The house that is home to the Burroughs and Chapin Art Museum turns 100 years old this year, and that's the subject of our [Photos of the Week](#).** In 1924, the building the Myrtle Beach community knows as the Burroughs and Chapin Art Museum was built on the north end, between current-day 54th and 59th Avenues North. It served as a residential home for two families until 1975. The abandoned building sat next to the Ocean Forest Hotel for several years, and at one point was under threat of being torn down. In hopes to preserve Myrtle Beach's architectural history, the historic treasure was carefully transported eight miles south in 1984 to its current home, thanks to Waccamaw Arts and Crafts Guild Visionary, Gaye Fisher. It opened 13 years later as the Burroughs and Chapin Art Museum and remains the museum's home today.

CONSENT AGENDA

Motion M2024-44 to approve an agreement between the City and the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (“DHEC”) for funding in the amount of \$1,000,000 to be used for the construction of the future 24th Avenue North ocean outfall; and to authorize the City Manager or his designee to execute and deliver the agreement by June 30, 2024.

This agreement is supported by appropriations from the state budget for fiscal year 2023-2024, according to Proviso 34.52. The supported project will involve constructing an ocean outfall for stormwater drainage and removal of existing beach pipes. The Public Works Department has prepared a project budget that considers these funds being allocated to the construction of the future 24th Avenue North ocean outfall. Unexpended funds distributed pursuant to this agreement may be carried forward to succeeding fiscal years and expended for the same purposes. No local match requirement is stated in the agreement.

Motion M2024-45 authorizing the City Manager or his designee to apply for a grant in the amount of \$20,000 from the Duke Energy Foundation for the purpose of purchasing public education materials related to disaster preparedness; and to record the appropriation of such grant funds in the amount that may be approved, and to execute and deliver the grant agreement and such related documents as may be required to put the grant into effect. No match requirement.

The City’s Emergency Management Division will use the grant to purchase informational materials focused on educating school-aged children within the City about natural disaster preparedness. Materials will be disbursed to children through three (3) local initiatives, including Chapin Memorial Library’s Mobile Library, EdVenture Children’s Museum, and Myrtle Beach Schools’ “BackPack Buddies Program.”

Motion M2024-46 authorizing the City Manager or his designee to apply for a grant of \$1,473,354 from the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA) – Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) program to hire six firefighters to bring two fire companies to the national staffing standards, to record the appropriation of such grant funds in the amount that may be approved, and to execute and deliver the grant agreement and such related documents as may be required to put the grant into effect. No match required.

The Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response grants (SAFER) was created to provide funding directly to fire departments to help increase or maintain the number of trained, “front line” firefighters. The objectives of the SAFER grant program are to assist local fire departments with staffing and deployment capabilities to respond to emergencies and assure that communities have adequate protection from fire and fire-related hazards. Local fire departments accomplish this by improving

staffing and deployment capabilities, so they may more effectively and safely respond to emergencies. With enhanced staffing levels, recipients should experience a reduction in response times and an increase in the number of trained personnel assembled at the incident scene. If awarded, this grant pays 100% of the firefighter's salary and benefits for 3 years. After the 3-yr., period, the City will have to pick-up 100% of the salary and benefit costs.

REGULAR AGENDA

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-22 to amend Chapter 2, Division 2, Article 6, Sec. 2-244 (a) and 2-253 of the Purchasing Code, and add Sec. 2-259 for Non-competitive Purchasing for Sole Source and Single Source.

Amend Section 2-244(a) to allow the city to advertise in online sources while also maintaining the city's ability to advertise in a newspaper of general circulation if the situation warrants and/or the item being procured may require as such (i.e., a grant may require a specific procurement method). Amend Section 2-253 referencing local vendor preference:

- *For bids between \$7,500 and \$25,000; the within the city limits bidder receives a 6% credit.*
- *For bids between \$25,000-\$100,000; if the local bid is 6% or less of the apparent non-local low bid, the local vendor has the opportunity to meet the apparent low non-local bid*
- *From \$100,000 - \$5,000,000; if the local bid is 4% or less of the apparent non-local bid, the local vendor has opportunity to meet apparent low non-local bid.*

Amend Section 259 to further clarify sole source vs. single source procurement.

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-23 to rezone ~1.78 acres (PIN# 425-1401-0029 & 425-1401-0030) from HC-1 (Highway Commercial) to WM (Wholesale/Manufacturing).

Parcel 1 fronts Stockholder Avenue and abuts Robert M. Grissom Blvd. Parcel 2 fronts Stockholder Avenue to the south and Executive Drive to the north. Both properties are currently zoned HC-1. Surrounding properties to the south are zoned HC-1 (Highway Commercial) and the properties to the north, east and west are zoned WM (Wholesale/Manufacturing). Planning Commission: 4/2/24 unanimously recommends approval (5/0)

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-24 to amend Article 14 and Article 15 to allow storage tanks for liquid substances, above ground as a conditional use in the HC-1 (Highway Commercial 1), HC-2 (Highway Commercial 2), and a permitted use in AP (Airport District) and LM (Light Manufacturing) zoning districts.

Storage tanks for liquid substances, above ground, are currently allowed as a special exception (tanks require BZA approval) in the AP (Airport District) and LM (Light Manufacturing) districts. The applicant originally requested adding above ground storage tanks as a conditional use in the HC2 district. Staff recommendation is to allow as conditional use in the HC1 and HC2 districts.

All designs must adhere to state and federal regulations, and any regulations as required by the City of Myrtle Beach Fire Marshal.

- *Storage tanks, above ground provided storage tanks shall be set back a minimum of 17' from any property line.*
- *Storage tanks shall only be permitted at hardware stores, gas stations, and locations for rental of general equipment and tools for construction, commercial, and industrial uses.*
- *The only substance allowed in the storage tank is Propane*
- *Storage tanks not located at a gas station are limited to a maximum of 1,000 gallons.*

Staff recommends changing above ground storage tanks from a special exception to permitted use in AP and LM districts. Planning Commission: 4/2/24 Recommends approval (4/2)

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-25 to create a Planned Unit Development known as 23rd Avenue North Planned Unit Development.

This is a new single-phase PUD with the intent to build an oceanfront hotel, a second row mobile check-in lot, and a third row parking deck.

2nd Reading Ordinance 2024-26 to amend a Planned Unit Development known as 21st Avenue Ocean Front Planned Unit Development.

This request is in conjunction with the proposed new 23rd Ave N PUD. This amendment to the 21st Ave N Oceanfront PUD is necessary because the proposed 23rd Ave N PUD includes 6 parcels currently regulated by the 21st Ave N Oceanfront PUD. Properties cannot be in multiple PUDs & this proposal removes 6 parcels from the 21st Ave N PUD.

1st Reading Ordinance 2024-28 to close and abandon certain alleys between lots 181, 183, 182, & 184 of the eastern section.

The newly created 23rd Ave., PUD calls for an alleyway swap in conformance to City Code. City Code section 5-27-150 outlines the city's policy on relocation/consolidation policy on alleyways. The applicant has determined the two (2) alleyways between lots 181 and 183 and lots 182 and 184 (see Exhibit A to the ordinance) shall be abandoned. In return the City shall receive title to a 20 (20) foot portion of the South Side of Lot 181 and a twenty (20) foot portion of the South Side of Lot 182, Eastern Section of Myrtle Beach.

** Myrtle Beach Downtown Alliance is required to conduct its business in public with limited exceptions known as “Executive Sessions”. Subjects eligible for Executive Session include:*

- *Personnel matters.*
- *Negotiations concerning proposed contractual arrangements and proposed sale or purchase of property.*
- *The receipt of legal advice relating to:*
 - *A pending, threatened, or potential claim.*
 - *Other matters covered by the attorney-client privilege.*
 - *Settlement of legal claims, or the position of the MBDA in other adversary situations.*
- *Discussions regarding development of personnel or devices.*
- *Investigative proceedings regarding allegations of criminal misconduct.*
- *Matters relating to the proposed location, expansion, or provision of services encouraging location or expansion of industries or other businesses.*

Motions to go into Executive Session must be made in public and specify one or more of the reasons above. The Committee can take no votes or take action in Executive Session. The Committee may take action on matters discussed in Executive Session which are deemed to be “emergency” concerns upon reconvening in open session.
