CALL TO ORDER

Chair Judy Cook, called the meeting of Montgomery County Alcohol Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services to order at 5:30 PM in the offices of Montgomery County Alcohol Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services with a quorum present.

RECOGNITION OF GUESTS

Director Jones-Kelley welcomed tonight's guests.

BOARD SPOTLIGHT

George Logan, Program Director Community Re-Entry Program provided an overview of the Mental Health Prison Reentry Program.

Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services (OHMHAS) developed the Mental Health Prison Reentry Program in coordination with the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) to provide continuity of care between the prison and community for offenders who have been identified as having a Severe Persistent Mental Illness (SPMI).

Most offenders who are on ODRC's institutional mental health caseload while incarcerated and are diagnosed with an SPMI are eligible for the MHRPR and identified as C1 offenders.

The MHRPR is to help improve communication and coordination between state and local criminal justice and mental health services. Improvement in continuity of care will result in reduced recidivism, improved information flow, and improved services to offenders with mental illness. Coordination of services and continuity of care are mutually beneficial to prison and community service providers, the public and the offender.

Nominating Committee Report

Res. #18-112 J. Startzman moved and A. Whitmore seconded that the Montgomery County Alcohol Drug Addiction Mental Health Services elect J. Jackson to serve as chair and J. Newby to serve as vice-chair effective January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2021. Further that the Executive Director and/or Board designee is authorized to sign any documents necessary to execute the process. Motion carried unanimously.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

Director Jones-Kelley provided the following report:

1. Friends of the Castle – celebrating 25 years of service to the community.
2. Recovery Housing Update – all Recovery Housing have been deeded over to providers. Promise to Hope in unison with Miami Valley Hospital Foundation is

still in the process of renovation. Pam Stanley reviews and monitors all recovery housing properties. We currently have 8-10 providers/10-12 properties with over 100 beds evenly split between male and female. Staff will be submitting a proposal for the next round of recovery housing funding; in 2020 PLACES adult facility will be the next project.

3. COAT will receive the Champions of Health Award – hosted by Ohio State University on Tuesday, December 4th.
4. GetHelpNow App – billboards are beginning to go up around the community encouraging everyone to download the GetHelpNow App. The app has been updated to include the foodbank.
5. Joint meeting with Public Health Dayton & Montgomery County and ADAMHS will be scheduled the week of January 28th.
6. Regional Affiliation Board (formerly Fab5) continue to meet to discuss formalized structure to build alignment for services and projects across the 8 counties (Preble, Warren-Clinton, Clarke, Madison, Greene, Montgomery, Logan-Champaign). First project is our shared or similar application for funding process. Fred Tatum will visit other counties to see what resources are available; we will adopt a shared process across county lines on how we deploy AFF and our on-line contracting process.
7. *The New York Times* article on This City's Overdose Deaths Have Plunged. Can Others Learn From It? was at members' places for reading.

COMMENTS FROM GUESTS

Bonnie Parish, Executive Director Family Services shared that they provide services for individuals with general mental health issues and not just the hearing impaired.



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Mental Health Prison Reentry Program

What is the , Mental Health Prison Reentry Program?

Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services (OHMHAS) developed the , Mental Health Prison Reentry Program (MHPRP) in coordination with the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) to provide continuity of care between the prison and community for offenders who have been identified as having a Severe, Persistent Mental Illness (SPMI).

Why was it created?

The primary purpose of the MHPRP is the improvement of continuity of mental health care for qualifying offenders leaving the prison system. The intent of the MHPRP is to help improve communication and coordination between state and local criminal justice and mental health services. Improvement in continuity of care will result in reduced recidivism, improved information flow, and improved services to offenders with mental illness. Coordination of services and continuity of care are mutually beneficial to prison and community service providers, the public and the offender.

Who is eligible?

Most offenders, who were on ODRC's institutional mental health caseload while incarcerated and are diagnosed with an SPMI, are eligible for the, Mental Health Prison Reentry Program, and identified as C1 offenders. Referral to MHPRP is available for eligible offenders up to 90 days post release.

How do offenders enroll in the program?

Prior to release, offenders are linked for an initial appointment for mental health treatment services in the community by the Community Linkage Social Workers (CLSW). The level of treatment services required in the community is determined by the community behavioral health agency based upon medical necessity. The Montgomery County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services (ADAMHS) will coordinate delivery of the appropriate recovery supportive services based upon the information provided in the MHPRP referral packet as well as identified by the ex-offender, community behavioral health agency, and the ADAMHS re-entry program coordinator.

Offenders identified as having a SPMI who need services post release may be referred to ADAMHS by their parole officer, community service provider, or they may do a self-referral within 90 days of release. Referrals beyond 90 days post release will be considered on a case by case basis. Post release referrals will be connected to a community based mental health provider to determine their level of service needs.

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How does MHPRP work?

Step 1 – In Prison

- Offender identified as SPMI by CLSW
- Referral package detailing needed community services sent to reentry coordinator at ADAMHS by CLSW
- In reach mailers sent to offender explaining MHPRP
- Reentry coordinator conducts one-on-one meeting within 45 days of offender being released.
 - Explains expectation, responsibilities, and limits of MHPRP to offender
 - Assesses and verifies offender's reentry needs
- Parole officers and local partners notified of offender's enrollment in MHPRP
- Mental Health and AOD intake appointments scheduled
- Transportation and housing upon release are verified or arranged as needed
- Inmate provided with written letter detailing discharge plans and contact information

Step 2 – Upon Release

- Become acquainted with reentry coordinator
 - Provide list of community resources
 - Assess federal, state, and county benefit needs and assist with applications
 - Referral to SOARS
- Provide a "Welcome Kit" (hygiene items, wash cloth, etc.)
- Initial meeting with community MH and/or AOD provider
- Continue to assess and assist with housing and transportation needs in the community

Step 3 – Community Reintegration and Involvement

- Direct connection to community-based agencies
 - Reentry Services and Case Management
 - MH/AOD services
 - Peer Support
- Provide financial assistance for other reentry services
 - Referral to job readiness/placement services
 - Referral to food/clothing banks
 - GED preparation and testing
 - Transportation assistance/Bus passes
 - License reinstatement support
 - ID acquisition
- Regular communication with reentry coordinator to ensure attendance at appointments and programing

Step 4 – Project Completion

- Continued MH/AOD services with community provider
- Secured permanent, sustainable housing
- Notification of completion to parole and other community partners
