The new Crisis Receiving Center now welcomes individuals who need immediate access to crisis mental health services. The Crisis



Receiving Center is located at 601 S. Edwin C. Moses Blvd, inside Elizabeth Place. RI International is operating the center that provides crisis services to individuals experiencing a mental health or substance use crisis. #### **ADAMHS CELEBRATES MULTIPLE HONORS**

ADAMHS is honored to receive multiple awards for the work of our team, as well as our Executive Director, Helen Jones-Kelley. Members of our team attended the Dayton Business Journal Business of the Year Gala. ADAMHS was a finalist for <u>Business of the Year</u> in the Community Supporter category. Highlighted work includes a particular focus on Black youth mental health, implementing innovative crisis services, and providing mental health support following the train derailment in East Palestine. Helen Jones-Kelley was given the <u>John E. Moore, Sr. Lifetime Achievement Award</u> for Racial Diversity at the Dayton Business





Journal Leaders in Diversity event. This Lifetime Achievement Award recognizes and celebrates Helen's 40+ years of public service, focused on improving the lives of families and children. Helen was also honored with the African American Leadership Award at the statewide UMADAOP Conference. This award is presented to someone who demonstrates commitment to improving the level of wellness of African American communities by developing or implementing exemplary behavioral health services. Congratulations to Helen and the entire team at ADAMHS for this well-deserved recognition.

#### ADAMHS CHOSEN TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL ANTI-STIGMA INITIATIVE

Montgomery County ADAMHS has been chosen as a pilot site for the National Anti-Stigma Initiative. The Anti-Stigma Initiative is a pilot program of the <u>Addiction Policy Forum</u>. Partners will help deploy and test new anti-stigma interventions and a stigma survey in our community.



The nationwide pilot is working to:

- Reduce addiction stigma, including stereotypes, prejudice, and discrimination intent
- Increase knowledge about addiction in local communities
- Improve helping behaviors towards individuals with substance use disorder (SUD)
- Identify levels of addiction stigma in a community to establish a baseline indicator

"Montgomery County ADAMHS has been working to reduce stigma in our community for many years. It's a privilege to be chosen by a national organization to develop best practices that will impact communities across the county," said Kimberly Priester, Director of Treatment & Supportive Services for ADAMHS.

## ADAMHS PROVIDES YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TO TEACHING CANDIDATES

Wright State University is partnering with ADAMHS to offer Youth Mental Health First Aid training to teaching candidates to prepare them for the challenges facing our children today.



"Teachers will be working with hundreds, perhaps, thousands of students throughout their careers. Knowing that 1 in 5 children experience mental health disorders

each year, it is very likely that educators will encounter students experiencing mental health challenges, mental disorders, or mental health crises," said Amy Elston, Ph.D. at Wright State University. "Educators will need to know how to help those students and guide them to the appropriate professionals. Youth Mental Health and First Aid training provides educators with an easy-to-remember action plan that educators can utilize as needed."

ADAMHS began offering this training in 2019, and the demand has grown from 6 classes to 10 classes in 2023. Courses were offered in September and October, with 120 students signing up for the training.

## BEHAVIORAL HEALTH EQUITY ROADMAP IS RELEASED

In partnership with the Health Policy Institute of Ohio (HPIO), ADAMHS has released our Behavioral Health Equity Roadmap Assessment to the



community. The assessment provides ADAMHS and our partners with information to inform the development of a future Behavioral Health Equity Roadmap.

"We are committed to ensuring everyone has access to quality care," said Tazeen Ahmed, Senior Program Coordinator – Health Policy & Equity for ADAMHS.

The report includes community conditions that support well-being, which include:

- Affordable housing and fair housing practices
- Jobs with livable wages
- Safe communities free from violence
- K-12 schools with resources to provide holistic supports to students and families
- Positive attitudes about mental health and disability
- Inclusive public spaces, such as drop-in centers, parks, and playgrounds

More information is still to come as we work with our community partners to address identified gaps hindering equitable access to services.
