### Village to hold Primary Election - Find out who's running



# Don't wait until the last minute to register!

Register to vote in-person at the Municipal Clerk's office in the Kronenwetter Municipal Center Monday - Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 pm.

Registering in-person is available during "late" and "open" registration periods. The "late" registration period is defined as the 19 days preceding an election. The "open" registration period is all other days not during the late registration period. Please remember to bring in proof of residence documentation.

Online: Visit the My Vote WI website (https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/) to register online. Please note that to use this feature, the address that you are registering under must match the WI DMV (driver's license) records. You can only use this feature during the "open" registration period.

**Mail:** Download and print a Voter Registration application from the Election Commission website.

(https://elections.wi.gov/) Remember to enclose your proof of residence documentation. This is only available during the "open" registration period.

In-person at the polls on Election Day. This registration can take as long as 45-minutes. We suggest registering before Election Day. Do not forget your proof of residence documentation.

Three candidates have declared their candidacy for Village president forcing a Primary Election on Feb. 21. Only two candidates are allowed on the Spring Election ballot.

Incumbent Village President Chris Voll will face current trustees Ken Charneski and Joel Straub in the race for Village president.

Voll has served as president since 2015. Charneski has served as a trustee since 2018. Straub has served as a trustee since 2021.

On Friday, Jan. 6, Police Chief Terry McHugh drew candidate names to determine Primary Election ballot placement.

#### The names will appear in the following order:

- Joel Straub
- Chris Voll
- Ken Charneski

Also, up for grabs are three Village Board trustee seats.

- Village Trustee currently held by Joel Straub since 2021
- Village Trustee currently held by Chris Eiden since 2013
- Village Trustee currently held by Kim Tapper since 2021

Incumbents Chris Eiden and Kim Tapper will face Kelly Coyle, Alex Vedvik, and Guy Fredel in the Spring Election on Apr. 4, 2023.

On Wednesday, Jan. 4, McHugh drew candidate names to determine ballot placement for the Spring Election.

- Kim Tapper
- Guy Fredel
- Alex Vedvik
- Chris Eiden

The trustees and Village president will serve a two-year term. The role includes attending bi-monthly Village Board meetings, committee meetings, and helping to make decisions that will impact the Village's growth and development. Visit www.kronenwetter.org to learn more about the positions.

All registered voters can vote in-person at the polls on Election Day or during absentee voting hours which are usually 2 weeks prior to each election. Please visit our website for updated voting hours. Currently, all wards vote at the Kronenwetter Municipal Center.

## Pay your property taxes by Jan. 31, 2023

Residents of Kronenwetter continue to pay the lowest taxes of all the area's incorporated municipalities. Property tax payments are due Jan. 31, 2023. If you are paying in installments, the first installment is due to the Village by Jan. 31, 2023. The second installment is due to the Marathon County Treasurer by July 31, 2023.

## Here's what to do if you're in the newly mapped floodplain

The Village has received revised Federal Emergency Management Agency floodplain maps. We are currently in the 90-day comment period. This period applies to major changes, not to individual properties.

Mortgage lenders will require flood insurance until they review the new maps, which will take until March 2023. Until then, if you are currently in the floodplain, you will need to continue your flood insurance.

- Homeowners that feel they are out of the floodplain with the new maps, should contact their mortgage lenders in March to inquire whether they can remove their flood insurance. If the mortgage lender does not remove the need for flood insurance and the homeowner feels that their property is out, they will need to apply for a Letter of Map Amendment (LOMA). This will require hiring a surveyor to complete a LOMA. For more information on this process visit the following FEMA website page:
- For those that were out of the floodplain, but now find themselves within the flood area, their mortgage lenders should be notifying them about the flood insurance requirement in March 2023.
- If the property owner feels they should not be in the newly mapped floodplain, they can apply for a LOMA with engineering proof of elevation above the area highwater elevation. This will require a hired surveyor to complete a LOMA. This should not be applied for until March 2023. By then FEMA will have had the time for date to be reviewed to make any elevation changes that the lending companies have time to review.

• For those who want to make a land configuration change or fill in the floodplain, you would need FEMA approval in the form of a Letter of Map Recommendation-Fill (LOMR-F). Again, it is recommended that this be done in March 2023 at the earliest.

## License your dog for 2023 - It's required

Help ensure your dog's safety with a dog license from the Village of Kronenwetter. If your dog becomes lost, a license will increase the chances of finding your beloved pet.

The Village requires all dogs 5 months of age or older to be licensed each year.

Dog licenses are issued on a calendar year and may be purchased by mail, online, and in-person.



## Sean Dumais appointed to the Village Board

Kronenwetter resident Sean Dumais was appointed as a Village trustee at the Dec. 27 Village Board meeting.

Dumais was one of four candidates to apply for the role. The position was left open by Tami Bloch who recently moved from the area. Bloch had won the seat in the 2022 Spring Election.

Dumais, Alexander Vedvik, Mary E. Solheim, and Kelly R. Coyle submitted an application to the Village Board to replace Bloch. The candidates were given time during the Dec. 27 meeting to introduce themselves and the reasons behind their intention to fill the seat. They also fielded questions from board members. The board voted to place Dumais in the open seat with six yes votes

and one abstention.

Dumais brings a background in business, analytics, and human resources to the Village. Today he runs non-profit businesses focused on training service dogs for disabled veterans and law enforcement agencies.

"I would like to serve my community by being an active part of the team that comes up with solutions instead of excuses, as well as set our community up for future success by forward thinking and actively working towards our mission statement goals," Dumais wrote in his application.

Dumais was born in Germany, grew up in California and moved to Kronenwetter in 2009 when he returned from a tour in Iraq. He has two daughters, one son, and a granddaughter. He spends his free time coaching football. He currently serves on the Administrative Policy Committee and is working on an efficiency study report for the Village. Thank you for serving the Village, Trustee Dumais.



## Water utility update

Construction of the water metering station is complete. This station was intended for use with the Village's plan to purchase water from Rothschild. These plans were put on hold when Rothschild reported high PFAS (polyfluorinated alkyl substances) levels in their water.

Currently, the Village is working on building a filtration plant which will filter the high iron and manganese from well No. 2. Becher-Hoppe Associates, Inc. is working on finalizing the design. Completion of the plant is expected by the end of the year.

## Make room the for snow plows

The Village of Kronenwetter's snow plows are ready for winter! During a snow event, please remember to drive with caution and give snowplows plenty of room. We are watching the streets for you, and deployment will be made as needed according to developing conditions.

The Village of Kronenwetter is NOT responsible for plowing county or state highways.

NO STREET PARKING from Nov. 1 to May 1 between the hours of 2:00 a.m. to 7:00 a.m. Keep the streets clear for our snowplows.

Violations can result in a parking citation, and if the situation dictates the vehicle may be towed at the owner's expense. You can request permission to park overnight by calling the Marathon County Sheriff's Department non-emergency number at 715-261-1200. Permission will not be granted if snow is forecasted. In the event permission was granted but an unexpected snowfall occurs, you will be contacted and asked to move your vehicle.

It is up to residents to clear the snow from the area adjacent to their mailbox. If you think your mailbox was damaged by one of our plows, please contact the Village at 715-693-4200, so we can investigate the issue.

If you have a fire hydrant near your home, please consider shoveling any snow accumulations around it.

## Theresa O'Brien named Kronenwetter's first female fire chief

In 2005, Theresa O'Brien's husband, Timothy O'Brien, asked her to join the Kronenwetter Fire Department. He had been fighting fires since 1992 and had joined the department in 2004.

"At the time I decided to join, our son (15 at the time) told me I'd never pass fire school," she said. "That was a challenge I couldn't pass up."

In Dec. 2005, O'Brien proved her 15-year-old wrong and officially became a full-fledged firefighter.

"First day I walked into the fire station as a firefighter it felt like I was there for a purpose and never looked back," said O'Brien. In 2007, she added first responder to her resume. Ten years later, she was promoted to Lieutenant/EMS Coordinator. In 2021, she became the Deputy Chief/EMS Coordinator. Today, she leads the department as the Village's first female fire chief.



"I wanted Kronenwetter Fire to have a leader that the members could respect and look up to," said O'Brien. "A leader is either what makes or breaks a department."

O'Brien is certain to forge a department of excellence as she moves forward in the new role.

"We need to look toward the future but at the same time not forgetting where the department came from and where it is right now," she said. "I want to build up our training and make sure everyone is learning and feels like they are part of something good."

The biggest challenge is staffing, she said. This year seven firefighters were added to the roster, but the department still needs more. There is still room for at least 13 firefighters and EMS responders.

"We recently received pay increases to be more competitive in the industry," said O'Brien. "As call volumes continue to increase, having enough personnel to respond is the most important."

O'Brien also wants to start investigating and researching the possibility of an ambulance service in Kronenwetter.



## New ladder truck rolling into 2023

The Village Board recently approved the purchase of a new ladder truck. The Piece Mfg 100" Ascendant Aerial Platform provides a 110' vertical reach and a 90' horizontal reach.

Fire Chief Theresa O'Brien said the Village needs this ladder truck to accommodate the growing population.

"Having a piece of equipment that allows us to better serve not just our residents, but also our growing industries is so important," she said.

Currently, the KFD must depend on other departments that own ladder trucks.

"To rely on other departments is sometimes a stretch if that equipment is already being used or if they don't have the personnel to spare," said O'Brien. The truck is expected to arrive in Kronenwetter by the end of January.

## **Kronenwetter Police Department to** expands its force in 2023

The Village police force will grow by two officers this year. The 2023 Village budget, approved by the Village Board, authorized the staff increase. The addition will bring the total number of full-time officers to ten. This will allow the department to provide much better service to Kronenwetter residents.

"The fact that we just started two brand new officers in the last quarter of 2022, plus the addition of two more new officers in April 2023 means our citizens will be seeing a lot of new faces out there," said Police Chief Terry McHugh.

In Aug. Isiah Konopacki was sworn in as a full-time police officer. He graduated from UW-Stevens Point with a BS in Conservation Law Enforcement. He earned his law enforcement certification from Mid-State Technical College. He served as a reserve deputy with the Wood County Sheriff's Office and as a security officer and dispatcher for the UW-Stevens Point Campus Police.

In Dec. Mason Dallman was sworn in as a full-time officer. Dallman's father, Ron, worked for the KPD for several years, but tragically passed away a year ago.

Dallman was a reserve officer for the Red Wing, MN Police Department. He recently completed the 720-hour WI police academy at Chippewa Valley Technical College. He has a BA in criminology from the University of River Falls.

McHugh hopes to have two new hires by Apr. 1, 2023. The new officers will allow the department to have six patrol officers, two patrol sergeants, one lieutenant, and a chief of police.

Officers Ben Shope and Aaron Seehafer were sworn in as sergeants on Jan. 9. They are the department's first sergeants.

"I'm looking forward to getting our new officers ingrained in the community," said McHugh. "At the same time, I'm very excited to train and mentor our new sergeants as they make the transition from officer to supervisor."
