1. Next week's [meeting schedule](#) and agendas are attached.
2. **Myrtle Beach police officers will play the Canal Street Ballers in basketball at 1:00 p.m., Saturday, August 25, at Mary C. Canty Recreation Center on Canal Street.** This friendly match is a chance for youngsters and officers to get together and share a common activity. The police officers won last year's game by just five points, so the Ballers are looking for bragging rights this time. Admission is free and open to the public.

Potential items for the September 18, 2018, Planning Commission meetings:

1. **PRE-FIN 18-07 Marina Tract D:** Proposal by GDMB Marina Land LLC to divide 42.06 acres at the corner of Fontane Way and Colline Verde Way (TMS# 165-00-01-450 and 165-00-01-451) into 196 lots, 14.45 acres of common area, and 5 new streets. (Applicant requested continuance at the August 21, 2018 meeting.)
2. **PRE-FIN 18-08 82 Dunes:** Proposal by Mozingo+Wallace to subdivide 3.22 acres at the corner of 82nd Parkway and Nigels Drive (TMS# 165-12-03-093) into 29 single family residential lots and 2 private streets. (Applicant requested continuance at the August 21, 2018 meeting.)

PUBLIC REQUESTS, PRESENTATIONS, AWARDS, MEMORIALS:

1. Proclamation declaring week of September 17-22, 2018, as South Atlantic Shrine Association Week (mtg). *This proclamation honors and thanks the South Atlantic Shrine Association for their loyalty to the City of Myrtle Beach. See Resolution R2018-35.*
2. Recognition of Jack McLaughlin (mtg). *Mr. McLaughlin is a Firefighter Engineer who has recently returned from deployment in Helmand Province Afghanistan with the SC Army National Guard from October 2017-June 2018. Jack has been with the city since September 2002. The purpose of this item is to publicly thank Mr. McLaughlin for his service to his country and to welcome him back to this community.*
3. Proposed upgrades to HGTC Grand Strand Campus – Dr. Marilyn Fore (ws) *President of HGTC will present the college's proposed upgrades to the Grand Strand Campus located on the former Air Force Base. This campus now includes a number of public amenities, including a Culinary Institute, Auditorium, Library and Continuing Education/Workforce Development Division. This presentation is related to Motion M2018-120 on this agenda, under which staff has concurred with the college's request for assistance with the undergrounding of overhead utilities along Pampas Drive. The presentation is also consistent with Resolution R2018-37, under which a 10-year plan for the undergrounding of overhead utilities funded by the Santee Cooper Underground Utility Fund is proposed.*
4. Introduction of MBACC CEO/President Karen Riordan (mtg). *Ms. Riordan comes to us from Williamsburg, Virginia, and started her new position on August 20.*

5. **Public Information Update – PIO Staff/Police (mtg)** *This item is listed on the agenda as a means of informing the community of some of the city's recent accomplishments and upcoming city events.*
6. **Department Update – Emergency Services (mtg)** *This is a new item listed on the agenda as a means of informing the community of the accomplishments and challenges of the city's individual departments and offices.*

CONSENT AGENDA *(The Consent Agenda covers items that are anticipated to be routine in nature. Any councilmember may ask that an item be moved from the Consent Agenda to the Regular Agenda for lengthier discussion, or a member of the public may request that an item be moved. Items remaining on the Consent Agenda will be briefly described by staff and may be passed as a group with the approval of the agenda.)*

NOTE: *City laws are known as ordinances. Before a city ordinance can be enacted, it must be introduced (1st Reading), and then approved (2nd Reading). Resolutions are normally actions through which City Council reinforces policy, or makes policy, not rising to the level of a law. Motions are generally oral in nature and related to direction from City Council to City staff to take specific actions.*

Resolution **R2018-033** to amend the CDBG budget for program year 2014/2015 to reallocate funding for Charlie's Place.

The resolution reduces the Building Demolition CDBG project by \$10,200 and increases the Charlie's Place Revitalization Project budget by that same amount. The Charlie's Place Revitalization Project on the north east end of Carver Street includes renovating the house and the remaining motel units into adaptive spaces. The contract for the house renovation has been executed, and related demolition work is expected to begin next week.

Resolution **R2018-035** designating the 2018 South Atlantic Shrine Association Annual Conference as a citywide festival from September 17-22, 2018, and affirming the city's co-sponsorship of the event.

The Shriners are a fraternal organization with approximately 310,000 members who support 22 children's hospitals. SASA is comprised of 48,000 Nobles from 20 different Shrine Centers in the southeast. SASA has held its annual meeting in the city on many occasions, attracting about 20,000 attendees. The resolution expresses Council's:

- *Appreciation for selecting Myrtle Beach to host the 45th annual meeting.*
- *Designation of the week of September 27, 2018, as city-wide festival, and to authorize welcoming banners.*
- *Approval of a reasonable variance to the noise ordinance.*
- *Approval to provide certain in-kind services, delivery and set-up of barricades along the parade route, additional trash receptacles and a parade review stand on Ocean Boulevard.*
- *Extension of allowable parade hours (from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m.) and allowing solicitation during the parade.*
- *Approval of the use of the Landmark Resort parking lot for trailers.*
- *Best wishes for a successful meeting and an invitation to return as often as possible.*

Motion **M2018-127** to acknowledge receipt for the purpose of Governing Body Review, of an application to be filed under the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program after the end of a period of 30 days from the date hereof. A copy of the 2018

(JAG) application has been distributed to City Council members and has been filed in the office of the City Clerk, where it will be available for review throughout that 30-day period.

The motion sets the clock into operation for the 30 day period required for governing body review of JAG grants. This grant is to apply for funding for Phase II of the license plate readers (LPR). Motion M2018-124 provided for additional cameras for the fly-over at Farrow and the By-Pass to be funded from the 2017 JAG grant. Phase II, which will be funded by the 2018 grant, will cover the underpass at that same location. Those additions will complete LPR coverage for each entry/exit point into/out of the city.

The LPRs have proven to be extremely valuable crime fighting tools. The ability to track wanted vehicles entering and leaving the city has led to a number of criminal apprehensions, especially when used in conjunction with the surveillance camera network. In 2017, over 20 million license plates were read. Please note that we do not maintain a log of any plates that have not been entered into the NCIC database.

REGULAR AGENDA *(The Regular Agenda includes items that are not anticipated to be routine in nature. Any councilmember may ask that an item be moved from the Consent Agenda to the Regular Agenda for lengthier discussion, or a member of the public may request that an item be moved.)*

1st Reading **Ordinance 2018-054** to amend a lease denominated as the Agreement of Lease between the City of Myrtle Beach and County of Horry as Landlords and Durham Bulls Baseball Club, Inc. as Tenant dated as of September 1, 1998, deleting unnecessary terms, reflecting the true parties in interest, and providing for the extension of lease for 3 years.

The City and County co-own the baseball stadium on a 70/30 basis. The original 20-year lease agreement expires after this baseball season, and the last debt service payment on the stadium bonds will be paid next month. The team has requested a three-year extension of the current agreement.

The original agreement contains provisions that are no longer relevant. These provisions are removed from the extension agreement because they are no longer applicable. Otherwise, there are no significant changes to the term of the agreement. During the extension period, the parties will work with an architectural firm to develop a modernization plan for the ballpark to serve as a basis for a long-term lease agreement between the parties. As co-owner, the county will also be asked to approve this extension.

1st Reading **Ordinance 2018-055** to convey parcel P-7 to Living Dunes, LLC as shown in Exhibit A and to direct the City Manager to take all necessary steps to accomplish the same.

The city owns two ponds, known as Parcels P7 and P8, both of which are located adjacent to the Living Dunes PUD. The developer made improvements to improve the drainage functionality of Parcel P8 so that Parcel P7 is no longer needed for drainage purposes. The developer wishes to use Parcel P7 as an amenity for the residents of the Living Dunes PUD. The value of the drainage improvements to Parcel P8 has been estimated at over \$177,000, an amount that significantly exceeds the value of Parcel P7.

Resolution **R2018-037** setting out the City's 10-year plan with respect to the undergrounding of overhead utilities.

Proposed plan to underground overhead utilities in the initial 10-year period is to:

- Complete undergrounding work along South Kings Highway, from 3rd Avenue South to the southern city limits.
- Partner with HGTC for proposed upgrades to the Grand Strand Campus (HGTC has agreed to pay related engineering costs).
- Prepare for connection of Highway 501 to Ocean Boulevard via 7th Avenue North by undergrounding utilities along 7th Avenue North (Kings Highway to Ocean Boulevard).
- Begin undergrounding on Kings Highway, from 21st Avenue North to the northern city limits.

Motion **M2018-071** to appoint/reappoint one member to the Myrtle Beach Air Base Redevelopment Authority to replace Wilson Cain. This term expires June 30, 2020.

The Authority is comprised of nine members, three appointed by the city, three by the county, one by the governor (all subject to confirmation of the Legislature) and two from the Legislature itself.

The city has received applications from Kevin Gunn, Robin Guthridge, John Maxwell, Mark Mancini, Carl Sivertsen and Michael Snow to fill the remaining vacant seat.

Motion M2018-120 to authorize the use of up to ~~\$3,020,000~~ \$2,265,000 from Santee Cooper's underground utility fund for the purpose of undergrounding utilities along Pampas Drive in conjunction with Horry-Georgetown Technical College's proposed campus upgrades, and up to \$755,000 from that fund for the purpose of undergrounding portions of Crabtree Lane, Emmens Avenue, and Gabreskie Lane.

Horry Georgetown Technical College proposes to invest over \$13 million in the Grand Strand Campus on the former Air Force Base in part to make it more compatible with the surrounding Market Common Community. In this effort, the college has requested the city's assistance with undergrounding utilities along Pampas Drive. The total of such work is ~~\$3,020,000~~ \$2,265,000, which would come from Santee Cooper's existing Underground Utility Fund. HGTC has agreed to pay the related engineering costs.

This work is anticipated in the 10-Year Plan, which is included as Resolution R2018-37 on this agenda.

Motion **M2018-123** to appoint 11 members to the Technology Advisory Group.

We have received resumes from the following applicants for nine of the positions on this new Committee: Rev. P. Kelly Barr, Joseph Bonanno, Donna Catton-Johnson, Kendall Davis, Peter Gasca, Bruce Grant, Jason T. Greene, Brent Groome, Josh House, Bradley Kohr, Mark Manafo, Frank McClatchy, Meagan Michal, Kaitlyn Mikus, Richard Miller, Susan Roe, Gina Trimarco and Keith Walters.

In addition, Council designated two seats for CCU and HGTC. The Presidents of those institutions have requested the appointment of Jean French and John Dove respectfully.

Motion **M2018-125** to declare certain vehicles abandoned or derelict pursuant to the authority of Article 41 of Title 56 South Carolina Code of Laws 2001.

City staff has previously tagged these vehicles as either abandoned or derelict. Upon approval these vehicles may be towed from their private property location to a storage facility. If the owner does not reclaim the vehicle, then the tow company ultimately becomes

the owner of the vehicle and may dispose of it as they see fit. The memo dated August 28, 2018, shows four vehicles.

Motion **M2018-126** to approve a Special Event Permit to Mike Shank / Festival Promotions for the "2018 Turkey Trot" 8K/5K race on the streets in the Market Common area and at Valor Park on November 22, 2018, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m., take down will be completed by Noon. The City Manager is authorized to make changes to these plans as he deems necessary in keeping with the nature of the event and as circumstances dictate.

This is an 11-year running event held on the streets of The Market Common on Thanksgiving morning, and is expected to attract 1,200 participants. The last runner will be off the street by 9:30 a.m. As is the case for all of our running events, the city uses a "rolling" road closure system, meaning that the roads are closed as the first runner approaches and reopened as soon as the last runner passes. This event benefits the Grand Strand Humane Society.

Motion **M2018-128** to consider additional Accommodations Tax funding for the Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum in the amount of \$10,000 based on the recommendation of the City's Local Accommodations Tax Committee.

The Art Museum requests an additional allocation of \$10,000 in Accommodations Tax to support for the museum's marketing plans targeted at Charleston, Florence and Wilmington. The first marketing campaign will feature the museum's exhibition, "Making Waves: A Drew Brophy Retrospective."
