- Technical Rescue



(July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024)




The fiscal year budget is \$8,696,600. As a service provider, the biggest expenditures are employee wages and benefits.

FIRE SUPPRESSION

The Fire Suppression Division consists of 48 members who work 24.25-hour shifts to staff each of the 3 Kentwood fire stations. They respond to all emergency calls, including fires, medicals, alarms, rescues, vehicle accidents, hazardous conditions and severe weather. They are assisted by 6 members from administration and prevention who work 40 hours per week but are alerted to incidents by pager at all other times and respond as needed.

All sworn fire personnel are certified by the State of Michigan as Fire Fighter II and licensed as Emergency Medical Technicians or higher. Many have advanced training and certification as Fire Officers, Hazardous Materials Technicians, Technical Rescue Technicians (rope, confined space, trench and structural collapse), Fire Inspectors, Fire Investigators, Plan Reviewers. Personnel are also certified as Instructors in many of those areas.






INCIDENT RESPONSE

Fire personnel respond from three strategically located stations that are staffed around the clock.





Stations 1 and 3 staff both a fire engine and medical unit due to call volume. Currently, Station 2 staffs only an engine. As Kentwood continues to grow and emergency responses increase, a medical unit will be added at Station 2.



FIRE PHOTOS

Because fire fighter priorities upon arrival at a fire include assessing the incident scene, finding a water source, attacking the fire and searching for possible victims, it is often difficult to obtain early photos of active fires. We appreciate the cooperation of neighbors who provide photos from phones or doorbell cameras to assist in documentation.

Fortunately, there were no loss-of-life fires in 2023. The most property damage occurred in residential fires.






RESPONSE TIMES


- Research has shown that medical intervention begun within 5 minutes of traumatic injury or cardiac arrest gives the patient a much greater chance of survival.
- National data indicates that fire fighters are able to confine about half of structure fires to the room and floor of origin if the response time is less than 5 minutes.

The Kentwood Fire Department response time goal is to reach the scene of an emergency within 5 minutes and 20 seconds (5:20). In 2023 the average overall emergency response time was 4:29.





No fire department is able to mitigate all emergencies independently. There are written agreements among departments throughout Kent County to assist when needed.




INCIDENT REPORTING

Fire departments in Michigan must participate in comprehensive national reporting systems for data collection involving both fire (NFIRS) and EMS (NEMSIS) incidents. After every response fire fighters complete reports to gather defined information about the nature of the call, actions taken, and results. Aggregate data submitted through the state is used to identify trends and issues, develop education campaigns, make recommendations for codes and standards, improve patient healthcare and outcomes, support research, and other safety efforts.

Kentwood Fire Department transitioned to the updated NEMSIS version 3.5 in December.

- 641 Total Elements in each report.
 - 441 EMS
 - 152 Demographic
- 328 State Elements
- 214 National Elements
- 137 Changes between version 3.4 and 3.5
- 26 New elements
- Other elements were added for Kent County EMS (KCEMS) and the City of Kentwood to assist with data capture.


The United States Fire Administration has begun efforts to replace the current NFIRS system with a National Emergency Response Information System (NERIS) to support enhanced preparedness and response and reduce risks to the community.




FIRE PREVENTION

The Fire Marshal and two Fire Inspectors comprise the Fire Prevention Division. Each member works four 10-hour days during the week (6:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M.). They review construction plans, conduct public education, investigate fires and, supplemented by suppression personnel, conduct business inspections and complete pre-incident plans. They also respond to emergency calls on- and off-duty.


ALARM INSTALLATIONS

The Kentwood Fire Department installs smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms at no cost where needed and requested in residences. Most of the alarms have been provided through the State MI Prevention program. Record numbers of alarms were installed in 2023.

Rental properties are not eligible for this program as it is the responsibility of the owner to install alarms.

PRE-INCIDENT PLANS

While performing fire safety inspections, fire personnel also develop pre-incident plans that familiarize them with the buildings and their features prior to an emergency and provide critical information during an emergency.



TRAINING

As emergency calls become more complex, more training is required to maintain and improve skills and implement new concepts to enhance safety and efficiency and, ultimately, provide a higher level of service to Kentwood citizens.


Most training is conducted in-house with certified instructors on staff. However, personnel also attend outside classes, particularly for specialized and advanced courses.

To assure that all initial and continuing education requirements are met and consistent, quality training is provided to new recruits and more seasoned personnel, a full-time Training Captain position was added in 2023. Personnel completed a total of 9,583 training hours in the general categories below.





EMERGENCY MEDICAL RESPONSES




FALSE CALLS




