





■ 2013 ■ 2014 ■ 2015 ■ 2016 ■ 2017 ■ 2018 ■ 2019




Violent Crime Incident Comparison

Myrtle Beach Police Department:

5 divisions working together to provide exceptional service to the citizens of Myrtle Beach while supporting the efforts of each other.



Administrative Division

- 300 Animal Cruelty and Neglect complaints with 4 felony cases for animal cruelty cases.
- Fielded approximately 400 wildlife related complaints and investigated approximately 50 animal bites/attacks.
- Seized approximately 100 animals related animal cruelty, viscous and dangerous animals.
- Officers worked with employers and found employment for 7 individuals.
- Assisted over 40 individuals with bus tickets home through New Directions.

- Completed 1,700 keep checks that include business and property checks.
- Assisted as a police representative for COPE.
- Facilitated property clean-ups through Code Enforcement.
- Increased our Neighborhood Watch Group to 30 Neighborhoods this year.
- 216 neighborhood watch meetings were conducted.
- 25 Safety-educational & kid events.
- New Guardian Academy program started for parents, guardians, teachers.





Administrative Division

- Increased recruitment coverage on social media and main stream media to reach over 80,000 viewers resulting in 1,728 candidates as well as increased communication with our community.
- Produced a new recruiting video.
- Continued community partnerships in False Alarm compliance and the Trespass and Loitering Program.
- Restaurant and Bar compliance checks and Business License violation enforcement.
- Nuisance Abatement compliance, investigation and enforcement.

- 184 Taxi inspections, 119 Chauffeur permits, investigate taxi complaints.
- Wrecker Franchise inspections.
- 749 Rental conveyance renewals, rental conveyance complaints; enforcement.
- Over 100 training classes in-house and with outside agencies.
- Eight pre-services training groups that included detention officers and assisted outside agencies as well.
- Over 100 Active Shooter and scenario based training sessions in house and within the community.





Investigative Division

- In 2019, the Investigative team consists of 6 detectives assigned to Violent Crimes and 8 detectives assigned to Property Crimes, supervised by 2 Lieutenants and 2 Sergeants.
- This team worked 2,156 cases this year.
- Detectives worked 3 homicides within the City limits with each incident resulting in arrests.
- We have team members that liaison with the Myrtle Beach Rape Crisis Center.
- We have team members that liaison with the SC Coastal Region Task Force on Human Trafficking.
- We have several team members on the Carolina Organization of Retail Crime Alliance / Local Retail Theft Group.





Investigative Division

Crime Scene

- Responded to 606 individual calls for service to process various crime scenes.
- 35 additional cases included where Crime Scene assisted other agencies (responding to process scenes, basic processing of items in our lab, the use of AFIS, Cellular phone forensics, and vehicle infotainment system forensics).
- Processed over 282 digital devices (cellular phones, computers, and storage devices).
- Crime Scene recorded the beach and City buildings for erosion and damage caused by hurricanes and monitored traffic.
- Participated in approximately 6 weeks of outside training, which included computer forensics, cellular phone forensics, shooting reconstruction, Advanced Drone Operations, drone piloting and the Crime Scene Academy.
- Approximately 71 individuals fingerprinted under our public fingerprint service.

Patrol Division

- Officers performed 14,534 keep checks.
- Officers completed over 11,000 incident reports.
- Officers responded to 5,242 Public Assist calls (not including keep checks).
- Maintained a high level of visibility.
- Continued community outreach program.
- Worked on forming and maintaining relationships with the business and private community.
- Completed Axon fleet camera project.
- Engagement in Intelligence Led Policing training.

Special Operations Division

Traffic Unit

- Myrtle Beach Police Department was re-elected 'host agency' for the 15th Circuit Law Enforcement Network.
- This is the 14th year in a row, named 'Network of the Year' and considered the 'Gold Standard' for DUI enforcement.
- Investigated 2,684 collisions in 2019 a decrease from 2018 at 2,739.
- 12 fatalities in 2018, 3 fatalities in 2019.
- 297 impaired drivers were arrested in 2019.
- Conduct regular operations to address speeding, seatbelt usage, and pedestrian/bicycle issues.
- Hosted Child Safety Seat events.
- Motor unit continues to provide funeral escorts, enforcement, and public education.
- Increased technology by acquiring crash data analysis equipment and software.

Beach Patrol Unit

- Implemented weekly training (swimming, water rescue, specialty equipment usage).
- Intra and Inter departmental and agency cooperation (MBFD, DNR, US Coast Guard, etc.).
- Maintain/increase cooperation with the beach services and lifeguards.
- Assisted with lost children, address alcohol and other violations.
- Stepped-up enforcement/monitoring of beach access and other beach-related activities.
- Voluntary compliance with parasail and jet ski businesses.



Special Operations Division K-9 Unit

- 585 deployments (47% increase from 2018)
- 66 bomb/explosive sweeps
- Seized over 11 kilos of marijuana, 1.3 lb. of heroin, and various other drugs.
- Tracked and located 12 weapons.
- Seized over \$20,000.
- Extremely active in community events, neighborhood watches, and charity events.
- Added 'Yep', apprehension K-9
- Retired 'Cees'; passed away form medical condition
- Assisted with mutual aid throughout Horry County, with SCHP, SLED, Darlington NASCAR, and other major events.







Detention

- Booked in 10,383 individuals into the jail facility.
- Completed over 200 in-state transports.
- Provide transport to medical facilities
- Maintained proper flag protocol.
- Participated in numerous community events.

Property and Evidence

- Processed 18,995 pieces of evidence.
- Collected 476 pounds of drugs in the NADDI box.
- One technician received certification from IAPE.
- Participated in evidence and equipment audits.
- Provided uniforms and equipment to all departmental new hires.





Communications Unit

- Dispatched 119,084 police calls for service.
- Dispatched 14,347 fire calls for service.
- All Communications Officers participated in MBFD's night training drills/live burns.
- 4 Communications Officers successfully completed the CTO program.
- 5 part-time call takers were hired (2 currently still employed).



- Completed 1,524 public record request & background checks.







Real Time Crime

<u>Case #19-000445 – Attempted Murder</u> RTC was able to track the vehicle involved in the shooting into and from the incident location. By tracking the vehicle to the point which it entered the city, RTC utilized the ALPR system to obtain the license plate information for the vehicle.








Real Time Crime

Case #19-005651 – Murder In actual real time, RTC was able to view the suspects leave the incident location and begin to track the vehicle involved with the crime. A description of the vehicle was given out over two radio channels and live updates were given to responding officers in real time. The vehicle was tracked to an area hotel and officers were able to locate the subjects and affected arrests shortly after the actual crime.











Real Time Crime

<u>Case #19-008326 – Armed Robbery</u> A call for service came out described as an armed robbery which had just occurred. RTC was able to locate the vehicle shortly after the incident occurred and track the vehicle involved. Additionally, RTC was able to give responding officers physical descriptions of the offenders and tag information. The vehicle and subjects were located and arrested a short time later.

- July 2017 our COPS grant award of 10 MBPD officers provided for the effort to begin based on the growth of the City of Myrtle Beach and the violent crime statistics.
- MBPD immediately focused on the downtown / waterfront area to implement CPTED principles.
- Our crime analyst, working with our officers identified and addressed hotspots and the needs of those areas.
- Zone realignment based on needs and increased communication with team to problem solve.
- Focus on intelligence led policing.
- Enhanced enforcement effort and prevention towards high-risk victims.
- Business outreach meetings, community outreach meetings, faith based outreach meetings and use of social media to push and receive information.


