2. **Carolina Country Music Fest continues through Sunday, June 9, at Burroughs & Chapin Pavilion Place.** Be aware of road closures that will continue after Sunday, June 9, to remove all equipment and fencing. Expected road closures and rideshare information are below.
 - **Ocean Boulevard, between Eighth and Ninth Avenues North**
 - Includes north and south sidewalks along this stretch of Ocean Boulevard
 - Bicyclists and pedestrians should use the Myrtle Beach Boardwalk to get to the other side of Ocean Boulevard
 - Closed through 5:00 p.m., Wednesday, June 12
 - **Ocean Boulevard, between Seventh and Eighth Avenues North**
 - Closed through 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 11
 - **Eighth Avenue North, all lanes and parking spaces**
 - Closed through 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 11
 - **Chester Street, between Seventh and Eighth Avenues North**
 - Includes parking lanes and spaces

 - Limited access for local business deliveries from Mr. Joe White Avenue
 - **Ninth Avenue North, between Broadway Street and Kings Highway**
 - Eastbound lane access only for rideshare after event gate opening time
 - **Chester Street, between Ninth Avenue North and Mr. Joe White Avenue**
 - Limited access for buses and local businesses during event
 - **The rideshare location for Carolina Country Music Fest is in a different location than last year. Rideshare users should plan to be dropped off and picked up along Ninth Avenue North, between Broadway Street and Kings Highway.** Drivers should enter from the eastbound lane on Broadway Street and exit using the southbound lane on Kings Highway.
3. **The Burned Children's Fund is collecting aluminum cans at the Carolina Country Music Fest.** Throughout the weekend, look for the large, red trailers to recycle your cans. After each day, the cans will be taken to the Waccamaw Metal Recycling Center to be exchanged for money. At the end of the weekend, all funds will be donated to the Burned Children's Fund, which helps pediatric burn patients and their families. Following the Country Music Fest, recycling continues at Myrtle Beach Fire Station No. 3, 2108 South Kings Highway. The public is welcome to drop off cans there into the red trailer.
 4. **A portion of Oak Street will close on Monday, June 10, for approximately six weeks for the next round of Arts & Innovation District infrastructure work.** The small portion of Oak Street, between Sixth and Seventh Avenues North, will close. The contractor will continue utility and sewer work at the new pump station. The project is scheduled to conclude before the South Carolina Department of Transportation begins its Highway 501 realignment at Broadway Street. This project's timeline is weather-dependent. Detour signs will be posted.
 5. **Drivers, avoid the intersection of Ninth Avenue North and Kings Highway from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 11.** Crews will be installing a traffic signal

cabinet. Vehicles traveling east and westbound along Ninth Avenue North will only be able to turn right onto Kings Highway while work is underway. Please pay attention to the traffic cones if driving this area. This project is weather-dependent.

More than 150 community members gathered at Myrtle Beach's World War II Memorial for the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Normandy Invasion, and that's the subject of our [Photos of the Week](#).** Myrtle Beach's Military Appreciation Committee and veteran community hosted the event to honor and remember the nearly 160,000 Allied troops who

landed on Omaha Beach in 1944. Of those soldiers, more than 4,000 American, Canadian and British troops were killed during the invasion. Following the placement of the wreath, the Knights of Columbus performed a 13-Fold American Flag ceremony. A member of the Veterans Organization of Cresswind, Paul Hickey, read a poem about the sacrifices made on that fateful day. Other guest speakers included Vietnam War veteran Bruce Lake and committee members Chris Aranda and Carol Dion. The event concluded with the singing of "God Bless America," led by local performer, Lori Coleman. Eighty years ago, the Allied forces launched the largest air, land and sea invasion in military history. We remember, and thank, our veterans and veteran families for their sacrifices. The 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Normandy Invasion was remembered with a ceremony at Warbird Park. More than 150 community members gathered to honor the nearly 160,000 Allied troops that fought on Omaha Beach on June 6, 1944, to protect world freedoms.

More than 150 community members gathered at Myrtle Beach's World War II Memorial Thursday, June 6, for the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Normandy Invasion. The Myrtle Beach Military Appreciation Committee and veteran community partners hosted an 80th Anniversary ceremony at Warbird Park to remember and honor the 160,000 Allied troops who stormed Omaha Beach in 1944. During the ceremony, guest speakers and poets spoke of the bravery and sacrifices these soldiers made fighting for world freedoms. Following the placement of the wreath, the Knights of Columbus performed a 13-fold American flag presentation. The event concluded with the singing of "God Bless America," led by local performer, Lori Coleman. Thanks to all who attended.

- 13. Did You Know...That the Myrtle Beach Town Council agreed to purchase the land for a municipal airport in 1939?** The airport, later named the Harrelson Municipal Airport, received federal funds in 1940 to construct two runways as part of the National Defense Program. The United States Army Air Corps expressed interest in using the airport for pilot training, and additional funds were given to lengthen and pave two runways. In November 1941, the War Department acting under the Second War Powers Act, acquired 6,707 acres to include the municipal airport. Many airfield improvements ensued, and a fighter-bomber group was activated and given the mission of supporting and training pilots and associated air crews. In December 1941, just days before the Pearl Harbor attack, the Town Council agreed to turn the airport over to the U.S. War Department to serve as the Myrtle Beach Aerial Gunnery and Bombing Range. Following World War II, the airport was returned to the city, but as the Cold War heated up in the mid-1950s, the city again gave its airport to the federal government. It ultimately became the Myrtle Beach Air Force Base, which operated until 1993.

CONSENT AGENDA

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-32 authorizing assumption of a towing franchise agreement granted to Strand Towing, LLC.

Strand Towing, LLC was granted a towing franchise on June 28, 2022 (Ordinance 2022-31). At that time, the owner/operator of Strand Towing was Theresa Ward. Ms. Ward recently conveyed the business to her daughter and son-in-law, Valerie Causey and William Causey. The new owners/operators have requested the City consent to their assumption of the towing franchise agreement. To assume the towing franchise agreement as the new owners/operators of Strand Towing, Valerie Causey and William Causey will need to execute the agreement, as well as an agreement expressly assuming all liabilities and obligations incurred by Strand Towing under the agreement during the prior ownership.

Motion M2024-58 authorizing the Myrtle Beach Police Department to apply for a grant in the amount of \$52,189 from the South Carolina Department of Public Safety Body Armor Assistance Grant program for reimbursement of purchase; and to record the appropriation of such grant funds in the amount they may be approved, and to execute and deliver the grant agreement and such related documents as may be require to put the grant into effect. No local match requirement.

Myrtle Beach Police Department (MBPD) applied for this reimbursement grant from the SC Department of Public Safety on March 15, 2024. Funding will be applied to the initial purchase or reimbursement of eligible body armor expenditures occurring January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024. MBPD is slated to purchase 9 replacement vests and 51 vests for new officers. There is no match requirement.

Motion M2024-59 Amend Motion M2024-35 authorizing the City Manager or his designee to accept a grant of \$41,822.74 from SC Department of Health and Environmental Control (SC DHEC) for the purpose of purchasing mosquito control equipment and supplies, to record the appropriation of such grant funds in the amount approved, and to execute and deliver the grant agreement and such related documents as may be required to put the grant into effect.

SC DHEC is distributing Hurricane Recovery Funds to local municipalities for mosquito control. SC DHEC has prioritized funding for municipalities that are most affected by hurricane-influenced mosquito population surges. This motion is amended to include the additional \$842.01 awarded by SC DHEC.

Haley Ricciardi's franchise (4th Avenue N.) has expired and desires to renew. The proposal calls for a 3-yr. agreement w/annual franchise fee of \$1,000/year and increasing to \$1,500/year for years two and three of the franchise period..

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-34 granting a boardwalk vendor franchise agreement for the 6th Avenue N. portion of the public boardwalk of the City of Myrtle Beach for a period of up to three years beginning June 29, 2024.

There are 4 existing Boardwalk franchise locations:

- 3rd Ave., N
- 4th Ave., N
- 5th Ave., N
- 6th Ave., N

Keisha Moyd's franchise (6th Avenue N.) expires June 28th, 2024, and desires to renew. The proposal calls for a 3-yr. agreement w/annual franchise fee of \$1,000/year and increasing to \$1,500/year for years two and three of the franchise period.

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-35 to rezone ~1.36 acres (PIN 444-0801-0221, 444-0801-0222, 444-0801-0230, 444-0801-0229, 444-0801-0228, 444-0801-0227) from 6th Ave N RDZ (Redevelopment District Zone) to MUH (Mixed Use, High Density).

This request is in conjunction with proposed Ordinance 2024-36, a request to remove six properties from the 6th Ave N RDZ. The 6th Ave N RDZ regulates development in two phases. Phase 1 is complete. These parcels represent the entirety of the undeveloped Phase 2 of the 6th Ave N RDZ. MU-H allows a mixture of uses and has strict design standards intended to create and facilitate a walkable area. Properties to the north, south and east are zoned MU-H (Mixed Use - High Density); the property to the west will remain in the 6th Ave N RDZ. Planning Commission: 5.7.24 recommends approval (9/0).

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-36 to amend the 6th Ave N RDZ to remove all references to 6 parcels on the corner of 6th Ave N and Flagg Street totaling ~1.36 acres (PIN 444-0801-0221, 444-0801-0222, 444-0801-0230, 444-0801-0229, 444-0801-0228, 444-0801-0227).

This request is in conjunction with proposed Ordinance 2024-35, a request to rezone six properties from RDZ to MU-H. The 6th Ave N RDZ regulates development in roughly two phases.

- *Phase 1 is for a new oceanfront tower to be supported by an existing 3rd-row parking garage. This phase is complete.*
- *Future phases consisted of the six subject parcels and are slated for "Future Development." Development plans for these parcels require approval via an RDZ amendment.*

If the rezoning request (Ordinance 2024-35) is approved, this amendment to the 6th Ave N RDZ is vital, for the reasons described above. Should 2024-35 fail to gain approval, this request to amend the 6th Ave N RDZ will be rescinded.

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-38 an ordinance temporarily suspending a franchise agreement for operation of rental conveyance businesses regulated by Chapter 12, Article V of the Code of Ordinances of Myrtle Beach to Ben Robinson d/b/a Rent Me Superstore, located at 106 North Kings Highway, Myrtle Beach, SC 29577 for a period of 45 days effective immediately upon passing of second reading.

Chapter 12, Article V of the City's Code of Ordinances allows City Council to require a franchise for the rental and operation of rental conveyances on the highways, streets, alleys, and public ways within the city limits. Via Ordinance 2024-13 adopted on March 12, 2024, City Council granted a

franchise to Ben Robinson D/B/A Rent Me Superstore at 106 North Kings Highway. Per the franchise agreement, to hold a valid franchise in good standing, the operator of the franchise must:

- obtain a valid franchise agreement
- have a valid up to date business license, and
- pay the \$10.00 per vehicle franchise fee, capped at \$2,000 per location

Despite repeated attempts by City staff informing the franchise of the franchise requirements the franchisee did not:

- possess a valid franchise
- have a valid City of Myrtle Beach Business License, nor
- paid the required per vehicle franchise fee

The franchisee came into compliance only after being informed the franchise could be revoked.

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-39 an ordinance temporarily suspending a franchise agreement for operation of rental conveyance businesses regulated by Chapter 12, Article 5 of the Code of Ordinances of Myrtle Beach to Ben Robinson d/b/a Rent Me Superstore, located at 300 South Ocean Blvd., Myrtle Beach, SC 29577 for a period of 45 days effective immediately upon passing of second reading.

Chapter 12, Article V of the City's Code of Ordinances allows City Council to require a franchise for the rental and operation of rental conveyances on the highways, streets, alleys, and public ways within the city limits. Via Ordinance 2024-14 adopted on March 12, 2024, City Council granted a franchise to Ben Robinson D/B/A Rent Me Superstore at 300 South Ocean Blvd., Per the franchise agreement, to hold a valid franchise in good standing, the operator of the franchise must:

- obtain a valid franchise agreement
- have a valid up to date business license, and
- pay the \$10.00 per vehicle franchise fee, capped at \$2,000 per location

Despite repeated attempts by City staff informing the franchise of the franchise requirements the franchisee did not:

- possess a valid franchise
- have a valid City of Myrtle Beach Business License, nor
- paid the required per vehicle franchise fee

The franchisee came into compliance only after being informed the franchise could be revoked.

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-40 an ordinance temporarily suspending a franchise agreement for operation of rental conveyance businesses regulated by Chapter 12, Article 5 of the Code of Ordinances of Myrtle Beach to Ben Robinson d/b/a Rent Me Superstore, located at 1205 North Ocean Blvd., Myrtle Beach, SC 29577 for a period of 45 days effective immediately upon passing of second reading.

Chapter 12, Article V of the City's Code of Ordinances allows City Council to require a franchise for the rental and operation of rental conveyances on the highways, streets, alleys, and public ways within the city limits. Via Ordinance 2024-14 adopted on March 12, 2024, City Council granted a franchise to Ben Robinson D/B/A Rent Me Superstore at 300 South Ocean Blvd., Per the franchise agreement, to hold a valid franchise in good standing, the operator of the franchise must:

- obtain a valid franchise agreement
- have a valid up to date business license, and
- pay the \$10.00 per vehicle franchise fee, capped at \$2,000 per location

Despite repeated attempts by City staff informing the franchise of the franchise requirements the franchisee did not:

- possess a valid franchise
- have a valid City of Myrtle Beach Business License, nor
- paid the required per vehicle franchise fee

The franchisee came into compliance only after being informed the franchise could be revoked.

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-41 to amend Section 1502.X to delete the previous text governing EV charges and replacing it with new text to clarify conditions applicable to EV chargers.

EV's is a relatively new phenomenon, and building codes, zoning codes, and firefighting practices are still developing in response to their presence. This ordinance addresses concerns of various departments regarding improved safety for EV chargers. EV chargers are broken down into three levels.

- *Level 1 and 2 chargers are allowed as accessory uses in all zones throughout Myrtle Beach.*
- *Level 3 chargers are allowed as accessory uses in all zones except for single-family and two-family residences within the city.*

To ensure safer conditions for visitors, residents, and firefighters, this ordinance would limit placement of EV chargers to street level, ensure emergency shutoff switch installation, prevent installation in parking structures that have accommodations above, and be installed according to fire and construction code. Planning Commission: 5.21.24 voted 7/0 to recommend approval.

1st Reading Ordinance 2024-42 granting a boardwalk vendor franchise agreement for the 3rd Avenue N. portion of the public boardwalk of the City of Myrtle Beach to Charmati Abdelkader for a period of up to three years beginning June 25, 2024.

Two of the four locations are earmarked for

1st Reading Ordinance 2024-43 granting a boardwalk vendor franchise agreement for the 5th Avenue N. portion of the public boardwalk of the City of Myrtle Beach to Timothy Buckley Sr., and Timothy Buckley Jr., for a period of up to three years beginning June 25, 2024.

Motion M2024-57 to appoint/reappoint four members to the Standard Code Board of Adjustments and Appeals.

The terms of Jeff Hunter, Neil McCoy, Robert McElveen, and David Raynor have expired. Mr. Raynor and Mr. McElveen are three year term seats with new term expiring April 26, 2027. Mr. McCoy and Mr. Hunter are alternative one year term seats. Their new terms expiration date is April 26, 2025. One seat remains vacant and the potential candidate must be a licensed contractor per City Code.

Motion M2024-60 to appoint/reappoint one member to the Housing Authority.

There is currently one vacancy. There is one resume on file and is also the recommendation, Nancy Giordano (Non-Resident). This term will expire on December 9, 2028.

Motion M2024-61 to declare certain vehicles abandoned or derelict pursuant to the authority of Article 41 of Title 56 South Carolina Code of Laws 2001.

This declaration is an effort to improve the appearance of both commercial and residential neighborhoods. This report includes vehicles staff tagged as abandoned or derelict. Council's approval allows these vehicles to be towed from their private property locations to a tow yard where they may be reclaimed by the current owner upon payment of the applicable towing and storage fees. If the vehicles are not claimed by the owner within 30 days of the required notice, then the tow company may sell the vehicle and keep the proceeds as compensation.
