Sea turtle nesting season begins May 1; do not disturb!

Sea turtles typically nest betweeen May 1 and October 31. Turtles often come ashore at night, returning to the same beach where they were born to lay their eggs.

It is illegal under federal and state law to disturb sea turtles,

with fines of up to \$15,000 for anyone who does. If you see a nesting turtle, stay away! Sea turtles are protected under the Federal Endangered Species Act of 1973.

Further, the Marine Turtle Protection Act states that "no

person may take, possess, disturb, mutilate, destroy, cause to be destroyed, sell, offer for sale, transfer, molest or harass any marine sea turtle or its nests or eggs at any times."

Do not disturb, touch, shine a light on or otherwise interfere with sea turtles, their nests or the hatchlings. Contact the rangers at Myrtle Beach State Park if you see a turtle or a crawl sign.



Seasonal rules begin May 1

Several beach and boardwalk rules change for the season when May arrives. From May 1 through Labor Day, dogs and bicycles are allowed on the beach only before 10:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

At all times when dogs are allowed on the beach or boardwalk, they must be on a leash of seven feet or shorter, and you must pick up and properly dispose of their droppings.

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Hurricane season returns June 1... Are you ready?

For coastal residents, hurricane season is a fact of life every year, from June through November. Advance preparation is the key to your family's safety if a hurricane threatens the Myrtle Beach area this summer.

The first step is to "know your zone," as shown on the map below. Evacuation routes and other hurricane safety tips are posted on www.cityofmyrtlebeach.com.

Know in advance where you'll go if an evacuation happens. Have important papers ready in a "go bag," and keep a hurricane kit handy with things you'll need in an emergency, such as insurance and medical records.



Include enough supplies in the kit for all family medicine and other critical items. Of course, batteries and flashlights are vital, too, in the event of a prolonged power outage.

Do not forget your pets! Have an evacuation plan or accommodations in areas away from the coast.

When the time comes, fill the car with gas and check in with relatives when you get to your destination. Having a family contact point will keep everyone posted.

Lifeguard rules change for 2023; shading rules do not

The Myrtle Beach City Council has amended the beach franchises to require lifeguard-only service, beginning this summer. Beach lifeguards will no longer rent chairs and umbrellas. Instead, rentals will be conducted by other staff.

The updated franchise agreement also changes the hours of lifeguard service. Previously, lifeguards worked from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. This year, the hours are 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., when the beach is busier.

However, the City of Myrtle Beach is not changing its shading device rules.

From Memorial Day through Labor Day, only circular umbrellas are allowed, at or above the high tide line.

Futrell Park improvements include splash pad, new playground and a walking trail, near Mr. Joe White Ave

Park improvements are near the top of the list this year, and Myrtle Beach's Futrell Park is no exception! New amenities include a splash pad for kids to enjoy during hot weather, along with a completely new playground.

Futrell Park is adjacent to Fire Station No. 1 on Mr. Joe White Avenue. It's centrally located and is part of the Booker T. Washington neighborhood. The playground and splash pad are scheduled to open in April.

The larger playground has all-new equipment, plus a high-tech artificial surface that's cooler than traditional playgrounds. The new splash pad will provide water activities for youngsters during warm weather.

Sign up for emergency notifications

Residents and businesses are encouraged to sign up for a new notification system to quickly learn about emergencies and other events that can affect the city. Called Regroup, the system is the quickest way to stay up-to-date during hurricanes, special events and other need-to-know occasions.

In addition to hurricanes, the system can alert residents to large special events that may affect traffic, as well as any urgent public safety messages and changes in city service schedules.









New dune crossovers coming this year

The City of Myrtle Beach has an ambitious schedule of replacing 14 sand dune crossovers this spring. The completed walkway shown above is at 73rd Avenue North.

Work also is underway at 51st Avenue North and other locations. Note that street ends may be closed while construction is occurring.



Look for restrooms soon in popular parks

Modular public public restrooms are being installed in several of Myrtle Beach's most popular parks.

The pre-fabricated restrooms are lifted into place, then connected to the city's permanent water and sewer systems. The units have two accessible bathrooms, with sinks and water fountains.

The restroom shown above is at Valor Memorial Garden in The Market Common. It's next to the pergola, near Hackler Street and Howard Avenue.

More bathrooms will be installed later this year at Midway Park, Futrell Park, Warbird Park and New Town Bark Park.



State regulates how golf carts may drive on streets

Golf carts are allowed on public streets, but state law regulates how and when they may be used and who is allowed to drive one.

When used on the road, golf carts must be insured and registered with the SC Department of Motor Vehicles. Here are the operating rules for golf carts on the street:

- Only by a licensed driver.
- Only when insured and registered.
- Only during daylight hours.
- Only on secondary roads where the speed limit is 35 miles per hour or less.
- Only up to four miles from the registered address.
- Not on primary roads (Kings Highway or US 501).
- Not on sidewalks, bike lanes or multipurpose paths.
- Not with more people than seats in the golf cart.
- Not by unlicensed children of any age.

The Corps of Engineers said the City of Myrtle Beach will receive 650,000 cubic yards of sand, or the equivalent of 65,000 dump trucks' worth. New sand fences and sea grass will be added afterward.

Actual pumping of sand is not expected until late this year, at the earliest. The Corps' design-and-coordination phase will take six to nine months, so we will not have a new beach in time for this summer.

In all, the South Carolina will receive \$97 million in federal funding to replenish Hurricane Ian's damage.
