anyone under the age of twenty-one (21). Access shall be limited exclusively to Medical Cannabis cultivation center staff and local and state officials and those specifically authorized under the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations.

f. Security and Video Surveillance

(i) The Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall be an enclosed locked facility and shall provide and maintain adequate security on the premises, including lighting, video surveillance, and alarms that comply with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations. The facility shall be enclosed by a high security fence. The fence must be adequately secure to prevent unauthorized entry and include gates connected into an access control system.

- (ii) The Medical Cannabis cultivation center parking area, cultivation, production, warehousing areas, and shipping bays and entrance shall be monitored by video surveillance equipment that complies with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations. The operator shall promptly make such records available to the Huntley Police Department upon request.
- (iii) Loading of all Medical Cannabis products shall occur within secure enclosed shipping bays and shall not be visible from the exterior of the building.
- (iv) A Medical Cannabis cultivation center is subject to inspection by the Huntley Police Department and/or Huntley Development Services Department at any time during regular business hours.
- g. Noxious Odors. All Medical Cannabis cultivation centers shall operate in a manner that prevents odor impacts on neighboring premises or properties, and, if necessary, the facility shall be ventilated with a system for odor control.

h. Conduct on Site

- (i) <u>Retail sales of Medical Cannabis or Medical Cannabis infused products</u> are strictly prohibited at Medical Cannabis cultivation centers.
- (ii) It shall be unlawful for a Medical Cannabis cultivation center to cultivate, manufacture, process, package, or sell any product other than useable cannabis and cannabis-infused products intended for human consumption in accordance with the Medical Cannabis Act.
- i. Interpretation. The provisions of this Subsection 156.068(F)(10) are intended to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the provisions and limitations of the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations promulgated thereunder.

(11) Medical Cannabis Dispensaries

- a. Minimum required buffer from protected uses:
 - i. A Medical Cannabis dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private nursery school, preschool, primary or secondary school, or day care center. Learning centers and vocational/trade centers shall not be classified as a public or private school for purposes of this Section.
 - (ii) A Medical Cannabis dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of an existing religious establishment, park district property, or library.

- (iii) A Medical Cannabis dispensary may not be located within 250 feet of residentially zoned property except when separated by a State highway.
- (iv) For the purposes of this section, distances shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures or objects, from the nearest point on the property line of the lot on which an applicable Medical Cannabis dispensary is located to the nearest point on a property line of any protected use.
- (v) **Summary of Buffer Requirements:**

- b. A Medical Cannabis dispensary may not conduct any sales or distribution of cannabis other than as authorized by the Medical Cannabis Act; provided, however, that if the Medical Cannabis dispensary is also a licensed Adult-Use Cannabis Dispensary, then it may conduct sales or distribution of cannabis in accordance with the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq. and the regulations of this Chapter that apply to Adult-Use Cannabis Dispensaries.
- c. Exterior Display: A Medical Cannabis dispensary shall be maintained or operated in a manner that the public viewing of cannabis, cannabis products, cannabis paraphernalia or similar products from any sidewalk, public or private right-of-way or from outside of the cannabis dispensing organization is not allowed.
- d. <u>Hours of Operations: Hours of operation are limited to between 6:00am and 10:00pm.</u>
- e. Environmental: Emission of dust, fumes, vapors, or odors in a manner that impacts neighboring premises or properties or any public property or right-of-way shall be prohibited.
- f. Signage: Electronic changeable copy signs are not permitted for a Medical Cannabis dispensary. No cannabis leaf or bud image may be used in promotional signage for a Medical Cannabis dispensary.

- g. State Requirements: The Medical Cannabis dispensary must comply with all applicable provisions of the Medical Cannabis Act as may be revised or amended from time to time.
- h. All hazardous waste and cannabis waste shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of the statutes of the State of Illinois and ordinances of the Village of Huntley.
- i. On-Premises Consumption: It shall be prohibited to consume cannabis products in a Medical Cannabis dispensary or anywhere on the site occupied by a Medical Cannabis dispensary.
- j. Other Cannabis Businesses Prohibited. Adult-Use Cannabis craft growers, cultivation centers, infusers, processors, and transporter organizations shall not be permitted to be co-located with a medical cannabis dispensary.
- k. Interpretation. The provisions of this Subsection 156.068(F)(11) are intended to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the provisions and limitations of the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations promulgated thereunder.

Plan Commission Recommendation

On December 9, 2019, the Plan Commission conducted a public hearing to consider regulations for cannabis businesses operating in accordance with the Illinois Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act. There were no members of the public that requested to testify at the hearing. The Plan Commission recommended unanimously by a vote of 7-0 to approve the proposed amendments as drafted.

The December 9, 2019, Plan Commission meeting minutes are provided as an exhibit to this report.

Financial Impact

The Cannabis Retailers' Occupation Tax is not applicable to Medical Cannabis; therefore, the Village cannot collect a tax on the sale of Medical Cannabis.

Action Requested

The Village Board is requested to consider the Plan Commission's recommendation for the proposed Text Amendments to the Village of Huntley Zoning Code regarding Medical Cannabis businesses operating in accordance with the Illinois Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 430 ILCS 130/1 *et seq.*, and act on a motion to consider the amendments as drafted, or as discussed and modified.

Re: Regulation of Medical Cannabis Cultivation Centers and Dispensaries

A. Background

The Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 410 ILCS 130, (the "*Act*") was originally enacted by the Illinois General Assembly effective January 1, 2014. In June 2019, the General Assembly passed various amendments to the Act in connection with the legalization of adult-use cannabis pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 401 ILCS 705/1-1, *et. seq.* The Act sets forth an extensive statewide regulatory scheme for production, distribution, and use of medical cannabis and provides for the operation of two types of medical cannabis businesses: medical cannabis dispensaries and medical cannabis cultivation centers.¹

State law governs the total number of medical cannabis dispensaries and cultivation centers that may operate throughout Illinois. Up to 60 medical cannabis dispensaries may be registered in Illinois, and those registrations are further allocated among several "Dispensing Organization Districts." 410 ILCS 130/115. Kane County is designated as a Dispensing Organization District and allocated two registrations, and there are two medical cannabis dispensaries currently registered in Kane County. McHenry County is also designated as a Dispensing Organization District and is allocated one registration. There is not currently a registered medical cannabis dispensary in McHenry County. The Act also authorizes the registration of one cultivation center in each of Illinois' twenty-two State Police Districts. Huntley is located in District 2, which consists of Lake, Kane, McHenry, DuPage, and DeKalb Counties, and there is currently one medical cannabis cultivation center registered in District 2.

The Act establishes some basic regulations for the location of cultivation centers. Specifically, a cultivation center must be located more than 2,500 feet from pre-existing schools, day care facilities, and areas zoned for residential use. 410 ILCS 130/105(c). Although the Act originally included buffer requirements for medical cannabis dispensaries as well, those requirements were eliminated by recent amendments to the Act and will not apply to medical dispensaries registered on or after July 1, 2019. 410 ILCS 130/130(d).

The Act also authorizes municipalities to enact "reasonable" local land use regulations that do not "unreasonably prohibit the cultivation, dispensing, and use of medical cannabis" in accordance with the Act. 410 ILCS 130/140. Accordingly, local zoning regulations can limit the location of medical cannabis businesses, including by establishing reasonable buffer limitations for medical dispensaries, provided that the buffers or other limitations are not so restrictive as to effectively prohibit medical cannabis businesses from locating within the community.

Except for land use regulations authorized by the Act, local regulation over medical cannabis facilities is generally prohibited. *Id.* Much like the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act's regulatory structure of adult-use cannabis businesses, the Act delegates most regulatory and enforcement functions to State agencies. The Department of Professional and Financial Regulation ("*DPFR*") exclusively licenses and oversees medical cannabis dispensaries, and the Department of Agriculture ("*DOA*") exclusively licenses and oversees medical cannabis cultivation centers. Both DFPR and DOA have adopted administrative rules that extensively regulate topics such as registration and licensing of medical cannabis facilities and their owners and staff; security systems and procedures; production, storage, transportation, and distribution of medical cannabis; facility hours and access; electronic surveillance and alarm systems; recordkeeping; inventory control; sanitation; inspections and investigations; and disciplinary procedures. But the regulations do not comprehensively cover many subjects that fall within traditional municipal zoning authority, such as minimum lot size, setbacks, parking, screening, landscaping, signage, and separation from/ proximity to other uses.

Although local authority to establish land use regulations for medical cannabis businesses is similar in many ways to local authority over adult-use cannabis businesses (which were discussed in greater detail in our memorandum to the Plan Commission dated November 4, 2019) there are some key differences, including the following:

- No prohibition option for medical cannabis. Unlike with adult-use cannabis businesses, the Village does not have the option to simply prohibit medical cannabis cultivation centers or dispensaries. Under the Act, a local government "may not unreasonably prohibit the cultivation, dispensing, and use of medical cannabis" as authorized by state law. 410 ILCS 130/140. The Village also cannot make zoning regulations that are unreasonably restrictive such that they would effectively prohibit medical cannabis businesses.
- No cap on the number of businesses. The Act does not authorize a municipality to impose
 a cap on the number of medical cannabis dispensaries or cultivation centers within their
 jurisdiction.
- <u>Buffer requirements</u>. As discussed above, the Act specifies buffer requirements for medical cannabis cultivation centers, which will preempt any conflicting local regulations. See 410 ILCS 130/140. But the Act does not dictate any particular buffer requirements for dispensaries registered with the State on or after July 1, 2019. Accordingly, buffers between new dispensaries and other, sensitive uses can be established as part of the Village's reasonable zoning regulations.

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On-Premises Consumption. Unlike the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, the Act does
not address on-premises consumption of cannabis within a medical dispensary. Since the
Act is silent on this subject, a local prohibition of on-premises consumption would not
conflict with the Act and could be included in the Village's reasonable zoning regulations.

B. Proposed Zoning Code Amendments.

A draft ordinance is provided with this memorandum and includes the following proposed regulations for the Plan Commission's consideration and discussion:

- Zoning Districts: The draft ordinance proposes that medical cannabis dispensaries
 would be appropriately classified as a special use in the C-2 Regional Retail District, and
 that medical cannabis cultivation centers would be appropriate classified as a special use
 in the M Manufacturing District. The Plan Commission previously recommended that adultuse dispensaries should be classified as special uses in the C-2 District.
- Buffers: The draft ordinance incorporates the buffer requirements prescribed by State law
 for medical cultivation centers. It proposes that medical dispensaries be subject to the
 same buffer requirements that the Plan Commission recommended for adult-use
 dispensaries.
- **Performance Standards:** The draft ordinance includes suggestions for performance standards for medical dispensaries and cultivation centers that do not conflict with the Act and applicable State regulations. With respect to medical dispensaries, the proposed standards parallel those that the Plan Commission recommended for adult-use dispensaries. If medical cannabis businesses are classified as special uses, then additional, reasonable site-specific conditions could be imposed as part of granting the special use permit. Note that, as discussed above, the Act and State regulations establish significant requirements for the physical facilities and operations of medical cannabis businesses, which preempt conflicting or concurrent local regulations, so those subjects need not be addressed in the Zoning Code.
- On-Premises Consumption: It is proposed that the Plan Commission consider prohibiting on-premise consumption at medical dispensaries. The Plan Commission previously recommended that on-premises consumption be prohibited in adult-use dispensaries.

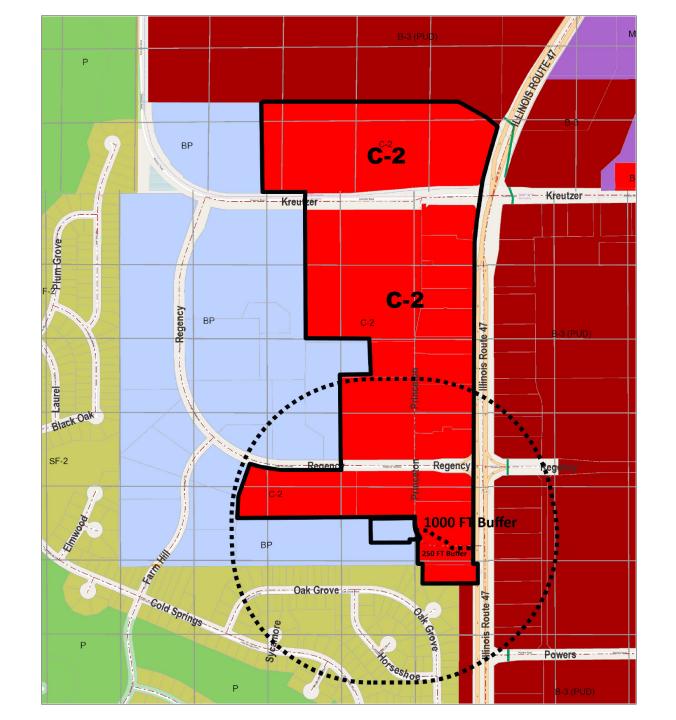

Map 1 - Buffers from Sensitive Uses

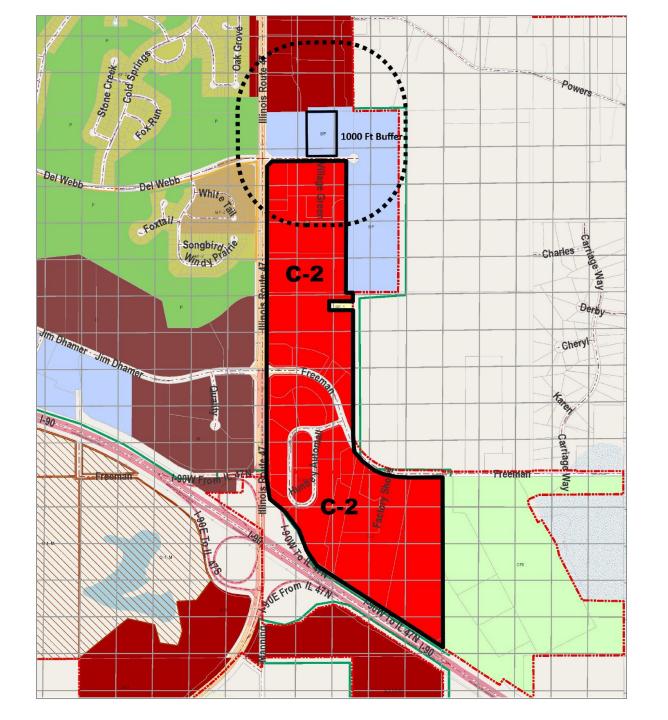

Medical Dispensaries Proposed in C-2 as a Special Use

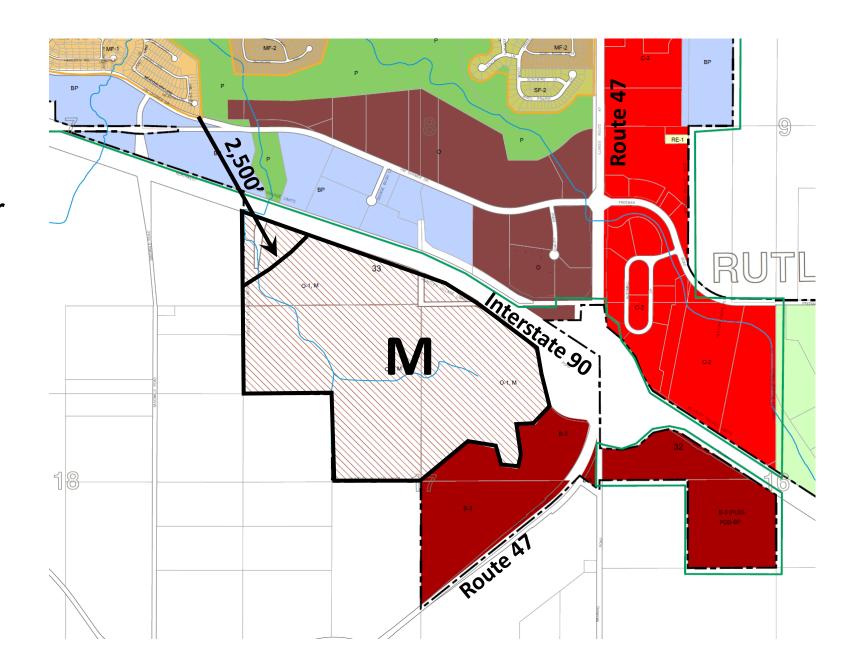
Map 2 - Buffers from Sensitive Uses

EXCERPT FROM 12/9/19 PLAN COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES

A. Petition No. 19-12.3, Village of Huntley, as petitioner, Consideration of potential text amendments to the Village of Huntley Zoning Ordinance regarding medical cannabis businesses operating in accordance with the Illinois Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 430 ILCS 130/1 et seq., including specifically whether to include state-authorized medical cannabis dispensing organizations and medical cannabis cultivation centers as permitted or special uses in non-residential zoning districts in the Village, minimum distance limitations from sensitive uses, and other reasonable zoning regulations relating to the location, time, place, and manner, of such medical cannabis business establishments.

A MOTION was made to open the public hearing to consider Petition No. 19-12.3.

Chairman Kibort stated that a public hearing is being conducted and all audience members that would like to speak tonight must be sworn in. After the swearing in, Chairman Kibort announced the Village's Special Counsel and staff would be giving a presentation and he introduced Betsy Gates-Alford and Director Nordman.

Regulation of Medical Cannabis Cultivation Centers and Dispensaries

Special Counsel Gates-Alford gave a brief slide show presentation. Counsel began by reviewing the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 410 ILCS 130, (the "Act"). The Act was originally enacted by the Illinois General Assembly effective January 1, 2014. In June 2019, the General Assembly passed various amendments to the Act in connection with the legalization of adult-use cannabis pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 401 ILCS 705/1-1, et. seq. The Act sets forth an extensive statewide regulatory scheme for production, distribution, and use of medical cannabis and provides for the operation of two types of medical cannabis businesses: medical cannabis dispensaries and medical cannabis cultivation centers.

Special Counsel Gates-Alford stated that State law governs the total number of medical cannabis dispensaries and cultivation centers that may operate throughout Illinois. Up to 60 medical cannabis dispensaries may be registered in Illinois, and those registrations are further allocated among several "Dispensing Organization Districts." 410 ILCS 130/115. Kane County is designated as a Dispensing Organization District and allocated two registrations, and there are two medical cannabis dispensaries currently registered in Kane County. McHenry County is also designated as a Dispensing Organization District and is allocated one registration. - Zoning Districts: The draft ordinance proposes that medical cannabis dispensaries would be appropriately classified as a special use in the C-2 Regional Retail District, and that medical cannabis cultivation centers would be appropriate classified as a special use in the M Manufacturing District. The Plan Commission previously recommended that adult-use dispensaries should be classified as special uses in the C-2 District.
- <u>Buffers:</u> The draft ordinance incorporates the buffer requirements prescribed by State law for medical cultivation centers. It proposes that medical dispensaries be subject to the same buffer requirements that the Plan Commission recommended for adult-use dispensaries.
- Performance Standards: The draft ordinance includes suggestions for performance standards for medical dispensaries and cultivation centers that do not conflict with the Act and applicable State regulations. With respect to medical dispensaries, the proposed standards parallel those that the Plan Commission recommended for adult-use dispensaries. If medical cannabis businesses are classified as special uses, then additional, reasonable site-specific conditions could be imposed as part of granting the special use permit. - On-Premises Consumption: It is proposed that the Plan Commission consider prohibiting on-premise
 consumption at medical dispensaries. The Plan Commission previously recommended that on-premises
 consumption be prohibited in adult-use dispensaries.

This concluded Special Counsel Gates-Alford's presentation, and she stated Director Nordman would be adding a few comments.

Director Nordman conducted a short recap of the proposed areas where a medical marijuana dispensary could possibly locate in the Village.

Director Nordman stated in order to maintain consistency with the adult-use cannabis dispensary regulations reviewed by the Plan Commission on November 11, 2019, a medical cannabis dispensary is also proposed as a special use in the "C-2" Regional Retail zoning district. The additional standards for medical cannabis dispensaries are also the same terms as the Plan Commission reviewed for adult-use cannabis dispensaries, except that the numerical limit of one dispensary cannot not apply. Director Nordman highlighted the areas on the zoning map where a medical dispensary could be located, and discussed the buffer areas. Map 1 displayed the proposed 1,000 –foot buffer from Daycare centers, and a 250-foot buffer from Residential zoned parcels. Map 2 displayed the 1,000-foot buffer from Schools.

Director Nordman stated the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act does not allow a municipality from prohibiting a medical cannabis cultivation center; thus, a medical cannabis cultivation center has been proposed as a special use in the "M" Manufacturing zoning district. The Act prohibits a medical cultivation center from locating within 2,500 feet (0.47 miles) of pre-existing schools, daycare facilities, and areas zoned for residential use, which significantly limits possible locations in the Village. The only "M" Manufacturing zoned

property that meets the 2,500 feet buffer requirement is located south of Interstate 90, west of Route 47. Director Nordman highlighted this area on the zoning map.

Director Nordman then referred to the formal language of the text amendment included in the Commissioner's packets, and explained this is what the Commissioners are being asked to review and offer their recommendation the Village Board.

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS

Section 156.011, entitled "Definitions" of Article II, entitled "Interpretations and Definitions," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part to add the following new definitions:

"Medical Cannabis Cultivation Center" means a facility operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Illinois Department of Agriculture to perform necessary activities to provide registered medical cannabis dispensing organizations with usable medical cannabis.

"Medical Cannabis Dispensary" means a facility operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation to acquire medical cannabis from a registered medical cannabis cultivation center for the purpose of dispensing cannabis, paraphernalia, or related supplies and educational materials to registered qualifying patients.

SECTION III. Section 156.061, entitled "(C-2) Regional Retail District" of Article VI, entitled "Planned Development District," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

§ 156.061 (C-2) REGIONAL RETAIL DISTRICT

(B) Uses.

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the C-2 District:

<u>RETAIL SALES</u> – Furniture sales (used), Outdoor sales & service, Secondhand store, adult-use cannabis dispensary, <u>Medical cannabis dispensary</u>.

<u>SECTION IV.</u> Section 156.045, entitled "(M) Manufacturing District" of Article V, entitled "Business and Non-Residential Districts," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

§ 156.045 (M) MANUFACTURING DISTRICT

(B) Uses. * * * *

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the M District:

<u>AGRICULTURAL BUSINESS</u> - Kennel/boarding, Poultry hatchery, Veterinary Hospital, Wind Energy Systems (large or small), <u>Medical cannabis cultivation</u> center.

<u>SECTION V.</u> Section 156.068, entitled "Special Use Permits" of Article VII, entitled "Special Use Permits," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

(F) Special Standards for Specified Special Uses. Where the district regulations authorizing any special use permit in a particular district impose special standards to be met by such use in such district, a permit for such use in such district shall not be recommended or granted unless the applicant shall establish compliance with such special standards.

* * *

(10) Medical Cannabis Cultivation Centers.

a. Location Restrictions

- (i) No medical cannabis cultivation center shall be established, maintained or operated on any lot that has a property line within 2,500 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private pre-school or elementary or secondary school or day care center, day care home, group day care home, part day child care facility, or an area zoned for residential use.
- (ii) Medical cannabis cultivation centers shall not be established on multiple-use or multiple-tenant property or on a property that shares parking with other users.

b. Manufacture and Production Standards

- (i) <u>Unless otherwise stated herein or provided by state law, the medical cannabis cultivation center shall conform to all Village rules, regulations and ordinances.</u>
- (ii) All medical cannabis cultivation centers shall comply with the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 410 ILCS 130/1 et seq., ("Medical Cannabis Act") and all rules and regulations adopted in accordance therewith.
- (iii) <u>Parking areas shall be well lit and monitored by video surveillance equipment in accordance with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations.</u>
- c. <u>Setbacks/Lot Area/Bulk Regulations</u>. A medical cannabis cultivation center shall conform to the setback, lot area, and bulk regulations applicable to the zoning district in which the medical cannabis cultivation center is located.

d. Signage

- (i) Other than signage expressly required by State law, all signage for a medical cannabis cultivation center shall be limited to one flat wall sign not to exceed ten square feet in area, and one identifying sign, which can only include the center's address, not to exceed two square feet in area; such signs shall not be directly illuminated.
- (ii) Electronic changeable copy signs and temporary signs are not permitted in connection with a medical cannabis cultivation center.
- e. Age and Access Limitations. Cultivation centers shall not employ anyone under the age of twenty-one (21). Access shall be limited exclusively to medical cannabis cultivation center staff and local and state officials and those specifically authorized under the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations.

f. Security and Video Surveillance

- (i) The medical cannabis cultivation center shall be an enclosed locked facility and shall provide and maintain adequate security on the premises, including lighting, video surveillance, and alarms that comply with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations. The facility shall be enclosed by a high security fence. The fence must be adequately secure to prevent unauthorized entry and include gates connected into an access control system.
- (ii) The medical cannabis cultivation center parking area, cultivation, production, warehousing areas, and shipping bays and entrance shall be monitored by video surveillance equipment that complies with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations. The operator shall promptly make such records available to the Huntley Police Department upon request.
- (iii) Loading of all medical cannabis products shall occur within secure enclosed shipping bays and shall not be visible from the exterior of the building.
- (iv) A medical cannabis cultivation center is subject to inspection by the Huntley Police Department and/or Huntley Development Services at any time during regular business hours.
- g. Noxious Odors. All medical cannabis cultivation centers shall operate in a manner that prevents odor impacts on neighboring premises or properties, and, if necessary, the facility shall be ventilated with a system for odor control.

h. Conduct on Site

- (i) <u>Retail sales of medical cannabis or medical cannabis infused products are</u> strictly prohibited at medical cannabis cultivation centers.
- (ii) It shall be unlawful for a medical cannabis cultivation center to cultivate, manufacture, process, package, or sell any product other than useable cannabis and cannabis-infused products intended for human consumption in accordance with the Medical Cannabis Act.

i. <u>Interpretation.</u> The provisions of this Subsection 156.068(F)(10) are intended to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the provisions and limitations of the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations promulgated thereunder.

(11) Medical Cannabis Dispensaries

- a. Minimum required buffer from protected uses:
 - i. A medical cannabis dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private nursery school, preschool, primary or secondary school, or day care center. Learning centers and vocational/trade centers shall not be classified as a public or private school for purposes of this Section.
- (ii) A medical cannabis dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of an existing religious establishment, park district property, or library.
- (iii) A medical cannabis dispensary may not be located within 250 feet of residentially zoned property except when separated by a State highway.
- (iv) For the purposes of this section, distances shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures or objects, from the nearest point on the property line of the lot on which an applicable medical cannabis dispensary is located to the nearest point on a property line of any protected use.

- b. A medical cannabis dispensary may not conduct any sales or distribution of cannabis other than as authorized by the Medical Cannabis Act; provided, however, that if the medical cannabis dispensary is also a licensed adult-use Cannabis Dispensary, then it may conduct sales or distribution of cannabis in accordance with the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq. and the regulations of this Chapter that apply to adult-use Cannabis Dispensaries.
- c. Exterior Display: A medical cannabis dispensary shall be maintained or operated in a manner that the public viewing of cannabis, cannabis products, cannabis paraphernalia or similar products from any sidewalk, public or private right-of-way or from outside of the cannabis dispensing organization is not allowed.

- d. Hours of Operations: Hours of operation are limited to between 6:00am and 10:00pm.
- e. Environmental: Emission of dust, fumes, vapors, or odors in a manner that impacts neighboring premises or properties or any public property or right-of-way shall be prohibited.
- f. Signage: Electronic changeable copy signs are not permitted for a medical cannabis dispensary. No cannabis leaf or bud image may be used in promotional signage for a medical cannabis dispensary.
- g. State Requirements: The medical cannabis dispensary must comply with all applicable provisions of the Medical Cannabis Act as may be revised or amended from time to time.
- h. All hazardous waste and cannabis waste shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of the statutes of the State of Illinois and ordinances of the Village of Huntley.
- i. On-Premises Consumption: It shall be prohibited to consume cannabis products in a medical cannabis dispensary or anywhere on the site occupied by a medical cannabis dispensary.
- j. Other Cannabis Businesses Prohibited. Adult-use cannabis craft growers, cultivation centers, infusers, processors, and transporter organizations shall not be permitted to be co-located with a medical cannabis dispensary.
- k. <u>Interpretation.</u> The provisions of this Subsection 156.068(F)(11) are intended to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the provisions and limitations of the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations promulgated thereunder.

Director Nordman concluded his presentation.

situation. She stated the reason for the zoning language is to determine whether (or not) a lounge for consumption (on premises) would be allowed. As the staff report indicates, a lounge is not intended to be an allowed use for any dispensary in Huntley.

All Commissioners were in favor of the zoning amendment as written and had no further comments.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 156 OF THE HUNTLEY VILLAGE CODE REGARDING ZONING REGULATIONS FOR MEDICAL CANNABIS FACILITIES

Ordinance (O)2020-01.__

WHEREAS, the Village of Huntley is a home rule unit of local government under the Illinois Constitution, 1970, Article VII, Section 6; and

WHEREAS, Title XV, Chapter 156 of the Huntley Code ("Zoning Code") regulates the use and development of land within the Village and provides for the administration and enforcement of such regulations; and

WHEREAS, from time to time it is appropriate to review, update and modify the Zoning Code to assure that it appropriately addresses new issues that may arise; and

WHEREAS, the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 410 ILCS 130 (the "Act"), sets forth a statewide regulatory scheme for a medical cannabis program, including regulations for the establishment and operation of medical cannabis dispensaries and cultivation centers; and

WHEREAS, Section 140 of the Act, 410 ILCS 130/140, authorizes all municipalities to enact reasonable local zoning and land use ordinances regulating state-registered medical cannabis dispensaries and cultivation centers, provided that such local regulations do not unreasonably prohibit the cultivation, dispensing, and use of Medical Cannabis in accordance with the Act; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Trustees have determined that, pursuant to the authority granted by Section 140 of the Act, the Zoning Code should be amended to establish reasonable zoning regulations for the establishment and maintenance of medical cannabis dispensary and cultivation center uses within certain non-residential areas in the Village; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to notice duly published, the Huntley Plan Commission (the "PC") conducted a public hearing on December 9, 2019 concerning the Proposed Amendments; and

WHEREAS, at the conclusion of the public hearing, the PC made findings and recommended the President and Board of Trustees adopt the Proposed Amendments; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Trustees have determined it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to adopt the Proposed Amendments as set forth in this Ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF HUNTLEY as follows:

SECTION I. The foregoing recitals are incorporated into and made part of this Ordinance by reference.

SECTION II. Section 156.011, entitled "Definitions" of Article II, entitled "Interpretations and Definitions," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is hereby amended in part to add the following new definitions:

"Medical Cannabis Cultivation Center" means a facility operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Illinois Department of Agriculture to perform necessary activities to provide registered medical cannabis dispensing organizations with usable medical cannabis.

"Medical Cannabis Dispensary" means a facility operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation to acquire medical cannabis from a registered medical cannabis cultivation center for the purpose of dispensing cannabis, paraphernalia, or related supplies and educational materials to registered qualifying patients.

SECTION III. Section 156.061, entitled "(C-2) Regional Retail District" of Article VI, entitled "Planned Development District," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is hereby amended in part as follows:

§ 156.061 (C-2) REGIONAL RETAIL DISTRICT

(B) Uses.

* * *

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the C-2 District:

<u>RETAIL SALES</u> – Furniture sales (used), Outdoor sales & service, Secondhand store, <u>Medical Cannabis dispensary</u>.

<u>SECTION IV.</u> Section 156.045, entitled "(M) Manufacturing District" of Article V, entitled "Business and Non-Residential Districts," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is hereby amended in part as follows:

§ 156.045 (M) MANUFACTURING DISTRICT

(B) Uses.

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the M District:

<u>AGRICULTURAL BUSINESS</u> - Kennel/boarding, Poultry hatchery, Veterinary Hospital, Wind Energy Systems (large or small), <u>Medical Cannabis cultivation</u> center.

<u>SECTION V.</u> Section 156.068, entitled "Special Use Permits" of Article VII, entitled "Special Use Permits," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is hereby amended in part as follows:

(F) Special Standards for Specified Special Uses. Where the district regulations authorizing any special use permit in a particular district impose special standards to be met by such use in such district, a permit for such use in such district shall not be recommended or granted unless the applicant shall establish compliance with such special standards.

(10) Medical Cannabis Cultivation Centers.

a. Location Restrictions

- (i) No Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall be established, maintained or operated on any lot that has a property line within 2,500 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private pre-school or elementary or secondary school or day care center, day care home, group day care home, part day child care facility, or an area zoned for residential use.
- (ii) Medical Cannabis cultivation centers shall not be established on multiple-use or multiple-tenant property or on a property that shares parking with other users.

b. Manufacture and Production Standards

- (i) <u>Unless otherwise stated herein or provided by state law, the Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall conform to all Village rules, regulations and ordinances.</u>
- (ii) All Medical Cannabis cultivation centers shall comply with the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 410 ILCS 130/1 et seq., ("Medical Cannabis Act") and all rules and regulations adopted in accordance therewith.
- (iii) Parking areas shall be well lit and monitored by video surveillance equipment in accordance with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations.
- c. <u>Setbacks/Lot Area/Bulk Regulations</u>. A <u>Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall conform to the setback, lot area, and bulk regulations applicable to the zoning district in which the medical cannabis cultivation center is located.</u>

d. Signage

- (i) Other than signage expressly required by State law, all signage for a medical cannabis cultivation center shall be limited to one flat wall sign not to exceed ten square feet in area, and one identifying sign, which can only include the center's address, not to exceed two square feet in area; such signs shall not be directly illuminated.
- (ii) <u>Electronic changeable copy signs and temporary signs are not permitted in</u> connection with a Medical Cannabis cultivation center.
- e. Age and Access Limitations. Cultivation centers shall not employ anyone under the age of twenty-one (21). Access shall be limited exclusively to medical cannabis cultivation center staff and local and state officials and those specifically authorized under the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations.

f. Security and Video Surveillance

- (i) The Medical Cannabis cultivation center shall be an enclosed locked facility and shall provide and maintain adequate security on the premises, including lighting, video surveillance, and alarms that comply with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations. The facility shall be enclosed by a high security fence. The fence must be adequately secure to prevent unauthorized entry and include gates connected into an access control system.
- (ii) The Medical Cannabis cultivation center parking area, cultivation, production, warehousing areas, and shipping bays and entrance shall be monitored by video surveillance equipment that complies with the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations. The operator shall promptly make such records available to the Huntley Police Department upon request.
- (iii) <u>Loading of all Medical Cannabis products shall occur within secure enclosed shipping bays and shall not be visible from the exterior of the building.</u>
- (iv) A Medical Cannabis cultivation center is subject to inspection by the Huntley Police Department and/or Huntley Development Services at any time during regular business hours.
- g. Noxious Odors. All Medical Cannabis cultivation centers shall operate in a manner that prevents odor impacts on neighboring premises or properties, and, if necessary, the facility shall be ventilated with a system for odor control.

h. Conduct on Site

- (i) <u>Retail sales of Medical Cannabis or medical cannabis infused products are strictly prohibited at medical cannabis cultivation centers.</u>
- (ii) It shall be unlawful for a medical cannabis cultivation center to cultivate, manufacture, process, package, or sell any product other than useable cannabis and cannabis-infused products intended for human consumption in accordance with the Medical Cannabis Act.
- i. <u>Interpretation</u>. The provisions of this Subsection 156.068(F)(10) are intended to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the provisions and limitations of the Medical Cannabis Act and State regulations promulgated thereunder.

(11) Medical Cannabis Dispensaries

- a. Minimum required buffer from protected uses:
 - (i) A Medical Cannabis dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private nursery school, preschool, primary or secondary school, or day care center. Learning centers and vocational/trade centers shall not be classified as a public or private school for purposes of this Section.
 - (ii) A Medical Cannabis dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of an existing religious establishment, park district property, or library.
 - (iii) A Medical Cannabis dispensary may not be located within 250 feet of residentially zoned property except when separated by a State highway.

(iv) For the purposes of this section, distances shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures or objects, from the nearest point on the property line of the lot on which an applicable medical cannabis dispensary is located to the nearest point on a property line of any protected use.

Agenda Item: Consideration – Ordinance Amending Chapter 156 of the Huntley Code Regarding

Zoning Regulations For Adult-Use Cannabis Business Establishments Operating in Accordance with the Illinois Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1-1 et

seq.

<u>Petitioner:</u> Village of Huntley

<u>Department:</u> Development Services Department - Planning and Zoning Division

Introduction

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (Public Act 101-0027) 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq. signed into law in 2019 permits (subject to various limitations and restrictions) the production, sale, possession, and use of recreational Adult-Use cannabis and cannabis-containing products under Illinois law beginning on January 1, 2020. The production, sale, and transportation of Adult-Use Cannabis will be limited to State-licensed cannabis business establishments ("Cannabis Businesses") operating in accordance with the Act. Adults 21 years of age and older will be permitted to purchase, possess, and use Adult-Use Cannabis in limited quantities for personal use.

Cannabis Businesses are defined by the State as follows:

- Dispensing organizations (or dispensaries), where Adult-Use Cannabis is sold to consumers at retail. Dispensaries may also sell cannabis paraphernalia and supplies and sell cannabis seeds to registered medical cannabis patients for home cultivation. Dispensaries may not produce or manufacture cannabis or cannabis-infused products, nor can they purchase cannabis or cannabis products from out-of-state sources.
- Cultivation centers, which are fully enclosed growing facilities with up to 210,000 square feet of canopy space for plants in the flowering state. Cultivation centers may also process cannabis and produce cannabis concentrates and/or cannabis-infused products.
- **Craft growers**, which are fully enclosed growing facilities with up to 5,000 square feet of canopy space for plants in the flowering state. Craft growers may also process cannabis and produce cannabis concentrates and/or cannabis-infused products.
- Infusers and processing organizations, which are facilities where constituent chemicals or compounds are extracted from plants to produce cannabis concentrate and/or where cannabis-infused products are produced.
- Transporting organizations (or transporters), which are businesses that transport cannabis in motor vehicles between other licensed Cannabis Businesses. Transporters may, but are not required to, have a fixed, physical business location.

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (the "Act") authorizes municipalities to prohibit Cannabis Businesses within their boundaries and, if Cannabis Businesses are allowed, authorizes municipalities to exercise zoning authority and certain other regulatory powers.

The Village's Special Counsel has prepared a memorandum, dated November 4, 2019, providing a further explanation of the Act and the issues for review. Special Counsel will be in attendance at the Village Board meeting to answer questions on the subject.

Staff Analysis

On October 10, 2019, the Village Board approved Resolution (R)2019-10.61 by a vote of 4-3 directing the Plan Commission to hold a public hearing on the questions of whether:

- (i) the Zoning Code should be amended to allow one, Adult-Use Cannabis Business dispensary, without on-site consumption, as a permitted or special use in the Village's various zoning districts; and
- (ii) the Zoning Code should be amended to establish other Cannabis Business Regulations that may be necessary, important, or beneficial to the Village and its residents consistent with the Act.

The resolution directed the Plan Commission to make a recommendation to the Village Board regarding the above subjects, along with any other conditions that should be attached to the zoning of Adult-Use Cannabis Businesses.

The resolution was a result of discussion and direction of the Village Board to provide the Plan Commission with the following direction for amending the Zoning Code:

- Allow Adult-Use Cannabis Dispensaries only.
- Prohibit Cultivation Centers, Craft Growers, Infusers and Processing organizations, and Transportation organizations/transporters.
- Prohibit the on-site consumption of cannabis.

Additional considerations discussed were to allow only one Adult-Use cannabis dispensary within the Village and to follow the zoning regulations applicable to Tobacco and Vape Shops. Tobacco and Vape Shops are allowed only in the "C-2" Regional Retail zoning district and they must be no less than 1,000 feet from a building used as a school, childcare facility, or for the education or recreation of children under 18 years of age.

The proposed amendments were prepared based on the direction provided by the Village Board.

Proposed Zoning Code Amendments

The proposed Zoning Code amendments would allow a maximum of one Adult-Use cannabis dispensary as a special use in the "C-2" Regional Retail Zoning District. All other cannabis businesses would be prohibited (craft growers, cultivation centers, infusers, processors, and transporter organizations). The proposed amendments also prohibit the on-premise of consumption of cannabis products at an Adult-Use cannabis dispensary.

Furthermore, the proposed amendments prohibit an Adult-Use cannabis dispensary from locating within 1,000 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private nursery school, preschool, primary or secondary school, daycare center, religious establishment, park district property, or library. Nor could an Adult-Use cannabis dispensary be located within 250 feet of residentially zoned property except when separated by a State highway.

The proposed amendments also provide signage restrictions and prohibit cannabis products or paraphernalia displays from being visible from outside of the cannabis dispensing organization.

The following is the proposed Zoning Code amendment in its entirety:

Section 156.011, entitled "Definitions" of Article II, entitled "Interpretations and Definitions," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part to add the following new definitions:

CANNABIS BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENT: An Adult-Use cannabis craft grower, cultivation center, dispensary, infuser, processing, or transporter organization operating pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., as it may be amended from time-to-time.

CANNABIS CRAFT GROWER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "craft grower" to cultivate, dry, cure and package cannabis and perform other necessary activities to make cannabis available for sale at a dispensing organization or use at a processing organization, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS CULTIVATION CENTER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "cultivation center" to cultivate, process, transport and perform necessary activities to provide cannabis and cannabis-infused products to licensed cannabis business establishments, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS DISPENSARY: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation as a "dispensing organization" to acquire adult-use cannabis from licensed cannabis business establishments for the purpose of selling or dispensing cannabis, cannabis-infused products, cannabis seeds, paraphernalia or related supplies to qualified purchasers per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS INFUSER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as an "infusing organization" or "infuser" to directly incorporate cannabis or cannabis concentrate into a product formulation to produce a cannabis-infused product, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS PROCESSOR: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "processing organization" or "processor" to either extract constituent chemicals or compounds to produce cannabis concentrate or incorporate cannabis or cannabis concentrate into a product formulation to produce a cannabis product, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS TRANSPORTER: An organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "transporting organization" or "transporter" to transport cannabis on behalf of a cannabis business establishment or a community college licensed under the Community College Cannabis Vocational Training Pilot Program, per the

<u>Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.</u>

<u>CANNABIS-INFUSED PRODUCT:</u> Food, oils, ointments, or other products containing usable cannabis that are not smoked.

Section 156.061, entitled "(C-2) Regional Retail District" of Article VI, entitled "Planned Development District," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

§ 156.061 (C-2) REGIONAL RETAIL DISTRICT

* * *

(B) Uses.

* * *

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the C-2 District:

* * *

<u>RETAIL SALES</u> – Furniture sales (used), Outdoor sales & service, Secondhand store, **Adult-Use cannabis dispensary.**

* * *

Section 156.068, entitled "Special Use Permits" of Article VII, entitled "Special Use Permits," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

(F) Special Standards for Specified Special Uses. Where the district regulations authorizing any special use permit in a particular district impose special standards to be met by such use in such district, a permit for such use in such district shall not be recommended or granted unless the applicant shall establish compliance with such special standards.

* * *

(9) Adult-Use Cannabis Dispensaries.

- a. <u>Maximum Number of Cannabis Dispensaries: Not more than one adult-use cannabis dispensary (a "Cannabis Dispensary") shall be permitted to operate within the Village of Huntley at any given time.</u>
- b. Minimum required buffer from protected uses:
 - (i) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private nursery school, preschool, primary or secondary school, or day care center. Learning

- <u>centers and vocational/trade centers shall not be classified as a public</u> or private school for purposes of this Section.
- (ii) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of an existing religious establishment, park district property, or library.
- (iii) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 250 feet of residentially zoned property except when separated by a State highway.
- (iv) For the purposes of this section, distances shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures or objects, from the nearest point on the property line of the lot on which an applicable Cannabis Dispensary is located to the nearest point on a property line of any protected use.
- (v) Summary of Buffer Requirements:

Use	Required Buffer
Schools	1,000 feet
Daycare	1,000 feet
Religious Establishment	1,000 feet
Residentially zoned property*	250 feet
Park District Property	1,000 feet
Library	1,000 feet

^{*}Except when separated by a State highway.

- c. A Cannabis Dispensary may not conduct any sales or distribution of cannabis other than as authorized by the Act.
- d. Exterior Display: A Cannabis Dispensary shall be maintained or operated in a manner that the public viewing of cannabis, cannabis products, cannabis paraphernalia or similar products from any sidewalk, public or private right-of-way or from outside of the cannabis dispensing organization is not allowed.
- e. <u>Hours of Operations: Hours of operation are limited to between 6:00am</u> and 10:00pm.
- f. Environmental: Emission of dust, fumes, vapors, or odors in a manner that impacts neighboring premises or properties or any public property or right-of-way shall be prohibited.

- g. <u>Signage: Electronic changeable copy signs are not permitted for a Cannabis Dispensary.</u> No cannabis leaf or bud image may be used in promotional signage for the Dispensary.
- h. State Requirements: The Cannabis Dispensary must comply with all applicable provisions of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., as may be revised or amended from time to time.
- i. All hazardous waste and cannabis waste shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of the statutes of the State of Illinois and ordinances of the Village of Huntley.
- j. On-Premises Consumption: It shall be prohibited to consume cannabis products in a Cannabis Dispensary or anywhere on the site occupied by a dispensary.
- k. Other Adult-Use Cannabis Businesses Prohibited. Adult-use cannabis craft growers, cultivation centers, infusers, processors, and transporter organizations shall not be permitted to be co-located with a Cannabis Dispensary. Any cannabis business establishment other than a Cannabis Dispensary operating pursuant to a special use permit and in accordance with this Code shall be prohibited in all zoning districts.

* * *

Plan Commission Recommendation

On November 12, 2019, the Plan Commission conducted a public hearing to consider cannabis business regulations. The public hearing was attended by approximately 26 residents of which five provided testimony. Of the testimony provided, four spoke in opposition to allowing the sale of Adult-Use cannabis within the Village and one spoke in support of allowing it. Following the consideration of public testimony and extensive discussion, the Plan Commission recommended unanimously by a vote of 7-0 to approve the proposed amendments as drafted.

The November 12, 2019, Plan Commission meeting minutes are provided as an exhibit to this report.

Financial Impact

A Cannabis Retailers' Occupation Tax, at a maximum rate of 3%, may be collected by the Village on the sales at Cannabis Dispensaries.

Action Requested

The Village Board is requested to consider the Plan Commission's recommendation for the proposed Text Amendments to the Village of Huntley Zoning Code regarding Adult-Use cannabis business establishments and act on a motion to consider the amendments as drafted, or as discussed and modified.

Re: Zoning Regulations Under the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act

I. Issues for Plan Commission Review

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq. (the "Act") was recently signed into law. On October 10, 2019, the Village Board adopted a Resolution stating that it wished to further study whether to: (i) allow State-licensed adult-use (recreational) cannabis dispensaries ("Cannabis Dispensaries") in Huntley subject to appropriate zoning regulations; and (ii) prohibit all other types of adult-use cannabis businesses within the Village. (See Section III.A of this memorandum regarding the categories of cannabis businesses allowed under State law.)

The Village Board's Resolution referred this matter to the Plan Commission, specifically asking the Plan Commission to evaluate and recommend zoning classifications for Cannabis Dispensaries, including whether Cannabis Dispensaries should be considered "permitted" or "special" uses under the Zoning Code in the Village's various zoning districts, and evaluate and recommend other zoning regulations for Cannabis Dispensaries as may be necessary, important, or beneficial to the Village and its residents.

In accordance with the Village Board's referral Resolution and the Act, the following is a summary of the issues presented for Plan Commission review and recommendation:

- 1. Whether to Recommend Prohibition of Cannabis Dispensaries. As a threshold matter, the Plan Commission may wish to recommend to the Village Board that Cannabis Dispensaries be prohibited within the Village. However, even if the Plan Commission wishes to recommend prohibition of Cannabis Dispensaries, consistent with the Village Board's referral Resolution the Plan Commission should still consider and recommend zoning regulations that would be appropriate if Cannabis Dispensaries are ultimately allowed.
- 2. Zoning Districts and Use Classifications. Next, the Plan Commission should consider:

- a. What zoning districts within the Village would be appropriate for Cannabis Dispensaries; and
- b. Whether a Cannabis Dispensary should be a special or permitted use in those districts; and

As a starting point for discussion, a draft ordinance has been prepared that proposes the Plan Commission consider whether Cannabis Dispensaries would be appropriately classified as a special use in the C-2 Regional Retail District.

- 3. Buffers from Sensitive Uses. The Act allows the Village to establish minimum buffers between Cannabis Dispensaries and any other uses that the Village deems to be sensitive. The Plan Commission may wish to consider whether to recommend buffers from certain sensitive uses, such as the following:
 - a. Public and private pre-schools, primary and secondary schools, colleges, and universities:
 - b. Day care facilities;
 - c. Religious establishments;
 - d. Park district property;
 - e. Libraries;
 - f. Residential properties.

A draft ordinance, which includes proposed buffer requirements, is provided with this memorandum.

- 4. Performance Standards. The Act allows the Village to require cannabis businesses to comply with reasonable time, place, and manner regulations that do not conflict with the Act as a condition of zoning compliance. The draft ordinance provided with this memorandum includes suggestions for performance standards for Cannabis Dispensaries that the Plan Commission may wish to consider. If Cannabis Dispensaries are classified as special uses, then additional site-specific conditions could be imposed as part of granting the special use permit. Note that, as discussed further below, the Act establishes significant regulations governing the physical facilities and operations of Cannabis Dispensaries, which preempt conflicting or concurrent local regulations, so those subjects need not be addressed in the Zoning Code.
- 5. Number of Cannabis Dispensaries. The Act also allows the Village to regulate the number of cannabis businesses that may be established within the Village. It is proposed that the Plan Commission consider allowing a maximum of one Cannabis Dispensary to operate within the Village at any given time. Such limitation is included in the draft ordinance provided with this memorandum.
- 6. On-Premises Cannabis Consumption. The Village may regulate or prohibit on-premises consumption of cannabis within Cannabis Dispensaries in the Village. It is proposed that the Plan Commission consider prohibiting on-premise consumption at Cannabis Dispensaries, which prohibition is included in the draft ordinance provided with this

memorandum. If the Plan Commission recommends that on-premises consumption be allowed, it may also wish to consider recommending appropriate restrictions or limitations.

II. Background Information Regarding the Act.

The Act permits (subject to various limitations and restrictions) the production, sale, possession, and use of recreational adult-use cannabis and cannabis-containing products¹ under Illinois law beginning on January 1, 2020. Production, sale, and transportation of Adult-Use Cannabis will be limited to State-licensed Cannabis Businesses operating in accordance with the Act. Adults 21 years of age and older will be permitted to purchase, possess, and use Adult-Use Cannabis in limited quantities for personal use.

Medical cannabis products will continue to be made available to qualified, registered patients and caregivers in accordance with the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Pilot Program Act, 410 ILCS 130/1 *et seq.*, (the "*Medical Cannabis Act*"). Registered medical cannabis patients may also grow up to five cannabis plants in an enclosed, locked space within their residence beginning on January 1, 2020. Act § 10-5(b). Existing licensed medical cannabis cultivation centers and dispensaries will be eligible to receive the first round of State licenses for Adult-Use Cannabis production and sales. However, they will be required to keep separate inventories of medical cannabis products. Act § 55-85. The Act does not otherwise significantly affect medical cannabis business operations or patient and caregiver rights and privileges under the Medical Cannabis Act, nor does it restrict medical cannabis patients from purchasing Adult-Use Cannabis in accordance with the Act.² *Id.* at §§ 55-10, 55-85.

Although the Act generally preempts local authority to license and regulate Cannabis Businesses (Act §§ 55-90, 55-25(4), it does allow municipalities to adopt ordinances prohibiting Cannabis Businesses (but not cannabis use) within their jurisdiction. Act § 55-25(5). If municipalities allow Cannabis Businesses, however, they may: (a) only regulate them through the exercise of zoning authority and reasonable time, place, and manner regulations that are not stricter than, or in conflict with, the Act; and (b) impose a Cannabis Retailers' Occupation Tax at a maximum rate of 3% on sales at Cannabis Dispensaries. Act § 55-25.

This memorandum provides a brief overview of the State regulatory structure and license implementation for Adult-Use Cannabis and Cannabis Businesses and then discusses the Village's authority to enact zoning ordinances and related time, place, and manner regulations regarding Cannabis Businesses.

¹ These include cannabis concentrates produced by extracting cannabinoids from the cannabis plant as well as foods, beverages, oils, ointments, tinctures, topical formulations, and other products containing cannabis that are not intended to be smoked. Act § 1-10.

² In the event of a conflict between the Act and the Medical Cannabis Act, the Medical Cannabis Act will prevail. Act § 55-85(a).

III. Key Aspects of the State Regulatory Structure and License Implementation

A. Cannabis Business Licensing and Oversight Responsibility

Adult-Use cannabis businesses ("Cannabis Businesses") will be exclusively licensed by the State in the following categories:

- Dispensing organizations (or dispensaries), where Adult-Use Cannabis is sold to consumers at retail. Dispensaries may also sell cannabis paraphernalia and supplies and sell cannabis seeds to registered medical cannabis patients for home cultivation. Dispensaries may not produce or manufacture cannabis or cannabis-infused products, nor can they purchase cannabis or cannabis products from out-of-state sources. See Act, Article 15.
- Cultivation centers, which are fully enclosed growing facilities with up to 210,000 square feet of canopy space for plants in the flowering state. Cultivation centers may also process cannabis and produce cannabis concentrates and/or cannabis-infused products. See Act, Article 20.
- Craft growers, which are fully enclosed growing facilities with up to 5,000 square feet of canopy space for plants in the flowering state. Craft growers may also process cannabis and produce cannabis concentrates and/or cannabis-infused products. See Act, Article 30.
- Infusers and processing organizations, which are facilities where constituent chemicals or compounds are extracted from plants to produce cannabis concentrate and/or where cannabis-infused products are produced. See Act, Article 35.
- Transporting organizations (or transporters), which are businesses that transport cannabis in motor vehicles between other licensed Cannabis Businesses. See Act, Article 40. Transporters may, but are not required to, have a fixed, physical business location.

The Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation ("**DFPR**") is responsible for licensing and overseeing the operations of Cannabis Dispensaries. The Illinois Department of Agriculture ("**IDOA**") is responsible for licensing and overseeing the operations of all other categories of Cannabis Businesses.

In addition to Cannabis Businesses, the Act directs IDOA to establish and administer a Community College Cannabis Vocational Pilot Program in coordination with the Illinois Community College Board. Act, Article 25. Licensees under the Community College Cannabis Vocational Pilot Program do not fall within the scope of the definition of a "Cannabis Business Establishment" under the Act, see Act §1-10, and therefore are not within the scope of the Village's zoning and regulatory powers. See id. §55-25.

B. Advertising and Signage Regulations

The Act regulates advertising of cannabis products. Ads cannot be placed: (i) within 1,000 feet of a school, playground, recreational center or facility, child care center, public park, public library, or game arcade that is not restricted to patrons 21 and over; (ii) in a public transit vehicle or shelter; or (iii) on publicly-owned or publicly-operated property. Additionally, ads cannot include false or misleading information, medical or therapeutic claims, depictions of underage consumption or images designed to appeal to children, depictions of actual cannabis consumption or overconsumption, or depictions of a cannabis leaf or bud (subject to exceptions for educational messages). Nothing in the Act grants Adult-Use Cannabis advertising, or signage for Cannabis Businesses, any privileged status *vis-à-vis* local signage regulations.

C. <u>Implementation Overview</u>

The Act went into effect on June 25, 2019, but Adult-Use Cannabis sales will not begin in Illinois until January 1, 2020. Act §§ 10-5, 15-15(g). Currently, DFPR is accepting applications from existing medical cannabis dispensary licensees for "Early Approval Adult Use Dispensing Organization Licenses." Applications to co-locate an Adult Use Cannabis dispensary with an existing medical cannabis dispensary will be reviewed and approved by DFPR within 14 days if all requirements of the Act are met. Act § 15-15. However, the dispensary will not be permitted to begin selling Adult-Use Cannabis to the public until January 1, 2020.

Existing medical dispensaries may also seek a license to open a new Adult Use Cannabis dispensary at a secondary location. The application for a secondary location must include evidence of zoning compliance or the status of a request for local zoning approval. Act § 15-20(c)(6). DFPR states that it will not review an application for a secondary location unless it includes a "Notice of Proper Zoning" form or similar document issued by the local zoning authority. See DFPR "FAQs – Secondary Site Applications" and "Program Information."

Similarly, existing medical cannabis cultivation centers may apply to IDOA until December 22, 2019 for an "Early Approval Adult Use Cultivation Center License." Act § 20-10. IDOA will issue the Early Approval license within 14 days after a complete application is submitted if all requirements of the Act are met, and the licenses will allow a cultivation center to begin growing and producing Adult-Use Cannabis as soon as the license is issued. *Id.* However, the cultivation center cannot start selling Adult-Use Cannabis to retail dispensary licensees until December 1, 2019 and, as noted above, sales from the dispensary to the public cannot begin until January 1, 2020. Act § 20-10(h), 15-15(g).

On May 1, 2020, the Act authorizes DFPR to begin issuing additional Adult-Use Cannabis dispensary licenses to new applicants. Act § 15-25(a)-(c). For such applicants, DFPR will first issue 180-day conditional licenses, and the final license cannot be issued (nor can business operations commence) until DFPR verifies that the dispensary's proposed physical location complies with local zoning laws and the Act. Act § 15-25(e), (f).

The Act also authorizes IDOA to begin issuing licenses to Adult-Use Cannabis craft grower, infuser, and transporter businesses by July 1, 2020. §§ 30-5, 35-5, 40-5.

During 2021 and 2022, the Act provides for the number of available Cannabis Business licenses to be gradually increased by DFPR and IDOA.

IV. Local Zoning and Regulatory Authority over Cannabis Businesses.

The Act generally preempts local authority, including home rule power, to regulate or license the activities and businesses described in the Act, including authority to regulate concurrently with the State in a manner that is more restrictive than the Act. Act §§ 55-25(4), 55-90. However, the Act expressly authorizes municipalities to prohibit Cannabis Businesses within their boundaries and, if Cannabis Businesses are allowed, authorizes municipalities to exercise zoning authority and certain other limited regulatory powers, as discussed further below.

If the Village decides to allow Cannabis Businesses within its jurisdiction, it may exercise zoning authority and, through the zoning process or otherwise, impose reasonable time, place, and manner regulations that are not stricter than, or in conflict with, the Act. Specifically, the Village may:

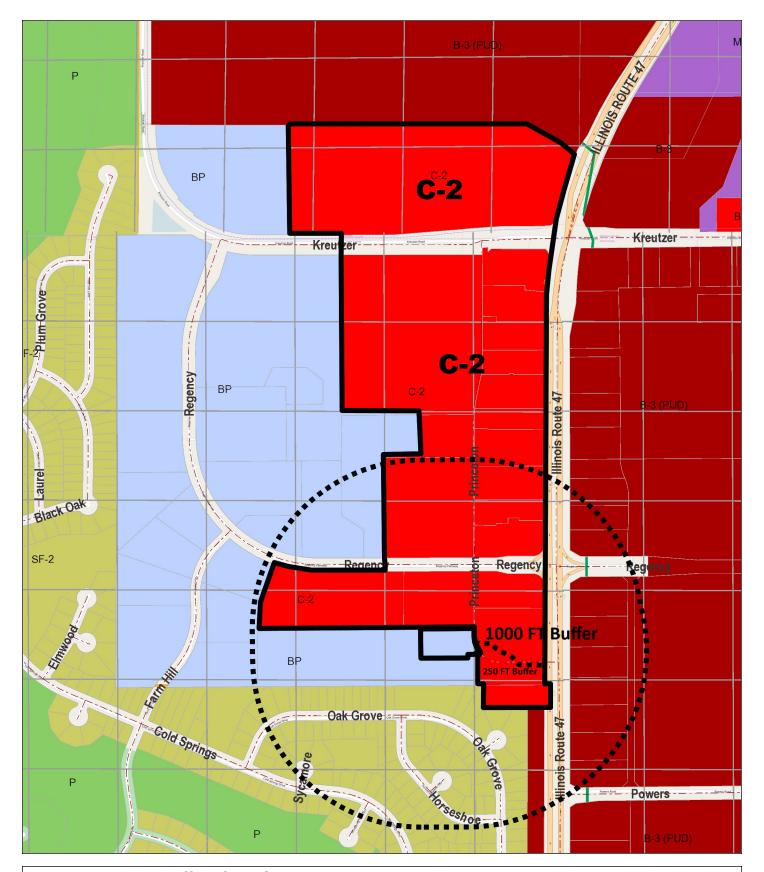
- (i) enact reasonable zoning regulations for Cannabis Businesses;
- (ii) establish minimum distance limitations between Cannabis Businesses and sensitive uses:
- (iii) regulate on-premises consumption of Adult Use Cannabis at or in a cannabis business establishment; and
- (iv) enact reasonable regulations, including through special use or conditional use permits, governing the time, place, manner, and number of cannabis business establishment operations, provided that such regulations do not conflict with or unreasonably restrict business operations authorized by the Act.

Although the Village is authorized to establish reasonable time, place, and manner regulations relating to Cannabis Business operations, the Act restricts the Village's authority to regulate these matters concurrently with, or more strictly than, the Act. See Act §§ 55-25(4), 55-90. The Act addresses a number of matters regarding Cannabis Business operations and facilities—especially with respect to Dispensaries—that are typically within the Village's local control, including the following:

- 1. Building and Life Safety Codes: Cannabis Businesses must comply with local building and fire regulations. Act §§ 15-70(g), 55-25.
- 2. Hours of Operation: A dispensary may operate between 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. Act § 15-70(i).
- 3. Exterior Lighting and Security: Cannabis Businesses must have exterior surveillance, alarm systems, and other security measures in accordance with a State-approved plan. For dispensaries, the Act specifically requires that all interior and exterior lighting must be in good working order with wattage sufficient for security cameras. A dispensary must operate a video surveillance system, among other security measures, and the premises must be sufficiently lit to facilitate surveillance. Video surveillance of

- outside areas, including the storefront and parking lot "shall be appropriate for the normal lighting conditions of the area under surveillance." Act §§ 15-70(k), 15-100(c)(13), 15-100(i)(3).
- 4. Landscaping and Yards: Trees, bushes, and foliage outside of a dispensary must not allow for a person to conceal themselves from sight. Act § 15-100(c)(14).
- 5. Shared Premises: If allowed by local zoning, a dispensary may share premises with a craft grower, infuser, or both, provided that their products and currency are stored separately in access-restricted areas. Act § 15-100(e).
- 6. Drive-Throughs: A dispensary may not operate a drive-through window. Act \S 15-70(n)(7).
- 7. Vending Machines: A dispensary may not sell Adult-Use Cannabis in a vending machine. Act § 15-70(n)(8).
- 8. Liquor: A dispensary cannot sell alcoholic beverages. Act § 15-70(d).
- 9. Separation: A new dispensary may not be located within 1,500 feet of another dispensary. Act § 15-70(n)(15). A new craft grower may not be located within 1,500 feet of another cultivation center or craft grower. Act § 30-30(o).

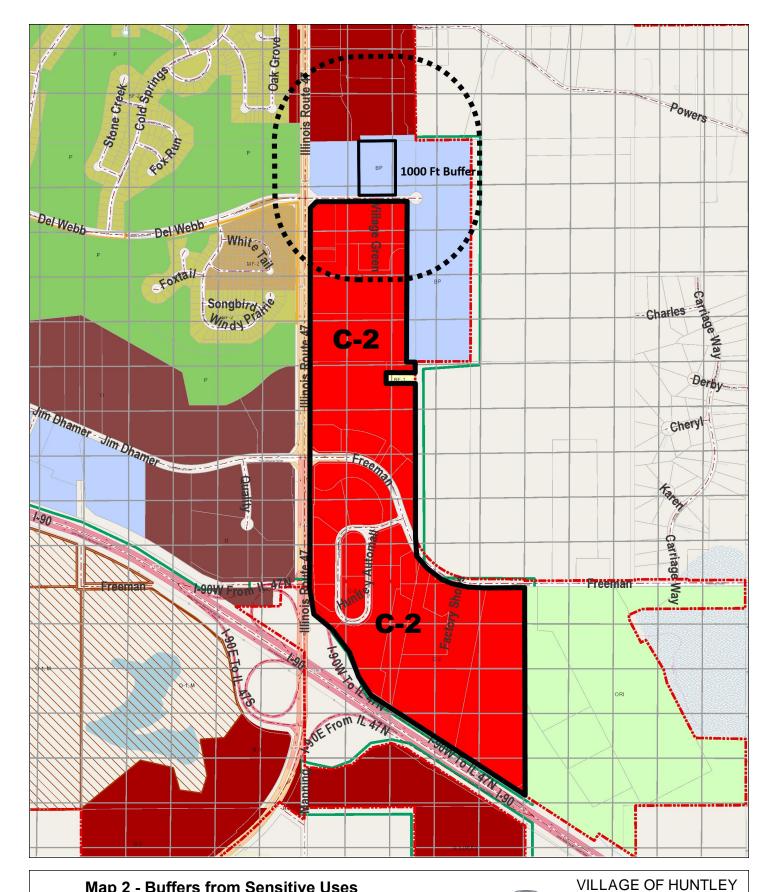

EXCERPT FROM 11/12/19 PLAN COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES

A. Petition No. 19-11.1, Village of Huntley, as petitioner, Request is for consideration of potential text amendments to the Village of Huntley Zoning Ordinance regarding adult-use cannabis business establishments operating in accordance with the Illinois Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1-1 et seq.

Chairman Kibort stated that a public hearing is being conducted and all audience members that would like to speak tonight, must sign in. He also stated they would be sworn in, under oath as this proceeding is legal testimony. Chairman Kibort then asked anyone wishing to speak to stand up and be sworn in. The following individuals were sworn in:

After the swearing in, Chairman Kibort announced the Village's Special Counsel and staff would be giving a presentation and he introduced Betsy Gates-Alford and Director Nordman.

Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act

Special Counsel Gates-Alford gave a brief slide show presentation. Counsel began by reviewing the State of Illinois Cannabis Regulations and the Tax Act. The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act was signed into law in June 2019. The Act permits (subject to various limitations and restrictions) the production, sale, possession, and use of recreational adult-use cannabis and cannabis-containing products (cannabis concentrates produced by extracting cannabinoids from the cannabis plant as well as foods, beverages, oils, ointments, tinctures, topical formulations, and other products containing cannabis that are not intended to be smoked) under Illinois law beginning on January 1, 2020.

Special Counsel stated the Act preempts home rule authority, except for limited powers that are expressly reserved to local governments. Local governments cannot regulate personal use and possession of recreational cannabis in a manner that is more restrictive than State law. Municipalities can enact a tax on the retail sale of adult-use (non-medical) cannabis and cannabis-containing products. The maximum rate of the tax is 3%.

Cannabis Businesses

Special Counsel Gates-Alford continued her review with information on Cannabis Businesses, and stated the businesses will be exclusively licensed by the State in the following categories:

- Dispensing organizations (or dispensaries), where Adult-Use Cannabis is sold to consumers at retail.
- Cultivation centers, which are fully enclosed growing facilities with up to 210,000 square feet of canopy space for plants in the flowering state.
- Craft growers, which are fully enclosed growing facilities with up to 5,000 square feet of canopy space for plants in the flowering state.
- Infusers and processing organizations.
- Transporting organizations (or transporters), which are businesses that transport cannabis in motor vehicles between other licensed Cannabis Businesses.

Local Regulation and Zoning of Cannabis Businesses

Special Counsel continued with information on local regulation and zoning. The Act allows municipalities to adopt ordinances prohibiting cannabis businesses. If the Village decides to allow them, it may exercise zoning authority to regulate cannabis businesses in a manner that is not stricter than, or in conflict with, State law. Specifically, the Village may:

- Enact reasonable zoning regulations for cannabis businesses;
- Establish minimum distance requirements between cannabis businesses and sensitive uses;
- Regulate on-premises consumption of cannabis in a cannabis business establishment;
- Enact reasonable regulations, including through special use permits, governing the time, place, manner, and number of cannabis businesses, provided that such regulations do not conflict with or unreasonably restrict business operations authorized by the Act.

Issues for Plan Commission Review and Recommendation

Special Counsel Gates-Alford began her review of the issues the Plan Commission should consider.

ISSUE #1: Whether to Recommend Prohibition of Cannabis Dispensaries.

- The Plan Commission may consider whether adult-use cannabis dispensaries should be allowed or prohibited within the Village.
- Even if the Plan Commission recommends prohibition of dispensaries, it should still consider and make recommendations on the remaining issues.

ISSUE #2: Zoning Districts and Use Classifications.

- What zoning districts within the Village would be appropriate for dispensaries
 - o Proposed for Plan Commission discussion: C-2 Regional Retail District
- Whether dispensaries should be classified as a permitted or special use

o Proposed for Plan Commission discussion: Special use

ISSUE #3: Buffers from Sensitive Uses.

Special Counsel stated the Village can establish minimum distance requirements between dispensaries and uses that the Village considers sensitive. The Plan Commission should consider:

- What uses should be protected by buffers
- What buffer distances are appropriate
 - o Proposed for plan commission discussion:
 - 1,000-foot buffer from schools, day care facilities, religious establishments, Park District properties, libraries
 - 250-foot buffer from residentially-zoned properties

ISSUE #4: Performance Standards.

Special Counsel stated the Village can establish reasonable time, place, and manner regulations for dispensaries. However, these regulations cannot conflict with State law.

- Proposed for Plan Commission discussion:
 - o No display of cannabis products visible from outside the dispensary
 - o No emission of dust, fumes, vapors, or odors that impact neighboring properties or public ways
 - o No electronic changeable signs
 - o Must operate in accordance with State law and regulations

ISSUE #5: Number of Cannabis Dispensaries.

Special Counsel stated the Village can regulate the number of dispensaries within its jurisdiction.

• Proposed for Plan Commission discussion: Maximum of one (1) cannabis dispensary

ISSUE #6: On-Premises Cannabis Consumption.

Special Counsel stated the Village can prohibit or regulate on-premises consumption of cannabis within dispensaries (e.g. smoking lounges).

Proposed for Plan Commission discussion: Prohibition of on-premises consumption

Special Counsel Gates-Alford concluded her presentation and stated Director Nordman would also be presenting information to the Plan Commission.

Staff Review of the Village Board Referral

Director Nordman thanked Special Counsel and began his presentation with a review of the Village Board's previous discussions and their decision to bring the petition to the Plan Commission for consideration and review:

• On October 10, 2019, the Village Board approved Resolution (R)2019-10.61 by a vote of 4-3 directing the Plan Commission to hold a public hearing on the questions of whether:

- o the Zoning Ordinance should be amended to include a Cannabis Business dispensary, without onsite consumption, as a permitted or special use in the Village's various zoning districts; and
- o the Zoning Ordinance should be amended to establish other Cannabis Business Regulations that may be necessary, important, or beneficial to the Village and its residents consistent with the Act.

Director Nordman stated the Village Board adopted a resolution directing the Plan Commission to make a recommendation to the Village Board regarding the above subjects, along with any other conditions that should be attached to the zoning of Cannabis Businesses.

The resolution was a result of discussion that determined it was the consensus of the Village Board to provide the Plan Commission with the following direction for amending the Zoning Ordinance:

- Allow Cannabis Dispensaries only.
- Prohibit Cultivation Centers, Craft Growers, Infusers and Processing organizations, and Transportation organizations/transporters.
- Prohibit the on-site consumption of cannabis.

Director Nordman stated additional considerations discussed were to allow only one (1) cannabis dispensary within the Village and to follow the zoning regulations that are applicable to Tobacco and Vape Shops.

Tobacco and Vape Shops are allowed only in the "C-2" Regional Retail zoning district and they must be no less than 1,000 feet from a building used as a school, childcare facility, or for the education or recreation of children under 18 years of age. Director Nordman reviewed a slide with the 2019 zoning map of the Village and showed the commissioners and audience the locations for C-2 zoning.

Director Nordman continued his presentation with slides showing buffer areas for Sensitive Uses. The first slide displayed the C-2 zoning in Regency Square commercial development and he indicated areas which would require a 1,000-foot buffer from a child care center, and also a 250-foot buffer from residential property. He then proceeded to review the C-2 zoning in the Village Green commercial development and indicated a 1,000-foot buffer would be required due to a school located in Gateway Commons. Director Nordman stated the "acceptable" areas remaining for a Cannabis Dispensary would be the northern half of Regency Square, and the southern two-thirds of Village Green.

Director Nordman stated the proposed amendments for Plan Commission consideration have been prepared based on the direction provided by the Village Board, as follows:

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS

Section 156.011, entitled "Definitions" of Article II, entitled "Interpretations and Definitions," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part to add the following new definitions:

CANNABIS BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENT: An adult-use cannabis craft grower, cultivation center, dispensary, infuser, processing, or transporter organization operating pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., as it may be amended from time-to-time.

CANNABIS CRAFT GROWER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "craft grower" to cultivate, dry, cure and package cannabis and perform other necessary activities to make cannabis available for sale at a dispensing organization or use at a processing

organization, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS CULTIVATION CENTER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "cultivation center" to cultivate, process, transport and perform necessary activities to provide cannabis and cannabis-infused products to licensed cannabis business establishments, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS DISPENSARY: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation as a "dispensing organization" to acquire adult-use cannabis from licensed cannabis business establishments for the purpose of selling or dispensing cannabis, cannabis-infused products, cannabis seeds, paraphernalia or related supplies to qualified purchasers per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS INFUSER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as an "infusing organization" or "infuser" to directly incorporate cannabis or cannabis concentrate into a product formulation to produce a cannabis-infused product, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS PROCESSOR: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "processing organization" or "processor" to either extract constituent chemicals or compounds to produce cannabis concentrate or incorporate cannabis or cannabis concentrate into a product formulation to produce a cannabis product, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS TRANSPORTER: An organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "transporting organization" or "transporter" to transport cannabis on behalf of a cannabis business establishment or a community college licensed under the Community College Cannabis Vocational Training Pilot Program, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

<u>CANNABIS-INFUSED PRODUCT:</u> Food, oils, ointments, or other products containing usable cannabis that are not smoked.

Section 156.061, entitled "(C-2) Regional Retail District" of Article VI, entitled "Planned Development District," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

§ 156.061 (C-2) REGIONAL RETAIL DISTRICT

* * *

(B) Uses.

* * *

(2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the C-2 District:

* *

<u>RETAIL SALES</u> – Furniture sales (used), Outdoor sales & service, Secondhand store, <u>adult-use cannabis dispensary.</u>

* * *

Section 156.068, entitled "Special Use Permits" of Article VII, entitled "Special Use Permits," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is proposed to be amended in part as follows:

(F) Special Standards for Specified Special Uses. Where the district regulations authorizing any special use permit in a particular district impose special standards to be met by such use in such district, a permit for such use in such district shall not be recommended or granted unless the applicant shall establish compliance with such special standards.

* * *

(9) Adult-Use Cannabis Dispensaries.

- a. <u>Maximum Number of Cannabis Dispensaries: Not more than one adult-use cannabis dispensary (a "Cannabis Dispensary") shall be permitted to operate within the Village of Huntley at any given time.</u>
- b. Minimum required buffer from protected uses:
 - (i) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private nursery school, preschool, primary or secondary school, or day care center. Learning centers and vocational/trade centers shall not be classified as a public or private school for purposes of this Section.
 - (ii) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of an existing religious establishment, park district property, or library.
 - (iii) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 250 feet of residentially zoned property except when separated by a State highway.

(iv) For the purposes of this section, distances shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures or objects, from the nearest point on the property of the lot on which an applicable Cannabis Dispensary is located to the nearest point on a property line of any protected use. For occupancy purposes, if a portion of the buffer touches the property, it does not exclude the entire property. If a portion of the building is in the buffer, the entire building would be considered in the buffer and not eligible.

(v) Summary of Buffer Requirements:

Residentially zoned property*	250 feet

Library	1,000 feet

^{*}Except when separated by a State highway.

- c. A Cannabis Dispensary may not conduct any sales or distribution of cannabis other than as authorized by the Act.
- d. Exterior Display: A Cannabis Dispensary shall be maintained or operated in a manner that the public viewing of cannabis, cannabis products, cannabis paraphernalia or similar products from any sidewalk, public or private right-of-way or from outside of the cannabis dispensing organization is not allowed.
- e. <u>Hours of Operations: Hours of operation are limited to between 6:00am and 10:00pm.</u>
- f. Environmental: Emission of dust, fumes, vapors, or odors in a manner that impacts neighboring premises or properties or any public property or right-of-way shall be prohibited.
- g. Signage: Electronic changeable copy signs are not permitted for a Cannabis Dispensary. No cannabis leaf or bud image may be used in promotional signage for the Dispensary.

- h. State Requirements: The Cannabis Dispensary must comply with all applicable provisions of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., as may be revised or amended from time to time.
- i. All hazardous waste and cannabis waste shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of the statutes of the State of Illinois and ordinances of the Village of Huntley.
- j. On-Premises Consumption: It shall be prohibited to consume cannabis products in a Cannabis Dispensary or anywhere on the site occupied by a dispensary.
- k. Other Adult-Use Cannabis Businesses Prohibited. Adult-use cannabis craft growers, cultivation centers, infusers, processors, and transporter organizations shall not be permitted to be colocated with a Cannabis Dispensary. Any cannabis business establishment other than a Cannabis Dispensary operating pursuant to a special use permit and in accordance with this Code shall be prohibited in all zoning districts.

Director Nordman concluded his PowerPoint presentation and mentioned to Chairman Kibort that this was the appropriate time to hear comments from the Public.

Chairman Kibort stated he would call up those that signed up to speak.

Dolores Mundt of 13280 Cold Springs Drive was called up to the podium. Ms. Mundt stated her objections to the petition, and she hoped the Commission would be brave by saying "no" to this. She has two daughters in Colorado and they say it hasn't worked well there. The Police are having a tough time with it in Colorado, and the money that was to be used for good is not being tracked well. She stated she does not want cannabis to be sold here, and she feels people should vote their conscience. That is why she is here today. Thank you.

Chairman Kibort then called upon Jennifer Galloway of 12820 Timber Creek Drive. Ms. Galloway stated she thought the hearing was about the public use of marijuana, and that she did not feel it should be used in public. She was against the recreational use. Ms. Galloway also objected to people under the influence of marijuana while driving.

Special Counsel Gates-Alford asked to interject, and to clarify the legal uses of cannabis. She stated it was not to be used in public places or in vehicles, and read portions of the Act. There is also no cannabis smoking allowed in any place where cigarette smoking is not allowed now.

Chairman Kibort thanked Special Counsel, and called upon the next resident, Ms. Liz Stuyvesant of 13362 Arboretum Lane. Ms. Stuyvesant stated she does not think cannabis is harmless, just like she doesn't think alcohol is harmless. Her brother used cannabis, and then used alcohol and he died. Ms. Stuyvesant is not happy with the state of Illinois passing the law. She also commented on a trip to Colorado where she had the occasion to speak with a police officer about the legalization of marijuana. She stated the officer replied there is a large increase in the drug cartel, and the cartel are now growing the drug in Colorado. Ms. Stuyvesant also said she went to a dispensary in Colorado, and said the drug is much stronger than when she was young. She concluded by stating she was ok with medical dispensaries, but is against allowing dispensaries for recreational uses.

Chairman Kibort called upon Alice Costable of 12887 Norfolk Drive. Ms. Costable has lived in Huntley 5 years and believes the 3% sales tax is not enough of a benefit. She believes the health of the young people is much more important. Ms. Costable stated the community could gain tax dollars another way, and mentioned getting more businesses. She also mentioned her grandson who is now vaping, and how he can get it anywhere, and used this analogy with what will happen with cannabis. She thanked the commissioners.

Chairman Kibort announced the next resident, Ms. Geri Levine, 12856 Timber Creek Drive. Ms. Levine stated she is a registered nurse, and she takes a different view on cannabis. She mentioned the September 2017 cover story of AARP magazine and recited many of the benefits of cannabis mentioned in the article. She is in favor of one dispensary being allowed in Huntley. Ms. Levine discussed the parameters for qualifying for medical use cannabis in Illinois, and that it is very difficult to qualify. The recreational marijuana could be helping many people with medical issues who do not qualify. She then went on to discuss young adults and them getting ahold of marijuana. Just like alcohol, it is illegal for those underage. Will young people find a way to get it? Yes, that is likely, but Ms. Levine stated they could get it now, on the streets. She discussed the likelihood of other drugs or chemicals being added to street drugs, and how much worse it could be. Ms. Levine discussed other nearby communities which are allowing it, and the lost revenue for Huntley. Also, the 63,000 additional jobs for the State of Illinois. Ms. Levine concluded by stating education is key, and she mentioned the difference between edibles and smoking, and length of time it takes to feel an effect. Educating the public is most important. She thanked the commissioners.

Chairman Kibort stated this ended the list of residents who signed up to speak at the Public Hearing, and this would begin the portion of the hearing where commissioners can ask questions of staff and counsel, and to begin discussing their thoughts on the petition.

Chairman Kibort asked for a comparison of sales tax for the Village. Director Nordman stated the current sales tax benefit (for Village) is 1% for retail, and cannabis could be taxed up to 3%.

Vice Chair Ellison asked Chief Porter to speak on the police departments view on cannabis and what they have learned from Colorado. Chief Porter stated driving is the biggest issue. Another issue is the cartels. In Colorado, the cartel was buying homes and filling them with marijuana. Crime around the dispensaries is a big concern due to them being a cash business. Vice Chair Ellison also asked about how to determine DUI for cannabis. Chief Porter said many states are looking at different technologies, and this is still being studied.

Commissioner Hahn inquired about transporting the drug to the dispensaries and what sort of licensing is done for this. Special Counsel responded by stating that all drivers involved in transporting cannabis must be trained and licensed, and the vehicles are tracked and chain of custody is documented every step of the way.

Commissioner Hahn also asked about growing at a personal home, and Chief Porter answered that is only allowed for medical users.

Vice Chair Ellison asked about guns being required by transporters and Special Counsel responded no, it is not a requirement.

Chairman Kibort asked about prohibiting use and drug testing requirements in private businesses. Special Counsel Gates-Alford stated businesses are not allowed to discriminate or regulate an employee's use of cannabis during off hours. They can regulate use during working hours and on-call hours. Federal employees do have additional restrictions though.

Commissioner Darci Chandler stated she was in favor of permitting one dispensary in the C-2 zoning district, and for providing buffers to sensitive businesses as stated in the draft ordinance. She also agrees cannabis should not be used on premises in dispensaries.

Commissioner Hahn stated he was originally opposed to the use of cannabis, except for medical reasons. However, since Illinois has approved it he would consider zoning regulations for recreational dispensaries. He stated he thought the text amendment was written very well and would vote to adopt them as they are currently written. He then inquired if a location of a dispensary is chosen and ultimately approved, whether that would restrict a school or daycare from locating within the buffer area. Special Counsel stated it would not impact a future location of a school or daycare, and said this amendment is written to determine the allowed location of cannabis dispensaries only. If a school or daycare comes after the dispensary, they could locate anywhere they have approved zoning.

Vice Chair Ellison commented on medical marijuana laws and how many persons who have serious illnesses are not covered by the law, and therefore cannot use a medical dispensary to buy cannabis. She mentioned the case of a friend with a child who suffered from daily seizures and had to move to another state to get the cannabis for their child. Her friend's child is doing so much better now with the drug. Vice Chair Ellison stated she believes many more people could benefit from using the drug, and she is in favor of allowing recreational dispensaries as a Special Use, and for the limit of one dispensary in Huntley.

Chairman Kibort stated he is hearing a lot of comments of the failures of the medical marijuana law, and he wished the government would have done better with that regulation.

Vice Chair Ellison asked for comments of Chief Porter on his feelings of the new cannabis laws, and on how it will impact our community. Chief Porter responded he believes driving under the influence will be the biggest issue. It's a new law, and many people will be trying it, and they may not know their limits, or understand the effects. Vice Chair Ellison inquired about overdoses in Colorado. Chief Porter responded, Colorado had a dramatic increase in overdoses at first, and it did curtail a bit after it was legal for some time. The overdoses were especially due to the fact that edibles take longer to take effect, and people unknowingly took too many. Commissioner Hahn commented to Chief Porter that he assumes the increase in overdoses would occur whether or not Huntley approves the dispensary zoning. Chief Porter agreed it would, as it would be legal to use cannabis throughout all of Illinois.

Chairman Kibort gave his comments on the proposed zoning regulations and cannabis. He stated that if Huntley is going to have a recreational dispensary, he was in favor of approving the draft regulations as they are written in the staff report.

Commissioner Lori Nichols stated she is in favor of the draft regulations and sees a benefit to having a dispensary here in Huntley. She goes to the American Legion and knows many people who would benefit from using it. Commissioner Nichols also stated she went through all the red tape to try and get her mother approved and was ultimately denied. She agrees with all the restrictions outlined in the reports, and sees the tax benefit of having it in our community instead of giving our tax dollars to another community.

Commissioner Terra DeBaltz stated she agrees with Commissioner Hahn and the other commissioners and is fine with the text amendment as it is proposed.

Commissioner Robert Chandler stated he agreed with Commissioner Hahn as well, "It's here". There is not a big enough benefit to restrict a dispensary in Huntley, when the buyers can go directly next door and purchase it. Then you'll begin to see dispensaries right on our borders, and the other towns will get our tax dollars. Commissioner Robert Chandler does have concerns with driving under the influence, but that will occur with or without a dispensary. He stated he is in favor of the text amendment as it is written, allowing one dispensary in the C-2 zoning (outside of buffer zones) with a Special Use permit, and he is opposed to the use of cannabis inside of dispensaries.

Discussion regarding the difficulty of being approved for medical cannabis. Chairman Kibort said he thought legislators could have done a better job with the medical marijuana laws, as he agrees there is a medical benefit and some people in need are not qualifying. He then asked for a motion to close the public hearing.

A MOTION was made to close the public hearing to consider Petition No. 19-11.1.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 156 OF THE HUNTLEY VILLAGE CODE REGARDING ZONING REGULATIONS FOR ADULT-USE CANNABIS BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENTS

Ordinance (O)2020-01.__

WHEREAS, the Village of Huntley is a home rule unit of local government under the Illinois Constitution, 1970, Article VII, Section 6; and

WHEREAS, Title XV, Chapter 156 of the Huntley Code ("Zoning Code") regulates the use and development of land within the Village and provides for the administration and enforcement of such regulations; and

WHEREAS, from time to time it is appropriate to review, update and modify the Zoning Code to assure that it appropriately addresses new issues that may arise; and

WHEREAS, the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (the "Act"), 410 ILCS 705/1-1 et seq., was recently approved by the General Assembly and signed into law on June 25, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the Act authorizes the establishment of dispensary, cultivation center, craft grower, processor/ infuser, and transporter businesses ("Cannabis Businesses") throughout Illinois for the purpose of producing, processing, distributing, and selling at retail adult-use cannabis in accordance with the Act ("Adult-Use Cannabis") for purchase and personal recreational use by Illinois residents and non-residents 21 years of age and older beginning January 1, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board desires to amend the Zoning Code to allow for the potential establishment of an Adult-Use Cannabis dispensary within the Village, to establish zoning regulations for Adult-Use Cannabis dispensaries, and to prohibit all other types of Cannabis Businesses within the Village (the "*Proposed Amendments*"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to notice duly published, the Huntley Plan Commission (the "PC") conducted a public hearing on November 12, 2019 concerning the Proposed Amendments; and

WHEREAS, at the conclusion of the public hearing, the PC made findings and recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the Proposed Amendments; and

WHEREAS, having considered the findings and recommendations of the PC, the Village Board has found and determined that the adoption of the Proposed Amendments, as set forth in this Ordinance, is in the best interests of the Village and its residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF HUNTLEY as follows:

<u>SECTION I</u>: The foregoing recitals are incorporated into this Ordinance as if fully set forth in this section.

SECTION II: Section 156.011, entitled "Definitions" of Article II, entitled "Interpretations and Definitions," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is hereby amended in part to add the following new definitions:

CANNABIS BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENT: An Adult-Use cannabis craft grower, cultivation center, dispensary, infuser, processing, or transporter organization operating pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., as it may be amended from time-to-time.

CANNABIS CRAFT GROWER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "craft grower" to cultivate, dry, cure and package cannabis and perform other necessary activities to make cannabis available for sale at a dispensing organization or use at a processing organization, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS CULTIVATION CENTER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "cultivation center" to cultivate, process, transport and perform necessary activities to provide cannabis and cannabis-infused products to licensed cannabis business establishments, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS DISPENSARY: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation as a "dispensing organization" to acquire adult-use cannabis from licensed cannabis business establishments for the purpose of selling or dispensing cannabis, cannabis-infused products, cannabis seeds, paraphernalia or related supplies to qualified purchasers per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS INFUSER: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as an "infusing organization" or "infuser" to directly incorporate cannabis or cannabis concentrate into a product formulation to produce a cannabis-infused product, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS PROCESSOR: A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "processing organization" or "processor" to either extract constituent chemicals or compounds to produce cannabis concentrate or incorporate cannabis or cannabis concentrate into a product formulation to produce a cannabis product, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

CANNABIS TRANSPORTER: An organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a "transporting organization" or "transporter" to transport cannabis on behalf of a cannabis business establishment or a community college licensed under the Community College Cannabis Vocational Training Pilot Program, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (410 ILCS 705/1 et seq), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

<u>CANNABIS-INFUSED PRODUCT:</u> Food, oils, ointments, or other products containing usable cannabis that are not smoked.

SECTION III: Section 156.061, entitled "(C-2) Regional Retail District" of Article VI, entitled "Planned Development District," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is hereby amended in part as follows:

§ 156.061 (C-2) REGIONAL RETAIL DISTRICT

* * *

- (B) Uses.
 - * * *
 - (2) Special Uses. Upon recommendation by the Plan Commission after public hearing on petition pertaining thereto, in accordance with the requirements set forth for such hearing in Article VII of this Ordinance, the Village may, by Special Use Permit, allow the following uses in the C-2 District:

<u>RETAIL SALES</u> – Furniture sales (used), Outdoor sales & service, Secondhand store, **Adult-Use cannabis dispensary**.

* * *

<u>SECTION IV</u>: Section 156.068, entitled "Special Use Permits" of Article VII, entitled "Special Use Permits," of Chapter 156, entitled "Zoning Code," of Title XV, entitled "Land Usage" of the Huntley Code is hereby amended in part as follows:

(F) Special Standards for Specified Special Uses. Where the district regulations authorizing any special use permit in a particular district impose special standards to be met by such use in such district, a permit for such use in such district shall not be recommended or granted unless the applicant shall establish compliance with such special standards.

* * *

(9) Adult-Use Cannabis Dispensaries.

- a. Maximum Number of Cannabis Dispensaries: Not more than one Adult-Use cannabis dispensary (a "Cannabis Dispensary") shall be permitted to operate within the Village of Huntley at any given time.
- b. Minimum required buffer from protected uses:
 - (i) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of a pre-existing public or private nursery school, preschool, primary or secondary school, or day care center. Learning centers and vocational/trade centers shall not be classified as a public or private school for purposes of this Section.

- (ii) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 1,000 feet of the property line of an existing religious establishment, park district property, or library.
- (iii) A Cannabis Dispensary may not be located within 250 feet of residentially zoned property except when separated by a State highway.
- (iv) For the purposes of this section, distances shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures or objects, from the nearest point on the property line of the lot on which an applicable Cannabis Dispensary is located to the nearest point on a property line of any protected use.
- (v) Summary of Buffer Requirements:

- c. A Cannabis Dispensary may not conduct any sales or distribution of cannabis other than as authorized by the Act.
- d. Exterior Display: A Cannabis Dispensary shall be maintained or operated in a manner that the public viewing of cannabis, cannabis products, cannabis paraphernalia or similar products from any sidewalk, public or private right-of-way or from outside of the cannabis dispensing organization is not allowed.
- e. Hours of Operations: Hours of operation are limited to between 6:00am and 10:00pm.
- f. Environmental: Emission of dust, fumes, vapors, or odors in a manner that impacts neighboring premises or properties or any public property or right-of-way shall be prohibited.
- g. Signage: Electronic changeable copy signs are not permitted for a Cannabis Dispensary. No cannabis leaf or bud image may be used in promotional signage for the Dispensary.
- h. State Requirements: The Cannabis Dispensary must comply with all applicable provisions of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., as may be revised or amended from time to time.

- i. All hazardous waste and cannabis waste shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of the statutes of the State of Illinois and ordinances of the Village of Huntley.
- j. On-Premises Consumption: It shall be prohibited to consume cannabis products in a Cannabis Dispensary or anywhere on the site occupied by a dispensary.
- k. Other Adult-Use Cannabis Businesses Prohibited. Adult-use cannabis craft growers, cultivation centers, infusers, processors, and transporter organizations shall not be permitted to be colocated with a Cannabis Dispensary. Any cannabis business establishment other than a Cannabis Dispensary operating pursuant to a special use permit and in accordance with this Code shall be prohibited in all zoning districts.

* * *

SECTION V: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.

Agenda Item: Consideration – Ordinance Approving an Amendment to Title XI of

the Huntley Village Code to Prohibit Adult-Use Cannabis Businesses

within the Village of Huntley

Petitioner: Village of Huntley

<u>Department:</u> Development Services Department - Planning and Zoning Division

Introduction

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (the "Act") authorizes municipalities to prohibit Cannabis Businesses within their boundaries. The proposed ordinance to prohibit Cannabis Businesses within the Village has been prepared should the Village Board not adopt the text amendments to the Village's Zoning Code regarding Adult-Use cannabis business establishments.

The adoption of an ordinance prohibiting cannabis business establishments protects the Village from a petitioner arguing that such a use falls within more general categories that are allowable under the Village's existing zoning regulations. For example, a craft grower or cultivation center might assert that it is an allowable agricultural use, like a commercial nursery or greenhouse; a dispensary might assert that it is an allowable retail use, similar to a drug store, liquor store, or tobacco store.

Financial Impact

None.

Legal Analysis

The Village's Special Counsel has drafted the proposed ordinance for consideration by the Village Board.

Action Requested

A motion of the Village Board for an Ordinance Approving an Amendment to Title XI of the Huntley Village Code to Prohibit Adult-Use Cannabis Businesses within the Village of Huntley.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE XI OF THE HUNTLEY VILLAGE CODE TO PROHIBIT ADULT-USE CANNABIS BUSINESSES WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF HUNTLEY

- **WHEREAS,** the Village of Huntley (the "Village") is an Illinois home rule municipality established and existing in accordance with the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1-1 *et seq.*, (the "Act") was recently approved by the General Assembly and signed into law on June 25, 2019; and
- WHEREAS, the Act authorizes the establishment of dispensary, cultivation center, craft grower, processor/ infuser, and transporter businesses ("Cannabis Businesses") throughout Illinois for the purpose of producing, processing, distributing, and selling at retail Adult-Use cannabis in accordance with the Act ("Adult-Use Cannabis") for purchase and personal recreational use by Illinois residents and non-residents 21 years of age and older beginning January 1, 2020; and
- WHEREAS, under the Act, the Village has authority to enact ordinances that prohibit Cannabis Businesses within the Village or significantly limit the locations where Cannabis Businesses may be established; and
- WHEREAS, the Village has a long tradition of utilizing its zoning and planning authority to ensure that compatible uses are maintained in its various neighborhoods; and
- WHEREAS, the President and Village Board have determined that Cannabis Businesses will be incompatible with the purposes and uses allowed within the Village's various neighborhoods, and the presence of Cannabis Businesses within the Village will therefore be detrimental to the Village and its residents; and
- WHEREAS, Title XI of the Huntley Village Code ("Village Code") regulates various businesses and business activities within the Village; and
- WHEREAS, the President and Village Board have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Title XI of the Village Code to prohibit Cannabis Businesses within the corporate limits of the Village.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF HUNTLEY, COUNTIES OF KANE AND MCHENRY, STATE OF ILLINOIS, as follows:
- <u>SECTION I</u>: <u>Recitals</u>. The foregoing recitals are incorporated in, and made a part of, this Ordinance by this reference as findings of the Village Board of the Village.
- <u>SECTION II</u>: <u>Amendment to Title XI of the Village Code</u>; <u>Prohibition of Cannabis</u> <u>Businesses</u>. Title XI, titled "Business Regulations" of the Village Code is hereby amended to add a new Chapter 121, which shall hereafter be and read as follows:

Chapter 121: Adult-Use Cannabis.

§ 121.01. ADULT-USE CANNABIS BUSINESSES PROHIBITED.

Adult-Use cannabis businesses (including dispensing organizations, cultivation centers, craft growers, processing organizations, infuser organizations, and transporting organizations, all as defined by the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1-1 et seq.) operating pursuant to said Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, as may be amended from time to time, are hereby prohibited from locating or operating within the corporate limits of the Village of Huntley. This section shall not be construed to prohibit the operation of any facility licensed to operate pursuant to the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, 410 ILCS 130/1 et seq., as may be amended from time to time, that does not also hold a license to operate pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act.

<u>SECTION III</u>: <u>Effective Date</u>. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage, approval, and publication in the manner provided by law.

Agenda Item: Consideration – Ordinance Amending Sections 120.17 and 130.25 of

the Huntley Village Code Regarding Cannabis Paraphernalia

Department: Police Department

Introduction

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1-1 et seq., (the "Act") was approved by the General Assembly and signed into law on June 25, 2019. As of January 1, 2020, the Act permits personal possession and use of cannabis, cannabis-containing products, and cannabis paraphernalia by individuals 21 years of age and older in accordance with the requirements of the Act. Recently, the General Assembly approved a "trailer bill" (Public Act 101-593) that took effect on December 4, 2019 and makes various changes and clarifications to the Act and related statutes. Changes in the recent trailer bill include: (i) amending the Drug Paraphernalia Control Act to eliminate criminal penalties for possession of cannabis paraphernalia; (ii) amending the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act to provide that it shall not be a criminal or civil offense for a person 21 years of age or older to possess or use cannabis paraphernalia after January 1, 2020; and (iii) amending the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act to eliminate restrictions on possession and use of cannabis paraphernalia by patients and to allow registered medical cannabis patients age 18 and over to smoke or vape cannabis.

Staff Analysis

In light of the changes in the trailer bill, an amendment is proposed to Section 130.25 of the Village Code to add language prohibiting underage possession of cannabis paraphernalia. Underage possession would include possession of paraphernalia by anyone under age 21, other than a registered medical cannabis patient. For a registered patient, smoking- or vaping-related paraphernalia could be prohibited for anyone under age 18. The trailer bill also includes a definition of "cannabis paraphernalia" that would be incorporated into the Village Code.

Section 120.17 of the Village Code should also be amended, as it makes it unlawful for "any person" to sell the following items of smoking-related paraphernalia:

- a. Water pipes;
- b. Bongs or water bongs;
- c. Electric pipes;
- d. Carburetion tubes and devices;
- e. Carburetor pipes;
- f. Chillums; and
- g. Ice pipes or chillers;

State law now provides for the sale of cannabis paraphernalia, as defined in §130.25 of the Code, by a licensed cannabis dispensary or medical cannabis dispensary or a qualified employee thereof. The amendment to Section 120.17 of the Village Code clarifies that it does not prohibit the sale of cannabis paraphernalia at State-licensed cannabis dispensaries.

Financial Impact

None.

WHEREAS, the Village of Huntley (the "Village") is an Illinois home rule municipality established and existing in accordance with the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, 410 ILCS 705/1-1 et seq., (the "Act") was recently approved by the General Assembly and signed into law on June 25, 2019; and

WHEREAS, as of January 1, 2020, the Act permits personal possession and use of cannabis, cannabis-containing products, and cannabis paraphernalia by individuals 21 years of age and older in accordance with the requirements of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act also permits the sale of cannabis paraphernalia by State-licensed cannabis dispensaries and qualified employees of such dispensaries;

WHEREAS, pursuant to its home rule powers and other applicable law, the Village has authority to regulate possession and use of cannabis paraphernalia by individuals under 21 years of age and sale of cannabis paraphernalia by persons other than State-licensed cannabis dispensaries and their qualified employees; and

WHEREAS, Section 130.25 of the Huntley Village Code ("Village Code") adopts and incorporates certain provisions of the Drug Paraphernalia Control Act, 720 ILCS 600/ 1 et seq., and thereby prohibits possession of illegal drug paraphernalia within the Village; and

WHEREAS, Section 120.17 of the Village Code prohibits the sale of certain items of drug- and smoking-related paraphernalia within the Village; and

WHEREAS, in light of the Act and other recent changes to State law, the President and Village Board have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to: (i) amend Section 130.25 of the Village Code to prohibit underage possession of cannabis paraphernalia, except for possession by registered qualifying medical cannabis patients in accordance with the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, and (ii) amend Section 120.17 of the Village Code to clarify that it does not prohibit the sale of cannabis paraphernalia at State-licensed cannabis dispensaries, all as set forth in this Ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF HUNTLEY, COUNTIES OF KANE AND MCHENRY, STATE OF ILLINOIS, as follows:

<u>SECTION I</u>: The foregoing recitals are incorporated in, and made a part of, this Ordinance by this reference as findings of the Village Board of the Village.

SECTION II: Section 130.25 of Chapter 130, titled "General Offenses," of Title XIII, titled "General Offenses," of the Village Code is hereby amended in part and shall hereafter be and read as follows:

§ 130.25 POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA; <u>UNDERAGE</u> POSSESSION OF CANNABIS PARAPHERNALIA.

- **<u>A.</u>** <u>**Drug Paraphernalia.**</u> ILCS Ch. 720, Section 600/3.5 are adopted and incorporated in full as if fully set forth herein.
- B. Underage Possession of Cannabis Paraphernalia. Except as provided in the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act with respect to registered qualifying patients, it is unlawful for a person under the age of 21 to knowingly possess an item of cannabis paraphernalia with the intent to use such item in ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing cannabis into the human body, or in producing or preparing cannabis for such use.

For purposes of this section "cannabis paraphernalia" means: equipment, products, or materials intended to be used for planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, ingesting, or otherwise introducing cannabis into the human body.

C. Penalty, see § 130.99

SECTION III: Section 120.17, titled "Sales of Certain Smoking Paraphernalia Prohibited," of Chapter 120, titled "Tobacco," of Title XI, titled "Business Regulations," of the Village Code is hereby amended in part and shall hereafter be and read as follows:

§ 120.17 SALES OF CERTAIN SMOKING PARAPHERNALIA PROHIBITED.

It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale within the Village the following items of smoking-related paraphernalia:

- a. Water pipes;
- b. Bongs or water bongs;
- c. Electric pipes;
- d. Carburetion tubes and devices;
- e. Carburetor pipes;
- f. Chillums; and
- g. Ice pipes or chillers;

provided, however, that this section shall not be interpreted as prohibiting: (i) the sale of ecigarettes, personal vaporizers, electronic nicotine delivery systems, or similar devices that are designed specifically to aerosolize or atomize liquid solutions that simulate the smoking of tobacco; or (ii) the sale of cannabis paraphernalia, as defined in §130.25 of this Code, by a licensed cannabis dispensary or medical cannabis dispensary or a qualified employee thereof.

Extension to AB Sanchez, Inc. for the Entryway Area and

Ornamental Bed Beautification Services

Department: Public Works and Engineering – Streets and Underground Division

Introduction

The Village of Huntley maintains the grounds at the entryway sign locations, downtown, Wing Pointe entryway at Haligus and Huntley Dundee Roads, Southwind entryway at Reed Road and Cambridge Drive, all four corners at the intersection of Main Street and IL Route 47 and the planting beds at Municipal Complex. These areas can be characterized as small tracts generally with mulch and flower beds with seasonal decorating that require hand work and frequent attention. To accomplish all the necessary work to the standard and consistency the Village has come to expect, the Village has contracted this work out over the last several years.

On Thursday, February 14, 2019 the Village received bids from three (3) contractors for the Entryway Area and Ornamental Bed Beautification Services contract. The bid documents required a Base Bid and a Mandatory Alternate Bid for each of three consecutive years beginning in 2019. The Base Bid landscape maintenance activities consist of litter and debris pick-up, turf mowing, weed control and fertilizing in the identified areas. The Alternate Bid landscape maintenance activities consist of aeration in the downtown square.

Staff Analysis

On Thursday, March 14, 2019, the Village Board approved the Year 1 Bid award for the Entryway Area and Ornamental Bed Beautification Services to AB Sanchez, Inc. in the total Bid amount of \$45,030.00. Based on acceptable performance for the Year 1 services, all is in order for consideration to approve the Year 2 and Year 3 Bid extension to AB Sanchez, Inc.

The contract may be cancelled by the Village in whole or in part by written notice to the Contractor upon non-performance or violation of contract terms. The Village of Huntley reserves the right to terminate the service at any time during the term of the contract upon ten (10) business days written notice to the Contractor. Failure of the Contractor to deliver services within the time stipulated, unless extended in writing by the Village, shall constitute contract default.

Strategic Plan Priority

The 2016-2020 Strategic Plan identifies *Promote Sound Financial Management and Fiscal Sustainability* as a Strategic Priority, and "Enhance asset management program to sustain level of service at economical life cycle cost" as an objective.

Financial Impact

The FY20 Budget includes \$150,000 in the Facilities & Grounds Maintenance Fund, 410-00-00-6179, \$45,710 of which is earmarked for the Year 2 work identified under this contract. The FY21 Budget will be presented with funding for the Year 3 work.

Legal Analysis None required.

Extension to C.T. Veach, Inc. for the Landscape Maintenance

Services

<u>Department:</u> Public Works and Engineering – Streets and Underground Division

Introduction

The Village of Huntley is responsible for maintaining the grounds on all Village-owned property, certain areas within Special Service Area No. 5 (Southwind), as well as certain tracts of Village rights-of-way (ROW). The Village has also been maintaining the IL Route 47 medians the last several years. The combined Village maintained areas total approximately 106 acres over 198 separately defined tracts. To accomplish all of the necessary work, the Village utilizes contractors to share in the workload. For the 2020 season, the Village has targeted 46 acres consisting of 93 separate tracts for contract work. Public Works crews would still be responsible for over half of the maintained responsibility. Tracts targeted for contract generally consist of the more precarious areas such as highly travelled ROW and areas with steeper slopes adjacent to detention basins. The Municipal Complex has also been identified for contract.

On Thursday, January 24, 2019 the Village received bids from six (6) contractors for the contract Landscape Maintenance Services. The bid documents required a Base Bid and a Mandatory Alternate Bid for each of three consecutive years beginning in 2019. The Base Bid landscape maintenance activities consist of litter and debris pick-up, turf and roadside mowing, weed control and fertilizing in the identified areas. The Alternate Bid landscape maintenance activities consist of mulching and pruning for the same areas, aeration at the Municipal Center along with weed control and fertilizer for the remainder of the Village maintained areas. Weed and fertilizer spraying for Village staff would be limited to spot spraying as necessary to address nuisance areas.

Staff Analysis

On Thursday, February 28, 2019, the Village Board approved the Year 1 Bid award for the Landscape Maintenance Services to C.T. Veach, Inc. in the total bid amount of \$83,615.00. Based on acceptable performance for the Year 1 services, all is in order for consideration to approve the Year 2 and Year 3 Bid extension to C.T. Veach, Inc.

The contract may be cancelled by the Village in whole or in part by written notice to the Contractor upon non-performance or violation of contract terms. The Village of Huntley reserves the right to terminate the service at any time during the term of the contract upon ten (10) business days written notice to the Contractor. Failure of the Contractor to deliver services within the time stipulated, unless extended in writing by the Village, shall constitute contract default.

Strategic Plan Priority

The 2016-2020 Strategic Plan identifies *Promote Sound Financial Management and Fiscal Sustainability* as a Strategic Priority, and "Enhance asset management program to sustain level of service at economical life cycle cost" as an objective.

Financial Impact

The FY20 Budget includes \$150,000 in the Facilities & Grounds Maintenance Fund, 410-00-00-6179, \$86,181 of which is earmarked for the Year 2 work identified under this contract. The FY21 Budget will be presented with funding for the Year 3 work.

Legal Analysis

None required.

Introduction

The FY20 budget includes funding for the purchase of a new 5-yard dump truck equipped with dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap, GPS, 2-way radio, lights, cameras, and lettering. This vehicle will replace Vehicle 1690, a 2000 5-Yard Dump Truck that is 20 years old and has reached the end of its useful life. Staff will prepare a surplus declaration for Vehicle 1690 for Village Board consideration upon delivery of the new vehicle at which time it will be sold at auction.

Staff Analysis

Staff has received a proposal in the amount of \$77,470.00 for the purchase of a 2021 International single axle dump truck cab and chassis from Rush Truck Centers through the State of Illinois Department of Central Management Services (CMS) Joint Purchasing Procurement Program. The remaining set-up of the truck including the dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap, GPS, 2-way radio, lights, cameras, and lettering will be completed through other vendors. This is a multi-purpose vehicle that is used year round by Public Works for snowplowing, road repairs, and underground work.

Financial Impact

The FY20 Budget includes \$191,100 for the vehicle (\$185,000 in the Equipment Replacement Fund, 480-60-00-8131 for the truck and \$6,100 in the Capital Projects and Improvements Fund for the chipper cap). The cost to purchase the truck cab and chassis is \$77,470.00. The cost to purchase the dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap and GPS is \$96,911.00 and will be presented for Village Board approval under a separate resolution. An estimated additional \$1,850 will be requested through separate purchase orders for miscellaneous accessories such as lettering, radio, floor mats and sideboard.

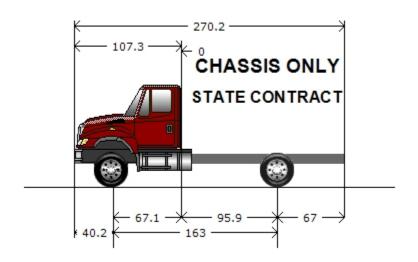

Introduction

The FY20 budget includes funding for the purchase of a new 5-yard dump truck equipped with dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap, GPS, 2-way radio, lights, cameras, and lettering. This vehicle will be replacing vehicle 1690, a 2000 5-Yard Dump Truck that is 20 years old and has reached the end of its useful life. Staff will prepare a surplus declaration for Vehicle 1690 for Village Board consideration upon delivery of the new vehicle at which time it will be sold at auction.

Staff Analysis

Staff has received a proposal in the amount of \$96,911.00 for the purchase and installation of a truck package including the dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap, GPS, cameras and lights for a 2021 International single axle dump truck from Bonnell Industries, Inc. through the Sourcewell Purchasing Program. The single axle dump truck cab and chassis is provided by another vendor. It is proposed that the Village purchase the truck package equipment to outfit the chassis from Bonnell Industries, Inc., which the Village has been doing for more than 20 years, to maintain consistency with the heavy duty vehicles in the fleet. This is a multi-purpose vehicle that is used year round by Public Works for snowplowing, road repairs, and underground work.

Financial Impact

The FY20 Budget includes \$191,100 for the vehicle (\$185,000 in the Equipment Replacement Fund, 480-60-00-8131 for the truck and \$6,100 in the Capital Projects and Improvements Fund for the chipper cap). The cost to purchase the dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap, GPS, cameras, and lights is \$96,911.00. The cost to purchase the truck cab and chassis is \$77,470.00 and will be presented for Village Board approval under a separate resolution. An estimated additional \$1,850.00 will be requested through separate purchase orders for miscellaneous accessories such as lettering, radio, floor mats and sideboard bringing the total purchase price to \$176,231.

WHEREAS, the Village of Huntley is a home rule unit of local government under the Illinois Constitution, 1970, Article VII, Section 6; and

WHEREAS, the FY20 Budget includes \$191,100 for the purchase of a new 5-yard dump truck equipped with dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap, GPS, 2-way radio, lights, cameras, and lettering; and

WHEREAS, the Village received a proposal for a truck package including the dump body, hydraulics, controls, plow, spreader, chemical tank, chipper cap, GPS, lights and cameras for a 2021 International single axle dump truck from Bonnell Industries, Inc. through the Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Program Contract #080818-BNL in the amount of \$96,911.00; and

WHEREAS, Bonnell Industries, Inc. has been outfitting the Village heavy duty vehicles for more than 20 years to maintain consistency in the fleet; and

WHEREAS, the new dump truck is a multi-purpose vehicle that is used year round by Public Works for snowplowing, road repairs, and underground work; and

Introduction

For engineering agreements \$25,000 or greater which include federal funds, Local Planning Agencies (LPAs), such as the Village of Huntley, are required to use Quality Based Selection (QBS) which is fully compliant with Federal requirements of 23 CFR 172 and the Brooks Act. As sub-grantees, LPAs must use competitive negotiation supported by qualification based selection procedures. This is the primary method of procurement for engineering and design related services using federal funding. Local preference or existing firm relationships can no longer be used as criteria to award engineering services for federally funded projects over the threshold amount.

Staff Analysis

On November 16, 2017, the Village Board authorized submittal of an Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP) grant application for the Reed Road Multi-Use Path (MUP) between Vine Street and IL Route 47. Subsequently, the Village was awarded an ITEP grant in the amount of \$192,000.00, representing 80% of the costs for Phase II and Phase III engineering and construction of the MUP. The remaining 20% of the project costs are to be matched by the Village. The Phase I Engineering was funded entirely by the Village and has already been completed. A breakdown of the project costs is summarized in the following table:

On July 26, 2018, the Village Board adopted a QBS Policy and Procedures for selecting an engineering consultant. Following the QBS process, the selection team identified Christopher B. Burke Engineering, LTD as the highest ranked consultant. The other two consultants that submitted a Statement of Qualifications included Fehr-Graham and Burns & McDonnell.

The Village has submitted pre-final Phase II plans to IDOT and is targeting an April 2020 IDOT Bid Letting.

Strategic Plan Priority

The 2016-2020 Strategic Plan identifies *Preserve and Enhance Quality of Life for Village Residents* as a strategic priority and "Identify additional locations and funding sources for multiuse paths" as an objective.

Financial Impact

The FY2020 Budget includes funding for the Reed Road Multi-Use Path construction and construction engineering services in the amount of \$60,000 in the Capital Projects and Improvement Fund, 400-00-00-8000. \$15,994.96 (80%) will be reimbursed by ITEP for Phase III construction engineering.

THE LPA AGREES:

- 1. To acquire in its name, or in the name of the STATE if on the STATE highway system, all right-of-way necessary for this project in accordance with the requirements of Titles II and III of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, and established State policies and procedures. Prior to advertising for bids, the LPA shall certify to the STATE that all requirements of Titles II and III of said Uniform Act have been satisfied. The disposition of encroachments, if any, will be cooperatively determined by representatives of the LPA, the STATE, and the FHWA if required.
- 2. To provide for all utility adjustments and to regulate the use of the right-of-way of this improvement by utilities, public and private, in accordance with the current Utility Accommodation Policy for Local Public Agency Highway and Street Systems.
- 3. To provide for surveys and the preparation of plans for the proposed improvement and engineering supervision during construction of the proposed improvement.
- 4. To retain jurisdiction of the completed improvement unless specified otherwise by addendum (addendum should be accompanied by a location map). If the improvement location is currently under road district jurisdiction, a jurisdictional addendum is required.
- 5. To maintain or cause to be maintained the completed improvement (or that portion within its jurisdiction as established by addendum referred to in item 4 above) in a manner satisfactory to the STATE and the FHWA.
- 6. To comply with all applicable Executive Orders and Federal Highway Acts pursuant to the Equal Employment Opportunity and Nondiscrimination Regulations required by the U.S. Department of Transportation.
- 7. To maintain for a minimum of 3 years after final project close out by the STATE, adequate books, records and supporting documents to verify the amounts, recipients and uses of all disbursements of funds passing in conjunction with the contract. The contract and all books, records, and supporting documents related to the contract shall be available for review and audit by the Auditor General and the STATE. The LPA agrees to cooperate fully with any audit conducted by the Auditor General, the STATE, and to provide full access to all relevant materials. Failure to maintain the books, records, and supporting documents required by this section shall establish presumption in favor of the STATE for recovery of any funds paid by the STATE under the contract for which adequate books, records and supporting documentation are not available to support their purported disbursement.
- 8. To provide if required, for the improvement of any railroad-highway grade crossing and rail crossing protection within the limits of the proposed improvement.
- 9. To comply with Federal requirements or possibly lose (partial or total) Federal participation as determined by the FHWA.
- 10. (Local Contracts or Day Labor) To provide or cause to be provided all of the initial funding, equipment, labor, material and services necessary to complete the project.
- 11. (Preliminary Engineering) In the event that right-of-way acquisition for, or construction of, the project for which this preliminary engineering is undertaken with Federal participation is not started by the close of the tenth fiscal year following FHWA authorization, the LPA will repay the STATE any Federal funds received under the terms of this agreement.
- 12. (Right-of-Way Acquisition) In the event construction has not commenced by the close of the twentieth fiscal year following **FHWA** authorization using right-of-way acquired this agreement, the **LPA** will repay the **STATE** any Federal Funds received under the terms of this agreement.
- 13. (Railroad Related Work) The LPA is responsible for the payment of the railroad related expenses in accordance with the LPA/ railroad agreement prior to requesting reimbursement from the STATE. Requests for reimbursement should be sent to the appropriate IDOT District Bureau of Local Roads and Streets Office. Engineer's Payment Estimates shall be in accordance with the Division of Cost.
- 14. Certifies to the best of its knowledge and belief that it's officials:
 - a, are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
 - b. have not within a three-year period preceding this agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of Federal or State antirust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements receiving stolen property;
 - c. are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a governmental entity (Federal, State, Local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in item (b) of this certification; and
 - d. have not within a three-year period preceding the agreement had one or more public transactions (Federal, State, Local) terminated for cause or default.
- 15. To include the certifications, listed in item 14 above, and all other certifications required by State statutes, in every contract, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment.
- 16. (STATE Contracts). That execution of this agreement constitutes the LPA's concurrence in the award of the construction contract to the responsible low bidder as determined by the STATE.
- 17. That for agreements exceeding \$100,000 in federal funds, execution of this agreement constitutes the LPA's certification that:
 - a. No federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of congress, an officer or employee of congress, or any employee of a member of congress in connection with the awarding of any federal contract, the making of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement.

- b. If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of congress, an officer or employee of congress or an employee of a member of congress in connection with this federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit standard form LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying", in accordance with its instructions.
- c. The LPA shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards (including subcontracts, subgrants and contracts under grants, loans and cooperative agreements), and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- 18. To regulate parking and traffic in accordance with the approved project report.
- 19. To regulate encroachments on public rights-of-way in accordance with current Illinois Compiled Statutes.
- 20. To regulate the discharge of sanitary sewage into any storm water drainage system constructed with this improvement in accordance with the current Illinois Compiled Statutes.
- 21. To comply with the federal Financial Integrity Review and Evaluation (FIRE) program, which requires States and subrecipients to justify continued federal funding on inactive projects. 23 CFR 630.106(a)(5) defines an inactive project as a project in which no expenditures have been charged against federal funds for the past twelve (12) months.
- 22. (Reimbursement Requests) For reimbursement requests the LPA will submit supporting documentation with each invoice. Supporting documentation is defined as verification of payment, certified time sheets or summaries, vendor invoices, vendor receipts, cost plus fix fee invoice, progress report, personnel and direct cost summaries, and other documentation supporting the requested reimbursement amount (Form BLR 05621 should be used for consultant invoicing purposes). LPA invoice requests to the STATE will be submitted with sequential invoice numbers by project.
- 23. (Final Invoice) The LPA will submit to the STATE a complete and detailed final invoice with applicable supporting documentation of all incurred costs, less previous payments, no later than twelve (12) months from the date of completion of work or from the date of the previous invoice, which ever occurs first. If a final invoice is not received within this time frame, the most recent invoice may be considered the final invoice and the obligation of the funds closed. Form BLR 05613 (Engineering Payment Record) is required to be submitted with the final invoice on the engineering projects.
- 24. (Project Closeout) The **LPA** shall provide the final report to the appropriate **STATE** district office within twelve (12) months of the physical completion date of the project so that the report my be audited and approved for payment. If the deadline cannot be met, a written explanation must be provided to the district prior to the end of the twelve (12) months documenting the reason and the new anticipated date of completion. If the extended deadline is not met, this process must be repeated until the project is closed. Failure to follow this process may result in the immediate close-out of the project and loss of further funding.
- 25. (Project End Date) For Preliminary Engineering projects the end date is ten (10) years from the execution date of the agreement. For Right-of-Way projects the end date is fifteen (15) years from the execution date of the agreement. For Construction projects the end date is five (5) years for projects under \$1,000,000 or seven (7) years for projects over \$1,000,000 from the execution date of the agreement. Requests for time extensions and joint agreement amendments must be received and approved prior to expiration of the project end date. Failure to extend the end date may result in the immediate close-out of the project and loss of further funding.
- 26. (Single Audit Requirements) That if the LPA expends \$750,000 or more a year in federal financial assistance they shall have an audit made in accordance with 2 CFR 200. LPA's expending less than \$750,000 a year shall be exempt from compliance. A copy of the audit report must be submitted to the STATE (Office of Internal Audit, Room 201, 2300 South Dirksen Parkway, Springfield, Illinois, 62764) within 30 days after the completion of the audit, but no later than one year after the end of the LPA's fiscal year. The CFDA number for all highway planning and construction activities is 20,205.
- 27. That the LPA is required to register with the System for Award Management or SAM, which is a web-enabled government-wide application that collects, validates, stores, and disseminates business information about the federal government's trading partners in support of the contract award and the electronic payment processes. To register or renew, please use the following website: https://www.sam.gov/SAM/
- 28. (Required Uniform Reporting) To comply with the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (30 ILCS 708) that requires a uniform reporting of expenditures. Uniform reports of expenditures shall be reported no less than quarterly using IDOT's BoBS 2832 form available on IDOT's web page under the "Resources" tab. Additional reporting frequency may be required based upon specific conditions, as listed in the accepted Notice of State Award (NOSA). Specific conditions are based upon the award recipient/grantee's responses to the Fiscal and Administrative Risk Assessment (ICQ) and the Programmatic Risk Assessment (PRA).

NOTE: Under the terms of the Grant Funds Recovery Act (30 ILCS 705/4.1), "Grantor agencies may withhold or suspend the distribution of grant funds for failure to file requirement reports" if the report is more than 30 calendar days delinquent, without any approved written explanation by the grantee, the entity will be placed on the Illinois Stop Payment List. (Refer to the Grantee Compliance Enforcement System for detail about the Illinois Stop Payment List: https://www.illinois.gov/sites/GATA/Pages/ResourceLibrary.aspx)

THE STATE AGREES:

- 1. To provide such guidance, assistance, and supervision to monitor and perform audits to the extent necessary to assure validity of the LPA's certification of compliance with Title II and III Requirements.
- (State Contracts) To receive bids for construction of the proposed improvement when the plans have been approved by the STATE (and FHWA, if required) and to award a contract for construction of the proposed improvement after receipt of a satisfactory bid.
- 3. (Day Labor) To authorize the LPA to proceed with the construction of the improvement when agreed unit prices are approved, and to reimburse the LPA for that portion of the cost payable from Federal and/or State funds based on the agreed unit prices and engineer's pay estimates in accordance with the division of cost page.

- 4. (Local Contracts) For agreements with federal and/or state funds in engineering, right-of-way, utility work and/or construction work:
 - a. To reimburse the LPA for federal and/or state share on the basis of periodic billings, provided said billings contain sufficient cost information and show evidence of payments by the LPA;
 - b. To provide independent assurance sampling and furnish off-site material inspection and testing at sources normally visited by **STATE** inspectors for steel, cement, aggregate, structural steel, and other materials customarily tested by the **STATE**.

IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED:

- 1. Construction of the project will utilize domestic steel as required by Section 106.01 of the current edition of the Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction and federal Buy America provisions.
- 2. That this Agreement and the covenants contained herein shall become null and void in the event that the **FHWA** does not approve the proposed improvement for Federal-aid participation within one (1) year of the date of execution of this agreement.
- 3. This agreement shall be binding upon the parties, their successors and assigns.
- 4. For contracts awarded by the LPA, the LPA shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of any USDOT assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR part 26. The LPA shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of USDOT assisted contracts. The LPA's DBE program, as required by 49 CFR part 26 and as approved by USDOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. Upon notification to the recipient of its failure to carry out its approved program, the STATE may impose sanctions as provided for under part 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S. C 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31 U.S.C 3801 et seq.). In the absence of a USDOT approved LPA DBE Program or on state awarded contracts, this agreement shall be administered under the provisions of the STATE'S USDOT approved Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program.
- 5. In cases where the **STATE** is reimbursing the **LPA**, obligation of the **STATE** shall cease immediately without penalty or further payment being required if, in any fiscal year, the Illinois General Assembly or applicable federal funding source fails to appropriate or otherwise make available funds for the work contemplated herein.
- 6. All projects for the construction of fixed works which are financed in whole or in part with funds provided by this agreement and/or amendment shall be subject to the Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/0.01 et seq.) unless the provisions of the act exempt its application.

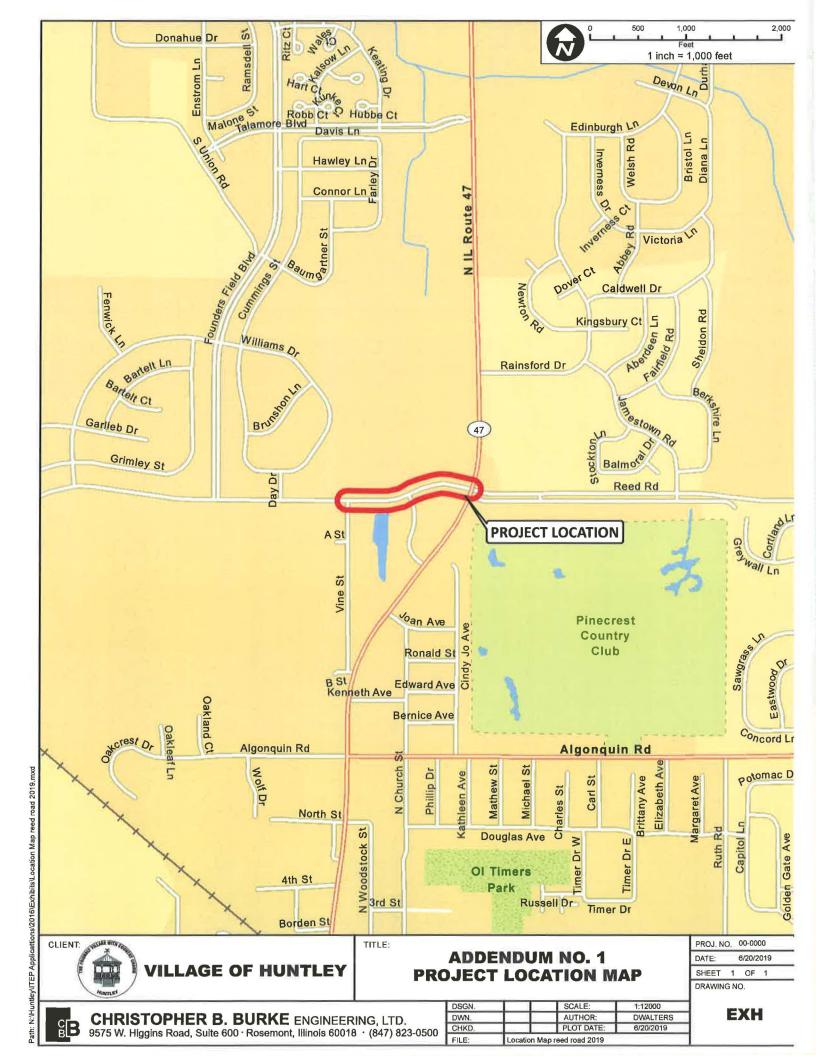

- a) For the first 50% of completed work, and upon receipt of monthly invoices from the ENGINEER and the approval thereof by the LPA, monthly payments for the work performed shall be due and payable to the ENGINEER, such payments to be equal to 90% of the value of the partially completed work minus all previous partial payments made to the ENGINEER.

- b) Final Payment Upon approval of the work by the LPA but not later than 60 days after the work is completed and reports have been made and accepted by the LPA and STATE, a sum of money equal to the basic fee as determined in this AGREEMENT less the total of the amounts of partial payments previously paid to the ENGINEER shall be due and payable to the ENGINEER.
- 6. The recipient shall not discriminate on the basis on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of any DOT-assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR part 26. The recipient shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts. The recipient's DBE program, as required by 49 CFR part 26 and as approved by DOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as violation of this agreement. III. It is Mutually Agreed,

- 1. That the ENGINEER and the ENGINEER's subcontractors will maintain all books, documents, papers, accounting records and other evidence pertaining to cost incurred and to make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the AGREEMENT period and for three years from the date of final payment under this AGREEMENT, for inspection by the STATE, Federal Highway Administration or any authorized representatives of the federal government and copies thereof shall be furnished if requested.
- 2. That all services are to be furnished as required by construction progress and as determined by the LPA employee In Responsible Charge. The ENGINEER shall complete all services specified herein within a time considered reasonable to the LPA, after the CONTRACTOR has completed the construction contract.
- 3. That all field notes, test records and reports shall be turned over to and become the property of the LPA and that during the performance of the engineering services herein provided for, the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any loss or damage to the documents herein enumerated while they are in the ENGINEER's possession and any such loss or damage shall be restored at the ENGINEER's expense.
- 4. That this AGREEMENT may be terminated by the LPA upon written notice to the ENGINEER, at the ENGINEER's last known address, with the understanding that should the AGREEMENT be terminated by the LPA, the ENGINEER shall be paid for any services completed and any services partially completed. The percentage of the total services which have been rendered by the ENGINEER shall be mutually agreed by the parties hereto. The fixed fee stipulated in numbered paragraph 4d of Section II shall be multiplied by this percentage and added to the ENGINEER's actual costs to obtain the earned value of work performed. All field notes, test records and reports completed or partially completed at the time of termination shall become the property of, and be delivered to, the LPA.
- 5. That any differences between the ENGINEER and the LPA concerning the interpretation of the provisions of this AGREEMENT shall be referred to a committee of disinterested parties consisting of one member appointed by the ENGINEER, one member appointed by the LPA, and a third member appointed by the two other members for disposition and that the committee's decision shall be final.

- 6. That in the event the engineering and inspection services to be furnished and performed by the LPA (including personnel furnished by the ENGINEER) shall, in the opinion of the STATE be incompetent or inadequate, the STATE shall have the right to supplement the engineering and inspection force or to replace the engineers or inspectors employed on such work at the expense of the LPA.
- 7. That the ENGINEER has not been retained or compensated to provide design and construction review services relating to the contractor's safety precautions, except as provided in numbered paragraph 1f of Section I.
- 8. This certification is required by the Drug Free Workplace Act (30ILCS 580). The Drug Free Workplace Act requires that no grantee or contractor shall receive a grant or be considered for the purpose of being awarded a contract for the procurement of any property or service from the State unless that grantee or contractor will provide a drug free workplace. False certification or violation of the certification may result in sanctions including, but not limited to, suspension of contract or grant payments, termination of a contract or grant and debarment of contracting or grant opportunities with the State for at least one (1) year but no more than five (5) years.

- 10. When the ENGINEER is requested to complete work outside the scope of the original AGREEMENT, a supplemental AGREEMENT will be required. Supplements will also be required for the addition or removal of subconsultants, direct costs, the use of previously unspecified staff, and other material changes to the original AGREEMENT.

Also responsible for the generation and inspection of punch lists used by the Village during the acceptance of public improvements for maintenance turn over to the Village.

CONSTRUCTION

IL Route 47 Multi-Use Path, Huntley: Resident Engineer. <u>Department:</u> Public Works and Engineering Department – Utilities Division

Introduction

The Nutrient Assessment Reduction Plan (NARP) is a requirement to be incorporated in many Illinois National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits for major publicly owned treatment works (POTWs) that discharge into a receiving waterbody which is impaired or at risk of eutrophication (excessive richness of nutrients in a lake or other body of water, frequently due to runoff from the land, which causes a dense growth of plant life and death of animal life from lack of oxygen). The West Wastewater Treatment Facility NPDES Permit Renewal, issued for Public Notice on September 28, 2019 contains the NARP requirement.

The purpose of the NARP is to identify phosphorus input reductions and other measures needed to help ensure that dissolved oxygen and offensive aquatic algae and aquatic plant criteria are met throughout a watershed. A provision of the NARP is to form a watershed group to evaluate the watershed on a holistic basis. The Fox River Study Group (FRSG) was formed several years ago under similar prerequisites. The FRSG has completed the Fox River Implementation Plan (FRIP) to serve as their NARP and now the EPA is moving on to more watersheds.

Staff Analysis

The Village of Huntley is required to develop a NARP by December 31, 2024, in accordance with Special Condition (SC) 23 of the Village's NPDES Permit (No. IL0070688) for its West Wastewater Treatment Facility. This is a significant effort and will require the Village to evaluate the management objectives for the NARP, assess data gaps that need to be filled, collect data to fill the gaps, develop tools (such as models) to assist with evaluating targets and management scenarios, and apply the tools to reach consensus on specific projects to be included in the NARP. The preliminary NARP workplan is the first step in this process, and will identify the scope, schedule, and budget for subsequent work that is required to produce the NARP over the next five years.

Related to the NARP, the permit also contains (SC 22), which will require a Total Phosphorus (TP) discharge limit of 0.5 mg/l by January 1, 2030. This SC is also being applied to many NPDES permits throughout the State. Currently, both the East and West Wastewater Treatment Facilities can meet a 0.5 mg/l TP discharge limit even though the current permit contains a 1.0 mg/l discharge limit. However, the Village needs to evaluate if the facilities can meet the 0.5 mg/l on a consistent basis. Village staff will evaluate TP removal capabilities over the next few years and assess if 0.5 mg/l is consistently feasible with current processes.

(SC) 23 addresses the consequence of the Village if a NARP is not prepared and submitted. Essentially, the Village would be subject to a TP discharge limit of whatever the EPA deems appropriate which may very well be below 0.5 mg/l identified in (SC 22) and at a much sooner timeframe. This would require a multi-million dollar investment at each facility to implement process equipment to achieve.

Strategic Plan Priority

The 2016-2020 Strategic Plan identifies "Preserve and Enhance Quality of Life for Village Residents" as a Strategic Priority, and "Protect Natural Resources" as a Goal.

Financial Impact

The FY20 Budget includes funding in the Wastewater Capital Improvement and Equipment Fund, 525-00-00-6120 for the Preliminary NARP Workplan Development.

Legal Analysis

PRELIMINARY NUTRIENT ASSESSMENT REDUCTION PLAN (NARP) WORKPLAN DEVELOPMENT

Village of Huntley, McHenry and Kane Cos., IL

The NARP is a requirement in Special Conditions to be incorporated in many Illinois National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits for major publicly owned treatment works (POTWs) that discharge into a receiving water body which is impaired or at risk of eutrophication. In addition, there are conditions in the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) general permit that require permittees to provide a schedule for meeting wasteload allocations in total maximum daily loads (TMDLs) or watershed management plans.

The purpose of the NARP is to identify phosphorus input reductions and other measures needed to help ensure that dissolved oxygen and offensive aquatic algae and aquatic plant criteria are met throughout a watershed. The NARP will therefore substitute for a TMDL to meet these numeric and narrative criteria. The NARP differs from a TMDL by allowing groups to evaluate the appropriate water quality targets, adjust them if this is shown to be appropriate and necessary, and to implement the NARP through adaptive management. Illinois EPA's expectations for the NARP, however, have not been articulated.

The Village of Huntley intends to develop a NARP by December 31, 2024, in accordance with Special Condition 23 of the Village's NPDES Permit (No. IL0070688) for its West WWTP. This is a significant effort and will require that the Village evaluate the management objectives for the NARP, assess data gaps that need to be filled, collect data to fill the gaps, develop tools (such as models) to assist with evaluating targets and management scenarios, and apply the tools to reach consensus on specific projects to be included in the NARP. The preliminary NARP workplan is the first step in this process, and will identify the scope, schedule, and budget for subsequent work that is required to produce the NARP over the next five years.

Scope of Work

The team will work with the Village to develop a preliminary NARP workplan by August 31, 2020. This will be accomplished through the following tasks:

- (1) Project Management & Preliminary NARP Objectives
- (2) Review Background Information
- (3) Identify Missing Components & Refine Objectives
- (4) Develop Preliminary NARP Workplan

Task 1. Project Management & Preliminary NARP Objectives

This task will include a kick-off meeting and a workplan review meeting with Huntley. Results of Tasks 2 through 4 will be used to inform the workplan review meeting. This task will also include routine project management, invoices and interim progress calls. Finally, Task 1 includes finalizing the preliminary workplan.

The kick-off meeting will be used for information transfer, establishing communication logistics, defining Village's interests and concerns, and discussing a NARP outline. The outcome of the kick-off meeting will be the preliminary NARP objectives and a preliminary outline of the NARP.

Beginning with the "end in mind" will help focus the review of background information. Results of Tasks 2 through 4 will be used to inform the workplan review meeting (2nd meeting with the Village). Around this time, a conference call with the IEPA will be coordinated to obtain general regulatory feedback of the proposed NARP workplan. The discussion at these meetings will be used to help finalize the NARP workplan for submittal to Illinois EPA.

Task 2. Review Background Information

The objectives of Task 2 are to assess the available information which relates to monitoring and modeling and to produce a revised NARP outline. This includes an assessment of information needed to develop a watershed model and instream model of the South Branch and Huntley Branch of the Kishwaukee River. Information will include available land use, flow, instream water quality, information/data on pollutant sources (point and nonpoint) and completed projects to control those sources. The project team will review the data for the period of last five years to be reflective of existing conditions of the watershed and stream.

The project team will initiate review of information related to the Village's water quality monitoring and water quality data available from Illinois EPA. The project team will also obtain publicly available data, such as existing models, that can provide information for development of the watershed model and instream water quality model that will be needed to complete the NARP. The project team will compile all the data in a database and summarize it in table format.

Task 3. Identify Missing Components & Refine Objectives

Task 3 will be used to refine the NARP objectives and create an outline of the preliminary workplan to inform the development of Task 4. Two known missing components are a watershed model (for calculating flows and pollutant loads to the South Branch of Branch of the Kishwaukee River during critical periods) and an instream water quality model. Key datasets needed to develop the models may also be missing. The project team will evaluate potential watershed and hydraulic/water quality models that could support development of the NARP. A table will be prepared showing the potential modeling platforms, their data needs, and available and missing data. This table will be reviewed with the Village during the progress meeting under Task 1.

There are different levels of model complexity (and hence required resources) that may achieve Village's objectives for the NARP. The project team will recommend two potential modeling platforms of different levels of complexity and identify the likely data gaps, including an estimate of the effort needed to fill those data gaps, and the value that each modeling approach may bring to meeting project objectives. The recommendation will be made based on the project team's recent experience with development of NARPs in Illinois. This will help the Village decide on the appropriate model platform and therefore the monitoring and modeling budgets needed in the workplan.

Task 4. Develop Preliminary NARP Workplan

This task will be used to reach consensus on the elements of a preliminary NARP workplan once the Village has selected a modeling platform. The project team will work with the Village to review various options and will then establish a draft scope, schedule, and cost estimate. Options for monitoring or making assumptions and the subsequent cost impacts will be identified. For example, sediment nutrient fluxes may be assigned using best professional judgment or there may be some stand-alone monitoring projects that should be proposed as

NARP projects. It may also be possible for the Village to restructure existing sampling programs (delay some planned sampling in exchange for new sampling) to inform the NARP and still provide the information needed for long-term management of the watershed. This information will be circulated as a draft preliminary workplan. Geosyntec will meet with Huntley and incorporate the Village's comments to produce a final draft preliminary workplan. The preliminary workplan will be finalized under Task 1. The workplan will be submitted to the Village in Memorandum format.

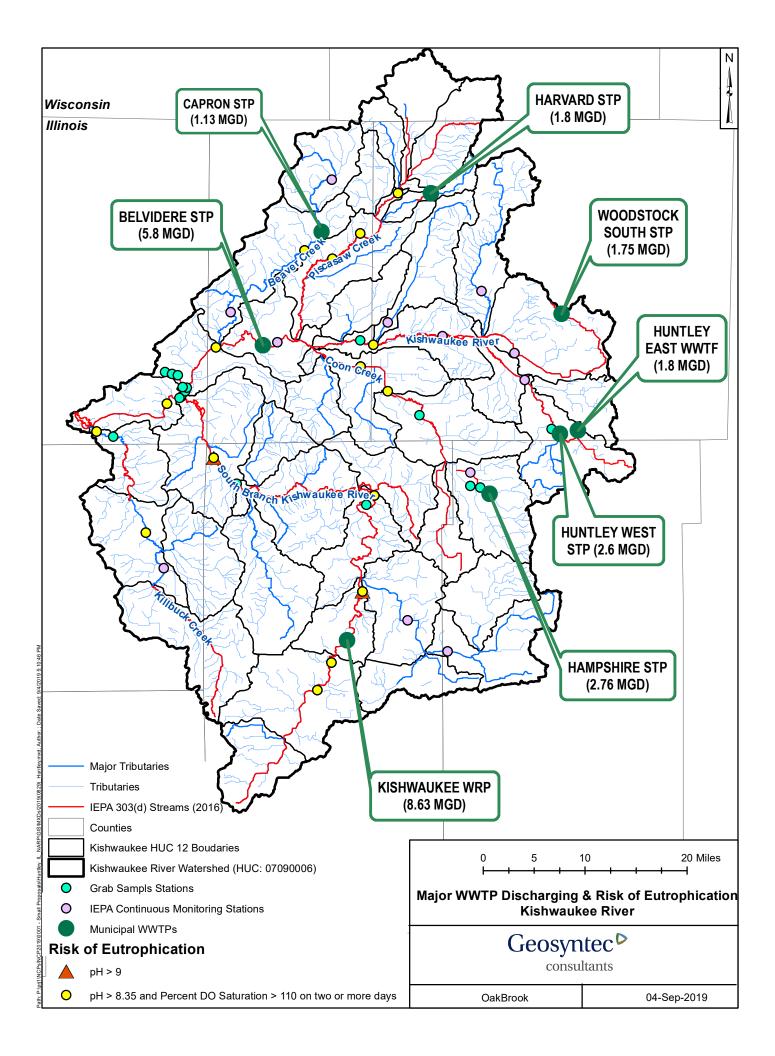
