ADAM CANIGIANI JR. – DISTINGUISHED CITIZEN AWARD RECIPIENT

On February 1, 2024, the Board of Supervisors presented 17-year-old resident Adam Canigiani Jr. with the Distinguished Citizen Award for his outstanding service to the community. State Senator Tracy Pennycuick and State Representative Donna Scheuren also presented him with accolades.

Adam is the son of Adam and Jessica Canigiani. Their family has held the Canigiani Christmas Light Show since 2007 that is enjoyed by thousands of people in this region. In conjunction with the Light Show, Adam began



in 2020 to collect food drive items for the Boyertown Area Multi-Service and donated approximately 7,500 pounds of food. His Eagle Scout Project in 2022 consisted of disbursing business cards, along with his volunteers at the Light Show, that contained a QR code that led visitors to an Amazon wish list that was created by the Child Life Department at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. In May 2023, while Adam was receiving treatment for his own health battles, he was able to deliver over 1,000 toys valued at over \$6,000 for The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Adam and his parents assisted the Township this past winter with

the food drive, in which 1,474 pounds of food was donated to the Boyertown Area Multi-Service.

He will graduate from Boyertown Area Senior High this spring and then attend Penn State Berks in the fall where he will major in Business. It is evident that Adam has a bright future ahead of him and we are sure that he will continue to make a profound impact on the lives of others.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

The Finance Department is responsible for the recording of all revenues and for the disbursement of all funds in compliance with the annual budget. The department provides accurate financial statements to the Board of Supervisors at the monthly meetings along with a detailed Bill's List. The Finance Department is also responsible for the billing and collection of rebillable land development expenses. The department maintains developer escrow accounts for all land development in the township. In addition, the Finance Department processes payroll and administers the township pension plans. Dallas Data Systems supports the Finance Department monthly by reconciling the township bank accounts. The Department is also responsible for the filing of all annual reports throughout the year and assisting the Township Manager with the annual budget. Starting in 2023, the Finance Department became responsible for the collection of sewer payments.





The Township adheres to the modified accrual basis of accounting and maintains all financial records in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles. The financial records are

independently audited annually by Maillie, Certified Public Accountants, which issues audited financial statements that are available for public review via the township website.

POLICE DEPARTMENT



CRASHDOCS - ACCIDENT REPORTS SERVICE

The Police Department is now using a service called Crashdocs (Powered by Carfax) which serves as a central hub for obtaining accident reports and allows citizens to access accident reports without the need to contact Township personnel for report copies. This service offers convenience to those who have experienced accidents within the Township by providing 24/7 access to the accident information and at the same fee that it would have cost to have previously obtained a report through the Township.

In addition, Carfax extends various investigative tools and offers complimentary training sessions to the Police Department. These resources encompass unlimited Carfax reports, partial license plate searches, 24/7 VIN monitoring, interagency collaboration, and a mobile app. These invaluable tools significantly enhance the department's ability to investigate crimes related to vehicle fraud, VIN alteration, stolen vehicles, and incidents involving partial license plate information, among others.



HYDROGEN SULFIDE IN WASTEWATER COLLECTION SYSTEMS

Hydrogen sulfide (H2S) is a colorless, flammable gas with a characteristic rotten egg odor that is frequently encountered in wastewater collection systems. This compound is formed during the microbial decomposition of organic matter in sewage under anaerobic conditions. In wastewater collection systems, H2S can pose significant challenges due to its corrosive nature. The gas can react with moisture in the air to form sulfuric acid, leading to the deterioration of concrete and metal structures within the system. Corrosion caused by hydrogen sulfide can result in the degradation of pipes, manholes, and other infrastructure, leading to increased maintenance costs and the potential for system failures.

To mitigate the adverse effects of hydrogen sulfide in wastewater collection systems, various control measures are employed. Proper ventilation and aeration are critical components of effective control, as



introducing oxygen helps create aerobic conditions that are less conducive to the production of hydrogen sulfide. Implementing these control measures not only safeguards the structural integrity of the system but also minimizes the associated maintenance costs and potential risks of infrastructure failures.

Regular monitoring of hydrogen sulfide levels is a crucial aspect of managing wastewater collection systems. Monitoring allows operators to assess the effectiveness of implemented control measures and identify areas within the system that may require targeted interventions. By staying vigilant and proactive in addressing hydrogen sulfide concerns, wastewater management authorities can ensure the long-term sustainability of their infrastructure, reduce environmental impact, and protect the health and safety of both workers and the surrounding community.

MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR

Public works crew will be completing the Dotterer Road trail project this summer.

All Capital Road Projects are based upon Board of Supervisors approval and scheduling can change.



For hazardous tree issues along state or county roadways that are overhanging the roadway or electric lines, if it is within 10 feet of an electric line only a qualified linesman in tree removal/pruning practices can trim or remove the tree. Met-Ed can be notified about issues by visiting firstenergycorp.com/met_edison. Under the Service Requests tab, select 'Report Tree Problem'.

Residents can report streetlight issues to Met-Ed by calling 1-888-LIGHTSS (1-888-544-4877) or at the website listed above by going to the Service Requests tab and selecting 'Outdoor Lighting Problem'. They may also contact the township and provide information of the closest address or the pole number.

ONLINE SUBMISSIONS & PAYMENTS FOR FENCE, SHED, AND PATIO PERMITS

There's a new and easy way to apply for your permits! New Hanover Township is pleased to introduce an online portal for permit submissions. You can fill out the form, attach the required documents, and pay for the permit all from the convenience of your home. This is currently available ONLY for fence permits, shed permits, and patio permits. All other permit types will require mailed, e-mailed, or in-person submission on the required form(s) with the applicable fee. Please email permits@newhanover-pa. org with any questions.

STORMWATER BMP INSPECTION PROGRAM

As part of the Township's MS4 Permit, all stormwater facilities (Best Management Practices - also referred to as BMPs) built after 2003 must be inspected. Prior to 2021, the Township relied on self-inspections for properties containing a stormwater management facility; this was done either by individual owners or by consultants hired by property owners to conduct the inspection. In 2021, the Township consulted with its engineer at that time to conduct inspections of all BMPs in the Township. The intent was to start all properties on the same inspection timeline. Inspections were completed in 2021 and 2022 but then paused during 2023.

This year, the Township is continuing with conducting BMP inspections and will be offering an option for self-inspection in lieu of the engineer inspection. BMPs will be inspected based on the approved plan specific to that BMP. The Township's Stormwater Management Ordinance has changed over time, therefore, the required design standards for older basins look different from more moder basins. Each BMP falls under an Operations & Maintenance agreement that gives the legal right for the Township or its agents to go onto a property to perform the inspection.

BMPs are classified into 2 categories:

 PCSM BMPs (Post-Construction Stormwater Management BMPs) are facilities constructed as part of a land development plan and are required to be inspected yearly.



CARING FOR YOUR YARD THIS SPRING

Spring is here and with it comes warmer weather, longer days and lots of yard work! Before you head outside to tackle your latest project, remember that what you do on your yard has a direct impact on the environment. This is especially true when it comes to caring for your lawn.

Lawns are notorious for their negative impacts on wildlife as well as local waterways. Luckily there are lots of small steps that you can take as a homeowner to make your yard more eco-friendly!

Consider these tips to reduce stormwater pollution and create wildlife habitat on your property this spring.

Clean-up: Collect and dispose of any trash that might have blown into your yard over the winter. Mulch or compost leaves and garden cuttings from the fall so that they don't get washed into local streams.



Fertilize Carefully: Look for slow release nitrogen fertilizer which is less likely to harm water quality. Several small fertilizer applications spread out over the growing season is better than one large application. Never apply fertilizer before it rains!



Plant Natives: Spring is a great time to plant native trees, shrubs and perennials! Native PA species require less maintenance, are more beneficial for wildlife and absorb more stormwater than non-natives.



Mow Sharp and High: A sharp mower blade cuts grass cleanly which improves turf health. Set your mower deck to 2.5" or more to help reduce stormwater runoff. Consider converting a section of your lawn to native garden!

• LT1A BMPs (Less than 1 Acre BMPs) are facilities installed on individual properties as a result of the addition of impervious cover over 1,000 square feet and are to be inspected once per year for the first 5 years and then a minimum of 3 years thereafter.

Residents impacted by the Stormwater BMP Inspection Program received a notice letter in February to provide information about the program timeline, future costs, and options for a Township versus self-inspection.

The inspections will be conducted by Knight Engineering. Fees for the inspection program will be billed at an hourly rate. Residents will receive an invoice after their inspection is completed. Inspections will be held on a rolling basis starting in May/ June and completed by July. As the inspections are completed, properties with no violations will receive a letter confirming such. Non-compliant properties will receive notice letters; compliance will either be marked for review the following inspection year or 90 days for more serious violations. Re-inspections will occur in August/September.

The survey technician will utilize an online survey tool called Survey123 where the data will be collected in the field, including photos of the BMP. The data will be exported into a report and reviewed by the Township engineer for completeness before sending the final report to the Township. The report data will be uploaded into the Township GIS under our service agreement with the Center for Watershed Protection.

Residents will have the option to opt into a self-inspection rather than have the Township engineer perform the inspection, provided that they meet the deadline and submit by a designated day on Township provided forms. Resources prepared by Township staff will be available to educate residents on how to perform a self-inspection; check the Township's website and Facebook for updates pertaining to these resources.

Early registration is recommended as each session accommodates a maximum of 32 campers. Registration for non-township residents opens on April 22. Sessions take place at Community Park from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM, allowing kids to enjoy outdoor activities, games, crafts, and fun in cooler morning temperatures. Session 1 runs from June 24 to July 5 (excluding July 4th), and Session 2 runs from July 8 to July 19.



ENVIRONMENTAL ADVISORY BOARD




