MONTGOMERY COUNTY HAZARDOUS WASTE EVENTS

Montgomery County continues to offer collection sites for certain hazardous wastes throughout the County on various dates and drop-off sites. Five events have already been held with two remaining: one scheduled for September 24 at Spring-Ford 9th grade center and one on October 23 at Lower Merion Transfer Station. Preregistration is required at www.MontcoPARecycles.org or by calling 610.278.3618.

AGRICULTURAL SECURITY AREA

This year the Township has had several applications, totaling 66.21 acres from residents applying to have their properties become part of the Township's Agricultural Security Area. This program was established in 1981 as a tool for strengthening and protecting agriculture in Pennsylvania. In order to be eligible to be included in the program, a property must be comprised of a minimum of 10 acres. The property must be viable agricultural land with soils conducive to agriculture such as cropland, pasture and woodland and have an income of at least \$2,000 from agricultural production per year. Benefits to the property owner include protection from some "nuisance" challenges and special consideration from local and state government agencies should the farm ever be proposed for condemnation. There is no tax benefit under this program and the farmer is obligated to maintain the ASA status for seven years, and following that time frame, can request removal from the program by submitting a written request to the municipality. The municipality may conduct a review of its ASA designated properties every seven years, and if no review is conducted, properties are automatically renewed for an additional seven years. Enrollment in this program is a prerequisite for eligibility in the county preservation program.



NEW HANOVER TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE 22-06 – *Zoning Changes*

Pennsylvania municipalities are required, by the Municipalities Planning Code, to update their Comprehensive Plans every 10 years. The Township undertook the task of updating the plan with the help of the Montgomery County Planning Commission and input from the public. Consideration was given to land use, demographics, housing, infrastructure, education, recreation and thoroughfare. The Board of Supervisors elected to adopt the New Hanover Township Comprehensive Plan 2040 on April 01, 2021. Subsequent to adoption of the plan, and in order to implement changes desired, it was determined that changes to the Official Zoning Map and to the Subdivision-Land Development and Zoning Ordinances were needed. On June 2, 2022 a public hearing was held to amend

Chapter 27 of the Township's Zoning and Subdivision-Land Development Ordinances to reflect the expansion of the R-2M Zoning District and eliminate the CB-2, TN, and HI districts. All property owners affected by this change were notified by mail and encouraged to attend public meetings and the public hearing regarding this change. Copies of the updated ordinance as well as the updated zoning map are available in the Township office and on the website. This change is in accordance with the broad-based goals and objectives as identified in the Comprehensive Plan 2040 to manage growth, provide safety and a high quality of life for the community.

PRIVATE WELL STUDY by Temple University

Researchers at Temple University are offering a paid study for families who drink water from a private well. The study is intended to help keep children safe from illnesses that can be spread by drinking water from private wells. Participating families will receive a free whole-home UV water treatment system (value of device + installation = \$1,000). BRIDGE PROJECTS

The Township has experienced several bridge repair projects by PennDOT and Montgomery County Roads and Bridges this year. The Lutheran Road bridge has been determined to be unsafe, has been closed to all traffic and will be replaced by Montgomery County Roads and Bridges. The New Hanover Square bridge was determined to be unsafe following damages during the storm in 2020 and is being replaced by PennDOT. The bridge at Swamp Pike and New Hanover Square Road is being replaced by Montgomery County Roads and Bridges and the bridge at North Charlotte Street just north of Swamp Pike is being replaced by PennDOT. Road detours and inconveniences to the public are unavoidable despite the Township having played a pro-active role in coordinating the project timelines to avoid the projects being undertaken simultaneously.









WHAT IS INFLOW AND INFILTRATION?

Inflow and infiltration is defined as groundwater and stormwater that enters a sewer system. Collection systems can be damaged when they are forced to transport more flow than they are designed to handle. Increased I & I also raises costs for wastewater treatment facilities, because harmless stormwater and ground water mixes with sewage and needs treatment.

Exceeding the capacity of the collection system can result in discharge of untreated wastewater into the environment. This discharge may come from collection system components or from a treatment system that does not have adequate capacity to treat the water. Infiltration can also cause pipe infrastructure failures due to erosion of soil support, and ground subsidence due to erosion of underground soil.

Homeowners can help reduce I & I by a few simple ways. Locate the sewer cleanout/vent in your yard and verify that it is not broken and that it is not in a low-lying area where rainwater can pond up and possibly overflow into your sewer vent. If it is in a low area, the pipe should be raised and capped to avoid ponding water. You should also verify that you do not have a sump pump discharging into your sewer main and that your house rain gutters are not tied in.



The Township is also taking steps to help reduce I & I. We do this in a few ways, we currently have flow monitors in the collection system that record flow levels and show spikes in the flow which indicate issues. Televising of sewer mains helps to identify cracks, holes and other issues in the mains. The more serious pipe issues can be repaired by either digging the line up and repairing it or by slip lining (patching) the pipe. Inspections of manholes are performed and if issues are found, they will be rehabbed by grouting and sealing.

POLICE DEPARTMENT RELOCATION - 2373 Hoffmansville Road

We are anxiously looking forward to the completion of the renovations at 2373 Hoffmansville Road and relocation of our police department to that site. Current municipal facilities dedicated in 1976 are no longer adequate to serve the needs of both the police and administrative daily functions. Renovations to the Township's former recreation building will be the new home of the police department and will be equipped to provide adequate area, facilities and technology needed for the police to safely and efficiently perform their duties. Following the relocation of the police department, renovations to the administration building will begin with relocating the current meeting room to the area previously the home of the police department, renovations to the administration areas, as well as an upgrade to the façade of the building.

BUDGET SEASON

The goal of the Township budget process is to carefully evaluate the Township's financial status and present this information in a way that will facilitate understanding by Township residents and the government organization. The annual budget is prepared by the Township Manager and the Finance Director. In New Hanover Township, the budget process begins in July and ends in late November. The budget process takes about 4 months from initial planning to final approval. Each department of the township has a line-item budget that tracks every dollar spent for personnel, operating and equipment costs. Meetings are held with the Department Directors, the Township Manager, and the Finance Director to go over their budget requests. The Township Manager drafts a proposed budget which then goes to the Board of Supervisors for approval. The Board of Supervisors review the budget in detail and then hosts a public meeting for input and review. After the meeting, the Board of Supervisors will adopt the budget. The budget must be adopted before Dec. 31st. The Annual Budget is available to the public on the township website and at the Township Building.

CODE ENFORCEMENT/ZONING

This time of year is a good time to brainstorm home improvement projects, please be aware that most require a permit prior to construction. The purpose of this department is to protect the public health, safety and the general welfare as related to the construction and occupancy of buildings and structures. The following residential projects require permits:

- additions
- accessory structures such as sheds, gazebos, pergolas, pole barns
- the creation of habitable space in a basement, attic, loft or attached garage
- decks
- demolition
- driveways (new installations, extensions to existing driveways and changes to the public road intersection)
- electrical, plumbing and mechanical additions such as piping, wiring, lighting, heating, cooling, generators, solar panels
- fences
- grading
- · home occupation
- patios
- pools and hot tubs, capable of holding water 24" deep or greater
- signs
- sump pumps, except for replacement of existing sump pumps without change of discharge location



This list is not all inclusive and non-structural improvements may not require a permit, so please call the office at 610-323-1008, extension 102 for specifics as needed. Additionally, if you rent all or any portion of your property, you must register the tenants with the Township.

Applications can be found on our website at https://www.newhanover-pa.org/resources/documents_ and_forms.php . Applications can be submitted by email to sdelporte@newhanover-pa.org, placed in the lockbox in the foyer, which is accessible at all times, by mail or in-person. Payment is not due until your plans are approved. Currently payments can be made by cash or check. All inspections and plan reviews, including electric, are done by the Township inspectors from Monday through Friday.

Failure to obtain the required building permits and inspections could result in serious ramifications and costly penalties. Violations are often discovered during fire and emergency investigations or when a property is offered for sale and County tax records and Township files cannot validate the improvements. Additional permits will not be processed for a property with outstanding prior permitting violations.

Residents of communities with a Homeowners Association (HOA) are requested to submit the HOA note that is on our website, with your building and zoning applications. The covenants, conditions and restrictions of an HOA may impose a more restricted use than is permitted under applicable Township ordinances. The HOA must be contacted before any work can be started.

MESSAGES FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR



Leaf Season:

• Leaves are recyclable and can be composted on your property or you may drop them off to Hetrick Gardens @ 2620 Swamp Pike Gilbertsville PA, No charge for New Hanover Township Residents.

Stormwater:

- All storm drains are checked and monitored before and during storms by Public Works employees
- Never dump anything into storm drains and never blow mowed grass into the street as it will clog drains and fill road drainage swales

Snow Removal Tips:

- Use off street parking when snow is predicted, by parking in the driveway there will be less snow to shovel
- · Do not park over storm drains, so that crews can clear snow and ice and avoid flooding from melting runoff
- Do not shovel or snow blow snow into the street after it has been plowed
- Think Safety: never approach moving snow equipment, just because you can see the driver does not mean he can see you
- If there's a fire hydrant near your home, please adopt it and keep it clear in case of an emergency.

SAFETY IN SNOWY CONDITIONS

Township plowing operations begin after MORE than two inches of snow accumulation and freezing temperatures which indicate no natural melting will occur. Residents are responsible for clearing snow around mailboxes and fire hydrants and also responsible for removing snow, ice, and slush from sidewalks, including handicap ramps, within 24 hours after the snow has stopped falling. Snow removed from sidewalks should be piled on lawns, not in the street or on neighboring properties. In the event a snow emergency is declared, do not drive unless it is absolute necessity and please assure that all cars are removed from along the roadway during the storm. Basketball hoops are NOT permitted to be located within the right of way and must be removed from the roadway.

What is an EAB, anyway?

Meetings are the second Monday of each month at 6:30 PM and are held in the Township building, 2943 N. Charlotte Street, Gilbertsville, PA 19525.

The EAB aims to educate Township residents about environmental issues so they can play a part in protecting/improving the Township.

The EAB assists the Township in monitoring basins to ensure proper function during and after a heavy rain event, gives advice to the Board of Supervisors after reviewing proposed development plans, is working on improving the Township parks with meadows and pollinator areas to make the parks more attractive and inviting, and is working on a recycling ordinance among other environmental topics.




RECREATION NEWS

Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years

Age matters when it comes to your smoke alarms.
Check the manufacture dates on your smoke alarms today!

Remove the smoke alarm from the wall or ceiling.





Look at the back of the alarm for the date of manufacture.

Smoke alarms should be replaced 10 years from the date of manufacture.





Put the alarm back on the ceiling or wall if it is less than 10 years old.



A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.



Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.



Call the fire department from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.
