2. **Myrtle Beach city offices and facilities will be closed on Monday, July 5, for the Independence Day holiday.** However, solid waste and recycling services will be on the regular Monday-through-Thursday schedule during the week of July 5-9. Trash and recycling will be collected as usual in Zone 1 on Monday, July 5.
3. **The sale, possession or use of fireworks is illegal inside the City of Myrtle Beach, with the exception of approved, professional fireworks shows.** Rather than risk a ticket by shooting fireworks, please enjoy a spectacular show from the Second Avenue Pier at 10:00 p.m., Sunday, July 4. It's visible up and down the beach.

5. **Myrtle Beach celebrated Juneteenth last Saturday with a festival at Charlie's Place, and that's the subject of our [Photos of the Week](#).** Juneteenth commemorates the date in 1865 when word of the Emancipation Proclamation finally reached the far corners of the United States, specifically Galveston, Texas. News traveled slowly 160 years ago, so it was more than two years before everyone heard word that slavery had been abolished. Myrtle Beach's Juneteenth celebration included music, poetry, dancing and more. The event was sponsored by the city's Neighborhood Services Department.

6. **Did you know...** That the crepe myrtle is the official flower of the City of Myrtle Beach? The colorful plant was so honored by City Council on October 30, 1956.
