MINUTES WORK SESSION LUNA COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS Thursday, July 12, 2018

BE IT REMEMBERED that the Luna County Board of County Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, July 12, 2018 in the County Commission Chambers of the Luna County Courthouse, Deming, New Mexico, for the purpose of conducting a Work Session.

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Smrkovsky called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance and the salute to the flag of New Mexico.

ROLL CALL: Chief Deputy Clerk Berenda McWright called roll. The following Commissioners constituting a quorum were present:

Barbara L. Reedy, District 1 Linda M. Smrkovsky, Chair, District 2 John S. Sweetser, District 3

SERVICE AWARDS: There were no service awards presented.

COMMISSIONERS AND STAFF DISCUSSION ON REGULAR MEETING AGENDA ITEMS: The Luna County Board of County Commissioners presented the Regular Meeting Agenda items for discussion only no actions were taken. The following agenda items were discussed:

- Approval of Commission on Aging Board Member Patsy Leyba: Chair Smrkovsky questioned if this agenda item should be considered under New Business, rather than the Consent Agenda.
- **Appoint Member to Labor Management Relations Board:** Mr. Pearson explained that John Strand was appointed by the Board to be the representative for Luna County. The Labor Management Relations Board is made up of three members, one is appointed by the County, one is appointed by the Labor Union, and those two appointments appoint a third member. The Labor Union would like to appoint Mark Myers as their representative.
- Participation in a Class Action lawsuit regarding the right to recover additional sums under the Payments in Lieu of Taxes Act for FY 2015, 2016, & 2017: Mr. Pearson explained that one County in another state filed a law suit against the Federal Government and a Federal Judge ruled that the United States Government did owe that County past payments for 2015, 2016 and 2017. The Judge also made it a Class Action lawsuit stating the Federal Government owes back payments to all of the counties in the United States. Luna County is owed approximately \$60,000 to \$80,000 and if the County chose to opt in could possibly get approximately 70% of what is owed back. The County has until September to opt in.
- **Indigent Claims Report:** Chair Smrkovsky asked for some clarification regarding the report which was provided by Joanne Hethcox.

ROUND TABLE DISCUSSION WITH ELECTED OFFICIALS: Mr. Pearson announced that all of the Elected Officials would have a round table discussion regarding the four day work week. Assessor Delilah Rojo spoke for herself as well as the Treasurer and the Clerk in favor of keeping the four day work week. Ms. Rojo provided several reasons that the four day work week seems to be working. The Title Companies have adjusted and one submitted a letter of support. The working citizens are able to obtain services without having to take time off work. The Assessor's Office is able to do assessments on properties before and after working hours which is very convenient for the citizens who want to be home. Ms. Rojo reported that they have not received any complaints from the public.

Commissioner Reedy stated that since she became a Commissioner the issue comes up all the time. She commended all of the Elected Officials and Department Heads for a job well done and suggested they figure out a way for the Courthouse to stay open on Fridays and still allow the employees to work four ten hour shifts.

Commissioner Sweetser stated that he is not hearing anything new from the Elected Officials regarding the issue. He reported that he has sat in front of the Courthouse for about ten minutes on a Friday afternoon and saw two customers turned away. He also stated that the agenda did not state that the issue would be discussed and the public did not have a chance to participate.

Commissioner Smrkovsky stated that she felt like the public was not properly educated in the beginning and requested the cost savings be reviewed.

PUBLIC INPUT: Alberta Morgan came before the Board and spoke against the County's four day work schedule. She also suggested the County put information in the City utility bills to better communicate with the public.

ADJOURN: Upon motion made by Commissioner Reedy and a second made by Chair Smrkovsky. Chair Smrkovsky adjourned the meeting at 10:01 a.m.

BE IT REMEMBERED that the Luna County Board of County Commissioners met in regular session at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, July 12, 2018 in the County Commission Chambers of the Luna County Courthouse, Deming, New Mexico, for the purpose of conducting any and all business to come properly before the Board.

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Smrkovsky called the meeting to order at 10:10 a.m., and led the Pledge of Allegiance and the salute to the flag of New Mexico.

ROLL CALL: Chief Deputy Clerk Berenda McWright called roll. The following members of the Board constituting a quorum were present:

APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Commissioner Sweetser requested item h. (Agreement between Luna County and Deming-Luna County Chamber of Commerce) of the Consent Agenda be pulled for discussion. Chair Smrkovsky entertained a motion to pull item h. from the Consent Agenda and consider it under New Business. Commissioner Sweetser so moved, Commissioner Reedy seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

MINUTES: Upon a motion made by Commissioner Reedy and a second by Commissioner Sweetser the Minutes of the June 5, 2018 Special Meeting were unanimously approved.

Upon a motion made by Commissioner Reedy and a second by Commissioner Sweetser the Minutes of the June 7, 2018 Special Meeting were unanimously approved.

Upon a motion made by Commissioner Sweetser and a second by Commissioner Reedy the Minutes of the June 14, 2018 Work Session were unanimously approved.

Upon a motion made by Commissioner Reedy and a second by Commissioner Sweetser the Minutes of the June 14, 2018 Regular Meeting were unanimously approved.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Reedy and a second by Commissioner Sweetser the June 28, 2018 Work Session Minutes were unanimously approved.

ELECTED OFFICIALS REPORTS: Clerk Andrea Rodriguez announced the Clerk's Office is busy collecting business registrations and the Re-Count Election was successful.

Sheriff Gannaway reported the statistics for the month of June. He stated there was one homicide which was investigated and a suspect was found in Kentucky who is waiting for an extradition. Burglaries and larcenies are up and vehicle theft is down. Overall calls are up a little bit. Non-Criminal and DWI's calls are down. Corporal Valdez and Corporal Acosta were promoted to Sergeants. The Sheriff's Department is in the process of promoting for three corporal positions. They are working on hiring a Deputy and a CSO. Deputy McBurney and Deputy Sias are in the academy currently. The department is also in the process of purchasing two new vehicles.

Chair Smrkovsky reported that many of the Elected Officials and Directors recently attended the New Mexico Counties 33 Strong Conference and the New Mexico Edge Classes. Luna County was presented an award for 24% reduction in the number of workmen's comp claims, 54% reduction in the number of auto claims and 100% reduction in the number of multi-line claims in the last seven years. She commended Mr. Pearson and Safety Director Mark Jasso for the award.

Chair Smrkovsky also reported that yesterday the NMC held a Legislative Committee Meeting which she and Mr. Pearson attended. The Committee considered issues such as appropriations for behavioral health, forfeiture act reform, tax reform and IRB's. Other issues that will be supported but are not necessarily priorities, included Fire Protection Fund, Whistle Blower Act, EMS Memorial, create statewide 911 Board, reinstate 911 funds, add non-residential properties, election clean-up, advanced mapping fund, rural residency program funding, dental therapist licensure, flexible to schedule jury duty excusal from elected officials, making world bank in Washington DC style super nationals permissible purchases.

COUNTY MANAGER'S REPORT: County Manager Ira Pearson reported on the following items:

PUBLIC HEARING: To Consider Repealing Ordinance Number 6- Salaries for County Elected Officials: Chair Smrkovsky opened the floor for public comment. No public comment was forthcoming.

ORDINANCE: Repeal Ordinance Number 6-Salaries for County Elected Officials: Mr. Pearson explained that the ordinance is out of date. Commissioner Reedy motioned to repeal Ordinance number 6- Salaries for County Elected Officials. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sweetser and carried unanimously following a roll call vote.

INDIGENT CLAIMS REPORT: Upon motion of Commissioner Sweetser and a second by Commissioner Reedy, the meeting of the Board of County Commissioners was unanimously recessed and the meeting of the Indigent Hospital Claims Board convened. Budget and Procurement Director Joanne Hethcox recommended approval of 26 claims for the month of June. One claim was denied. A total of 15 claims were detention center claims. The other 10 were citizen's claims for a total 23,599.53. The gross receipts collections totaled \$63,460.44 and the balance for Indigent Claims Fund totaled \$802,463.27 of that \$59,676.74 is encumbered. Commissioner Sweetser motioned to approve the Indigent Claims Report as submitted. Commissioner Reedy seconded the motion which carried unanimously. Commissioner Sweetser motioned to recess as a Claims Board and reconvene as a County Commission. Commissioner Reedy seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Chair Smrkovsky opened the floor for Public Comment. Edward Khanbabian spoke extensively against the four day work schedule. He also spoke against the County Manager's contract regarding the terms and the salary.

CONSENT AGENDA: Upon motion of Commissioner Reedy, seconded by Chair Smrkovsky, the following items of the Consent Agenda were unanimously approved following a roll call vote.

NEW BUSINESS: Chair Smrkovsky reviewed each item on the New Business agenda with the Commissioners:

- a. **Appoint Member to Labor Management Relations Board:** Mr. Pearson explained that the local labor management Relations Board is a three member board. One member was chosen by the Board of County Commissioners which is John Strand. One member is being chosen by the Labor Union which is Mark Myers and the third member will be chosen by the first two members. Commissioner Sweetser motion to approve the nomination of Mark Myers to the Labor Management Relations Board. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Reedy and carried unanimously.
- b. Participation in a Class Action Lawsuit regarding the right to recover additional sums under the Payments in Lieu of Taxes Act for FY 2015, 2016, & 2017: Chair Smrkovsky stated that the Commissioners have until September to act on this item and suggested they table the item for further review. Mr. Pearson explained that the information for the lawsuit was distributed by the National Association of Counties and each County will need to decide individually if they want to participate in the Class Action Lawsuit. Commissioner Sweester motioned to table Participation in a Class Action lawsuit regarding the right to recover additional sums under the Payments in Lieu of Taxes Act for Fiscal Year, 2015, 2016 and 2017. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Reedy and carried unanimously.
- c. Authorize the County Manager to enter into a purchase agreement for the McGee property (0.9 acres) not to exceed the appraised value: Mr. Pearson explained that this is the last piece of property dividing up the recreation area around Starmax. The appraisal should be available by next week. The County would not pay more than appraised value and the funds would come out of the Starmax funds. Chair Smrkovsky asked about the Starmax funds. Mr. Pearson explained the way the bond is written any excess on the Gross Receipts Tax can be used for the facility in acquiring land, repairs and other various things. A few years ago the County purchased the land right next to Starmax using the same method. Commissioner Sweester asked how much is in the fund. Mr. Pearson stated approximately \$350,000. Commissioner Reedy motion to authorize the County Manager to enter into a purchase agreement for the McGee property (0.9 acres) not to exceed the appraised value. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sweetser and carried unanimously.
- d. **Agreement between Luna County and Deming-Luna County Chamber of Commerce:** Commissioner Sweetser requested an explanation regarding the fact the Chamber is a member driven organization classified as a 501 C6. Mr. Pearson explained the agreement is made between Luna County and the Chamber of Commerce stating that the contractor agrees to conduct a Chamber of Commerce that enhances a community environment that encourages and supports dynamic business

activity while fostering community pride and spirit and that the Commission agrees to pay \$2,000 during the fiscal year to help defray the expenses of conducting the business. The Chamber will invoice the County for what they do and it will not be considered just a donation for them. They are identified as a contractor for needs that the County has, and it is under the amount that would have to go out for RFP. Commissioner Reedy motioned to approve the agreement between Luna County and Deming-Luna County Chamber of Commerce. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sweetser and carried unanimously.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: to discuss Limited Personnel Matters pursuant to §10-15-1 (H)(2) NMSA 1978 pertaining to the County Manager's Evaluation & Contract to include job description, performance goals, roles and responsibilities: Commissioner Reedy motioned to go into Executive Session to discuss Limited Personnel Matters pursuant to §10-15-1 (H)(2) NMSA 1978 pertaining to the County Manager's Evaluation and Contract to include job description, performance goals, roles and responsibilities. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sweetser and carried unanimously following a roll call vote. The Commissioner went into Executive Session at 11:02 am.

Chair Smrkovsky entertained a motion to return from Executive Session where no other matters were discussed other than Limited Personnel Matters pursuant to §10-15-1 (H)(2) NMSA 1978 pertaining to the County Manager's Evaluation and Contract to include job description, performance goals, roles and responsibilities. Commissioner Reedy so moved. The motioned was seconded by Commissioner Sweetser and carried unanimously following a roll call vote.

BE IT REMEMBERED that the Luna County Board of County Commissioners met in Special Session at 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 23, 2018 in the County Commission Chambers of the Luna County Courthouse, Deming, New Mexico, for the purpose of conducting any and all business to come properly before the Board.

The following staff and elected officials were present: Manager Ira Pearson, Assistant Manager Glory Juarez, Executive Assistant Yossie Nieblas, Attorney Charles K. Kretek, Clerk Andrea Rodriguez, Chief Deputy Clerk Berenda McWright, Deputy Clerk Pilar Salcido, Assessor Delilah Rojo, Chief Deputy Assessor Michelle Holguin, Sheriff Kelly Gannaway, Captain Michael Brown, Emergency Services Director Mark Jasso and Budget & Procurement Director/Indigent Claims Administrator Joanne Hethcox, Dispatch Director Lauree Sanchez, Operations Manager Yovanie Granillo, Sergeant Luis Malina, Luna County DWI Prevention Program Teresa Aguilera, Road Director Marty Miller, Road Supervisor Mike Hatch, Administrative Assistant Patricia Rodriguez and Code Enforcement Officer Manny Armendariz

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Smrkovsky called the meeting to order at 10:04 a.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance and the salute to the flag of the State of New Mexico.

ROLL CALL: Deputy Clerk Pilar Salcido called roll. The following members of the Board constituting a quorum were present:

Barbara L. Reedy, District 1 Linda M. Smrkovsky, Chair, District 2 John S. Sweetser, District 3

PUBLIC COMMENT: Chair Smrkovsky opened the floor to Public Comment.

Sean Blaine presented the results of a poll that was conducted by the Deming Luna County Board of Realtors in response to the Luna County 4-day Work Schedule. The results from that poll were as follows, 18 realtors were opposed to the four day work week, three realtors had no opinion, and zero were in favor. Mr. Blaine further commented the as a local resident the four day work week really doesn't matter to him if it is working for the employees and saving money for the County.

Luna County Employee Manny Armendariz came before the Board as a resident and taxpayer and spoke in favor of the four day work week. He stated that it provides him the opportunity to volunteer at his daughter's school on Fridays. He also stated that he had served two customers in the planning department before 8:00am this morning and those customers were very pleased to do business at the County without having to take off work. He also stated that other employees were in favor of the four day work week but possibly feared retaliation if they spoke up.

Alberta Morgan stated that she is a resident of twenty years and a taxpayer and she objects to the four day work week. She spoke in favor of flex hours for the employees. She complained that the voters were not able to vote on Fridays.

Micki Shillito of Deming Realty stated that the County being closed on Fridays has caused hardships for some of her customers. She encouraged the Board to make their decision for the general best interest of the public.

Robert Saint Louis stated that he is one of the largest landowners in the County and he was not in favor of the four day work week and that employee opinions should not be considered in the decision.

NEW BUSINESS:

- a. Resolution 18-33 Approval of 2017-2018 4th Quarter Financial Report: Commissioner Smrkovsky requested a motion to approve Resolution 18-33 approval of the 2017-2018 4th Quarter Financial Report. Commissioner Reedy motioned to approve the report as submitted. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sweetser and carried unanimously following a roll call vote.
- **b. Resolution 18-34 Approval of FY 2018-2019 Final Budget:** Manager Ira Pearson reviewed the changes that have been made since the preliminary budget and recommended approval of the final budget. Chair Smrkovsky requested a motion to approve Resolution 18-34 Approval of FY 2018-2019 Final Budget. Commissioner Sweetser so moved. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Reedy and approved unanimously following a roll call vote.
- c. Luna County Work Schedule Discussion Only: Commissioner Reedy stated that there has been a lot of discussion regarding the four day work week that the public has responded to and many suggestions were offered such as a modified work schedule or returning to the five day week. Commissioner Reedy stated that she was not a Commissioner when the four day week started and that she was informed it was presented as cost savings which she didn't feel the county had those cost savings. Mr. Pearson stated that the cost savings would be evaluated in August so a full year could be analyzed. Commissioner Sweetser stated that he couldn't see where there would be any cost savings if the courthouse is kept open for 40 hours per week whether it was a four day week or a five day week. Chair Smrkovsky stated that there has been seven other counties that have successfully gone to the four day work week. Chair Smrkovsky expressed support for the four day work week for the employees as well as the Community. She stated that there are other counties that stay open for five days but only provide services for four days, but she did not see the point in being open if you were not providing proper services to the public. The property information is online for the realtors, taxes can paid online and e-recording is available. She also stated that people are resistant to change but she feels it has been a good thing and going back to the five day work schedule will be taking a step back. Commissioner Sweetser stated that he voted against it in the beginning and hasn't changed his mind. The courthouse has been open five days a week for 100 years and the public never was really considered when the change to four days was made. He stated that people are still showing up at the Courthouse on Fridays. Commissioner Sweetser stated that although the employees got used to the four day work week, he felt like it was adopted for the wrong reasons. Commissioner Reedy stated that when she was appointed it was the most talked about issue in the county and it was not just the realtors it was also property owners. She offered suggestions for the for keeping the courthouse open on Fridays by having a group

that works Monday through Thursday and a group that works Tuesday through Friday. Commissioner Reedy stated that there were some issues brought up by the other elected officials regarding security and that it would be hard for them to re-adjust. She stated that we have listened to our employees and our constituents, and she hoped that help would be more forthcoming from the other elected officials for the ability to make those changes in order to serve the public with limited disruption. Chair Smrkovsky stated that a work session was held earlier this month with the other elected officials to discuss a possible solution to the problem. She felt that management should be involved in finding a solution. Mr. Pearson stated that in trying to come up with a plan to make a five day, ten hour a day schedule work, it has become apparent that services would be limited for two days a week and security would be a concern. He stated that he would like more time to come up with a solution and more time to analyze the cost savings. Mr. Pearson reported that in his research, a year ago, the other counties that implemented the four day work week got used to it and liked it. He also stated that he would go in the direction the board requests of him. Chair requested input from the other Elected Officials. None was forthcoming. Other public comment was accepted from Robert Saint Louis speaking against the four day work week. Sean Blaine spoke about the lack of security at the Courthouse.

d. Luna County Work Schedule: Commissioner Sweetser moved to go to the five day work week. Chair Smrkovsky asked that he clarify his motion regarding how many hours per day. Commissioner Sweetser clarified that he did mean a five day, eight hours a day, work week. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Reedy. Assistant County Manager Glory Juarez requested that they set an effective date to avoid any confusion. Commissioner Reedy stated that she felt that was a management decision and it could be included in the motion. Commissioner Sweetser felt like it should be effective before school starts. Discussion ensued regarding issues such as the pay period, giving employees time to adjust their schedules and which departments would be affected. Further public comment was entertained. Commissioner Sweetser then moved to rescind the action that was taken last year. That motion was also seconded by Commissioner Reedy. There was discussion and confusion regarding issues with rescinding the action that was taken a year ago. Mr. Pearson suggested they make a new motion to avoid complications. Commissioner Sweetser motioned again to go back to the five day work week, eight hours a day, for the departments that changed a year ago starting on August 12th. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Reedy and was approved by a two to one vote with Chair Smrkovsky voting in the negative.

The motion was seconded by Commissioner Reedy and approved unanimously following a roll call vote. The Executive session began at 4:00 p.m.

The Commissioners returned from Executive session at 5:45p.m. Chair Smrkovsky requested a motion to return from Executive Session where no other matters were discussed other than Limited Personnel Matters pursuant to §10-15-1 (H)(2) NMSA 1978 pertaining to the County Manager's evaluation and contract to include job description, performance goals, roles and responsibilities and

that no action would be taken. Commissioner Reedy so moved. The motion seconded by Commissioner Sweetser and carried unanimously following a roll call vote.

ADJOURN: Upon a motion by Commissioner Sweetser and a second by Commissioner Reedy the meeting was adjourned the meeting at 5:46 p.m.

Do Nothing	If you do nothing, you will not be included in the Lawsuit, and you will have no right to any money recovered in the Lawsuit. But you will keep the right to sue the federal government for any alleged PILT Act underpayments in fiscal years 2015 through 2017, on your own and at your own expense.			

- Your rights and options, and the deadline to exercise them, are further explained below.
- This Notice may affect your legal rights. Read it carefully.

BASIC INFORMATION

1. Why did I get this Notice?

The federal government's records show that you are a unit of local government that received a payment pursuant to Section 6902 of the PILT Act in fiscal years 2015, 2016, and/or 2017. This Notice advises you that:

- a. The Court has allowed, or "certified," a Class Action Lawsuit against the United States to recover amounts which the Court has determined that the government was required to pay units of local government under 31 U.S.C. § 6902, but did not pay in full in fiscal years 2015, 2016 and 2017.
- b. You are eligible to participate in the Lawsuit by completing and timely submitting a Class Action Opt-In
 Notice Form. The Form may be completed and submitted online at www.PILTPayments.com.
 Alternatively, you may complete the enclosed copy of that Class Action Opt-In Notice Form and submit it by first class mail or by pre-paid delivery service.

2. What is this Lawsuit about?

This Lawsuit is about whether the federal government was required to pay in full the amounts due to units of local government under Section 6902 of the PILT Act in fiscal years 2015, 2016, and 2017. The Class Representative (Kane County, Utah) contended that the federal government underpaid units of local government in those years, and that all Class Members are entitled to recover the underpayment amounts. The government denied that any units of local government were entitled to any additional PILT payments beyond the amounts already paid for those years.

3. What has the Court decided?

The Court has ruled that provisions of Section 6902 of the PILT Act obligated the federal government to pay eligible units of local government the full amounts calculated by a formula set forth in the Act even though Congress failed to appropriate sufficient funds to do so in fiscal years 2015 through 2017 (noting that Kane County had not challenged (and the decision did not therefore extend to) the portion the government's reduction of its fiscal year 2015 PILT payments caused by the sequestration of part of the funds appropriated to make FY 2015 PILT payments). The Court granted summary judgment, in favor of the Class, as to the government's liability for underpaying Class Members in those years. The Court has not yet determined the amount by which the Class as a whole, or any individual Class Member, was underpaid in those years. As of the date of this notice, Class Counsel

and counsel for the government have agreed on the amount of the underpayment in fiscal years 2015 and 2016, and anticipate reaching agreement on the amount of the underpayment in fiscal year 2017. The Court's decision is subject to appeal.

4. What is a Class Action and who is involved?

In a class action, one or more Class Representatives (in this case, Kane County, Utah) sues on behalf of all Class Members (in this case, units of local government that receive PILT payments) who have the same or similar claims. Kane County and all other Class Members who choose to participate in the Lawsuit are the "Plaintiffs." The United States is the "Defendant." In a class action at the United States Court of Federal Claims, the Court resolves all issues for all Class Members who choose to participate in the Lawsuit. Here, that includes the Court's decision that the government is liable, described in paragraph 3 above.

5. Why is this lawsuit a Class Action?

The Court has decided that this Lawsuit meets the requirements of Rule 23 of the Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims, which governs class actions in that Court. Specifically, the Court has ruled that:

- The potential Class is so numerous that joinder of all Class Members is impractical;
- There are legal questions and facts common to each Class Member's claim:
- The Class Representative's claim is typical of the claims of other Class Members;
- The Class Representative, Kane County, Utah, and Class Counsel, Alan I. Saltman, a partner in the Washington, D.C. office of Smith, Currie & Hancock LLP, will fairly and adequately represent the interests of the Class;
- The common legal and factual questions predominate over questions affecting only individual Class
 Members; and
- This Class Action will be more efficient than having many individual lawsuits.

6. What is requested in this Lawsuit?

The Class Representative seeks, for itself and for all other Class Members who choose to participate in the Lawsuit, payment of the amounts by which each was underpaid in fiscal years 2015 through 2017. Class Counsel will also ask the Court for an award of attorney's fees and expenses.

WHO MAY PARTICIPATE IN THE CLASS ACTION

7. Am I part of this Class Action Lawsuit?

You must decide whether you wish to participate in the Lawsuit. You cannot participate unless and until you fill out and submit—online, by first class mail, or by pre-paid delivery service—the Class Action Opt-In Notice Form found on the website www.PILTPayments.com. A copy of the Form is also enclosed. The Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims require that Class Members choose whether to "opt into" the lawsuit. If you fit the description in the next question—and the government's records indicate that you do—you may opt into and participate in this Lawsuit. If you do nothing, you will be excluded from the Lawsuit and will forfeit your right to receive any monies recovered in the Lawsuit.

8. Who can participate in the Lawsuit?

The Court has decided that the Class consists of:

"All 'unit[s] of local government,' as defined in 31 U.S.C. § 6901(2), that received payment under 31 U.S.C. § 6902(a) of the Payment in Lieu of Taxes Act in fiscal years 2015, 2016, and/or 2017."

Any unit of local government meeting this definition may participate in this Lawsuit by timely submitting a completed Class Action Opt-In Notice Form.

9. Does participating in the Lawsuit cost any money?

No.

YOUR OPTIONS

10. How can I participate in this Lawsuit?

You can complete and submit your Class Action Opt-In Notice Form online at www.PILTPayments.com.

Alternatively, you can complete the enclosed Class Action Opt-In Notice Form and send it by first class mail to:

PILT Payments Class Action, 1025 Connecticut Avenue NW, Suite 600, Washington, D.C. 20036. However you transmit it, you must submit your completed Form no later than September 14, 2018 if you wish to participate in the Lawsuit. Do not delay.

11. What happens once I choose to participate in this Lawsuit?

As a Class Member who chooses to participate in the lawsuit, you will be represented by Class Counsel, who will take all actions necessary to protect your rights. You will receive the benefit of, and be bound by, all rulings, orders, judgments entered, or settlements approved by the Court, whether favorable or unfavorable. You will **not**, however, be asked to make any out-of-pocket payment of attorney's fees or expenses in the case.

12. If I choose to participate in the Lawsuit, what will I be required to do?

After timely submitting a completed Class Action Opt-In Notice Form, the parties currently do not anticipate that you will have to do anything else.

13. What happens if I choose not to participate in the Lawsuit?

If you do not submit a completed Class Action Opt-In Notice Form online on or before September 14, 2018; by first class mail postmarked on or before September 14, 2018; or by pre-paid delivery service delivered no later than September 14, 2018, you will be barred from participating in the Lawsuit and will not be entitled to any portion of any monetary recovery by judgment or settlement of the Lawsuit. You will retain the right to sue the federal government on your own about the same legal claims made in the Lawsuit, and will not be bound by the Court's judgment in the Lawsuit. If you decide to pursue your claim independently, outside of this Lawsuit, you should consult an attorney and do so promptly because certain statutes of limitation may bar or limit your claim. If you choose to hire your own attorney, you will be responsible for paying the full cost of that attorney.

THE LAWYERS REPRESENTING YOU

14. If I choose to participate in the Lawsuit, do I have to hire a lawyer to represent me?

No. The Court has decided that Alan I. Saltman and the firm of Smith, Currie & Hancock LLP are qualified to represent you and all other Class Members who choose to participate. They are called "Class Counsel."

Mr. Saltman is experienced in handling similar cases against the federal government. If you choose to file a Class Action Opt-In Notice Form, you agree to legal representation by Mr. Saltman and his firm.

15. Should I hire my own lawyer?

If you decide to participate in the Lawsuit, you do not need to hire a lawyer because Class Counsel is and will continue working on your behalf. But you are permitted to hire your own lawyer if you would like to do so. For

example, you may have your own lawyer appear in Court if you want someone other than Class Counsel to speak for you. Of course, if you choose to hire your own lawyer, you will be responsible for paying the full cost of that lawyer.

16. How will Class Counsel be paid?

Class Counsel will submit a request for its fees and expenses to the Court. You will not have to pay any fees or expenses directly. The fees and expenses that the Court determines should be paid to Class Counsel, if any, might be deducted from the money obtained for the Class and might reduce the amount available for distribution to Class Members, and therefore reduce the amount of money you receive.

LITIGATION INFORMATION

17. How and when will the Court decide the amount of the underpayments?

Class Counsel and counsel for the government have already agreed on the amount of the underpayments in fiscal years 2015 and 2016, and anticipate that they will also reach agreement on the amount of the underpayment in fiscal year 2017. Should that not occur, Class Counsel will have to prove the amount of the underpayments in fiscal year 2017 at trial. No trial date has been set. The Court has not yet entered judgment in any amounts for any of the years involved in the Lawsuit.

18. If there is a trial on damages, must I attend?

If there is a trial on damages, you do not need to attend. Class Counsel will present the case on behalf of all Class Members participating in the Lawsuit. You and/or your own lawyer are welcome, and entitled, to attend at your own expense.

19. When will I get any money from the lawsuit?

After the Court has determined (a) which Class Members have chosen to participate in the lawsuit, (b) the underpayment amounts, and (c) the fees and expenses that should be paid to Class Counsel, you will be notified about how and when you will receive your payment. At this time, the parties do not know how long that will take, or whether there will be any appeal from the Court's decisions that could impact the entitlement, timing, or amount of any payments.

GETTING MORE INFORMATION

20. Is more information available from the Court?

The pleadings and other records in the Lawsuit may be examined during regular business hours at the Office of the Clerk of the United States Court of Federal Claims. The Court's address is:
