**Re: Meeting Schedule and Agendas**

1. Next week's [meeting schedule](#) is attached.
2. **Temporary signage allowances and additional outdoor seating granted to businesses and restaurants last year at the beginning of the COVID-19 emergency will expire on May 1.** Executive Order No. 14, issued March 31 under the mayor's continuing COVID-19 Emergency Declaration, allowed these helpful business options to continue through April 30.
3. **More new asphalt is coming!** Milling and paving operations will create a few delays next week, as a contractor improves several local roads. One lane of travel will be kept open, but drivers can expect delays during construction. Here's the schedule, weather permitting:

Milling

Monday – Pampas Drive, from Meyers Avenue to Howard Avenue  
Tuesday – Louise Drive, from Country Club Drive to Canterbury Lane  
Wednesday – North and South Oak Street, from Main Street to Collins Avenue

Paving

Tuesday – Pampas Drive, from Meyers Avenue to Howard Avenue  
Wednesday – Louise Drive, from Country Club Drive to Canterbury Lane  
Thursday – North and South Oak Street, from Main Street to Collins Avenue

4. **Get ready for the rescheduled Myrtle Beach Marathon and Half Marathon next Saturday, May 1.** Both races begin at 7:00 a.m. on Grissom Parkway, between 21<sup>st</sup> Avenue

North and Mr. Joe White Avenue, to achieve more social distancing. Be patient and plan to share the road with runners or seek alternate routes.

Drivers should expect possible congestion between 4:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., with delays on Kings Highway, Ocean Boulevard, Farrow Parkway and Grissom Parkway. Allow extra time to get to your destination on May 1. Use US 17 (the “bypass”) for north/south travel and avoid the following intersections:

- Mr. Joe White Avenue and Grissom Parkway
- 21st Avenue North and Grissom Parkway
- 29th Avenue North and Grissom Parkway
- Mr. Joe White Avenue and Oak Street; and
- Mr. Joe White Avenue and Kings Highway

For visitors, remember to park on the west side of Ocean Boulevard Friday afternoon or evening, as you won’t easily be able to cross the Boulevard with your car during race hours on Saturday. Officers will be positioned along Ocean Boulevard to assist with crossing the street when runners aren’t present. Parking along Ocean Boulevard will be prohibited after 1:00 a.m. Saturday, and northbound traffic will not be allowed during the race.

The half marathon and full marathon routes have been adjusted in The Market Common to avoid the businesses there. As soon as the last runner passes, city crews will collect traffic control devices and open up roadways and intersections, once the race has cleared the area.

- 5. Nominations are being accepted for the third annual Robert C. Hawkins Veterans Volunteer Service Award, to be presented in May.** The late Bob Hawkins, retired US Army Colonel, was one of the original volunteers for Military Appreciation Day. This award recognizes an individual’s contributions to a veteran or a veterans’ group along the Grand Strand. It’s presented by the Military Appreciation Committee. Nominations are available at <https://bit.ly/3deEc0u>. The submission deadline is May 17.
- 6. Looking ahead, seasonal restrictions begin in May for pets and bicycles on the beach and boardwalk.** From May 1 through Labor Day, pets are allowed on the beach only before 10:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m. At all times, pets must be on a leash of seven feet or shorter, and owners must pick up and properly dispose of any droppings. Bicycles also must observe the “before 10:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.” rule for the beach. On the Boardwalk, pets and bicycles are allowed only from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. during the May-Labor Day window. Pets still must be leashed, of course, and droppings properly removed.
- 7. Chapin Memorial Library, 400 14th Avenue North, will be closed to the public on Wednesday, April 28, for system updates.** The library will reopen at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, April 29. We apologize for any inconvenience.
- 8. The City of Myrtle Beach begins spraying to control the mosquito population on Monday, May 3.** Typical hours of spraying are 4:30 to 10:30 p.m. The City of Myrtle Beach also has a program to protect bees. Register any bee hives by calling 843-918-2000. Once a beehive is registered, the city will avoid spraying in the vicinity. Here is the weekly mosquito spraying schedule, weather permitting.

Monday – 62nd Avenue North to the northern city limits  
Tuesday – 21st Avenue North to 62nd Avenue North  
Wednesday – 3rd Avenue South/501 to 21st Avenue North  
Thursday – 17th Avenue South to 3rd Avenue South (includes Highway 15 corridor)  
Friday – 17th Avenue South to the southern city limits

12. **Did you know...** That during the Civil War, the US Bark *Ethan Allen*, sailing off Myrtle Beach in April 1864, destroyed a salt works facility at Withers Swash? The ship's commander sent armed men in two boats into Withers Swash where they discovered and destroyed six salt pans. A precious commodity of the time, salt was produced by boiling or otherwise evaporating seawater in large containers. The ship's crew had destroyed a larger salt works discovered at Singleton Swash a day earlier.

Resolutions are actions through which City Council reinforces or makes policy not rising to the level of law. Motions are related to direction from City Council to city staff to take certain actions.*

**REGULAR AGENDA**

**1<sup>st</sup> Reading Ordinance 2021-21 to amend Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Myrtle Beach, Beach and Boating Regulations, to make minor updates to sections of this chapter.**

*Due to the increase of activity on the beach and based on feedback from beachgoers and staff, this ordinance makes the following changes:*

- *Adds Fire Department Ocean Rescue as an appropriate authority.*
- *Amends shading devices and permits devices designed for infants/children.*
- *Amends the fishing allowances & requires a 50' buffer b/w fishing & people swimming.*
- *States that people swimming have the right-of-way over fishing. Note: this only applies if there is a conflict between fishing and swimming.*
- *Does not permit fishing in front of any franchisee's umbrella line.*
- *Removes the provision allowing jet-skis to be launched from or returned to the beach (exception for businesses operating pursuant to a franchise and emergency personnel).*
- *Requires no holes be dug on the beach deeper than 12" without refilling the hole before departing the site.*
- *Adds to the list of items of display that do not meet the requirement of adequate body covering when it comes to appropriate swimming attire on the beach.*

**1<sup>st</sup> Reading Ordinance 2021-22 to rezone 21 acres located in the 2600 Range of S Kings Hwy (a portion of PIN# 4430000012) from PRC (Parks Recreation and Conservation) to AP (Airport) to resolve a split zone.**

*Applicant has a split-zoned parcel of property they want to address.*

- *A large majority of airport property is zoned AP (Airport) in support of airport operations, but this particular parcel is currently zoned both AP and PRC (Parks Recreation and Conservation).*
- *Per FAA requirements, MYR had initiated an airport master plan prior to COVID-19.*
- *During the master plan process MYR discovered this split zoned parcel.*
- *Split zoned parcels are difficult to plan for because of the different uses. Ideally, entire tracts of parcels should be zoned the same to make development more efficient.*
- *Because AP is the most dominate zone at the airport, it was recommended this parcel be rezoned AP.*

*At the PC meeting on 3.16.21, the majority of the Commissioners voiced concerns regarding this request because they were concerned with the lack of buffering along Hwy 17, and along the backside of the cemetery property that abuts the airport.*

*When considering this item please keep in mind the following:*

- *Any development/re-development at the airport and on this parcel will be subject to CAB review.*
- *In the near future the City plans on replacing privacy fence at the cemetery. The replacement fence will be 6'-8' in height.*
- *There is also a large patch of mature trees and shrubbery on the back portion of the cemetery. The trees and shrubbery are on cemetery property and will act as a natural buffer between the airport property and the cemetery.*
- *The AP zone already abuts the cemetery along the rear property line, and the HC-2 (Highway Commercial) zone abuts the cemetery on the north and south side.*

**Resolution R2021-15 to adopt the City of Myrtle Beach's 2021 Agenda for Federal Legislative Priorities.**

*In March 2021 the Federal Government passed the American Rescue Plan. It is also anticipated that later this summer/fall the Federal Government will pass the American Jobs Plan. Both of these pieces of legislation contain significant sums of appropriations (e.g., federal grants) that can support the economic development and infrastructure needs of the City and the Greater Myrtle Beach community. Working cooperatively and collaboratively with the Myrtle Beach Area Chamber of Commerce and the business community we will work with our Congressional partners to secure what we can from these appropriations.*

**Motion M2021-55 authorizing the City Manager or his designee to accept a grant of \$548,240 from the Horry County CTC Committee through SCDOT for the purpose of resurfacing Robert Grissom Pkwy, Louise Dr, Greens Blvd, Osceola St and Oleander Dr; to record the appropriation of such grant funds in the amount approved; and to execute and deliver the grant agreement and such related documents as may be required to put the grant into effect. No match is required.**

*Per the CTC's approval, \$548,240 was allocated for resurfacing Robert Grissom Pkwy, Louise Dr, Greens Blvd, Osceola St and Oleander Dr. The City of Myrtle Beach Public Works Department will have full responsibility for the procurement, construction, maintenance, and inspection of this project.*

**Motion M2021-56 authorizing the City Manager or his designee to accept a grant of \$356,841 from the Horry County CTC Committee through SCDOT for the purpose of resurfacing N Oak St, S Oak St, Oleander Dr and making intersection improvements at Mr. Joe White Ave and N Kings Hwy; to record the appropriation of such grant funds in the amount approved; and to execute and deliver the grant agreement and such related documents as may be required to put the grant into effect. No match is required.**

*Per the CTC's approval, \$356,841 was allocated for resurfacing N Oak St, S Oak St, Oleander Dr and making intersection improvements at Mr. Joe White Ave & N. Kings Hwy. The City of Myrtle Beach Public Works Department will have full responsibility for the procurement, construction, maintenance, and inspection of this project.*

**Motion M2021-57 to approve a Special Event Permit to Heather Gray / BEI-Beach, LLC for the Market Common Carriage Rides, to be held every Tuesday from May 1, 2021 thru June, 30th, 2021 from 5:00 pm to 8:00 pm. The City Manager is authorized to make changes to these plans as he deems necessary in keeping with the nature of the event and as circumstances dictate.**

*This event features a Horse Drawn Carriage to carry guests through the Market Common. The promoter anticipates the event will draw approximately 100 guests per evening and asks to close two parking spaces on Howard Avenue in front of Dolce Lusso Salon for carriage pick up and drop off.*

**Motion M2021-58 to approve a Special Events Permit to Heather Gray/ BEI – Beach LLC for the Deville St. Festival, to be held every Saturday from 10:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. from May 1, 2021, to July 24, 2021. The City Manager is authorized to make changes to these plans as he deems necessary in keeping with the nature of the event and as circumstances dictate.**

*There will be various vendors and entertainment along Deville St. The applicant is aware they must pay for any services provided by the City of Myrtle Beach.*

**Motion M2021-59 to approve a Special Event Permit to Heather Gray/ BEI-Beach, LLC for the Taste of Market Common, to be held May 15, 2021, from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The City Manager is authorized to make changes to these plans as he deems necessary in keeping with the nature of the event and as circumstances dictate.**

*The event includes tastings from restaurants throughout the Market Common. Deville Street will be closed from Lewis Street to Nevers Street from 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. Expected attendance is 1,500.*

**Motion M2021-60 to approve a Special Event Permit to Mike Shank / NS Promotions for the Independence Day 5K Race on the streets in the Market Common area and at Grand Park on July 3, 2021, between 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m., with take-down completed by 12:00 p.m. The City Manager is authorized to make changes to these plans as he deems necessary in keeping with the nature of the event and as circumstances dictate.**

*This is the 12<sup>th</sup> consecutive year for this road race, which occurs on the July 4<sup>th</sup> holiday. The organizer expects 500 runners for this event which will include temporary road closures on Farrow Parkway, Shine Avenue, Pampas Drive, Mallard Lake Drive, Swallow Avenue, and Meyers Avenue. In each case the roads will be reopened to vehicular traffic after the final runners pass by.*

**Motion M2021-61 to approve a Special Event Permit to Chris Trout / Native Sons Promotions for the 2021 “Coastal Highland Games.” The City Manager is authorized to make changes to these plans as he deems necessary in keeping with the nature of the event and as circumstances dictate.**

*The event will be held on the fields adjacent to City Services Building including closure of Jackson St. on June 5, 2021, from 8:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. Event includes teams and/or Scottish clans from the Southeast competing in traditional Scottish athletic events, live music, kid zone, inflatables, food vendors, sponsor tents and beer sales.*

**Motion M2021-62 to approve a Special Event Permit to Michelle Kerscher/Gay Dolphin and Oceanfront Merchants Association for the “Sun Fun Festival” to be held at Plyler Park and Beachfront, and on the Boardwalk between 8<sup>th</sup> Ave. North and Mr. Joe White Avenue, June 4 to June 6, 2021, from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. The City Manager is authorized to make changes to these plans as he deems necessary in keeping with the nature of the event and as circumstances dictate.**

*The event features a Parade at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 5, starting at 8<sup>th</sup> Ave. North and proceeding north on Ocean Boulevard to 15<sup>th</sup> Ave. North. There will be live bands, performers, games and vendors. The event will be open to the public with no admission charge.*
